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FOREWORD


The "USAF Statistical Digest" (Short Title USAF SD-57) summarizes in one document the volume of statistical data collected and published by various offices in Headquarters, United States Air Force and certain major commands. It is published in accordance with AFR 5-24 and is to be used as the official basic reference document for the period and areas covered.

The Fiscal Year 1957 edition is the twelfth edition of the series. Original editions - Army Air Force Statistical Digest (World War II) and supplement Number 1, 1945 were followed by AAF Statistical Digest, 1946 and USAF Statistical Digest 1947. The 1946 and 1947 editions made Air Force statistics available in summarized form, available as far back as possible, with the exception of Combat Operations. This data is found only in the 1945 edition. The 1948 issue was the first strictly annual publication. Since 1949 each annual edition has been organized on a Fiscal Year basis.

Immediately following the Table of Contents is a Major Air Command listing, containing information which is appropriate to all data included in this issue. Definitions and general information pertaining to specific subject matter areas are found in introductory statements in each Part. Tables indicated in the headnote as "New Tables" are tables which were not included in the FY 56 edition of this publication.

Sources of most of the data are the published and unpublished records of the Directorate of Statistical Services. The balance of the data was furnished by other agencies as noted in source reference data.

AIR DEFENSE COMMAND

Established 21 March 1946; reassigned to Continental Air Command, 1 December 1948; discontinued, 1 July 1950; and re-established as a major air command 1 January 1951.

AIR MATERIEL COMMAND

Established 17 July 1944 as AAF Materiel and Services; redesignated as AAF Air Technical Service Command, 31 August 1944; redesignated as Air Technical Service Command, 1 July 1945; and redesignated as Air Materiel Command, 9 March 1946.

AIR PROVING GROUND COMMAND

Established as AAF School of Applied Tactics, 27 October 1942; redesignated as AAF Tactical Center, 28 October 1943; redesignated as AAF Center, 1 June 1945; redesignated as AAF Proving Ground Command, 28 February 1946; redesignated as Air Proving Ground Command, 10 July 1946; redesignated as Air Proving Ground and assigned to Air Materiel Command, 20 January 1948; relieved of assignment to Air Materiel Command and designated a major air command, 1 June 1948; and redesignated as Air Proving Ground Command, 20 December 1951.

AIR RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT COMMAND

Established as Research and Development Command, 23 January 1950; redesignated as Air Research and Development Command, 16 September 1950; and assumed powers, missions and functions, and responsibilities of the Air Force Special Weapons Center (formerly Special Weapons Command), 1 April 1952.

AIR TRAINING COMMAND

Established as Army Air Force Training Command, 7 July 1943; and redesignated as Air Training Command, 1 July 1946.

AIR UNIVERSITY

Established as AAF School of Applied Tactics, 1 November 1943; redesignated as Army Forces School, 1 June 1945 and redesignated as Air University, 12 March 1946.

CONTINENTAL AIR COMMAND

Established 1 December 1948.

HEADQUARTERS COMMAND, USAF

Established as Bolling Field Command, 15 December 1946; and redesignated as Headquarters Command, USAF, 17 March 1948.

MILITARY AIR TRANSPORT SERVICE

Established 1 June 1948 assuming all active units of the discontinued Air Transport Command and Air Transport Service; and assumed powers, missions, functions and responsibilities of Air Pictorial Service, 16 April 1952.

STRATEGIC AIR COMMAND

Established 21 March 1946 concurrent with redesignation of Continental Air Forces.

TACTICAL AIR COMMAND

Established 21 March 1946; reassigned to Continental Air Command, 1 December 1948; and relieved of assignment to Continental Air Command and designated a major air command, 1 December 1950.

USAF SECURITY SERVICE

Established 20 October 1948.

ALASKAN AIR COMMAND

Activated Alaska Air Forces, 15 January 1942; redesignated as 11th Air Force, 5 February 1942; and redesignated as Alaskan Air Command, 21 December 1945.

CARIBBEAN AIR COMMAND

Activated Panama Canal Air Force, 20 November 1940; redesignated as Caribbean Air Force, 5 August 1941; redesignated as Sixth Air Force, 5 February 1942; redesignated as Caribbean Air Command, 31 July 1946; and assumed powers, missions, functions and responsibilities of Antilles Air Command, 31 July 1946.

FAR EAST AIR FORCES

Activated Far East Air Forces, 3 August 1944; redesignated as Pacific Air Command, U. S. Army, 6 December 1945; beginning July 1945, it included Fifth, Seventh, and Thirteenth Air Force and Air Forces in Middle Pacific; and redesignated as Far East Air Forces, 1 January 1947.

NORTHEAST AIR COMMAND

Transferred to jurisdiction of AAF, 1 January 1946 as Newfoundland Base Command, and assigned to Air Transport Command; and redesignated as Northeast Air Command, relieved of assignment to Military Air Transport Service, and designated a major air command, 1 October 1950. Discontinued 1 April 1957. Subordinate, Organizations, Personnel, and Functions transferred (with a few exceptions) to Strategic Air Command and Air Defense Command.

U. S. AIR FORCES IN EUROPE

Activated Eighth Air Force 28 January 1942; redesignated as United States Strategic Air Force in Europe, 1 March 1944; redesignated as U. S. Air Forces in Europe, 7 August 1945; and assumed powers, missions, functions and responsibilities of Third Air Division, 21 January 1951.

AIR FORCE FINANCE DIVISION

Established as a separate operating agency, 1 January 1951.

SIXTEENTH AIR FORCE

Established as a separate operating agency, 20 May 1954. Redesignated from Joint United States Military Group, Air Administration (Spain) to Sixteenth Air Force effective 15 July 1956.

USAF ACADEMY

Established 27 July 1954. The Headquarters of the Academy was activated 14 August 1954.

AIR FORCE UNITS AND CAPABILITIES

The tables included in this section provide a summary of all USAF Units and Summary data reflecting the Status and deployment of USAF Major Wings, and Flying Support Units.

Tables reflecting status and deployment contain the following data:

- a. Total units activated, Fiscal Years 1952 - 1957, inclusive.
- b. Equipped units by type of unit equipment possessed, Fiscal Years 1952 - 1957, inclusive.
- c. Authorized, possessed, combat ready unit equipment, and authorized, assigned, combat ready crews in units by type of unit equipment, Fiscal Years 1954 - 1957, inclusive.
- d. Operational Readiness of USAF Major Wings, Fiscal Year 1957.

DEFINITIONS

Major Wing - An air unit composed normally of one primary mission group and the necessary supporting organizations, and other services required by the primary mission group. It is designed for direct participation in operations against enemy forces or for providing airlift for combat elements.

NOTE: In some cases, Major groups do not have a parent wing. Also, certain Major squadrons do not have a parent wing or group. Such units are shown in wing equivalents on the basis that one primary mission group or approximately three or four primary mission squadrons, depending on the type of unit and location, are the equivalent of a wing.

Flying Support Unit - A flying unit which has a mission of furnishing operational assistance to combat elements.

Operational Readiness - A measurement of relative capability. It is the degree to which a unit is manned, equipped and trained for the satisfactory performance of its primary mission.

Primary Mission - The principal mission currently assigned the unit. Normally it is preparing for, or executing the task for which the unit was basically intended.

CHANGES IN TABLES

The terms "Major Wings," "Major Wings and Support Forces (Flying)" and "Major Wings and Squadrons" used in Tables 2 through 9 of this edition are synonymous with "Combat and Troop Carrier Wings and Support Forces," "Combat and Troop Carrier Wings and Squadrons," "Combat and Troop Carrier and Transport Units," "Combat and Airlift Units," "Combat and Troop Carrier Wings" in previous editions. The changes necessitated are as follows:

Unit capabilities are expressed as "C" ratings. These evaluations are prepared by Headquarters USAF after considering all known factors affecting unit readiness.

C-1 High degree of relative effectiveness. Adequately manned, equipped and trained to perform primary mission with latest type UE(first line aircraft and equipment).

C-2 Same as C-1 except with second line aircraft and equipment (B-26, F-80, etc.) or with first line aircraft and equipment not designed to perform the primary mission of the unit.

C-3 A lesser degree of effectiveness than indicated above with either first or second line equipment. Shortage of personnel, equipment and facilities, etc., exists.

C-4 A very low degree of effectiveness. Extreme shortage in equipment, personnel and facilities exists.

FLIGHT OPERATIONS

INTRODUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

Aircraft flight operations data included in this section are based on statistics submitted on AF Form 110A in accordance with AFR 65-110 as revised. The 110A report is compiled on a physical possession basis with the various activity categories determined by the assignment or status of the aircraft rather than actual use.

The tables provide summary data covering flight operations on "Operating Active" and "Non-Operating Active" USAF aircraft and include aircraft flying hours, utilization, etc.

Operating Active - Those aircraft which are actively engaged in supporting flying missions, including test aircraft and aircraft bailed to civilian activities for test. Assignment codes are as follows:

(AD) Administrative: Aircraft authorized major air commands for the performance of command administrative missions.

(CS) Operational Support: Aircraft assigned for essential liaison and logistic support not otherwise provided, and for the required combat readiness training of rated personnel not presently assigned to tactical units or crew positions.

(CC) Primary Tactical Unit: Aircraft assigned as primary unit equipment for the direct accomplishment of tactical unit operations.

(CP) Tactical Unit Support: Aircraft which are authorized and assigned as tactical unit support aircraft.

(CU) Student Training: Aircraft assigned to perform the mission of student and combat crew training within the Air Training Command, Military Air Transport Service and Air Force Academy.

(CT) MATS Transport: Aircraft assigned for the accomplishment of transport operations within MATS.

(CE) MATS Air Evacuation: Aircraft assigned for the accomplishment of air evacuation operations within MATS.

(TC) Combat Crew Training: Aircraft assigned specifically to combat training schools.

(EX) Test: Aircraft assigned for testing, research and development other than "X" models and aircraft on bailment contract.

(ES) Test Support: Aircraft assigned to support of test aircraft and allied equipment other than aircraft on bailment contract for test support.

(CM) Special Mission: Aircraft assigned to major air commands to accomplish missions of the Air Force in support of its own special activities and those of the governmental agencies which cannot be met as a by-product mission of other flying.

Non-Operating Active - Those aircraft in preparation for possession by units or test activities through any of the logistical processes of supply, maintenance, and modification, and those aircraft which are excess to command requirements.

Command Support: Includes aircraft in (DP) Depot Prototyping, (DW) Depot Work, (RT) Transient Maintenance, and (NP) New Production.

(CX) MAP Aircraft Temporarily Diverted to USAF: Aircraft programmed for foreign countries under the Mutual Assistance Program for which delivery to the ultimate recipient foreign country has been deferred in order to divert temporarily these aircraft to the USAF.

Other: Includes aircraft in (NR) Enroute, (XJ) Excess to Command, and (CD) Crash Damage.



PART III



SAFETY

The data presented on this category are subdivided into two sections: Flying Safety and Ground Safety.

FLYING SAFETY

The content of this section presents data on aircraft accidents which occurred in the United States Air Force, the Air National Guard, the Air Force Reserve, and the Navy units flying for the Military Air Transport Service during Fiscal Year 1957.

During Fiscal Year 1957, all accidents, major and minor, totalled 1,532. These accident statistics are reflected herein by command, by type and model of aircraft involved, by phase of operation in which the accident occurred, by the factors causing the accident and by the conditions affecting the accident. All rates are expressed in number of accidents per 100,000 flying hours.

AIRCRAFT ACCIDENT:

An event not caused directly by enemy action, involving one or more Air Force aircraft (including ANG aircraft) that occurs between the time the engine(s) is started for the purpose of commencing flight and the time when the aircraft lands and comes to rest with the engine(s) stopped for normal deplaning, and which results in minor, substantial damage or destruction of the aircraft.

MAJOR ACCIDENTS:

When the aircraft is destroyed or receives substantial damage.

ALL ACCIDENTS:

As used herein is the total of major plus minor accidents. A minor accident is one which the aircraft receives minor damage.

FATAL ACCIDENT:

In which any person receives fatal injuries.

FATAL:

A fatal injury that results in death because of major injuries received in the accident or the complications arising therefrom. Fatalities enumerated include all persons killed and/or missing as a result of USAF aircraft accidents. Pilot fatalities apply to USAF pilots only.

MISSION:

The primary objective or purpose for which a flight was undertaken. The mission classifications used herein conform with the AFM 65-110 mission categories.

BAILMENT AND/OR LOAN:

Accidents in aircraft which are on bailment contract or on loan are included in the total number of accidents appearing in this section. However, flying time is not available for bailment/loan aircraft, and accidents in these planes have not been included in rate computations.

GROUND SAFETY**DEFINITIONS**

The tables included in this section are USAF Ground Accident statistics approved and directed by the Air Force Regulation 32-1, dated 24 August 1948. In establishing the reporting system, standardized cost factors and definitions have been approved. The present standard accident costs for injuries and fatalities were established by the Air Force Regulation 32-2, dated 18 April 1956.

ACCIDENT, GROUND

Any accident which occurs on or off an Air Force installation, base, or site which involves Air Force military personnel, Air Force civilian personnel on duty, or Air Force property. Reference paragraph 3, Air Force Regulation 32-2, dated 18 April 1956.

ACCIDENT, PRIVATE MOTOR VEHICLE

A motor vehicle accident involving only non-Air Force motor vehicle or, if both Air Force and non-Air Force motor vehicles were involved, the Air Force motor vehicle was not being operated at the time of the accident. Motor vehicles which are not Air Force property will be considered as private motor vehicles. Vehicles which are the property of Government agencies other than the Air Force will also be considered as private motor vehicles.

ACCIDENT, USAF MOTOR VEHICLE

An accident involving the operating of an Air Force motor vehicle which results in either disabling or non-disabling injury to Air Force personnel and/or non-USAF persons and/or damage aggregating \$25.00 or more to Air Force motor vehicles, or to other vehicles or property without regard to ownership.

ACCIDENT, USAF PROPERTY

An incident resulting from Air Force ground operation wherein Air Force property is accidentally damaged in amount of \$25.00 or more.

COST PER CAPITA

Cost per Capita = Cost of Injuries / Cost of Fatalities / Cost of Property Damage

COMMAND (FISCAL YEAR MAJOR), CONTINENTAL US

Continental Command - A Major Air Command whose headquarters and subordinate units are located within the Continental United States.

COMMAND (FISCAL YEAR MAJOR), OVERSEAS

Overseas Command - A Major Air Command whose headquarters and subordinate units are located outside the Continental United States.

DAYS OUT OF SERVICE

Air Force vehicle "days out of Service" and Air Force aircraft "days out of service" will be estimated total number of calendar days that the particular piece of equipment is out of service as a result of a ground accident, beginning with the day after the accident occurs and continuing up to the day on which it is estimated that the equipment will return to service.

GROUND SAFETY (CONTINUED)

DEFINITIONS**INJURY, DISABLING**

An injury which results in death, permanent total, permanent partial injury, or temporary total injury which in the opinion of competent medical authority makes it impossible for the injured to return to work or duty at any time during the next calendar day following date of injury.

INJURY, NON-DISABLING

A non-disabling injury is an injury which, although requiring medical attention, would not keep the injured person from performing his regularly assigned duties during the next calendar day or any subsequent day. This type is generally known as a first-aid case.

PERSONNEL, CIVILIAN

Includes citizens and/or residents of the United States, its territories, and Canada, who are employed by the US Air Force and are paid from appropriated funds. Excludes Foreign Nationals.

PERSONNEL, MILITARY

Comprises officers and airmen serving on extended active duty with the Air Force. Members of other United States military services serving on extended active duty with Air Force units are included as Air Force Military Personnel.

RATES

Frequency rates were computed to the following formulas:

$$\text{Civilian Injury Rate} = \frac{\text{Number of Civilian Disabling and Fatal Injuries} \times 1,000,000}{\text{Total Hours of Civilian Employment}}$$

$$\text{Military Injury Rate (On Duty)} = \frac{\text{Number of Military Disabling and Fatal Injuries "On Duty"} \times 100,000}{\text{Total Military Man-Days of Exposure} \times 1/3}$$

$$\text{Military Injury Rate (Off Duty)} = \frac{\text{Number of Military Disabling and Fatal Injuries "Off Duty"} \times 100,000}{\text{Total Military Man-Days Exposure} \times 2/3}$$

$$\text{USAF Motor Vehicle Rate} = \frac{\text{Number of USAF Motor Vehicle Accidents} \times 100,000}{\text{Total USAF Motor Vehicle Mileage}}$$

STATUS

Indicates whether or not the person involved in the accident was on or off duty and whether the accident occurred on or off a military installation, base or site.

STRENGTH (AVERAGE), CIVILIAN

The derived civilian employee strength is developed by dividing the total civilian payroll man-hours worked (including legal holidays) during the report period by the standard number of work hours during the report period:

TOTAL CIVILIAN

$$\text{Derived Civilian Strength} = \frac{\text{Man Hours Worked}}{\text{Number of Standard Work Hours}}$$

The number of standard work-hours during the report period are the number of calendar days in the month minus Saturdays and Sundays multiplied by 8. Example - there were 21 paid payroll work-days in January 1955, therefore, the standard number of work-hours in the month was 21 multiplied by 8, or 168 hours.

STRENGTH (AVERAGE), MILITARY

The average military strength is obtained by dividing the total military man-days of exposure by the number of days in the report period:

$$\text{Average Military Strength} = \frac{\text{Exposure}}{\text{Number of Days in the Report Period}}$$

The total military exposure is the sum of daily assigned strength figures as shown on all morning reports for the entire report period.

GROUND SAFETY (CONTINUED)**DEFINITIONS****TIME LOSS (CIVILIAN)**

Time loss for a civilian employee will be the estimated total number of days he will be unable to report for work as a result of the injury beginning with the first day he is unable to report for work and continuing up to the date of return. Sick leave, annual leave, and holidays will be included in the time loss.

TIME LOSS (MILITARY)

Time loss for a military person will be the estimated number of calendar days he is unable to report for duty as a result of an accidental injury, beginning with the first day he is unable to report for duty and continued up to the date of return.

USAF AIRCRAFT DAMAGED FROM GROUND ACCIDENTS

USAF Aircraft damaged as the result of a ground accident.



AIRCRAFT-MATERIEL

INTRODUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

The tables included in this section provide summary data pertaining to the procurement, production, inventory, status, deployment, and disposition of USAF aircraft, and similar information for other major items or materiel in the USAF during the Fiscal Year 1957. Production data for aircraft and guided missiles are obtained under the provision of AF Regulation 70-11, dated 13 July 1952.

In addition to information reflecting the status of aircraft procurement and production, these data contain the following information by type and model of aircraft: Total aircraft inventory, active and inactive aircraft inventory, planned program, aircraft operationally and not operationally ready, aircraft in storage, aircraft excess to all military requirements, aircraft production, gains and losses to the aircraft inventory, and a summary of active and inactive aircraft by functional distribution.

The classification of aircraft herein is in accordance with AF Regulation 65-60, dated 15 June 1955, and T.O. 1-1-81, dated 15 August 1955 with revisions. The type classification is generally based upon the type designator or the prefix preceding the basic type designator of each aircraft model. A prefix is assigned an aircraft model when the aircraft is modified to perform a function (indicated by the prefix) other than its basically designated purpose.

The following definitions apply to the terms herein -

AIRCRAFT: A heavier-than-air vehicle, capable of flight, which has incorporated in its prime design the ability and/or requirement for human occupancy. (Ref T.O. 1-1-81)

OPERATING ACTIVE AIRCRAFT: Those aircraft which are currently and actively engaged in supporting flying missions, administrative aircraft, test aircraft including those test aircraft on bailment, aircraft provided for the required combat readiness training of rated personnel not presently assigned to tactical units or crew positions.

NON-OPERATING AIRCRAFT: Those aircraft in preparation for possession by units or test activities through any of the logistical processes of supply, maintenance, and modification, and those aircraft which are excess to command requirements.

INACTIVE AIRCRAFT: Those aircraft in the inventory other than operating active and non-operating active aircraft, such as aircraft on loan and bailment (except bailed for test, maintenance and modification); aircraft for which there is no longer a requirement in the active inventory, including those aircraft that have been accumulated in excess of immediate possible future needs; and aircraft in the process of being dropped from the total aircraft inventory.

ACCEPTANCE: Aircraft which have been shop-assembled and fully inspected by constituted USAF or Navy production authorities; and the title, responsibility, and accountability assumed by the contracting agency of recipient.

OPERATIONALLY READY: An aircraft, which without additional repair or maintenance, is safe and capable of normal flight operations. This does not necessarily indicate that the aircraft is capable of performing a specific mission such as combat, photo, etc., but merely that the aircraft is flyable and that the DD Form 781 does not bear a red cross. Weather, runway conditions, shortage of operations personnel, or other factors not relating to the aircraft itself will not cause an aircraft to be reported "not operationally ready."

ANORP: "Aircraft Not Operationally Ready Awaiting Parts" are those aircraft not flyable as indicated by a red cross on DD Form 781, solely due to lack of parts. Aircraft will not be reported as awaiting parts unless the required parts have been requisitioned from the normal supply source at the station where the aircraft is located and notification has been received from the normal supply source that the parts are not available. This category does not include those aircraft awaiting parts required for the performance of modifications defined in AF Regulation 57-4.

AIRFRAME WEIGHT: The weight of the assembled principal structural components of an aircraft. It includes hull or fuselage, wings, stabilizers, vertical fins, control surfaces, landing gear, and nacelles.

GUIDED AIRCRAFT ROCKET: A type of self-propelled aircraft armament normally carried by piloted aircraft which, after launching, can be guided to the target which it destroys by means of an explosive war-head.

USAF GUIDED MISSILES: An unmanned vehicle moving above (about) the earth's surface whose trajectory or flight path is capable of being altered by a mechanism within the vehicle.

USAF AMMUNITION: All stocks of serviceable and suspended Air Force ammunition items physically on hand.

AIRCRAFT ENGINES

INTRODUCTION AND DEFINITIONS

Data on production and inventory of aircraft, missile and drone engines are presented in this section. Engine production data are obtained under the provisions of AFR 67-62, dated 6 August 1954, while engine inventory data are obtained under the provisions of AFR 65-20, dated 12 March 1957.

The following definitions apply to the terms as used in this publication:

ACCEPTANCES: An aircraft engine that has been shop-assembled and fully inspected by authorized USAF or Navy plant representatives, and for which the title, responsibility, and accountability have been assumed by the contracting agency or recipient.

INSTALLED ENGINE: Serviceable or repairable engine assets which are either physically mounted on aircraft, missile or drone; or undergoing organizational maintenance for reinstallation in an aircraft, missile or drone.

UNINSTALLED ENGINE (formerly designated as SPARE): An engine available for distribution or installation, but without controls or built up accessories which convert it to a power pack.

REPARABLE ENGINE: Engines determined to be operationally unsuitable, requiring other than organizational or field maintenance.

SERVICEABLE ENGINE: Engines determined to be operationally suitable for installation, or are either awaiting or undergoing organizational or field maintenance.



AVIATION FUEL AND OIL

The information contained in this section summarizes USAF aviation fuel and oil, world-wide, for Fiscal Year 1957.

The data shown in the following tables include fuel and oil inventories, issues and receipts.

DEFINITIONS: The following definitions apply to the terms herein:

AVIATION FUEL - applies to aviation gasoline and jet fuel. Aviation gasoline is graded by octane rating in order - 115/145, 100/130, 91/96 and 80. Jet fuel consists of JP-4 and JP-5 types.

AVIATION OIL - a term which applies to aircraft engine lubricating oil, graded thus - 1120, 1100, 1080, 1065; Jet oil - 1015, 1010, 1005; and special jet-7808. It includes reused product for the Fiscal Years 1956 and 1957 only.

INVENTORY - product on hand at base, terminal, and in transit.

IN TRANSIT - product on way to destination. Applies to both overseas and zone of interior.

ISSUES - includes fuel consumption for flying purposes, fuel utilized for other than direct flight operations; i.e., marine equipment, engine block testing, and modification centers. "Issues" is broken down into four types: charge sales (issues to users of USAF, USAF Reserve and Air National Guard Aircraft, and other than aircraft), reimbursable sales to other than USAF Aircraft, issues for cash, and exchange account (Canadian AF or Canadian Navy).

RECEIPT - The increase in inventory caused by receipt of incoming shipment of product.







PREFACE AND DEFINITIONS

The tables included in this section provide summary data on the status of the USAF World-Wide Vehicle Inventory. Air Force Regulation 77-1, and Air Force Manual 171-5, Volume II, constitute the basic authority for the system.

BASE STOCK. Vehicles on the property account of the base supply officer.

DEPOT STOCK. Vehicles in a depot for depot repair or storage (includes vehicles at commercial storage sites).

EXCESS TO INDIVIDUAL ORGANIZATIONS. Vehicles in excess to requirements of the individual responsible organizations.

INTRANSIT. Vehicles enroute from the manufacturer to a command, or from one command to another.

IN-USE. Vehicles assigned for use.

MOBILIZATION RESERVE AND SPECIAL PROJECTS. Vehicles committed to AF-GEN-1-50-OPR (SEA WEED, BIG TOP, and NIGHT LIFE) and other special projects.

UNECONOMICALLY REPARABLE. Vehicles which are uneconomically reparable in accordance with TO 3GA-1-70 (Maximum Repair Allowance for USAF Vehicles).

UNREPORTED STATUS. Vehicles which have been incorrectly reported; i.e., one of the above terms has not been used to correctly identify the status of the vehicle.

INDIGENOUS. Refers to off-shore procurement and occupation cost acquired vehicles.



MACHINE TOOLS**PREFACE AND DEFINITIONS**

The table in this section provides summary data on the status of the inventory and dollar value of USAF Machine Tools. Air Force Regulations 78-15; 78-19; 78-23; and 78-24 cover the contractor segment, whereas AF Manual 67-1 covers the supply segment.

Machine tools are referred to as that production equipment listed in the Federal Stock Catalog under commodity codes 3411-3419 and 3441-3449.

CONTRACTOR CUSTODY (ACTIVE). Tools in the hands of contractors, in-use for production.

CONTRACTOR CUSTODY (IDLE). Tools not in-use. They are in a general reserve located at contractor storage sites.

SUPPLY (ACTIVE). Tools in the hands of base installations engineers, base maintenance activities, including aircraft and equipment, and depot maintenance for maintenance, rebuild, and repair work.

SUPPLY (IDLE). Tools not in-use. They are in a general reserve located at Air Materiel Command storage sites.

LATHES. Includes screw machines.

MISCELLANEOUS MACHINE TOOLS. Includes gun rifling machines, shapers, power hack saws, files, etc.

BENDING AND FORMING MACHINES. Excludes wire and metal ribbon forming machines.

MANUAL PRESSES. Includes arbor, straightening, forcing and assembly presses.

FORGING MACHINERY AND HAMMERS. Excludes forging presses.

WIRE AND RIBBON FORMING MACHINES. Excludes roll forming machines.

RIVETING MACHINES. Excludes power driven hand riveting machines.

NOTE: Heavy presses (forging and extrusion) are included in FSC Code 3442, Hydraulic and Pneumatic Presses, Power Driven.



FISCAL

This section reflects the funding operations of the various Air Force Appropriations and/or funds with the respective major programs for the fiscal years indicated in the title of each table. Some of the related budget tables are to be found in other areas of the publication such as reports on the Reserve Forces, Mutual Defense Assistance Program, and Research and Development.

DEFINITIONS**APPROPRIATION**

An authorization by an Act of Congress to incur obligations for specified purposes and to make payments therefor out of the Treasury.

APPROPRIATION ACCOUNT

An account established to make amounts available for obligation and expenditure from the Treasury. In Budget-Treasury Regulation 1, appropriation accounts include not only accounts to which money is directly appropriated, but also revolving funds, working funds, trust funds, etc. Appropriation accounts do not include official deposit funds.

APPROPRIATION REIMBURSEMENT

Consists of earnings or collections for commodities, work, or services furnished or to be furnished between appropriations or to an individual, firm or corporation to be credited to an appropriation account.

BUDGET PROGRAM

A subdivision established under an appropriation to identify a significant segment of Air Force operations.

EXPENDITURE

The amount of liability incurred for goods and services received or assets acquired for which payment has been made. Synonymous with disbursements less expenditure refunds.

FUND

A sum of money or other resources, usually segregated, to be expended or used for specified purposes.

OBLIGATION

The amount of an order placed, contract awarded, or service received, or any transaction which establishes a legal requirement for the ultimate disbursement of funds.

OBLIGATIONS INCURRED

Amounts of orders placed, contracts awarded, services received, and similar transactions during a given period requiring future payment of money.

PROJECT ACCOUNT CLASSIFICATION

In appropriation and fund accounting, an approved system of subdivision of an appropriation or fund for administrative use.

REAL PROPERTY

Any interest in land and anything permanently attached to it, including structures, fixtures, and other improvements.

UNLIQUIDATED OBLIGATION

An obligation incurred for which payment has not been made.

UNOBBLIGATED BALANCE

That portion of an authorization which has not been obligated.



TRANSPORTATION

1. Definitions:

a. Space Required Travel -

- (1) Military personnel of the Department of Defense on active duty traveling under competent change of station or temporary duty orders, or in emergency leave status.
- (2) Civilian personnel of the Department of Defense traveling under competent change of station, temporary duty, or emergency leave orders.
- (3) Members of Congress traveling on official business at the request of and subject to such controls as may be prescribed by the chairman of the committee on which the Member of Congress is serving.
- (4) Dependents of military and civilian personnel of the Department of Defense when traveling pursuant to competent permanent change of station orders or travel authorizations in connection with permanent change of station of the principal.
- (5) Red Cross personnel on duty with the Armed Forces who are traveling under competent orders of the sponsoring Department.
- (6) Dependents of military and civilian personnel of the Department of Defense stationed overseas when such dependents are traveling to or from the United States for the purpose of attending school - not to exceed one round trip per year.

b. Space Available Travel - space unassigned after all space requirement travel assignments have been made and which would otherwise be unused.

c. Measurement Ton - a unit of volume for cargo freight usually reckoned at 40 cubic feet.

2. Overseas Areas -

- a. Transatlantic - Europe, Mediterranean-Africa, Azores, Bermuda, Iceland.
- b. Arctic - Newfoundland, Greenland, Labrador.
- c. Pacific - Philippines, Far East, Pacific Islands, Indian Ocean Area.
- d. Caribbean - Caribbean Area, South America, Ascension Island.
- e. Alaska - Includes Aleutians.



INSTALLATIONS, CONSTRUCTION, COST OF MAINTENANCE AND OPERATING OF USAF REAL PROPERTY

The information contained in this section covers a variety of subject matter which has been grouped in the following major divisions:

Installations
Construction
Cost of Maintenance and Operation of USAF Real Property

INSTALLATIONS

This section furnishes data on acreage and cost of real property, and number and types of installations under the jurisdiction of the USAF. The following definitions are applicable to types of installations.

Operational: An installation the principal use of which is to provide capability of sustained support of USAF combat and/or combat support missile or flying units of squadron strength or greater.

Operational Support, Flying: An installation the principal use of which is to support flying activities other than combat or combat support of squadron level or greater.

Operational Support, Non-Flying: An installation the principal use of which is the headquarters of numbered air forces on higher echelon, without flying facilities.

Training: An installation the principal use of which is the support of the training mission.

Research and Test: An installation the principal use of which is to support major research, development or employment and suitability testing mission.

Logistical: An installation the principal use of which is the support of major depot or Headquarters, Air Materiel Command.

Industrial: Plants, airfields, and/or allied facilities controlled by the Air Force through ownership, lease, or permit which are operated under contract for production, modification, and/or research and development of aircraft and related procurement, and which fall under the jurisdiction and accountability of the Air Materiel Command.

Ancillary: An installation subordinate to or in support of an operational, training, research and test, logistical, or industrial installation.

Tenant on Other Services: An installation belonging to another United States Government service on which the Air Force conducts activities.

Active: An Air Force installation in use for the performance of an Air Force function.

Inactive: An Air Force installation not in use for the performance of an Air Force function.

CONSTRUCTION

This section relates to the progress of new construction for the USAF. The following definitions are applicable:

Authorized: The USAF Military Construction Program as approved by Congress.

Current Program: The scope and dollar amount deemed necessary for the completion of a line item determined essential to the mission of the USAF.

Approved Program: Scope and dollar amount approved for implementation of construction and funding by appropriate authority of OSD and/or DOD through apportionment, or program clearance.

Operational Program: The scope and dollar amount released to USAF construction agencies as approved for construction, obligation, and expenditures for the completion of a line item.

COST OF MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF USAF REAL PROPERTY

This section shows the cost of maintenance and operation of USAF Real Property.

Labor Cost: Costs of all personnel, regardless of the source, performing work attributable to Real Estate Facilities activities.

Material and Supplies: For use in accomplishing the functions of maintenance, repair and operation of Real Estate Facilities.

Contract and Other: Lump sum and unit price work contracts administered by the installation for preservation and construction, utilities service contracts, and inspection and maintenance contracts administered by Major AF Command Headquarters.



MILITARY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (MAP)

DEFINITIONS - The following definitions apply to the terms used herein:

GRANT AID - Military assistance furnished gratuitously to eligible foreign countries, funded through annual appropriation by Congress.

REIMBURSABLE MILITARY ASSISTANCE - Transactions for military materiel and services which have been ordered and paid for by eligible recipient countries.

MAP AIRCRAFT - Aircraft in foreign countries provided by the USAF under Military Assistance Program.

AIRCRAFT ATTRITION - Aircraft lost from MAP inventories by reason of accident, obsolescence, or in combat.

MOBILE TRAINING TEAMS - A group of qualified personnel organized and equipped to provide training instruction, guidance, or assistance to recipient countries under the Military Assistance Program.

SPACE - Represents one man-course completed by one student in one class covering a specific subject of instruction.

MAP EMPLOYEES - Category of civilian personnel engaged in activities required in carrying out the Military Assistance Program as administered by the Air Force. Employment is in terms of work units such as man-month equivalent.



MILITARY PERSONNEL

DEFINITIONS

ACTIVE FEDERAL MILITARY SERVICE

Normal full-time duty with a Federal Military Service as opposed to inactive duty status of a Reservist.

AERONAUTICAL STATUS

The general grouping of Air Force personnel with reference to their aeronautical rating, aeronautical designation, and flying status. The principal groupings are:

1. Rated Personnel: USAF Officers who have been awarded an aeronautical rating of Pilot, Aircraft Observer, Navigator or Flight Surgeon on personnel orders per authority AFR 50-7

2. Non-Rated Personnel: Personnel who do not have an aeronautical rating of Pilot, Aircraft Observer, Navigator or Flight Surgeon, including personnel who have aeronautical designation, eg. Aviation Medical Examiner, Flight Nurse, Non-Rated Crew Member, and Non-Rated Non-Crew Member, even though such personnel may be on Flying Status.

AIR FORCE OFFICER QUALIFYING TEST (AFOQT)

The AFOQT battery is given to newly commissioned officers and to persons being considered for officer training. These tests are designed to predict proficiency in AF specialties or success in training, classifying individuals by aptitude clusters.

AIR FORCE COMMAND STRENGTH

All military personnel (permanent party and pipeline, USAF, SCARWAF, and Navy) who are assigned to Air Force units. This strength is chargeable against the personnel ceiling of the Department of the Air Force and is under the command jurisdiction of the Chief of Staff, USAF.

1. Command Strength, Continental: The total strength of military personnel who are assigned to units of which the Headquarters have permanent station location in the Continental US or to units which are enroute between Continental and Overseas stations but are assigned to a Continental Command or to the Continental US portion of a Global Command.

2. Command Strength, Oversea: The total strength of military personnel who are assigned to units of which the Headquarters have permanent station location outside the Continental US or to units which are enroute between Continental and Oversea Stations but are assigned to an Oversea Command or to the overseas portion of a Global Command.

3. Command Strength, Worldwide: The total strength of personnel assigned to Air Force units (USAF and SCARWAF) regardless of location.

AIR FORCE DEPARTMENTAL STRENGTH

The total strength of military personnel commissioned, appointed or enlisted in the United States Air Force, whether or not such personnel have been placed on duty with another Department.

AIR FORCE PERSONNEL

A general term comprising all military personnel (USAF, SCARWAF, or Navy) assigned to Air Force Units.

AIR FORCE SPECIALTY (AFS)

A grouping of positions which require common qualifications. An AFS is identified by a Title and Code.

AIR FORCE SPECIALTY CODE (AFSC) - AIRMEN

A combination of meaningful digits used to identify an AFSC. For example:

MILITARY PERSONNEL - (Continued)

DEFINITIONS**ARMED FORCE QUALIFICATION TEST SCORE (AFQT SCORE)**

The test contains questions on arithmetic reasoning, word knowledge, tool functions, and spatial visualization. The "Score" is a composite index of performance on all these items, and as such, is an indication of general learning ability.

CAREER AIRMEN

A Regular Air Force Airman who has completed one or more enlistments in the United States Air Force.

CAREER FIELD

A grouping of related AFS's involving basically similar knowledges and skills.

CAREER RESERVE OFFICER

A commissioned officer who has signed a statement that he desires to serve on active duty for an unlimited period.

COMMAND

A major organizational division of the United States Air Force.

1. Continental Command: A Major Air Command whose command headquarters and subordinate units are located within the Continental United States.

2. Overseas Command: A Major Air Command whose command headquarters and subordinate units are located outside the Continental United States.

3. Global Command: A command whose command headquarters is located either inside or outside the Continental US and whose subordinate units are located both inside and outside Continental US.

CONTROL AIR FORCE SPECIALTY (Control AFS)

The AFS for manning purposes in which an airman's reassignment is projected, and represents his highest usable skill based on total Air Force requirements. It should be his Primary AFS; however, if there is an Air Force surplus of the PAFS, it may be an additional awarded AFS, or an AFS in which the airman is being trained.

FIRST TERM AIRMEN

A Regular Air Force Airman serving on his first enlistment in the United States Air Force.

FRINGE BENEFITS

Benefits which are not a part of military pay made directly to USAF personnel and are such as medical care for dependents, commissary privileges, etc.

FUNCTIONAL CATEGORY (APPLIES TO CAREER FIELD)

A grouping of airman career fields into four broad categories of highly technical, technical, semi-technical and non-technical jobs to be performed.

FUNCTIONAL GROUP

The general grouping of personnel according to their status as to permanent party or pipeline.

GRADE

Grade as used in this report applies to grade in which individuals are currently serving.

IMMEDIATE REENLISTMENT

A reenlistment in the Regular Air Force within 24 hours within the same unit from which separated.

MILITARY PERSONNEL (CONTINUED)

DEFINITIONS**INACTIVE FEDERAL MILITARY SERVICE**

All military service other than active, whether as a commissioned officer, warrant or flight officer, or in enlisted status. (AFR 35-3)

MUSTERING OUT PAY (MOP)

An extra sum of money payable to any of certain persons upon or after his release from active duty for service during wartime. It is not to be confused with terminal-leave pay.

NONCAREER RESERVE OFFICER

A commissioned officer whose present tour of duty has a definite scheduled date of separation.

OPERATING CONTROL

Control exercised over the combat or service operation of subordinate or other organizations. Operational control comprises those functions of a command involving the composition of subordinate forces, the assignment of tasks, the designation of objectives, and the authoritative direction necessary to accomplish the mission. Normally it does not include such matters as administration, discipline, or internal organization.

OPERATING LOCATION

A permanent duty station of an individual. A station is considered permanent if the orders specify a period of three months or longer. If no period is specified, the duty station is considered permanent.

PERMANENT CHANGE OF STATION (PCS)

A physical transfer of a person, group of persons, or unit from one station to another, made without plan or expectation of return to the station of first instance.

PERMANENT PARTY PERSONNEL

Those personnel assigned to a unit to perform their principal duty in the furtherance of the missions of the unit and who are properly chargeable against the authorization of the unit. This to include assigned over strength.

Pipeline Personnel

Those USAF, SCARWAF, and Navy personnel who are (assigned to an Air Force Unit temporarily for the purpose of administration and enlistment, reenlistment, replacement processing, training or hospitalization), i.e., those who are temporarily ineffective. Such personnel are not chargeable against the specific authorizations of the unit to which they are assigned while in a pipeline status. Pipeline is composed of transients, patients, and students.

TRANSIENTS

(1) Overseas Replacements: Personnel who are assigned to a unit specifically charged with administering processing for overseas movement. They are assigned for further assignment and movement to duty with an overseas US unit.

(2) Returnees: Personnel who are assigned to a unit specifically charged with administering and processing individuals returned from overseas. They are assigned for further reassignment and movement to duty with a Continental US Unit.

(3) Fillers: Personnel assigned temporarily to a unit who are awaiting reassignment to another unit for duty, return to duty, training, or oversea movement. This group may include prior service enlistees; reenlistees within 90 days; and immediate reenlistees at a port upon return from overseas; personnel recalled to Extended Active Duty (EAD) while awaiting permanent duty assignment; prisoners in confinement, and prisoners restored to duty; and personnel returned to military control from Dropped From Rolls (DFR) status. It does not include personnel assigned to a unit or headquarters for further reassignment to a subordinate unit; overseas replacements; returnees or student personnel.

MILITARY PERSONNEL (CONTINUED)

DEFINITIONSPipeline Personnel (Continued)

(4) Patients: Hospitalized personnel assigned to an Air Force unit which administers personnel under going inpatient treatment at a medical facility operated by any of the three military departments.

(5) Supplementary Pilots: Graduates of basic pilot training performing supplementary pilot duties on active duty who did not sign a 4 year service contract.

(6) Students: Personnel assigned in a student status to a unit charged with administration of individuals attending a formal course of instructions at a service or civilian school or a basic military training course.

PRIMARY AIR FORCE SPECIALTY (Primary AFS)

The awarded AFS in which an Officer or Airman is most highly qualified to perform duty.

QUARTERS ALLOWANCE

A basic allowance for quarters.

RATED PERSONNEL

USAF Officers holding a currently effective aeronautical rating.

REENLISTMENT INTENT

Expressed attitude toward reenlistment, made by airmen in response to attitude questions.

REGULAR AIR FORCE PERSONNEL

Department of the Air Force military personnel who, by enlistment, appointment, or commission, are members of the Regular Air Force.

RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS (ROTC)

A Training corps with units established at civilian educational institutions to qualify students for appointment as reserve officers.

SELECTED CHARACTERISTICS AND ATTITUDES

1. Selected: Used to imply that data presented in this report are not necessarily the complete body of data; rather, data presented were picked subjectively, as being the most pertinent.

2. Characteristics: Refer to those elements which are more or less stable in nature, e.g., grade, age, marital status, rating etc.

3. Attitudes: Refers to responses to those questions in which individuals express degree of predisposed feeling for a thing, institution, or situation.

SCARWAF PERSONNEL

Those Department of the Army personnel assigned as permanent party or pipeline to USAF or SCARWAF unit.

SKILL LEVEL

The level of an AFS which indicates the degree of qualification of airmen:

SUBSISTENCE ALLOWANCE

A monetary allowance given a military person in lieu of food.

TECHNICAL SPECIALIST APTITUDE INDEX (TSAI) SCORE

A separate rating or score for each of certain AF Specialties, indicating the predictive aptitude of a person, arrived at by converting raw scores received on a battery of aptitude tests to a standard score with range of 1 through 9 (stanine score).

TECHNICAL TRAINING

In a broad sense, that training for both military and civilian personnel in specialties other than those of an AF pilot or navigator, as in the phrase 'Technical Training Air Force.'

MILITARY PERSONNEL (CONTINUED)

DEFINITIONS

TOTAL FEDERAL MILITARY SERVICE

Includes both, active and inactive military service.

TRANSFER

Permanent change in departmental status, regardless of whether or not accompanied by a change of command status and/or unit assignment.

UNIVERSAL MILITARY TRAINING AND SERVICE ACT (UMTS)

The UMTS Act provides that all males who first entered the armed forces through Inactive Reserve Service or Active Duty after 19 June 1951 and before 9 August 1955, and who were not yet 26 years old when they entered, are subject to an eight-year period of Inactive or Active Duty or combination of such duty.

USAF PERSONNEL

Those Department of the Air Force military personnel assigned as permanent party or pipeline to a USAF or SCAR-WAF unit.

NOTE: Annual strength figures are as of 30 June except as noted. The history of the AAF falls into several well defined phases. On 1 August 1907, the Aeronautical Division of the Signal Corps was established, and this division continued until 1 July 1914 when it was reorganized as the Aviation Section of the Signal Corps. In May 1918, Army aviation was divorced from the Signal Corps by Presidential order and comprised the Division of Military Aeronautics, Bureau of Aircraft Production, and the Spruce Section which had been organized in November 1917. (The latter was created to expedite lumber production for aircraft construction.) Legislative cognizance of a separate arm occurred on 4 June 1920 when the Air Service was created. The Air Corps was established in July 1926 and continued until the reorganization of the Army in March 1947. At that time, the Army Air Forces came into being and continued under this organization until the three defense agencies were established in 1947. On 17 September 1947, James V. Forrestal took the oath of office as Secretary of Defense. The Air Force was officially separated from the Army the following day and the new agency, U.S. Air Force, was established, but it was not until 1948 that Air Force reporting was entirely divorced from the Army. Blank columns in the table below indicate that breaks were not available for the period; and other necessary explanations are covered with foot notes. Army personnel on duty with the US Air Force known as SCARWAF, were included in this table from Sep 1947 through Jun 1955. SCARWAF were discontinued as of 31 Mar 1956.

U S AIR FORCE MILITARY PERSONNEL SURVEYS

COMMENTARY

NOTE: This study is based upon a 100% survey of Air Force female military personnel as of 28 February 1957. The survey was requested by the Chief of the Air Force Nurse Corps, Director of the Women in the Air Force, and the Chief of the Medical Specialist Corps. The purpose of the survey was to determine the effect of various factors on Air Force career plans of women. Vital statistics were also sought which were needed for planning and policy development, especially in regard to quarters.

AIR FORCE FEMALE MILITARY PERSONNEL

OFFICERS BY BRANCH OF SERVICE. - The Air Force has three principal branches for female military personnel-Women in the Air Force (WAF), Air Force Nurse Corps (AFNC), and Medical Specialist Corps (MSpC). In addition, one female officer was in the Dental Corps and 17 in the Medical Corps. The total female officer strength in the Air Force on 28 February 1957 was 3,485 - AFNC, 2,730 (78%); WAF, 618 (18%); MSpC, 119 (3%); and Other, 18 (1%).

AIR FORCE CAREER INTENT. - WAF officers are considerably more AF career minded than Nurses or Medical Specialists with 77 per cent intending an AF career compared to 55 per cent for Nurses and 61 per cent for Medical Specialists.

By Grade: Regardless of branch of service, nearly all officers in field grades intend to stay in but the percentage in field grades in each branch varies greatly and this affects the overall intent. Over 27 per cent of the WAF officers are field grade compared to seven per cent of the AFNC, and 11 per cent of the MSpC.

By Age: Age also affects intent in that younger women are less inclined to an AF career. Of the Nurses, 20 per cent are under 25 years of age and 51 per cent are under 30, while the WAF have only three per cent under 25 and 26 per cent under 30. The MSpC have 18 per cent under 25 per cent under 30.

By Marital Status: Only 12 per cent of the WAF and AFNC and 15 per cent of the MSpC officers have husbands. The married women are less inclined toward an AF career than the unmarried. Greatest AF career intent is expressed by divorced, legally separated and widowed women who comprise 14 per cent of the WAF officers, eight per cent of the AFNC officers and six per cent of the MSpC officers.

By Educational Level: The lowest AF career intent is expressed by officers with a Registered Nurse Diploma. AFNC officers with the RN Diploma as their highest level of education comprise 80 per cent of the Corps and nearly half are undecided about an AF career or plan to separate. The second lowest career intent is expressed by those with baccalaureate degrees who make up nearly half the WAF, 10% of the AFNC, and 78 per cent of the MSpC officer strength.

CIVILIAN PLANS OF OFFICERS SEPARATING. - The civilian plans of officers, who have no intention of an AF career and will separate on completion of service contract, are largely to keep house and raise a family. This item was selected by 41 per cent of the WAF, 40 percent of the AFNC and 32 per cent of the MSpC officers separating. Second choice for the WAF was to attend school full time (16%), for AFNC 17 per cent planned both to work and go to school, and 32 per cent of the MSpC planned to get a job the same as their AF specialty. Significantly, 16 per cent of the nurses separating planned to continue their nursing profession in civilian life.

AIR FORCE IMPROVEMENTS RECOMMENDED. - All female officers were queried as to what improvement or change was most needed in the Air Force. About two per cent in each branch of service were quite satisfied with things as they were. But 25 per cent of the officers felt that housing was inadequate, WAF officers (20%) thought something should be done to improve the prestige of military women, while Nurses and Medical Specialists, whose humanitarian work has given them prestige, were more concerned about promotion policies. Nurses, in particular, wanted an improvement in working conditions (13%) and greater opportunity to further their education (11%). Nine per cent of all the officers wanted improvement in pay.

INTEREST IN BECOMING A REGULAR OFFICER. - Slightly more than 17 per cent of the officers have regular Air Force commissions - WAF 28 per cent, AFNC 15 per cent, and MSpC 21 per cent. Of those who have Reserve commissions, 41 per cent of the WAF, 47 per cent of the AFNC, and 45 per cent of the MSpC officers are either currently not eligible or not interested in a regular commission. About 20 per cent of the WAF and 44 per cent of the Nurses and Medical Specialists are undecided about applying for a regular commission, while 39 per cent of the WAF, 9 per cent of the AFNC and 11 per cent of the MSpC nonregular officers have applied or intend to apply for regular commissions.

ADEQUACY OFFICER'S GOVERNMENT QUARTERS. - Approximately 60 per cent of the female officers reside in Bachelor Officers' Quarters or similar government controlled officers quarters. By branch, such occupancy is WAF, 51 per cent; AFNC, 63 per cent; MSpC, 40 per cent; and Other, 61 per cent. Even though 90 per cent of the female officers occupy private rooms, less than one-third of these rooms have private bathrooms. The percentage of these officers who rate their quarters as adequate are: WAF, 39 per cent; AFNC, 43 per cent; MSpC, 53 per cent; and Other, 33 per cent. The greater the number sharing a room, or other facilities, the lesser the feeling of satisfaction. Only seven per cent of the

officers felt no improvement was necessary to their government quarters, but 55 per cent wanted more privacy, space, and better furnishings. The remainder wanted improvement in facilities or the physical plant. Currently, 10 per cent of the officers have no living room facilities available to them, 18 per cent have no kitchen facilities, and 26 per cent have no laundry facilities.

CHARACTERISTICS OF WAF AIRMEN. - As of 28 February 1957, there were 7,886 WAF airmen of whom 24 per cent were career WAF, in that they were serving their second or later enlistment in the Air Force. Nine per cent of the WAF had also served in the WAC and now occupy 94 per cent of the Master Sergeant, 73 per cent of the Technical Sergeant, and 23 per cent of the Staff Sergeant spaces. About 11 per cent of the WAF airmen intend to stay on active duty until retirement, the earliest date of which would be July 1962. The change of the WAF from a patriotic organization to a service group with career opportunity has caused a maldistribution in ages in that WAF Master and Technical Sergeants have an average age eight years above that of their male counterparts, while in other grades WAF ages are comparable to male airmen.

JOB ASSIGNMENTS. - Excluding WAF airmen who are unassigned, Basics, and those attending school, nearly 90 per cent feel they are qualified for the job they are doing, while 10 per cent (mostly Airman Second and Third Class) do not know. Of these WAF, 90 per cent are working in their primary career field, four per cent are not and would like to, while six per cent are not and do not want to. About 21 per cent of the WAF airmen feel their job is best suited for female airmen, five per cent feel their job should be done by male airmen, 69 per cent indicate either WAF or male airmen would be suitable, four per cent think their work should be done by civilians, and one per cent, by officers.

REASON FOR ORIGINAL ENLISTMENT IN THE AIR FORCE. - The change of the WAF from a patriotic to a career organization is evident in the distribution of reasons for original enlistment in the Air Force by grade. Nearly two thirds of the Master Sergeants and a majority of the Technical Sergeants joined the Air Force for such patriotic reasons as "Felt the Air Force Needed Me" and "Felt I could be More Effective in the Military". In the lower grades the main reasons for enlisting were for career opportunities, educational opportunities, and the desire to get away from home and to travel. Only six per cent of the post-Korean conflict enlistees felt the Air Force needed them or that they could be more effective in the military.

PRESENT AIR FORCE PLANS. - Only 17 per cent of the WAF airmen in the four lower grades intend to reenlist, 30 per cent are undecided and 53 per cent intend to separate on expiration of tour of service. The principal reason for separation is "Keeping House or Raising a Family" (29%). About 20 per cent have no plans, 15 per cent plan to get [o] to same as their Air Force background, 24 per cent plan to go to school or both school and work, and 12 per cent have other plans. Even though so few WAF in the four lower grades intend to stay on active duty, only 27 per cent feel that civilian life offers greater career advantages than the Air Force. Among WAF, who recently enlisted, of those who are Basic Airmen, 72 per cent feel that AF career advantages were greater than those of civilian life and 43 per cent of the Airmen Third Class agreed. The lowest opinion of AF career advantages is held by Staff Sergeant of whom 25 per cent think AF career advantages are superior to those of civilian life.

ADEQUACY OF GOVERNMENT PROVIDED QUARTERS. - Nearly 88 per cent of the WAF airmen live in government provided quarters with such tenancy running from 99 per cent for Basic Airmen to 69 per cent for Master Sergeants. Of those who live in government quarters, 63 per cent rate them as good or excellent with this opinion ranging from 55 per cent by Master Sergeants to 89 per cent for Basic Airmen. Of those WAF who consider their government quarters inadequate, the two major complaints were (1) lack of privacy (24%) and (2) overcrowding (21%). The balance of the complaints are spread over deterioration of the physical plant and lack of facilities.

INTEREST IN OFFICER CANDIDATE SCHOOL. - Twenty per cent of the WAF airmen are eligible for Officer Candidate School and another 20 per cent do not know if they are. Nearly all of these WAF, who "don't know", are in the four lower grades. One-third of the WAF are ineligible due to age - in the top three grades for being over-age and in the lower three grades for being under-age. Airmen First Class have 40 per cent eligible and 23 per cent who aren't sure one way or the other. Only one per cent of the WAF airmen have OCS applications pending, nine per cent plan to apply during 1957 and 11 per cent in 1958 or later. Twenty-five per cent are undecided about applying and 55 per cent are not interested in becoming officers.

REASON FOR NOT BEING INTERESTED IN OCS. - Of the 55 per cent of the WAF airmen who are not interested in becoming officers through Officer Candidate School training, one-half of this group (mostly in the lower grades) intend to separate on end of current tour, 28 per cent prefer being in enlisted status feeling that there are more advantages job-wise in being an enlisted woman, 10 per cent feel they could not qualify or might fail, and 12 per cent have other reasons.

SAMPLING VARIABILITY

The reliability of an estimated percentage depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the total on which it is based. The following tables provide the approximate sampling variability of estimated percentages, based on population totals of selected sizes.

If the estimated percentage is 2 or 98, 5 or 95, etc., (as indicated on the left index of the table), and the total (base figure) is 300, 500, etc., (as indicated on the top index of the table) then the chances are approximately 19 out of 20 that the difference (in percentage points), due to the sampling variability, between the estimated percentage and the percentage which would be available if all individuals had been interviewed, is less than:

EXAMPLE

To illustrate, 49.8 per cent of the 774,941 Airmen have never been married. The sampling variability is 0.5 per cent and the chances are about 19 out of 20 that the percentage obtained by a 100 per cent survey would be between 49.3 and 50.3 per cent.

OFFICERS

OFFICERS BY GRADE IN WHICH SERVING. - Between 31 May 1956 and 31 May 1957, officer strength (excluding general officers) dropped by 1,095. All grades increased in strength except that of Second Lieutenant which fell from 25,102 to 16,299, a decrease of 8,803. This drop was due to curtailment in the input of new officers and normal promotions to First Lieutenant. As a result, the average age of officers has increased 1.3 years in a year. Other changes in characteristics and attitudes of officers between 31 May 1956 and 31 May 1957 follow:

Marital Status: The percentage of officers "Never Married" dropped from 21 to 17 per cent.

Age: The percentage of officers 24 years old and younger dropped from 24 to 15 per cent.

Career Category: The percentage of Regular officers (including Warrant Officers) rose from 18 to 20 per cent; Career officers increased from 46 to 56 per cent; and Noncareer officers percentage dropped from 36 to 24 per cent.

Legal Dependents: Officers with no dependents correspond to the percentage "Never Married" (17%). The percentage of officers with only one dependent (usually a wife) dropped from 18 per cent in May 1956 to 16 per cent in May 1957, while officers with two or more dependents increased by nearly five per cent points.

Personal Situation In The Air Force During The Last Twelve Months: The personal situation of officers during the 12 months preceding May 1957 had worsened compared with the twelve months preceding May 1956. A year ago, 44 per cent of the officers responded that their personal situation had become better during the last twelve months compared to 35 per cent who indicated improvement in the May 1957 survey. A year ago, 14 per cent said they were worse off, compared to 19 per cent this year. The worsening of personal situation is most evident in the grades of Captain and above which show eight per cent points increase -- from about 16 per cent to 24 per cent. The worsening of the personal situation can be attributed to economic reasons. Officers feel the most important benefits that would increase the value of an Air Force career are increased pay and allowances and security of an Air Force career.

MALE COMMISSIONED OFFICERS BY CAREER-CATEGORY. - As of 31 May 1957, the strength of Air Force male commissioned officers was 132,400, about 2,000 fewer than on 31 May 1956. The career category of these officers was:

Regular	24,200 (18.3%)
Career Reserve	74,800 (56.5%)
Noncareer Reserve	33,400 (25.2%)

During the year a great change in career category structure resulted from status changes from Noncareer to Career Reserve. Career Reserve strength gained 8,300 while Noncareer Reserve strength dropped by 10,600. There were approximately 9,300 applications approved for Career Reserve status between 31 May 1956 and 31 May 1957. Net gain to Regular male commissioned officer strength totaled 300. Affirmative AF career intent increased from 60 per cent to 64 per cent for Nonregular officers; did not change for Regular officers (88%); and increased the overall positive intent from 65 per cent to 68 per cent.

AIR FORCE EXPERIENCES VERSUS EXPECTATIONS. - Officers' experiences in Air Force life that are above or below expectations on entry to active duty have significant effect on his Air Force career plans. When his experience exceeds

COMMENTARY (CONTINUED)

expectations, he is much more likely to pursue an AF career. When his experiences are about the same as expected his career plans are about the same as the average for his career category; when his experiences are more difficult or worse than expected he is less likely to be inclined toward an Air Force career.

"Adjustment to the Life of An Air Force Officer" was the least difficult experience of the seven experiences listed, with 38 per cent finding it easier than expected and only three per cent found it more difficult than anticipated.

"Amount of Personal Freedom" was more than expected for 31 per cent of the officers and eight per cent experienced less freedom than expected. Noncareer Reserve officer had the most trouble in adjusting to limitation on personal freedom.

"Opportunity To Travel, New Experiences and Adventure" was greater than expected for 28 per cent of the officers, while 12 per cent, mostly Noncareer Reserve officers, found this experience under expectations.

"Opportunity To Get Good Job Assignments" was better than expected for 28 per cent of the officers and not as good as expected for 26 per cent. Although Noncareer Reserve officers complain more (35%) about not having a job as good as they expected, 21 per cent of the Regular and 24 per cent of the Career Reserve officers also feel they should have better job assignments.

"Level of Pay And Allowances" was above expectations for 17 per cent of the officers; about the same as expected for 60 per cent; less than expected for 16 per cent; and seven per cent had not given this much thought. Nearly one-fourth of the Regular officers found pay and allowances less than they had figured it would be.

"Opportunity to Obtain Selected Bases (General Location of Assignment)" was less than expected for 48 per cent of the officers, while 12 per cent had found base of choice opportunity greater than expected. This experience was the only one in which response by career category did not differ greatly.

AIR FORCE CAREER PLANS BY CAREER CATEGORY. - The percentage of officers planning an Air Force career rose from 65 per cent on 31 May 1956 to 68 per cent on 31 May 1957. This slight improvement in overall officer intent may be attributed to the shift in officer career category. During the year, the percentage of officers with regular commissions increased by two per cent points, Career Reserve officers increased by 10 per cent points, and Noncareer Reserve officers decreased by 12 per cent points. The percentage of Regular and Career Reserve officers planning an AF career did not change, but the percentage of Noncareer Reserve officers planning to stay on active duty dropped those who planned to remain in, changed their status to Career Reserve. The following percentage distribution of officers who plan an Air Force career by source of commission for 31 May 1956 and 31 May 1957, illustrates the trend of Air Force career intent.

Other selected characteristics and attitudes of officers as of 31 May 1957 follow:

Career Advantages - Air Force vs Civil Life: More Career Reserve officers feel the Air Force offers career advantages superior to those in civilian life than do Regular officers. Nearly 44 per cent of the Career Reserve officers felt the Air Force offered more than civilian life, while 31 per cent of the Regular and 11 per cent of the Noncareer Reserve agreed. Preference for civilian life was made by 62 per cent of the Noncareer Reserve officers, 34 per cent of the Regular officers, and 22 per cent of the Career Reserve officers. Of the balance, eight per cent in each career category stated "Don't Know" and the remainder thought Air Force and civilian career advantages to be "About the Same."

Date of Separation: Nearly 13,000 Noncareer Reserve officers indicate they will separate between 1 June 1957 and 30 June 1958. In addition over 9,000 plan to leave in Fiscal Year 1959, and 4,500 in FY 1960.

Dissatisfaction With Military Service And Prospects In Civilian Life: Career Reserve officers in their response to the question of how two factors apply to them, "Dissatisfaction With Military Service And Prospects In Civilian Life" indicate they are better adjusted to military life and a large percentage plan to stay in regardless of civilian prospects. The following table presents dissatisfaction continuum by career category:

Regardless of career category, Air Force career intentions diminish as dissatisfaction increases and, within each dissatisfaction grouping, plans for an Air Force career increases as civilian prospects go from "Very Good" to "Unknown."

Personal Situation In The Air Force: Thirty-eight per cent of the officers state their personal situation in the Air Force has improved in the Air Force during the last 12 months, 42 per cent have noticed no change, and 20 per cent say it has worsened. Regular officers are relatively pessimistic concerning the change in their personal situation with 27 per cent saying things have improved and 27 per cent saying things have gotten worse. Noncareer Reserve officers respond with 44 per cent noting improvement in their personal situation and 17 per cent think they are worse off. Career Reserve officers: 39 per cent are better off; 19 per cent worse off.

Influence Of Counseling On Air Force Career Plans: Although counseling had no influence on the plans of 78 per cent of the officers, who had been counseled, it did influence 20 per cent toward staying in the Air Force. Adverse influence (against staying in) was reported by only two per cent of the officers. Counseling had the greatest favorable effect on Regular officers (24%), and second, on Career Reserve officers (22%), and least on Noncareer Reserve officers (16%). Half of the officers had received no counseling but more than three-fourths of these planned an Air Force career. Most of these officers refused counseling because they planned to stay in. About 12,000 Noncareer officers, who have not been counseled, have date of separation too far in the future to warrant counseling yet.

Attitude Toward Overseas Tours: The prospect of overseas tours as an aspect of Air Force life is looked upon favorably by two-thirds of the officers regardless of career category. Twenty-four per cent of the officers view the prospect of overseas tour, neither favorably nor unfavorably, and 10 per cent consider overseas tours as an unfavorable aspect of Air Force life.

COMMENTARY (CONTINUED)

Length Of Specified Tour With Cash Bonus: In response to the question, "Which One Of The Guaranteed Specified Tours (5, 10, or 15 years) Would Be Most Acceptable If A Cash Bonus Of Two Months Base Pay For Each Year Of Active Duty Were Paid Upon Completion Of The Tour?" officers did not overwhelmingly chose any one tour. Career Reserve officers were well represented in each of the three lengths of tours, but Noncareer officers, 55 per cent of whom would not extend their tour regardless, showed interest only in a five year tour. The following percentage distribution shows Career and Noncareer Reserve officers by length of specified tour desired:

REASON FOR STAYING IN OR LEAVING THE AIR FORCE BY CAREER CATEGORY. - Regular officers intend an Air Force career because they "Like Military Life" (27%), "Like Flying and Aviation" (25%), and like the "Retirement Benefits and Equity" (12%). Another 12 per cent are staying in because they have so much service credit toward retirement.

Career Reserve officers chose as reason for staying in, "Like Flying And Aviation" (27%), "Like Military Life" (22%), and "Retirement Benefits And Equity" (18%).

Noncareer Reserve officers, who intend an Air Force career (12%), are doing so because they "Like Flying And Aviation" (48%), "Like Military Life" (14%), and like the "Retirement Benefits And Equity" (11%). More than half (56%) of the Noncareer officers, who are undecided about an Air Force career, gave reasons for staying in the Air Force. The most important reason was "Like Flying And Aviation" (50%).

Only three per cent of the Regular officers indicate they will separate. Their main reasons are "Civilian Life Offers Greater Career or Professional Opportunities" (24%), "Lack Of Stability Of Personnel Policies" (15%), and "Family Considerations" (15%).

Only three per cent of the Career Reserve officers do not intend an Air Force career. They plan to leave because, "Civilian Life Offers Greater Career Or Professional Opportunities" (30%), "Going To School Or College" (12%), and various other reasons, each less than 10 per cent.

Fifty-six per cent of the Noncareer Reserve officers do not plan an Air Force career. Forty-three per cent feel that civilian life offers greater opportunity, 13 per cent do not like or are dissatisfied with military life, 10 per cent say the Air Force has not provided them with the kind of work they like to do, and the remainder are spread out in small percentages among other reasons.

AIRMEN

Airmen By Grade In Which Serving - In the past 12 months the strength of airmen by grade has changed greatly. Between 31 May 1956 and 31 May 1957 the strength of the top four grades has increased by over 21,000 while the lower three grades dropped by 11,000. Aviation cadet strength is about 800 below a year ago. The above changes in composition of the airman strength has effect on characteristics and attitudes which now represent a slightly "older" population with longer military service.

Marital Status: A year ago 53 per cent of the airmen had never married compared to slightly less than 50 per cent on 31 May 1957.

Months Of Active Military Service: The average months of active military service per airman has increased from 58.8 to 63.3 per cent in the last year.

Age: The average age of airmen has increased from 24.2 years to 24.6 years since May 1956. The increase in age is notable in the top four grades. Master Sergeant average age rose from 36.9 years to 37.8 years, nearly a full year, indicating their high retention rate.

Career Intent When First Entered The Air Force: The percentage of airmen who planned to make an Air Force career when they first entered the Air Force has risen five per cent points over May 1956. While a great part of this increase was due to the strength gain in the top four grades of career airmen, Basic Airmen who plan an Air Force career rose from 20 per cent to 25 per cent during the year. Airmen Third Class And Second Class show similar favorable career intent.

Reenlistment Intent: While the overall reenlistment intent based on total separations has not changed since a year ago, the intent to reenlist has fallen for both First Term and Career airmen. Large numbers of First Termers have reenlisted at half-term thus entering the Career airman category and bringing with them a lower AF career intent. This has caused the affirmative career intent of Career airmen to fall from 80 to 73 per cent in one year. First Term airmen intending an AF career has fallen from 16 to 12 per cent since those First Termers with positive AF career intent have reenlisted, leaving a greater proportion of First Termers with negative intent. The paradox is that the actual Air Force reenlistment rate, based on reenlistment of those eligible to reenlist, has climbed rapidly. Preliminary USAF reenlistment rate for First Termers for January through June 1957 was 37 per cent, while 74 per cent of those separating during that six month period was eligible to reenlist. About 76 per cent of the Career airmen were eligible to reenlist and 90 per cent of the eligibles did so. Raising the requirements for eligibility to reenlist reduces the proportion eligible but does not affect the reenlistment rate under the present formula.

Reason For Original Enlistment Into The Air Force: The principal reason the top four grades of airmen entered the Air Force was that they were originally drafted or enlisted in preference to being drafted into another military service. The main reason the three lower grade airmen joined was to get Air Force educational and technical training for later use in civilian life. An average of 12 per cent, regardless of grade, signed up because AF career opportunities looked better than those of civilian life. Less than two per cent joined because they needed a job at the time. Sixty-two per cent of the Aviation Cadets entered the Air Force because they were interested in aviation and flying.

COMMENTARY (CONTINUED)

Improvement That Would Increase The Value Of An Air Force Career: An increase in pay and allowances is the improvement which would increase most the value of an Air Force career for 38 per cent of the airmen. This improvement was desired by only 18 per cent of the Basic Airmen, but by 47 per cent of the Master Sergeants. Basic Airmen and Airmen Third Class wanted more and better training. "Base Of Choice" was also pointed out by lower grade airmen. No issue was made of medical care, recreation facilities, housing, or increased retirement benefits.

Satisfaction With Present Job Assignment: Fifty-four per cent of the airmen are working in their primary Air Force specialty and like it, while 26 per cent are working in their PAFS, but would prefer a different job assignment. Six per cent like their jobs even though they are not working in their PAFS, but four per cent who are not working in PAFS would prefer to do so. Another four per cent are not satisfied with their job and want a new job not in their PAFS. Six per cent are unassigned; mostly Basic Airmen and Airmen Third Class.

Attitude Toward Use Of Seat Safety Belts In Government Vehicles: Nearly 80 per cent of the airmen would voluntarily use safety belts if installed on government vehicles. Nearly all the airmen who would not voluntarily use safety belts if provided on government vehicles do not have seat safety belts on their own cars. About 16 per cent of the airmen have been involved in, or know of, a motor vehicle accident in which safety belts were worn. In such accidents, 29 per cent of the airmen believed the belts prevented injury, 56 per cent thought the belts reduced injuries, and 15 per cent indicated the belts were of little or no value.

AIRMEN BY TECHNICAL CATEGORY. - Of 772,634 enlisted men in the Air Force, 750,122 are identified by career fields. Those not identified by career field are mostly Basic airmen; unclassified airmen or those in reporting codes.

Fifty per cent of the airmen are in career fields of the Highly Technical category, 19 per cent in Technical category, and 31 per cent in Semi-Technical category.

First Term airmen with no prior service comprise 53 per cent of the Air Force strength and 59 per cent of the total airmen in Highly Technical category; while Career airmen make up 42 per cent of the airman strength and 36 per cent of the Highly Technical category. First term airmen with prior service comprise the remaining five per cent of the airman strength and the five per cent in Highly Technical category. Nearly half of the airmen in career fields in the Semi-Technical (soft-core) category are career airmen.

Selected characteristics and attitudes of airmen by technical category follow:

Reenlistment Intent: Forty-eight per cent of the airmen in Semi-Technical category intend to reenlist compared to 39 per cent in Highly Technical and 43 per cent in Technical categories. Only 15 per cent of the First Term no prior service airmen plan to reenlist, while 60 per cent of the First Termers with prior service and 73 per cent of the Career airmen intend to stay in the Air Force.

Grade: A greater percentage of the airmen in Semi-Technical fields are in the top three airman grades (34%) than in Highly Technical category (31%), while over 40 per cent of the airmen in Technical category are Staff Sergeants or higher. This condition is caused by the different grade distributions in the three categories of enlistment. Of the Career airmen in Highly Technical category, 79 per cent are in the top three grades compared to 64 per cent in Semi-Technical category.

Age: Nearly two-thirds of the airmen in Highly Technical jobs are 23 years old or younger. In Technical and Semi-Technical categories about 50 per cent are over 23 years of age. This is due to the high percentage (22%) 30 years of age and older in these two categories. In Highly Technical category, 16 per cent of the airmen are 30 years old or more.

Reenlistment Intent If Could Attend Technical School: Airmen who did not intend to reenlist or who were undecided about reenlisting were asked if they would reenlist if they could attend a technical school course of their own choice for which they were qualified. Twenty-three per cent responded "Yes", 31 per cent "No", and 46 per cent were undecided. This would increase the affirmative reenlistment intent based on total separations (not just those eligible to reenlist) to nearly 56 per cent. Over 33 per cent of the airmen in Semi-Technical category whose present reenlistment intent is "No Or Undecided" would reenlist, 21 per cent of those in Technical, and 18 per cent in Highly Technical categories.

Desire To Train Into A Different Career Field: Airmen in Semi-Technical category show the greatest desire to train into a different career field and those in Highly Technical, the least. Over 55 per cent of the airmen holding Semi-Technical career field would like to retrain into another field, as would 46 per cent of those in Technical category, and 35 per cent in Highly Technical category. About three-fourths of these airmen desire technical school training into a new career field.

DISSATISFACTION WITH MILITARY SERVICE AND PROSPECTS IN CIVILIAN LIFE. - No dissatisfaction with military service was expressed by 53 per cent of the airmen. This ran from 50 per cent for First Term airmen without prior service to 58 per cent for First Termers with prior service. Fifty-six per cent of the Career airmen were satisfied.

Some dissatisfaction was reported by 27 per cent of the airmen. First Termers with prior service had the lowest percentage with some dissatisfaction (23%) while both other categories of enlistment had 27 per cent with some dissatisfaction. Considerable dissatisfaction was registered by 12 per cent of the airmen - 16 per cent for First Termers (NPS), 10 per cent for First Termers (PS), and 9 per cent for Career airmen.

Eight per cent had "Other Reasons" for not remaining in the Air Force.

REASONS FOR STAYING IN OR LEAVING THE AIR FORCE BY CATEGORY OF ENLISTMENT. - The major reasons airmen give for staying in or leaving the Air Force vary with their category of enlistment. First Term airmen, no prior service, who plan to reenlist cited "Adventure, Travel, New Experiences" (22%) and "Like My Job And Duty Assignments" (23%) as their principal reasons for staying in the Air Force. Another 15 per cent liked military life.

First Term airmen with prior service in the Army, Navy, Coast Guard, or Marine Corps plan to reenlist because they "Like Military Life" (25%), "Retirement Benefits" (23%), and "Like My Job and Duty Assignments" (17%).

Career airmen, who are on their second or later enlistment in the Air Force, will reenlist for these reasons: "Retirement Benefits" (26%), "Like My Job And Duty Assignments" (19%), and "Like Military Life" (19%).

The reason First Term airmen, no prior service, leave the Air Force is, "Going To School Or College" (28%), "Civilian Life Offers Greater Career Or Job Opportunities" (22%), and "Air Force Hasn't Provided Me With The Work I Like" (12%).

First Term airmen, with prior service, plan to separate because "Civilian Life Offers Greater Career Or Job Opportunities" (22%), "AF Hasn't Provided Work I Like" (19%), and "Not Enough Promotion Opportunities" (16%).

Those Career airmen who do not intend to reenlist give "Other Reasons" (37%), "Family Considerations" (21%), and "AF Hasn't Provided Me With The Work I Like" (12%) as principal reasons for leaving. "Other reasons" cited by anti-Air Force career airmen is checked apparently because there are not sufficient negative and probing response choices which truly reflect their specialized attitudes and points of view.



DEPOT LEVEL TRAINING

Depot Level Training is training designed to train Air Force personnel at depot level to overhaul equipment to bring it up to new standards.

FATALITY

This type of attrition is a student lost from a course by reason of accidental death, occurring as a direct result of training while actually undergoing instruction. (Students becoming fatalities by reason of death from other causes are reported as "Other".)

FOREIGN NATIONALS

Students who are detailed to the school in an attached status from any foreign country, territory, or possession, excluding those possessions and territories of the United States of America.

GRADUATES

Students who have successfully completed a course in which enrolled.

HOLDOVERS

Students who do not graduate when normally scheduled, but are still enrolled in the course. These students are reported as enrolled at the beginning of the ensuing period unless otherwise disposed of.

MILITARY TRAINING (CONTINUED)**DEFINITIONS**LOSSES

Losses includes three groups of students:

1. Those who fail a course because of academic or flying deficiency.
2. Those who are losses from service because of fatality as a direct result of training.
3. Those who are withdrawn from a course because of illness, death, or any reason other than 1 and 2 above and who will not continue that course at a later date.

ON JOB TRAINING (OJT)

The training received by an individual in actual performance of his duties or while performing assigned duties.

STUDENTS

Training students are those personnel enrolled for the purpose of undergoing standardized courses of instruction at service schools conducted by the US Air Force, Army, Navy, and Civilian Schools and Hospitals. (This group includes USAF, Army, Navy, and Civilian students, or foreign nationals.) In referring to USAF training, students fall under these categories:

1. Assigned - Personnel assigned to the school unit and for whom the school unit is responsible for morning report strength accountability.
2. Attached - Personnel attached to the school unit from other units of the Air Force or other Federal agencies, who are scheduled to return to their respective units upon completion of the course, and for whom strength accountability is at all times maintained by such other units.



DEFINITIONS

ACCESSION

Action resulting in the addition of a civilian employee to the Department of the Air Force.

APPOINTMENT

1. Excepted Appointment: New appointment without regard to the competitive requirements of the civil service rules and regulations under authority of Schedule A or Schedule B to a position which is excepted under such authority.
2. Excepted, permanent: Employees serving under excepted appointments or personal service contracts which contain no conditions or restrictions as to tenure.
3. Excepted, limited or conditional: Employees serving under excepted appointments or personal service contracts which specify either conditional or indefinite tenure, or specific time limitations.
4. Competitive, career: Appointments from civil service registers to positions which are not filled by career conditional appointments and to other positions of persons who have previously met the service requirement.
5. Competitive, career-conditional: Appointments from civil service registers which are conditional until a service requirement has been met.
6. Indefinite Appointment: Employees who are affected by the following: On and after December 1, 1950, all new appointments shall be indefinite appointments, except those of postmasters in all classes of post offices, and, in unusual circumstances, appointments to positions for which the Civil Service Commission determines that probationary appointments are in the interest of the service.
7. Temporary Appointment: Civilians serving under temporary appointments for definite limited periods (one year or less).

EMPLOYEES

1. Contract Hire: Employees performing personal services for the Air Force and under the supervision of the Air Force. Payments are made for these services by the Air Force to a foreign government or other agency which in turn pays the employees concerned.
2. Departmental Civilian Employees: Employee designation indicating appointment to Headquarters, USAF.
3. Direct Hire: Employees performing personal services for the Air Force and who are paid directly by the Air Force.
4. Full-Time: Employees regularly required to work, as a minimum, the number of hours and days required by administrative work week for their employment group or class, regardless of the nature of appointments.
5. General Schedule (GS): A schedule of civilian personnel which includes former Professional and Scientific Service (P Service), Clerical, Administrative, and Fiscal Service (CAF), and the Sub-professional Service (SP Service) established by Classification Act 1949 (PL 429, 81st Congress) replacing Classification Act of 1923, as amended.
6. Intermittent: Employees employed on an irregular or occasional basis whose hours or days of work are not based on a prearranged schedule, and who are compensated only for the time when actually employed or for service actually rendered. (WAE-Special Consultants and Other than Special Consultants).
7. Part-Time: Employees regularly employed on a prearranged schedule whose working time is less than that prescribed for full-time employees in the same group or class; excludes special consultants.
8. Salaried: Employees whose wage rates are established by law under the Classification Act of 1949 and amendments thereto.
9. Special Consultants: Civilian consultants with "excepted appointments" (excluded from provisions of the Classification Act of 1949) for a specified number of days, not to exceed one year, and who receive a stipulated amount of compensation for the days actually employed.

HEADQUARTERS, USAF

Includes Office of the Secretary of the Air Force, Central Control Group, and the Air Staff.

JUSMG, SPAIN

Joint United States Military Group, Air Administration (Spain) was redesignated Headquarters, Sixteenth Air Force, 15 July 1956.

SEPARATION

Action resulting in the loss of a civilian employee from the Department of the Air Force.

CIVILIAN PERSONNEL (CONTINUED)**DEFINITIONS****VETERANS' PREFERENCE**

The preference, with respect to conditions of employment, as allowed under the Veterans Preference Act as amended. This preference covers ex-servicemen, mothers entitled to preference under Public Laws 396 and 888 (80th Congress), wives of service connected disabled ex-servicemen, and widows of servicemen or ex-servicemen.

5 Point:

1. **Veterans (Male and Female)** - Civilians employed as of the end of the month, who were "Veterans" resulting from their own active military or naval service in or prior to World War I or World War II.

10 Point:

1. **Veterans (Male and Female)** - Civilians employed as of the end of the month, who were "Veterans" with service connected disability resulting from their own active military or naval service in or prior to World War I or World War II.

2. **Wives** - Civilians employed at the end of the month, who had established veterans preference as wives of service connected disabled veterans.

3. **Widows** - Civilians employed at the end of the month, who had established veterans preference as the unmarried widows of deceased veterans.

4. **Mothers** - Civilians employed at the end of the month, who had established veterans preference as the mother of a deceased "Veteran" son or daughter who served on honorable duty in the US Service or the mother of a permanently disabled "Veteran" providing the mother is widowed, divorced, or the wife of a permanently disabled husband (living husband may be either or not the father of the "Veteran").

WAGE BOARD EMPLOYEES

Category of employees who are paid according to prevailing wage board determinations in the area of their employment.

"WHEN ACTUALLY EMPLOYED" (WAE) EMPLOYEES

See Intermittent Employees (Civilian Personnel).



MEDICAL ACTIVITY, CASUALTIES, AND PATIENT TRANSPORT

DEFINITIONS

ACTIVE DUTY MILITARY PERSONNEL

Consists of all military personnel who are on extended active duty. Excluded are military personnel who are on short tours of duty.

ADMISSION FROM DUTY

The enrollment in a patient status of a military person whose treatment requires that he be excused from duty beyond midnight of the day on which he reported for treatment, whether treated in a hospital, a dispensary or quarters. A patient is considered as admitted from duty only once during a continuous period of treatment; if he is transferred from one medical facility to another, the transfer is not an admission from duty. The term includes patients admitted to non-military medical facilities when the reporting facility has assumed responsibility for the records of the patient. Admissions from AWOL, except those AWOL from a patient status, are counted as admissions from duty. The term excludes persons treated on an outpatient status, and cases carded for record only.

ADMISSIONS RATE

A measure which indicates the frequency of patients being relieved from duty because of medical reasons. Hence, the admission rate is based on admissions from duty. The conversion of number of admissions to show the number of admissions that would occur during a year if admissions occurred throughout an entire year at the same frequency as in the period of observation, per thousand average strength is termed the annual admission rate and is computed as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of admissions during period} \times \text{number of such periods in a year} \times 1000}{\text{Average daily strength during the period}}$$

ADMISSIONS TO HOSPITALS AND CLASS "A" DISPENSARIES

Include all patients admitted to the wards of an Air Force hospital or Class "A" Dispensary whether from duty or by transfer from another medical facility. Excluded are cases treated in quarters, or in a duty status, or in a nonmilitary medical facility.

AVERAGE OCCUPIED BEDS

The average daily number of patients occupying beds in hospitals and Class "A" Dispensaries as of midnight of a given day.

AVERAGE STRENGTH SERVED

Includes not only those U. S. active duty military personnel for whom a base holds sick call, but also those U. S. active duty military personnel reporting elsewhere (Dispensaries) for sick call but attached to the base for in-patient care.

CASUALTY

Any person who is dead (from any cause) or whose services are lost to his unit for 24 hours or more because of involuntary absence (missing), capture, internment, or wounds, or injuries requiring admission to a medical treatment facility. Any person undergoing treatment for wounds or injuries as of 2400 local time, is considered as having been lost to his unit for 24 hours or longer. Mental disorders, psychoneurotic cases, colds and other diseases (not causing death) are not included as casualties. Casualties are divided into "battle" and "nonbattle" categories.

CAUSATIVE AGENT

That instrumentality, factor, or occurrence resulting in death, wound, injury, or missing status.

COMPLETE PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS

Include only routine physical examinations performed in accordance with USAF directives and recorded on the report of medical examinations (Standard Form 88); physical inspections of food handlers or barbers are not included nor are examinations for personnel reporting sick.

DEATHS

Includes those persons killed outright (or dying before reaching a medical treatment facility); those wounded or injured persons who subsequently died of their wounds or injuries (after being admitted to a medical treatment

MEDICAL ACTIVITY, CASUALTIES, AND PATIENT TRANSPORT (CONTINUED)

DEFINITIONS (CONTINUED)

facility); those persons reported as missing who were either subsequently conclusively determined to have been killed, or who, having been in a missing status for a year or more, were presumed to be no longer living; whether or not these incidents occurred "in action" or under "battle" or "nonbattle" conditions.

FULL TIME EQUIVALENT PERSONNEL

Are total assigned and attached personnel converted into actual full-time strength; for example, 10 individuals employed on a full-time basis and 4 individuals employed on a half-time basis, are considered to be 12 full-time equivalents.

HOSPITALIZATION RATIO

The proportion of strength occupying hospital and Class "A" Dispensary beds on an average day (of the period for which it is computed). It differs from the noneffective ratio in that quarters or Class "B" Dispensary patients are excluded. The ratio is computed per 100 strength as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of sick days in hospital and dispensary in the period} \times 100}{\text{Average daily strength} \times \text{number of days in the period}}$$

or:

$$\frac{\text{Daily average number of patients occupying hospital and dispensary beds}}{\text{Average daily strength for the period}}$$

INCIDENCE

A count of diagnostic entities reported, as distinguished from number of patients admitted.

MISSING

Any person is missing who is involuntarily absent or who fails to return from a scheduled flight or mission, who is not known to be dead, AWOL, in a hospital, in confinement, on leave, or in any other absent category.

NONBATTLE CASUALTY

Any dead (including those as a result of disease), or wounded, injured or missing person, not classed as "Battle" casualty are defined herein. All self-inflicted wounds or injuries and injuries due to elements such as frostbite and trenchfoot are considered to be "nonbattle". If there is any doubt as to whether a casualty, occurring under combat mission conditions, was due to "nonbattle" factors, the casualty is classed as "battle" and not as "nonbattle".

NONEFFECTIVENESS

The temporary loss of manpower from duty, in this context for medical reasons.

NONEFFECTIVE RATIO

The proportion of strength not available for duty on an average day (of the period for which it is computed) because of medical reasons whether under treatment in hospital, dispensary, or quarters. The ratio is computed per 100 strength as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Number of sick days in period} \times 100}{\text{Average daily strength} \times \text{number of days in period}}$$

or:

$$\frac{\text{Average daily number of "patients remaining"} \times 100}{\text{Average daily strength}}$$

OPERATING BEDS

Those medical treatment facility beds which are currently set up and in all respects ready for the care of patients, and which the facility is staffed and equipped to operate. Bassinets and Class "B" Dispensary beds are not included.

OUTPATIENT VISITS

A visit is counted for each patient (not excused from duty) who on a given day presents himself for either medical advice or treatment. On any given day, only one visit is counted regardless of the number of times the patient is seen; when the patient is seen on multiple days, one visit is counted for each day. Patients reporting for prescribed examinations and immunizations are not counted as a visit.

DEFINITIONS (CONTINUED)**PRINCIPAL DIAGNOSIS**

A term used to indicate the sum of sole and primary diagnosis.

SPECIFIED PERIODIC EXAMINATIONS OR TESTS

Are those examinations or tests administered to personnel, military or civilian, exposed to industrial-type hazards.

RETURNS TO MILITARY CONTROL

Persons, previously reported as missing, who have returned to military control from a missing status.

OFFICE OF SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS

The following definitions pertain to the security portion of this Digest.

DEFINITIONS**AUXILIARY OFFICE INVESTIGATIONS - (short terminology - "Auxiliary")**

Investigations of any nature conducted by the Directorate of Special Investigations or a District Office, in which, in accordance with OSI policy, that office acts as an assistant to the controlling office (the office of origin) within its territorial investigative jurisdiction.

CLASSIFICATION

The numerical designation and descriptive character assigned to each investigation which indicates the principal nature of the purpose of the investigation.

COUNTERINTELLIGENCE INVESTIGATIONS

Investigations conducted to determine facts related to security control measures designed to insure the safeguarding of information, personnel, equipment and installations against the sabotage, espionage or subversive activities of foreign powers and of disaffected or dissident groups or individuals which may constitute a threat to the internal security of the Air Force.

GENERAL INVESTIGATIONS

Investigations conducted to determine facts and circumstances pertaining to alleged major violations of the Articles of the Uniform Code of Military Justice, Federal Statutes and/or other applicable directives, by USAF personnel, excluding incidents of a counterintelligence or procurement nature.

INVESTIGATIONS CLOSED

Investigations terminated by offices of origin and auxiliary offices after all relevant facts have been determined and impartially reported to the requesting commander through proper OSI channels.

INVESTIGATIONS OPENED

Investigations initiated by offices of origin or auxiliary offices pursuant to requests from appropriate commanders or the Chief of Staff, USAF.

INVESTIGATIONS PENDING

Investigations opened by offices of origin or auxiliary offices on which, as of the date such investigations are inventoried, there remains further investigative work and reporting to be done before they may be considered investigations closed.

OFFICE OF ORIGIN INVESTIGATIONS - (short terminology - "Origin")

Investigations of any nature conducted by the Directorate of Special Investigations or a District Office in which, in accordance with OSI policy, that office assumes the control of the entire investigation.

PERSONNEL SECURITY INVESTIGATIONS


Investigations conducted to determine facts upon which the requesting commander can decide whether to grant or deny to the subjects of the investigations access to restricted areas and/or classified defense information. The loyalty and security program within the executive departments established the requirement for such investigations, and they are governed by law, DOD directives and Air Force policies.

PROCUREMENT INVESTIGATIONS

Investigations conducted to determine facts surrounding incidents of alleged breaches of the public trust and violations of law in connection with Air Force procurement, disposal, nonappropriated funds, and pay and allowance matters.

SECURITY

Safeguarding military information - This regulation prescribes policies and procedures for the safeguarding of military information which requires protection and to achieve uniformity in the grading and assignment of classification. Ref: AFR 205-1

SECURITY AND DISCIPLINE (CONTINUED)**PROVOST MARSHAL**

Provost Marshal Statistics are a collection of selected data concerning corrections, security violations, and delinquencies charged to Worldwide Military Personnel on active duty. The statistics reported in this section are derived from AF Form 511, "Provost Marshal Activities Report."

The following definitions affect this portion of the Morale Reports:

DEFINITIONS**ABSENT WITHOUT LEAVE (AWOL)**

The status or the offense of any member of the Air Force, who, without proper authority:

- (1) Fails to go to his appointed place of duty at the time prescribed, or
- (2) Goes from that place, or
- (3) Absents himself or remains absent from his unit, organization, or other place of duty which he is required to be at the time prescribed (Uniform Code of Military Justice, Article 86) (See AFR 35-73 1-4 dated: 2 August 1955.)

APPREHENSION

a. Cooperation of State and Local Police Forces. Commanders of zone of interior major air commands will take steps to secure the active cooperation of all State and local police forces and such other officials and organizations as they may consider useful to insure the person's prompt return to military control. Such agencies will be informed that they should not take action to apprehend an absentee or deserter unless they are in receipt of either DD Form 553 or information from an officer of the Air Force that the person is an absentee or deserter whose return to military control is desired. Commanders of major air commands overseas will take such action as the local situation may warrant.

b. Personnel Authorized to Apprehend:

- (1) Military. Members of the Armed Forces are authorized to apprehend absentees and deserter in the circumstances described in MCM, 1951, paragraphs 17, 18, and 19.
- (2) Civilians. Any civil officer having authority to apprehend offenders under the laws of the United States or any State, district, Territory, or Possession of the United States may summarily apprehend a deserter from the Armed Forces of the United States and deliver him into the custody of the Armed Forces of the United States (Uniform Code of Military Justice, Article 8). Generally, a private citizen does not have any authority to apprehend a deserter unless authorized to do so by a military officer (distribution of DD Form 553 has been held to be sufficient authorization).

CUSTODY GRADE

Prisoners will be classified as being in a minimum, medium or maximum custody grade in accordance with the criteria outlined in (1), (2), and (3) below. The initial classification will be determined by the confinement officer based upon the nature of the offense, demeanor of the prisoner upon admission, and any other pertinent information available.

- (1) Minimum custody prisoners-- Those who are sufficiently stable, dependable, and trustworthy who require little or no custodial supervision.
- (2) Medium custody prisoners require continual supervision, but their escape would not threaten life, limb or property.
- (3) Maximum custody prisoners-- Those whose escape would present a distinct threat to the safety of life, limb or property, and who require special custodial controls and handling.



COMPONENTS

DEFINITIONS

AF RESERVE

ACTIVE DUTY FOR TRAINING

Full-time duty with the active establishment for the purpose of training. All tours accomplished under the provisions of AFM 45-1^b are included in this definition.

AIR FORCE RESERVE SPECIALIST TRAINING CENTER UNIT

A non-Table of Organization, composite type unit composed of persons who will be required in the event of full and/or partial mobilization, and who may possess either Ready Reserve or Standby Reserve status.

AIR FORCE RESERVE TRAINING CENTER

A Table of Distribution unit of the regular Air Force, comprising such equipment, facilities and permanent party personnel as are necessary to conduct the training and administration of the Reserve T/O&E units assigned to it, and to conduct the administration of Reservists.

AERIAL PORT SQUADRONS (AP Sq)

T/O units whose personnel are trained in the functions carried on at air terminals and whose specialty is loading, unloading and dropping of supplies from aircraft.

AF RESERVE COMBAT SUPPORT TRAINING (AFRCST)

T/O units, such as Air Depot Wings, whose personnel are trained in logistical functions to the combat units.

AF RESERVE COMBAT TRAINING (AFRCT)

T/O units whose personnel are trained in direct combat and close supporting functions.

AIRWAYS AND AIR COMMUNICATIONS SQUADRON (AACS)

T/O units whose personnel are trained in communications with aircraft in flight as well as with airways stations for the purpose of safe movement of aircraft.

AIR RESERVE SQUADRONS (Air National Guard Nurse Training) (ARS (ANT))

Non-T/O units made up of nurses whose personnel are attached to, and train with, Air National Guard units.

AIR RESERVE SQUADRON (Navigational Training) (ARS (Nav))

Non-T/O units made up of navigators who train in navigational methods and procedures.

AIR RESERVE UNIT PERSONNEL (General Training) (ARU (Gen))

Those AF Reserve personnel, who are assigned to Non T/O AF Reserve units, and participate in individual general type training.

AIR RESERVE UNIT PERSONNEL (Specialized Training for Non-pay) (ARU (S-NP))

Those AF Reserve personnel, who are assigned to Non T/O AF Reserve Units and participate in individual specialized type training, but do not qualify for inactive duty training pay.

AIR RESERVE UNIT PERSONNEL (Specialized Training for Pay) (ARU (S-P))

Those AF Reserve personnel who are assigned to Non T/O AF Reserve units and participate in individual specialized type training and who qualify for inactive duty training pay.

AF RESERVE FLYING TRAINING (AFRFT)

T/O units whose personnel participate in training that would enable them to train pilots in case of mobilization (AFRFT was composed of six Pilot Training Wings until May 1955 at which time these wings were redesignated AF Reserve Combat Training Wings).

INACTIVE STATUS LIST RESERVE SECTION (ISLRS)

All personnel within the Standby Reserve of the Air Force Reserve who have completed their total obligated Reserve service as required by law, who are unable, or unwilling, to participate in prescribed training, who request such status and whose continued retention in the Air Force Reserve is determined to be in the best interest of the Air Force.

COMPONENTS (CONTINUED)

AF RESERVE (CONTINUED)

INELIGIBLE RESERVE SECTION (IRS)

Those personnel who by law have a reserve obligation but do not, and are not, required to participate in any kind of reserve training.

INACTIVE DUTY TRAINING

Training performed by members of the Air Force Reserve not on active duty. This inactive duty training includes training for pay and/or non-pay through participation in training periods and unit training assemblies or the performance of equivalent duties in place of attendance at a unit training assembly.

MOBILIZATION ASSIGNMENT RESERVE (MAR)

An Air Force Reserve Officer or airman not on extended active duty who requires regular and frequent training to attain or retain proficiency in his mobilization position. Such persons possess Ready Reserve status and are eligible for inactive duty training pay and authorized active duty training.

MOBILIZATION DESIGNATION RESERVE (MDR)

An Air Force Reserve officer or airman not on extended active duty who, by virtue of previous military experience and/or the similarity of his civilian occupation to his duty AFSC, is capable of filling a mobilization position with a minimum of training. Such persons may possess Ready or Standby Reserve status. A mobilization designee is not eligible for inactive duty training pay, but is eligible for active duty training subject to the availability of funds.

NON-AFFILIATED RESERVE SECTION (NARS)

AF Reserve personnel who are not assigned to an AF Reserve unit and who do not have a mobilization assignment or mobilization designation position, but who are permitted to earn points by participating in certain kinds of training. (AFR 45-34)

PROGRAM ELEMENTS

Categories of assignments set up within the AF Reserve program to accomplish the different types of training necessary to fulfill the AF Reserve mission.

RESERVISTS IN PAY STATUS ASSIGNMENTS (Comparable to category designated Organized Air Reserve prior to January 1953)
All personnel of the Air Force Reserve who are physically and professionally qualified for active duty, who fulfill the age-in-grade requirements, availability requirements, and who are in the following types of assignments, comprise Pay Status Assignments; mobilization assignments; combat training centers; flying training centers; combat support training centers; and specialist training center units.

READY RESERVE (Established January 1953)

All Air Force Reserve Units and personnel who are liable for active duty either in time of war, national emergency declared by the President or the Congress, or as otherwise authorized by law. All members of the Ready Reserve are in active status.

REPLACEMENT TRAINING SQUADRONS (RT Sq)

Non-T/O units whose personnel are made up of those persons who possess a rated AFSC for which no vacancy exists in the parent reserve wing. These personnel participate in flying training.

RESERVISTS IN NON-PAY STATUS ASSIGNMENTS (Comparable to category designated Volunteer Air Reserve prior to January 1953)

All personnel of the Air Force Reserve who are physically and professionally qualified for active duty, but for whom no position vacancy exists in Pay Status Assignments, or who, for personal reasons, do not participate in the

COMPONENTS (CONTINUED)**AF RESERVE (CONTINUED)**

Air Force reserve training program to the extent required for retention in Pay Status Assignments comprise Reservists in Non-Pay Status assignments. Except for the maximum age of 60, there are no age-in-grade or availability requirements for Reservists in Non-Pay Status Assignments.

RETIRING RESERVE (Comparable to category designated Honorary Air Reserve prior to January 1953)

All Air Force Reserve personnel whose service has been honorable and who have completed 20 years of satisfactory Federal service on active or inactive status or combination thereof in any component or components of the armed services, or who have reached the statutory age for retirement, and who have applied for and received transfer to the Reserve Retired List comprise the Retired Reserve.

STANDBY RESERVE (Established January 1954)

All Air Force Reserve units and personnel, who are liable for active duty in time of war or national emergency declared by the Congress or as may be otherwise authorized by law. All members of the Standby Reserve except those persons on the Inactive Status List Reserve Section and the Retired Reserve List, are in an active status.

TRAINING ATTACHMENT

The attachment, for training purposes only, of an Air Force Reserve officer or airman having a mobilization assignment or designation, to an appropriate unit or activity of the regular Air Force, Air Force Reserve, or the Air National Guard of the United States (subject to the approval of the Air National Guard of the United States unit commander concerned), other than the unit or activity with which mobilization position is held.

AIR NATIONAL GUARD**AIR NATIONAL GUARD STRENGTH**

The assigned strength of Air National Guard Units not on Active Military Service. This strength may include Army personnel known as SCARWANG. However, no SCARWANG were included after 1 March 1956.

CURRENT AUTHORIZED STRENGTH (AIR NATIONAL GUARD)

The authorized strength which is applicable to Federally recognized Air National Guard Units as of the specified date. Such authorized strengths as are issued in appropriate Air Force table of organization with the current reduction in strength by the National Guard Bureau.

SCARWANG PERSONNEL (No SCARWANG included after 1 March 1956.)

Special category Army type National Guard personnel who have or are awaiting Federal recognition and who are assigned to an Air National Guard Unit provided their assignment on "M" Day would be with the U S Air Force. These personnel are charged to the Air National Guard Troop ceiling.

TROOP PROGRAM - AIR NATIONAL GUARD

Authorized strength of all National Guard Units allotted to the States, Territories, and possessions as issued in appropriate Tables of Organization and Tables of Distribution currently augmented and/or reduced by the National Guard Bureau.

COMPONENTS (CONTINUED)**AF RESERVE (CONTINUED)****AIR FORCE RESERVE OFFICERS TRAINING CORPS (AF ROTC)****AFROTC STRENGTH**

This is the inventory of all Air Force Reserve Officers' Training Corps (AFROTC) students in active participation of ROTC training, in conjunction with academic curriculum at civilian educational institutions.

CONDITIONAL ENROLLMENT

This type of enrollment is a tentative enrollment which will not become absolute unless and until the proper authority determines that the student concerned is fully qualified for formal enrollment in the advanced course of the Air Force ROTC.

ENROLLED STUDENTS

This group includes both conditionally and formally enrolled students.

FORMAL ENROLLMENT

This type of enrollment is an absolute advanced enrollment where a condition does not exist that would question a student's qualification for enrollment. Such enrollment entitles the student concerned to receive all benefits, financial and otherwise, provided by law and regulations. (Tables in this publication are based on this type of enrollment).


