When Adrienne Dickey's husband Don first deployed to Iraq in 2004, their boys were 5, 7 and 9. Living in their hometown of Quenemo, Kansas, a small farming community with fewer than 400 residents, the Dickey boys were the only ones at school with a parent deployed to a war zone. Faced with a pay cut from Don's deployment, Adrienne had to figure out ways to keep their boys active to help deal with the stress of missing their father - but on a tighter budget.

She learned about Our Military Kids and applied for grants for Skylar and Caleb to take wrestling lessons. "It was a tremendous opportunity for them because it gave them a physical outlet to work out their emotions," Adrienne says. She says their boys couldn't wait to talk to their dad about their wrestling during his calls from overseas. Throughout two more deployments, all three of their boys, including youngest Kayden, utilized grants from Our Military Kids to stay active and try new things. Horseback riding, basketball and summer camp were all a part of life when dad was deployed.

Thirteen years later, SFC Dickey has once again returned to the Middle East. And this time, his oldest boys Skylar, 24, and Caleb, 22, have joined him. The brothers now serve in the Kansas Air National Guard. Like many military children, the boys joined the Guard because it offered a way of life they already knew and cherished. But Adrienne thinks the grants from Our Military Kids played a big part in shaping their early, positive memories of their dad's service.

The boys both are a part of the 190th Air Refueling Wing, which is also where Adrienne works as an Airman and Family Readiness Program Manager. Her job allows her to take care of families, especially during deployments, which she knows about firsthand. While Adrienne has gotten used to the lengthy separations from her husband, she says it's still tough. And having two sons deployed as well makes this deployment a little more stressful. "It's been a whole different ballgame for me this time," Adrienne says. Fortunately, Skylar and Caleb are stationed together on the same base and check in with each other daily, but their dad is deployed in another location and is in touch much less frequently.

Adrienne is comforted knowing that their boys are together and that they all will be home soon. After 24 years of marriage, she is looking forward to having all the men in her family back on Kansas soil. "It's a life change when your spouse gets deployed." In the meantime, she finds ways in her job to make sure other Kansas families know they are not alone. "It's nice knowing there are programs that will help," she says. "You really find out that you have a bigger family than you thought."

OMK KID GROWS UP

Sometimes, we get the chance to see our military kids grow up. We recently got to know former grant recipient Michelle Criqui of Ft. Belvoir, Virginia, who spent several months volunteering for OMK after graduating from college. She joined the OMK team as our newest employee on March 5. We asked her to share her perspective on being an OMK kid.

When I was a senior in high school, my dad left on a year-long deployment to Kosovo. This meant that my mom, three younger sisters, older brother and I would have to navigate our way through holidays, get-togethers, and all those simple, everyday moments with my dad serving nearly five thousand miles away. My mom was, and still is, a true home-front superhero - making daily sacrifices to ensure that we had everything we needed to be successful, even during this trying time.

When she discovered Our Military Kids, it was as if a huge weight was lifted off her shoulders. She applied for four grants - one for each of my sisters, and they were approved right away. It amazed me that we could get this much support from people we didn't know, but who nonetheless were in our corner, rooting us on and lending a helping hand.

I used my grant to row on the Mount Vernon High School crew team as a member of the Women's Varsity boat. I got the opportunity to race in regattas across Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and even on the Potomac River in Washington, D.C. I earned a varsity letter and a third-place medal for a regatta in which I led the boat in stroke seat. This grant gave me the chance to make so many amazing friends, and receive invaluable encouragement from my coaches that I still carry with me today.

I knew that I wanted to give back to the incredible military community in some way, so it only felt right that I contact Our Military Kids. I know firsthand just how far one grant can go in a child's life, especially when he or she is in a difficult situation that can be hard to comprehend. Our Military Kids made my dad's year of deployment so much easier on my family, and for that, I will always be grateful.
