# PLAYGROUND SAFETY

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that emergency rooms see more than 20,000 children ages 14 and younger each year for playground related injuries. Nearly 80 percent of these injuries are caused by falls. Here are some things to look out for when you're at the playground.

**Improper protective surfaces** - Look for surfaces that are made of wood chips, mulch, wood fibers, sand, pea gravel, shredded tires or rubber mats. It's best if the surface is at least one foot deep.

**Inadequate space** - The area under and around play equipment where a child could fall should be a minimum of six feet in any direction. Additionally, watch out for overcrowded play areas. For example, swings should be set far enough away from other equipment that children won't be hit by a moving swing.

Lack of maintenance - Be aware of hardware that could cut a child or catch items of clothing. Watch for wooden equipment that has fallen out of repair and has splits or splinters. Be cautious of the potential for sharp edges on equipment and communicate these hazards to your children.





Summer is just around the corner, but the month of May traditionally brings warmer weather. Additionally, this is the month many Arkansans begin to spend a little extra time outdoors! Before it gets too hot, here are some tips to keep you cool during the warmer months!!!

# **WATER SAFETY**

According to the National Safety Council drowning is the second leading cause of death for people ages 5 to 24. Here are some safety precautions to think about when enjoying water activities.

**Never swim alone** - Always have a partner when you're going swimming, especially if you're going to an area that is new to you. Additionally, don't dive in unfamiliar areas. If you're trying a new dive location, get an adequate briefing by a professional prior to using the new area.

**Don't drink and swim** - KidsHealth.org reports that alcohol is involved in about half of all male teen drowning events.

**Swimming lessons** - Find age appropriate swim lessons for you child, but remember that no number of lessons can completely "drown-proof" a person.

# **OUTDOOR ACTIVITY SAFETY**

Biking, hiking, canoeing and many other outdoor activities are a favorite pastime during the summer. Taking safety precautions can keep these activities fun and could prevent a visit to the doctor.

**Bicycle safety** - Wear bright colored clothing or reflective clothing. Ride single-file in the direction of traffic and watch for hazards along the road, such as cars and debris.

**Canoe safety** - Always wear a lifejacket when canoeing. Never stand up in a canoe. Bring a waterproof bag with some extra clothes, sunscreen, a first aid kit, water, snacks and a map.

Walking/Running safety - Distracted walking incidents are becoming increasingly more common. According to the Governor's Highway Safety Association report, there were nearly 6,000 pedestrian fatalities in 2017. Look left, right, and left again before walking or running across the street. Never wear headphones while you are walking or running in areas where there could be vehicle traffic. Run in a group, and only run or walk in areas where there is enough room to do so (designated trails, sidewalks, etc.).

As always, as the weather begins to warm up, make sure to drink plenty of water and stay hydrated. Avoiding heat-related injuries can help you enjoy summer activities all season long.

# CHUTES AND PACKERS: RIGGERS ROCK THE DZ

The 189th Aerialport flight is responsible for the palletization and loading of cargo onto the wing's C-130H's, making movements easier for the wing every day. The flight, consisting of more than 15 Airmen, is responsible for building heavy platforms, container delivery systems and tactical training bundles and assist with more than 100 drops per month.



First thing in the morning, the day shift builds up what was dropped the night before. After the build-up, they load the equipment into the aircraft to be dropped at the zone. Along with cargo drops, the flight performs engine run offloads and combat offloads to ensure they are prepared for real-world events or deployments.



The versatile pallets are used to hold all types of items. From tanks, forklifts and Humvees to food, ammunition and water, the flight preps and palletizes for all types of operations. The recent hurricane relief efforts were a testament to the ability of the 189th APF to roll with the punches and maximize their potential.

"I love the challenges that I face every day," said Master Sgt. David Smith, the 189th APF superintendent. "They may not always be considered good challenges, but we do our best to work through them. I've seen lots of changes in aerialport but we've taken those changes and used them to grow what we have today."

# TSgt Olda Cannon, Knowledge Operations Craftsman and Records Custodian for the Commander at the 189th Airlift Wing Communications Flight, Little Rock Air Force Base

As a member of the 189th Air Wing's Communications Flight, TSgt Olda Cannon travels about 180 miles each way from Naylor, Missouri, to the Little Rock Air Force Base every drill.

Cannon is a Knowledge Operations Craftsman and is the Records Custodian for the Commander's file plan. Her other responsibilities include various duties as a flight CSS/orderly room POC and the Communications Flight Functional Area Records Manager (FARM).

Cannon said she and her husband own a farm in Naylor and time away from the farm and her family was a significant factor she had to consider when deciding to commute a long distance to be a member of the Arkansas National Guard.

She said, "When I am gone for drill/AT we hire out a farmhand to help cover my normal duties. That was a large consideration we mulled over when we decided to move and begin farming, not only would we now incur the travel/food cost for me to attend drill, but we would also be paying another employee to cover my position.

"Additionally, there is no longer the ability to make family/school functions after drill or annual training days like I could when we lived in the local area." She said after the additional costs incurred for travel, filling her position on the farm, and paying for TRICARE insurance there is very little left out of my drill pay each month.

Cannon said she truly enjoys seeing the other members (friends) in her flight and within the wing and catching up with them each drill.

She said, "I continue to stay a member of the 189th because it is a blessing to get to come back each month and serve the 189th and continue to work toward accomplishing my goal of retiring at 20 years of military service.

"It is also a blessing to know that if myself or my family is ill or in need of care, we have insurance coverage and are able to receive the care we need with relative ease."

She said, "It is not easy to be a Guardsman that doesn't live close (to drill)...but anything worth doing typically isn't easy!"

If someone from your unit is making extraordinary efforts to be a come to drill let us know. They might be our next Road Warrior.

# The Long Road the Short Path Home

Williams travels just about 130 miles each way between the campus of Arkansas State in Jonesboro and her home unit HHC, 239th BEB in Conway.

However, her original journey began years ago.

"I always wanted to do military service of some type," said Williams. "During my sophomore year of high school I decided the Navy was the service branch I was interested in."

Only a few months later a single significant experience started a chain of events that would change the path Williams' military career multiple times. On April 27, 2014, an EF4 tornado ripped through Pulaski, Faulkner and White counties and struck Williams' hometown of Vilonia. It was the deadliest tornado in Arkansas since 1968.

Williams was familiar with tornadoes and the damage they can cause. Another tornado that occurred just three years and two days before had followed a similar path. Williams was also no stranger to emergency response and disaster operations. She had spent years observing the operations of the Chief at the Vilonia Fire Department. She calls him Dad.

"I volunteered with the fire department as much as they would let me, but the exposure is definitely something that helped me understand how important a life of service can be," Williams said.

In the immediate aftermath of the April 27th tornadoes, Williams jumped right in to assist with response and recovery operations. She helped dispatch volunteers and resources, a role typically held by service workers with years of experience in the field of emergency management or operations.

The tornado generated national attention and within weeks then-President Barack Obama visited the state to view the damage firsthand. Of Williams, Obama said, "Casey...did such a good job that State Troopers started taking orders from her."





Remember that decision earlier in the school year to join the Navy? The recognition from President Obama caught the attention of Arkansas Senator John Boozman. After a conversation with Williams, Boozman wrote a nomination letter for her to application to the United States Naval Academy. Williams was accepted into the Naval Academy with plans to graduate in the Class of 2020.

The journey appeared to be going smoothly. Things were falling into place. Williams prepared to complete her final year of high school and head off to the Naval Academy. In the spring of 2016, as Williams was preparing to graduate high school when she started feeling ill. It was later discovered that an unknown parasite had attached itself to her spinal cord. She was still determined to attend the Naval Academy, so she submitted several waivers to try to defer her attendance until she could resolve her medical issues. Ultimately the Naval Academy decided not to approve any of the waivers.

Instead of beginning her freshman year at the Naval Academy, Williams started college in the fall of at Arkansas State.

"At that point I had started to give up," Williams said. "I still wanted to serve, but I was feeling pretty discouraged. One day I walked past a bunch of ROTC cadets working out and decided it was time to get back into shape." Williams asked if she could start working out with them. Not long after she decided to give the Arkansas National Guard a chance.

"It took about a year to get all of the medical waivers worked out," said Williams. "But it was definitely worth it in the end."

On July 11, 2017, Williams contracted with the Reserve Officer Training Corps as a simultaneously membership program, or SMP, cadet. Williams hopes to continue her passion for service and operations by commissioning as a Chemical Officer and serving in a civil support unit. Despite attending drill at a location just a few miles from her home, Williams is proud of her journey and appreciates the Soldier the stops along the way have helped her become.

"I'm looking forward to my future," she says.

# A DAY IN THE LIFE OF A HELICOPTER PILOT

Camp Robinson is often awash in the sound of rotor blades as crews from the Arkansas National Guard's 77th Expeditionary Combat Aviation Brigade (ECAB) conduct daily operations. Pilots, crew members and maintainers function as if they were one organism with the sole purpose of keeping the aircraft's rotor blades turning. For some, the technical aspects of flying a helicopter seem daunting, but for Lt. Col. Eric Ladd it's just another day at the office. I recently spent the day with Ladd to find out what it's like to be a pilot. Although he never tires of the rush that happens after he's back on the ground, after nearly fifteen years the actual flying portion has become second nature, like driving a car. And the helicopter he flies, the UH-72 Lakota, is akin to driving a sports car.

"It's like strapping a 720 horsepower jetpack to your butt," says Ladd. "Sometimes you feel like you're trying to hold a wet spaghetti noodle straight during a windstorm."

Although being a pilot sounds like a fun job it's still a job. Like other helicopter pilots (and pilots in general) the majority of his time is spent planning and preparing for the upcoming mission and then debriefing maintenance crews and documenting flight hours once the mission is completed. This helps ensure that his fellow pilots and other military personnel can have the most up to date information and properly prepared aircraft when it's their turn up in the helicopters.

His day begins with a mission planning session. He discusses routes, goals, weather, and aircraft status with his co-pilot and crew chief. And the team discusses safety, a lot. Ensuring that the pilots, crew and passengers safely return from a mission is more important than the multi-million dollar aircraft Ladd flies.

"Every takeoff is optional," Ladd says, "but every landing is mandatory."

During a nine hour day, on average Ladd spends two or three hours flying. The other six hours are usually spent either planning or preparing to execute the mission, studying up on the systems of the aircraft or debriefing the mission that he's already executed.

"That's one thing that future aviators should understand

about Army aviation and civilian aviation. You spend much more time being a pilot on the ground than you actually do in the aircraft," says Ladd.

I had the pleasure of taking a flight with Lt. Col. Ladd on a blustery day in April. Although I missed the mission brief, I did arrive in enough time to see Ladd complete his preflight checks on the aircraft. He carefully examined the aircraft's equipment to ensure that the Lakota was safe to fly and we strapped in for the day's activities. Sitting through Ladd's preflight was like being in your first Latin class, at the collegiate level, while the professor teaches calculus.

Once preflight checks were completed Ladd moved the aircraft to the taxiway with an ease gained from years of flying. Takeoff was smooth and uneventful as we banked over the airfield and headed to Conway. And the view from the front seat of a Lakota is magnificent.

Ladd was constantly busy: he checked weather information, reported his location, checked fuel level all while piloting the Lakota to our destinations. He even took the time to bank over Pinnacle Mountain, an action that was met with enthusiastic waves from hikers on the summit.

I asked Ladd what advice he would give to someone interested in becoming a military pilot. His advice: education and teamwork.

"Anyone interested in becoming a pilot should take advantage of every educational opportunity that comes their way. This means attending a two year or four year college or finding certification programs that can set applicants apart from others who are also applying to the program," says Ladd. "This goes for both civilians who want to become a pilot and those who come up from the enlisted ranks."

He stresses that teamwork is required to get any aircraft in the air. From the maintenance crew to flight operations, everyone has to work as a team to make sure that every flight is a safe one.

Ladd stressed that "you need to embrace the team concept and put your personal needs aside and work for the betterment of the team."

The 154th (Observation, Reconnaissance) Weather **Reconnaissance Squadron of the Arkansas National Guard served in North Africa and Italy during WWII.** In September 1940 the 154th became part of the Army Air Corps. After training at Morris Field, North Carolina, the unit was sent overseas in September 1942.

Initially assigned to the 68th Observation Group (motto: Victoria Per Observatiam [Victory Through Observation]) on 1 Sep 1941, it was later assigned to the Twelfth Air Force and finally to the Fifteenth Air Force, 15 Jun 1944.

Most of the squadron sailed from the United States in September 1942 on the HMS Queen Marv. with its first overseas station in Wattisham, England, 4-21 Oct 1942. From there it boarded ship and sailed to be part of Operation Torch, the invasion of North Africa, going ashore on the second day (9 November 1942) of the invasion in Oran, Algeria, Over the next 2 ½ years the squadron would be stationed in St Leu, Tafaraoui, and Blida, Algeria; Oujda, French Morocco; Youks-les-Bains, Algeria; Thelepte, Sbeitla, Le Sers, and Korba, Tunisia; Nouvion and Oran, Algeria; with final station in Bari, Italy (3 Feb 1944 -1 Jul 1945).

"Nouvion Airfield, Algeria, N. Africa—June 12 [1943]

The tail end of the Squadron comes sliding in by truck and plane today and brings tales of the bombing of Korba. 'Early in the morning they came. Dive bombers streaking out of the sun and peppering the ground with their machine guns and then letting fall their eggs.' One of the men caught in the raid comments slowly, 'had two fried eggs in my mess kit ... saw the planes a coming ... my mess kit went one way and I went the other ... you know, when the raid was over, I warn't hungry at all!' ... From another man: 'no one was hurt, but it sure was a helpless feeling; just laying there flat on the ground; no foxhole, no nothing!""

During the period of overseas deployment the 154th operated Douglas A-20 Havocs, Bell P-39 Airacobras, LockheedP-38/F-4 Lightnings, and was the first American unit to operate North American P-51 Mustangs in the European Theatre. A total of 1495 missions and 2522 sorties were flown.

The 154th Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron was attached to the Fifteenth Air Force for the purpose of flying weather reconnaissance, a duty that had been handled by a P-38 unit called the Fifteenth Air Force Weather Reconnaissance Detachment. Personnel and equipment of both units were subsequently integrated, and the unit was re-

designated the 154th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron (Medium) on 12 May 44. Operations centered on weather reconnaissance, and the 154th instituted the concept of "lead missions," in which a weather-recon plane preceded Fifteenth Air Force heavy bombers by 50-75 miles to the target and/or on return from the target, sending real time radio weather data to the trailing bombers. The 154th WRS was innovative in the installation and use of the K-24 aerial camera.

The Squadron was awarded a Distinguished Unit Citation for actions over Rumania, 17, 18, 19 Aug 1944.



# READINESS RODEO PREPS AIRMEN FOR DEPLOYMENT

Airmen of the 189th Airlift Wing participated in a readiness rodeo to ensure deployment preparedness on April 6. The rodeo included classroom instruction and pratical application of self-aid buddy care and proper response to chemical, radiological, biological, or nuclear (CBRN) strike.

The rodeo provided the airmen with the tools and information they would need if faced with a medical emergency or attack in deployed environment. Although deploying personnel would be required to receive additional training prior to departure to their deployed location, the rodeo is a good way for airmen to hone their skills and refresh their knowledge of the equipment and procedures they may have to use if necessary.

Part of the CBRN portion of the training includes donning mission oriented protective posture gear within a very small window of time, with the primary goal being decreasing reaction time and anxiety of wearing MOPP gear at various levels. In addition to quick donning of gear, airmen have to ensure that they know how to properly wear and fit their gas masks in the event of an attack that releases harmful chemical or biological agents. Airmen also learned what medical supplies they might need if they are faced with ensuring the medical stability of a fallen airman, or even themselves. Participants received hands-on demonstrations of a vareity of medical tools that they could access in case of emergency, including quick clotting solutions, Israeli Bandages, and slings. These items and more are included in the first aid kits that airmen are issued when in a deployed environment.

Keeping the members of the 189th AW ready to join the fight is a vital part of remaining ready, relevant, and credible in our nation's ongoing efforts to ensure the safety of its citizens.
