PROTECTING PERSONALLY IDENTIFIABLE INFORMATION*

What is the Privacy Act of 1974?

The Privacy Act is a Federal law that establishes and safeguards the protection of records that the Federal Government collects and maintains on U.S. citizens and aliens lawfully admitted for permanent residence. The purpose of the Privacy Act is to balance the Government's need to maintain information about individuals with the rights of individuals to be protected from unwarranted invasion of privacy through the collection, maintenance, use, and disclosure of personal information by Federal agencies. One critical aspect of the Privacy Act is to protect personally identifiable information (PII).

What is PII?

PII is information that can be used to determine an individual's identity. One element of PII may be enough to identify an individual. In other cases, more than one element of PII can be combined to identify an individual. The following are examples for PII:

Do not release PII about anyone to anyone else without first receiving written consent from the individual whose PII is requested.
