## REFERENCES TO "SANTO".

To EFIM<sup>[i]</sup>.No. 16<sup>[a]</sup>.

1. From the day of crossing the frontier SANTO's<sup>[ii]</sup> allowance[, ] taking into account family allowances indicated[, ] has been eight Australian pounds, besides which there is due to him for payment [0% on the scale of] travelling expenses seven Australian pounds eighteen shillings.
2. According to a Government order, from 1st December 1946 salary alters in accordance with the third group of countries. In future SANTO's allowance will amount to seven Australian pounds fifteen shillings.
3. From the day SANTO was reckoned as in post as a courier of the Special Guard [SPLTsOKhR:NA]<sup>[iii]</sup> his allowance comes to thirty-two Australian pounds six shillings. In connection with the change in the calculation of salary, advise the scale of your salary since the application of the [0% December order] and whether you are being paid the [0% proper salary at present, on what] scale and since when.
