GAO: "Three kinds of systems that can launch nuclear weapons make up the U.S. nuclear triad:

Nuclear-capable heavy bombers (known as the "air leg") Intercontinental ballistic missiles or ICBMs ("ground leg") Ballistic missile submarines ("sea leg")

Most of these systems, however, are nearing or past their planned end-of-life dates. And all of their replacement systems are at risk of delays. For example, parts of the current ICBM could age out faster than expected, while the replacement ICBM faces delays." <u>Read Report</u>.

The United Kingdom is the only nuclear weapon state that operates a posture with a single deterrence system.
