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GENERAL REGULATIONS

1-1. General:

(a) The wearing of the naval uniform should be a matter of personal pride to all naval personnel. All officers and men and members of the Navy Nurse Corps shall provide themselves with the correct uniform as prescribed by these regulations, and are for bidden to wear any other than the regulation uniform, insignia, or devices of their respective rank, corps, or rating, or any medals or orders in any other way than hereinafter prescribed.

(b) It shall be the duty of those intrusted with authority to enforce the provisions of these regulations.

(c) The uniform, with its various insignia and devices, is designed primarily to indicate on sight those belonging to the naval service; to show at a glance their rank, corps, or ratings, and hence the authority and responsibility imposed by law upon those wearing it.

(d) Uniforms shall be kept scrupulously clean, with lace, devices, and insignia bright and free from tarnish and corrosion. Clothes and equipment shall be made of high grade material.

(e) Officers and enlisted men on duty shall at all times wear the uniform of their respective grades, as prescribed by the senior officer present, except as otherwise designated herein.

1-2. Chaplains.—Chaplains shall not wear the cocked hat, epaulets, sword, sword belt, or full-dress trousers, and in lieu of the cocked hat and blue full-dress trousers, when prescribed, they shall wear a cap and plain blue cloth trousers. They may wear the vestments of the church to which they belong on occasions requiring it. 1-3. Acting Commissions.—Officers under acting commissions for special purposes or for temporary duty only shall not be required to have uniforms and equipment other than blue service dress and white service dress. This does not apply to officers in the permanent service who hold temporary commissions in a higher grade.

1-4. Retired Officers.—Officers on the retired list shall be entitled to wear the prescribed uniforms of the rank in which retired. If ordered to duty, they shall wear the uniform prescribed for officers on active duty.

1-5. Officers Suspended.—Officers suspended from duty by sentence of court-martial, or on furlough, or waiting orders for punishment, are prohibited from wearing the uniform during these periods.

1-6. Civilian Clothing, Officers.—Officers may be permitted to have and to wear when off duty civilian clothing, but discretion must be observed in granting this privilege in foreign ports. No part of the prescribed uniform or equipment shall be worn at the same time that civilian clothes are worn, except articles which do not present a distinct naval appearance, such as raincoats, shoes, socks, gloves, linen, and underwear. Miniature medals may be worn on appropriate occasions with civilian evening dress.

1-7. Civilian Clothing, Enlisted Men:

(a) Enlisted men shall not be allowed to have civilian clothing in their possession on board ship. Enlisted men may be permitted to wear civilian clothes when on leave or liberty in

United States ports, but they shall not wear civilian clothing ashore in a foreign port, except where the laws prohibit the wearing of foreign uniforms. (Foreign uniforms are not allowed to be worn in Switzerland unless prior authority has been obtained through diplomatic channels.)

(b) No part of the uniform shall be worn with civilian clothing, except articles which do not present a distinct naval appearance, such as the overcoat, raincoat, jersey, underclothing, socks, gloves, shoes, and overshoes.

(c) When on duty, or when ashore in a foreign port, enlisted men of the Navy or Marine Corps shall wear the prescribed uniform, whether serving on shore or afloat.

1-8. Uniform of the Day:

(a) The uniform to be worn for the season, day, or occasion shall be prescribed by the senior officer present, with due regard to the duty to be performed and the state and variation of the weather.

(b) The uniform of the day shall be regulated by the senior officer present to insure that the dress for officers and men is the same for all in the same locality. The senior officer present afloat shall inquire of the commandant or senior officer present ashore what uniform is being prescribed, in order to preserve the desired uniformity for liberty parties and others.

(c) In the fleet the uniform of the day prescribed by the senior officer present shall be worn by officers of the watch; by all petty officers, signalmen, and others on watch above decks, and by boats' crews; by all persons above deck at "all hands" when going in or out of port; and generally by all officers and men above decks and in common living spaces; but commanding officers may prescribe or permit the working uniform for other persons as may be most suitable to the exercise or duty of the ship at the time.

(d) A dress board, in which will be indicated the uniform of the day for officers and for the crew, shall be kept posted in a conspicuous place. (e) When embarked on Army transports, those of the naval service shall wear the uniform prescribed by the senior naval line officer or marine line officer embarked. The prescribed uniform insofar as practicable shall conform to that prescribed by the officer commanding the troops embarked.

(f) Prescribed uniforms shall be designated in the terms used in these regulations, and in the following sequence:

(1) Officers of the Navy.

(2) Officers of the Marine Corps.

(3) Chief petty officers (and men wearing similar clothing), if different from that for other enlisted men of the Navy.

(4) Enlisted men of the Navy.

(5) Enlisted men of the Marine Corps.

(g) When white uniforms, or uniforms any part or parts of which are white, are designated, they shall be so prescribed that officers and men of all branches shall be similarly clothed, insofar as practicable.

1-9. Exceptions to Uniform of the Day:

(a) Cooks, officers' cooks, and bakers at work in the galleys and bake shops shall wear white undress, bakers' and cooks' caps, and white aprons. When not on duty there, they shall wear the uniform of the day. Messmen while performing their duties as such shall wear white undress and white aprons (marines, the corresponding uniform), and they may wear this uniform any time below decks, but at quarters and off duty they shall wear the uniform of the day. Mess attendants on board ship when performing duties in the wardroom shall at all times wear the white jacket with white or blue trousers, according to the prescribed uniform of the day. When leaving the ship they shall wear the same uniform as other enlisted men.

(b) In warm weather aboard ship, chief petty officers who may be engaged in work which might stain, soil, or wet their clothing may be permitted to remove their coats.

(c) At sea and in isolated anchorages for target practice or similar service, when hot weather or other conditions render it desirable, the uniform of the day for enlisted men may be modified by omitting the jumper. When this uniform is prescribed, chief petty officers shall omit coat and wear outer shirt, with belt instead of suspenders to support the trousers. This uniform will be indicated by signal, and particular care must be taken that none but clean uniform undershirts or shirts are worn, and that a neat appearance is preserved at mess. Members of the guard shall not wear this uniform.

(d) The foul-weather clothing or other prescribed protective clothing may be worn as circumstances warrant.

(e) The working uniform may be worn as prescribed by the senior officer present.

(f) Chief petty officers' blue flannel shirts may be worn when prescribed by the senior officer present.

1-10. Officer of the deck.—The officer of the deck shall wear gloves and carry binoculars or a spyglass in port; at sea he shall carry binoculars and have a deck trumpet or megaphone directly at hand. Appropriate side arms may be prescribed by competent authority.

1-11. Arms at Quarters.—At ordinary daily quarters on board ship no arms shall be worn by officers unless their men be under arms, except on occasions when the drill instructions prescribe arms.

1-12. Side Arms, Leggings, Etc.:

(a) Sword, leggings, and black shoes shall be worn by officers when parading with enlisted men under arms; when parading in full dress or dress, leggings shall not be worn.

(b) Leggings shall be worn by enlisted men of the Navy with any form of dress when under arms for parade or ceremony, for infantry or artillery drill, when in a landing party, or on guard detail, or when on duty ashore as patrol or beachmaster's guard, or as mail orderly. With leggings high black shoes shall be worn by enlisted men.

(c) Swords shall be worn at formal inspections of the crew on board ship, when prescribed by drill regulations and when designated as part of the uniform. They shall not be worn unhooked except when the officer is mounted. When worn without other side arms, the sword belt shall be outside the frock coat and under all others; the sword shall be worn outside of the overcoat.

(d) An officer detailed to place another officer under arrest shall wear the sword.

(e) When the pistol is carried, the belt shall be worn outside of every coat, including the overcoat, the pistol being worn slightly in front of the right hip. The cartridge attachments worn with the pistol belt shall be worn in front and at the right and left of the belt buckle. If only one cartridge attachment is worn, it shall be at the right of the buckle. Web suspenders (single or double) may be prescribed for use with pistol belt, to prevent sagging when heavy items of equipment are worn.

(f) A petty officer on boat duty, in charge of guard boat or on other special duty, shall wear the service pistol belt, but this provision shall not apply to the coxswain of a boat unless the boat's crew is armed.

(g) Officers or men wearing side arms shall not remove their caps or other head covering except indoors.

(h) The sword knot shall be worn by commissioned officers only.

(i) Officers on shore patrol shall wear the uniform of the day with gloves and brassards.

1-13. Midshipmen Uniforms.—The dulyauthorized and approved uniforms for midshipmen at the United States Naval Academy (which are prescribed by the Superintendent of the Naval Academy) shall be described in terms used in these regulations, in order that when midshipmen are serving with other forces and the uniform for any occasion is designated, it will apply alike to midshipmen's uniform appropriate for the occasion.

1-14. Standard Phraseology.—When official references are made to the uniform by any person in the Navy, by any bureau, or in any official publication, the terms set forth in the

Uniform Regulations, U. S. Navy, shall be used.

1-15. Pins and Jewelry.—No watch chains, fobs, pins, or other jewelry shall be worn exposed upon the uniform by any officer or enlisted man of the Navy, except sleeve buttons, and shirt studs as prescribed, and the authorized decorations, medals, and ribbons.

1-16. The Hair and Beard.—The hair, beard, and mustache shall be neatly trimmed. The face shall be kept clean-shaved, except that a mustache, or beard and mustache, may be worn at discretion. No eccentricities in the manner of wearing the hair, beard, or mustache shall be permitted.

1-17. Inspection of Clothing and Bedding:

(a) Commanding officers shall cause the men's clothing and bedding to be inspected by the division officers periodically, taking care that the inspections are so conducted as not to be unnecessarily irksome to the men. They shall encourage the men to keep their uniforms clean and neat and do everything possible to facilitate the proper care, cleaning, fitting, and preservation of the uniforms and equipment.

(b) Division officers shall inspect the clothing and bedding of the men in their divisions and insure that they have the prescribed outfit at all times. They shall make inspections at stated intervals to determine that the clothing and bedding are clean, ample, properly marked, and strictly in accordance with regulations.

(c) On the arrival on board of men transferred from another ship or station, their outfits shall be inspected promptly. Should any man be transferred or received without the prescribed outfit, the facts shall be reported to the commanding officer.

1–18. Transfer or Exchange of Clothing.— No transfer or exchange of clothing shall be made without the authority of the commanding officer. When clothing belonging to deserters is sold, the name of the deserter shall be obliterated

1-19. Regulation Clothing:

(a) All wearing apparel drawn from a supply officer or from the quartermaster's department of the Marine Corps shall be considered uniform.

(b) Clothes made by the men for themselves, made by ship's tailors for them, or received by them from other than official sources, shall conform strictly in material, pattern, and making to those issued by the Government.

(c) Standard samples, as approved by the Bureau of Navigation, of every article of enlisted men's uniforms shall be kept at the Naval Clothing Depot. The articles issued to ships shall conform in every respect to the standard samples, and no change shall be permitted without the sanction of the Secretary of the Navy.

1-20. Marine Expeditionary Force.—Naval officers and enlisted men serving with an expeditionary force of marines may wear the field uniform and insignia prescribed, respectively, for officers and enlisted men of the Marine Corps, except that on the right side of the garrison cap, instead of the emblem of the Marine Corps, they shall wear a half-size, bronze replica of the cap device of a commissioned officer of the Navy. Other insignia designation of rank or rating shall be in accordance with the regulations applying to the working uniform.

1-21. Marine Personnel Serving With Naval Forces.—The uniforms worn by officers and men of the Marine Corps when serving afloat or ashore under naval command shall be as prescribed by the senior officer present.

1-22. Landing Force, Dyed Uniforms for.— It is directed that the undress white uniform of all men landed for operations on shore be dyed khaki brown when, in the opinion of the commanding officer, it is advisable to do so.

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

2-1. Full Dress, Blue.—Frock coat, epaulets, decorations, large medals and badges, cocked hat, full-dress trousers, full-dress belt, sword, white gloves, and black shoes.

2-2. Full Dress, White.—White coat, shoulder marks, decorations, large medals and badges, white service trousers, white cap, fulldress belt, sword, white gloves, and white shoes.

2-3. Dress, Blue.—Frock coat, epaulets, decorations, large medals and badges, cocked hat, dress blue trousers, full-dress belt, sword, white gloves, and black shoes.

2-4. Dress, White.—White coat, shoulder marks, ribbons, white service trousers, white cap, full-dress belt, sword, white gloves, and white shoes.

2-5. Undress, Blue, A.—Frock coat, ribbons, blue cap, dress blue trousers, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and black shoes.

2-6. Undress, Blue, B.—Same as Undress, blue, A, but with white cap.

2-7. Undress, Blue, C.—Frock coat, ribbons, white cap, white service or dress trousers, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and white shoes.

2-8. Undress, White.—White coat, shoulder marks, ribbons, white cap, white service trousers, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and white shoes.

2-9. Service Dress, Blue, A.—Blue sack coat, ribbons, blue cap, plain blue trousers, gray gloves (if prescribed), and black shoes.

2-10. Service Dress, Blue, B.—Same as Service dress, blue A, but with white cap. 2-11. Service Dress, Blue, C.—Blue sack coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, gray gloves, and white shoes.

2-12. Service Dress, White.—White coat, shoulder marks, ribbons, white cap, white service trousers, white gloves, and white shoes.

2-13. Evening Full Dress, A.—Evening-dress coat, epaulets, miniatures of medals, decorations and badges, white dress waistcoat, cocked hat, full-dress blue trousers, full-dress belt, sword, white gloves, black patent-leather shoes.

2-14. Evening Full Dress, B.—Mess jacket, shoulder marks, miniatures of medals, decorations and badges, white dress waistcoat, white cap, full-dress blue trousers, white gloves, and black patent-leather shoes.

2-15. Evening Full Dress, C.—Evening-dress coat, miniatures of medals, decorations and badges, white dress waistcoat, blue cap, fulldress blue trousers, white gloves, and black patent-leather shoes.

2-16. Evening Full Dress, D.—Same as Evening full dress, C, but with white cap.

2-17. Evening Dress, Blue, A.—Eveningdress coat, miniatures of decorations, medals and badges, white dress waistcoat, blue cap, dress blue trousers, white gloves, and black patent-leather shoes.

2-18. Evening Dress, Blue, B.-Same as Evening dress, blue, A, but with white cap.

2-19. Dinner Dress, A.—Mess jacket, shoulder marks, miniature medals, white dress waistcoat, white cap, dress blue trousers, black patent-leather shoes.

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2-20. Dinner Dress, B.—Mess jacket, shoulder marks, miniature medals, white dress waistcoat, white cap, white dress trousers, and white shoes.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

(See uniforms designated under Table of Honors, U. S. Navy Regulations. Articles 20-4, 20-5 and 20-6, Uniform Regulations.)

2-30. Full Dress:

(a) State occasions at home and abroad.

(b) Ceremonies, solemnities, and entertainments when the senior officer present considers it desirable to pay special honors to the occasion.

(c) Once a quarter at Saturday inspection.

2-31. Dress:

(a) Formal occasions.

(b) Ceremonies, solemnities, and entertainments of less importance than those requiring *Full dress*.

(c) On assuming or relinquishing command.

(d) First visits to officers of flag rank.

(e) When exchanging visits of ceremony with foreign officials and when making boarding calls on men-of-war.

(f) Saturday morning inspections, except when Full dress is worn.

2-32. Undress:

(a) When serving as a member of a general court martial.

(b) When visiting foreign officers.

(c) On first visit to commanding officers.

(d) Informal daytime receptions to which officers are invited in their official capacity when frock coats are appropriate.

2-33. Undress With Leggings.—Occasions of special ceremony, by officers on duty with enlisted men under arms on shore when the uniform prescribed for other officers is *Full dress or Dress*. Swords shall be worn with this uniform.

2-34. Service Dress:

(a) When reporting for duty.

(b) Member of summary court martial, court of inquiry, or board; judge advocate of general court martial.

(c) When making boarding calls on a merchant ship, whether manned by reserve crew or not.

(d) In general, at all other times not otherwise herein provided for. Leggings with swords or pistols may be prescribed with this dress in functions where marching may be required.

2-35. Evening Full Dress.—Formal evening functions such as those at which full dress would be worn during the day.

2-36. Evening Dress.—Formal evening functions when *Evening full dress* is inappropriate.

2-37. Dinner Dress.—Ordinary evening social functions.

2-38. In prescribing any of the last three above-mentioned evening uniforms, due consideration must be given to the temperature and the relative importance of the function in deciding whether the uniform will be blue, all white, or a combination of the two.

2-39. Equivalent Army, Navy, and Marine Corps Uniforms.—When officers of the Army and officers of the Navy and Marine Corps, or either, are in attendance together elsewhere than at the White House, one of the three below uniforms shall be designated by the senior officer present.

2-40. At White House Functions.-Officers attending functions at the White House should consult the Navy Department (Bureau of Navigation), which will prescribe the appropriate uniform for the occasion and season.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

2-50. Navy Blue.—Where blue is specified to designate the color of a material for a garment it shall be interpreted to mean *Standard Navy blue*.

2-51. Frock Coat.—This garment shall be a double-breasted frock, blue cloth, double row of five gilt buttons, close fitting, full skirted, reaching to kneecap, rolling collar, open front; to be worn buttoned, using the four lower buttons on the right side. (See Plates 1-2.)

2-52. Service Coat, Blue.—This garment shall be a double-breasted sack, cloth, serge, Palm Beach or similar light-weight material, double row of three gilt buttons, easy fitting, reaching about one inch below crotch line, rolling collar, open front; to be worn buttoned, using the three buttons on the right side. (See Plate 3.)

2-53. Service Coat, White.—This garment shall be single-breasted, buttoned to neck, stiff standing collar, form fitting, five gilt buttons, reaching to about one inch below crotch line. (See Plates 4-5.)

2-54. Evening-Dress Coat.—This garment shall be of conventional cut, shaped to figure, blue cloth, double row of three gilt buttons; approximate length, to hollow back of knee joint. This coat shall be worn open, but held together in front by two Navy buttons and link. (See Plate 6.)

2-55. Mess Jacket, White.—This garment shall be similar in cut to body of *Evening dress* coat, but somewhat longer, sufficiently so to fully cover the upper trousers band; two gilt buttons on each side of front, descending to a rounded peak behind; to be worn open, but held together in front by two Navy buttons and link. (See Plate 7.) 2-56. Overcoat.—This garment shall be double-breasted, blue cloth, double row of five gilt buttons, easy fitting, full skirted, to extend one-third the distance from the kneecap to the ground, shaped at waist and held by half-belt at back; to be worn buttoned, using the four lower buttons on the right side; collar to be so arranged that the coat may be buttoned at the neck if desired. (See Plate 12.)

2-57. Boat Cloak.—This garment shall be made of blue cloth, of conventional cut, full three-quarters of a circle, to extend two inches below kneecap when epaulets are worn, circular black velvet collar closed at neck with hooks and eyes, and one set of silk or mohair frogs. (See Plate 14.)

2-58. Waistcoat, Evening Dress, White.— This garment shall be of conventional cut with rolling collar and have four gilt buttons; to be made of linen, duck, or similar material. (See Plate 18.)

2-59. Waistcoat, Service, Blue.—This garment shall be of conventional cut, singlebreasted, without collar, open to breast line, to be made of cloth or serge to match coat, and shall have a single line of six gilt buttons. (See Plate 18.)

2-60. Trousers, Full Dress.—These trousers shall be of conventional cut, blue cloth with gold-lace stripes covering outside seams, and shall have two fob pockets and no other pockets. The pockets shall be cut high to come well up under the waistcoat and mess jacket. (See Plate 16.)

2-61. Trousers, Dress, Blue.—These trousers shall be the same as *Trousers*, full dress, but without the gold-lace stripes.

2-62. Trousers, Service, Blue.—These trousers shall be of conventional cut, cloth, serge, Palm Beach or similar light-weight material. When wearing blue, the coat and trousers shall match in color and be of the same material. (See Plate 16.)

2-63. Trousers, Dress, White.—These trousers shall be of the same cut as Trousers, dress, blue, but made of the same material as the mess jacket.

2-64. Trousers, Service, White.—These trousers shall be of conventional cut and with usual trouser pockets. When wearing white, the coat and trousers shall be of the same material. (See Plate 16.)

2-65. Raincoat.—This coat shall be doublebreasted, blue, of water-repellent material, and shall have convertible collar similar to overcoat. It shall be loose fitting, full skirted, length onethird the distance from the kneecap to the ground, full belt fitted with leather-covered buckle of nonmagnetic substance in front. (See Plate 13.)

2-66. Raincape.—This cape shall be made of waterproofed cashmere fabric; blue-black in color; single-breasted; full-sweep cape with fly front; arm openings; and two inside oblique pockets. Cape to extend to bottom of overcoat when worn with overcoat. Possession of this cape is optional. (See Plate 15.)

2-67. Cap Cover, Rain.—The cap cover shall be made of black or transparent waterproofed material, and shall fit neatly over cap.

2-68. Cocked Hat.—The cocked hat shall be rigid, of black silk beaver, about five inches high and seventeen inches long, with gold tassels in fold at each end and trimmed for the several ranks as specified. (See Plate 19.)

2-69. Cap, Blue and White.—The frame shall be so constructed that a blue cloth or plain white material cover may be fitted; it shall be stiff, standing, and flaring throughout its circumference to give the center edge of the cover a rolled or rounded effect, rather than one having a thin edge. In general the measurement, with the cover on, should be as follows: Length of crown at grommet 10½ inches, width at grommet 10 inches, extended height in rear from bottom of frame to top of grommet $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches, in front from visor to top of grommet $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches. (See Plates 20-21.)

2-70. Sword and Scabbard.—The sword shall bave a cut and thrust blade, from 26 to 32 inches long, half-basket hilt, and shall fit in a black leather scabbard. (See Plate 28.)

2-71. Sword Knot.—This article shall consist of a loop of ¹/₂-inch gold lace, 24 inches long, with slide and tassel. (See Plate 28.)

2-72. Full-Dress Belt.—This article shall be made of blue-black webbing with gold stripes, backed by black grain leather and fittings. (See Plate 27.)

2-73. Undress Belt.—This article shall consist of plain black leather and fittings. (See Plate 27.)

2-74. Epaulets.—The body shall be covered with gold lace, the outer edge shall have a fringe of gold bullion; and the upper surface shall be decorated with the corps device and insignia of rank. (See Plates 23-24.)

2-75. Shoulder Marks.—The length shall be 5½ inches, and the width shall be 2¼ inches. They shall be made stiff and secured at their inner ends by a small Navy button to white coats, khaki working coats, overcoats, and mess jackets. Flexible shoulder marks may be worn by officers whose duties require them to enter restricted spaces or wear equipment which is strapped over the shoulders. (See Plate 22.)

INSIGNIA

2-80. Indication of Rank of an Officer.—The rank of an officer is indicated primarily by the number and width of stripes on his sleeve; it is also indicated on epaulets, shoulder marks, and pin-on devices, and in part by the markings on the cocked hat, cap, full-dress trousers, and belt.

2–81. Sleeve Markings (Stripes):

(a) Sleeve stripes shall encircle the sleeve and shall be of gold lace or yellow silk lace of approved shade and pattern except those for overcoats, which shall be of lustrous black flat braid. The spacing between stripes shall be $\frac{1}{10}$ inch; the lower stripe shall be 2 inches from the edge of the sleeve and parallel thereto. (b) The following stripes shall be worn on the sleeves of blue coats by officers of the following or equivalent ranks:

Admiral	One 2-inch stripe with three ¹ / ₄ -inch stripes above it.
Vice admiral	One 2-inch stripe with two 1/2-inch stripes above it.
Rear admiral	One 2-inch stripe with one ¹ / ₄ -inch stripe above it.

2-82. Sleeve Markings (Corps Devices):

(a) In addition to the insignia of rank indicated by the above-mentioned stripes, officers of the several corps shall wear ½ inch above the gold stripes the following insignia of corps (known as corps devices), all to be embroidered and of a size to be inscribed in a circle of 1½ inches in diameter, except as otherwise specified. The stars or corps devices may be made of gold embroidery or of yellow silk embroidery of approved shade and pattern.

(b) LINE OFFICERS.—A five-pointed gold star, the lower ray pointing downward. (See Plate 31.)

(c) MEDICAL OFFICERS.—A spread oak leaf, embroidered in gold, surcharged with an acorn, embroidered in silver, of a size to be inscribed in a rectangle 1% inches long and % inch wide; to be set with the longer axis of the device perpendicular to the upper stripe of lace, stem down, and curved slightly to the front. (See Plate 31.)

(d) DENTAL OFFICERS.—A spread oak leaf embroidered in gold, with acorns embroidered in silver on each side of the stem, of a size to be inscribed in a rectangle 1½ inches long and ½ inch wide; to be set with the longer axis of the device perpendicular to the upper stripe of lace, stem down and curved slightly to the front. (See Plate 31.) (e) SUPPLY OFFICERS.—A sprig of three oak leaves and three acorns, to be embroidered in gold, with one acorn on each side of the stem and one acorn between the two upper leaves; leaves and acorns to be distinctly and separately outlined, except where brought together at the stem of the sprig; of a size to be inscribed in a rectangle 1¼ inches long and ¾ inch wide; to be set with the longer axis of the device parallel to the stripes of lace, with stems to the front. (See Plate 31.)

(f) CHAPLAINS.—A Latin cross embroidered in gold, the long arm 1 inch long, the short arm $\frac{1}{2}$ inch long, and each arm $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide; to be set inclined toward the rear, the longer arm making an angle of 60° with the upper stripe of lace. (See Plate 31.)

For chaplains of the Jewish faith the corps device shall consist of the Star of David above and attached to the top center of the Tablets of the Law, to be approximately 1½ inches high and to be set with the longer axis of the device perpendicular to the upper stripe of lace.

(g) PROFESSORS OF MATHEMATICS.—An oak leaf with slightly curving stem and acorn attached to the concave side of the stem, to be embroidered in gold, of a size to be inscribed in an ellipse $1\frac{1}{12}$ inches long and $\frac{1}{22}$ inch wide; to be set with stems to the front, acorn uppermost and midrib of the leaf making an angle of 30° with the stripe of lace.

(h) NAVAL CONSTRUCTORS.—A sprig of two live-oak leaves, spreading with an acorn on the stem between the leaves, stem curving slightly, embroidered in gold, of a size to be inscribed in a rectangle 1% inches long and % inch wide; to be set with the longer axis of circumscribing figure parallel to the stripes of lace, stem pointing down toward the front. (See Plate 31.)

(i) CIVIL ENGINEERS.—Two sprigs of two live-oak leaves embroidered in gold and an acorn embroidered in silver in each sprig, leaves of each sprig spreading and with the acorn at the stem; the sprigs to be crossed with stem at the ends of the device, the acorns pointed up and clearing the tips of the leaves of the opposite sprig; the device to be $1\frac{1}{16}$ inches long over all and $\frac{1}{16}$ inch wide, to be set with the longer axis parallel to the upper stripes of lace. (See Plate 31.)

2-83. Shoulder Marks (for All Officers):

(a) Shoulder marks which indicate rank and corps shall be worn on white service coats, mess jackets, overcoats, and khaki working uniform coats.

(b) They shall be 5½ inches long, 2½ inches wide, with the outer end squared and the inner end terminating in a symmetrical triangular peak, extending 1 inch beyond the parallel sides.

(c) For all flag officers, the outside face shall be covered with 2-inch gold lace, or yellow silk lace, of approved shade and pattern, showing a margin of % inch of blue cloth, with silver foul anchor mounted thereon, crown pointing outward. For flag officers of the staff corps, there shall be surcharged on the shank of the anchor a miniature device in gold of the appropriate corps. Designations of rank shall be as follows:

Admiral	Four silver stars.
Vice admiral	Three silver stars.
Rear admiral	Two silver stars.
Commodore	One silver star.

(d) For all officers below flag rank; the outside face shall be covered with dark blue cloth lined with black silk. Corps devices on shoulder marks shall be of the same sizes, and shall be set, in relation to the stripes thereon, as specified for corps devices on the sleeves of blue coats. Rank shall be designated by stripes, the number and width of which shall be as specified for blue coats. (See Plate 22.)

2-84. Epaulets:

(a) There shall be three standard patterns, one for flag officers (bullions 3½ inches long and % inch diameter), one for captains and commanders (bullions 3 inches long and ½ inch diameter), and one for lieutenant commanders, lieutenants, and ensigns (bullions 3 inches long and % inch diameter). Epaulets shall not be worn by chaplains, chief warrant officers or warrant officers.

(b) The rank insignia shall be as follows:

(c) CORPS DEVICES FOR EPAULETS.—On the strap of the epaulet shall be mounted a silver foul anchor. Staff officers shall wear surcharged on the silver anchor the appropriate corps device. (See Plates 23-24.)

2-85. Cocked Hat:

(a) For officers of flag rank, to be bordered with gold lace 1½ inches wide, the cockade to be trimmed with similar lace.

(b) For all other commissioned officers (except chaplains and chief warrant officers) the cocked hat shall be bordered with black silk lace 2% inches wide, but showing only 1% inches on the outside.

(c) For the ranks of captain and commander the cockade shall be trimmed with gold lace 1½ inches wide; for the ranks of lieutenant commander and below, gold lace 1 inch wide.

(d) The cockade shall be of black silk, 3½ inches in diameter. (See Plate 19.)

2-86. Caps:

(a) For flag officers and officers of equivalent rank in the staff corps, the visor shall be embroidered full in gold with oak leaves and acorns on dark blue cloth.

(b) For captains and commanders and officers of equivalent rank in the staff corps, similarly embroidered but only along front edge.

(c) For all other officers of and below rank of lieutenant commander, the visor shall have a polished black finish. (d) The cap device for all commissioned officers shall be embroidered and consist of two crossed foul anchors in gold with silver shield and spread eagle to face dexter superimposed. A cap device made of solid metal is optional.

(e) An adjustable chin strap shall be made of %-inch gold lace or yellow silk lace.

(f) The underside of the visor of all caps shall be lined with dark green diced hatter's skiver leather. (See Plates 20-21.)

2–87. Trousers, Full Dress:

Full-dress blue trousers (except for chaplains) shall have a stripe of gold lace, or yellow silk lace, of approved shade and pattern, covering the outside seam of each leg, in widths as follows:

2-88. Belt, Full Dress:

The full-dress belt shall be worn by all commissioned officers (except chaplains and chief warrant officers), and shall be of dark navy-blue webbing, backed by black leather, 1% inches wide, and fastened with a gold-plated buckle, 2 inches in diameter, marked as follows:

(1) OFFICERS OF FLAG RANK.—Three woven gold stripes, each ¼ inch wide, the two outer stripes on the upper and lower edges, respectively, the third one in the middle; sling straps to be ¼ inch wide, with three ¼-inch gold-woven stripes, one on each edge and one in the middle.

(2) OFFICERS OF THE RANK OF CAPTAIN AND COMMANDER.—The same as for officers of flag rank, except that there shall be seven gold stripes, each χ_6 inch wide in the belt, and on the sling strap three χ_8 -inch stripes.

(3) OFFICERS OF AND BELOW THE RANK OF LIEUTENANT COMMANDER.—The same as paragraph (2), but with five gold stripes in the belt and no middle stripe in the sling strap. (See Plate 27.)

2-89. Belt, Undress.--Plain black grain leather, 2 inches wide, with plain sling straps of the same material, % inch wide, buckle and mounting same as full-dress belt, no special rank markings. (See Plate 27.)

2-90. Alguillettes:

(a) Aiguillettes shall be worn by officers when on duty as personal aides to the President, aides at the White House, aides to the Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the Navy, aides to flag officers, and by naval attachés. They may be worn on official occasions by commissioned officers appointed as aides on his staff by the governor of a State or Territory. Aides to the President and at the White House shall wear them on the right side; all others on the left. With overcoats they shall be worn on the outside.

(b) Dress aiguillettes shall consist of two loops and shall be worn on service uniforms by aides on occasion of ceremony and on social occasions when prescribed.

(c) Service aiguillettes shall be worn only on service dress uniforms, and shall have loops as follows: (1) Aide to an admiral or official of higher rank, four loops; (2) aide to a vice admiral, three loops; (3) aide to a rear admiral or officer of lower rank, two loops.

(d) Dress aiguillettes for aide to the President shall have a gold cord without the blue; in all other respects the same as hereinafter described. (See Plates 29-30.)

OTHER ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

2-100. Buttons:

(a) Navy gilt buttons shall be convex, of standard pattern and of four sizes, with regulation device of United States Navy stamped on the surface of the button. The eagles on all buttons shall face dexter. Buttons shall be of the following sizes: 40-line (1 inch), 35-line ($\frac{1}{4}$ inch), 28-line ($\frac{1}{40}$ inch), and 22 $\frac{1}{4}$ -line ($\frac{1}{40}$ inch). Thickness of the 22 $\frac{1}{4}$ and 28-line buttons shall be $\frac{1}{4}$ inch and that of the 35- and 40-line buttons $\frac{3}{4}$ inch, with $\frac{1}{42}$ inch tolerance either way.

(b) Black buttons shall be of vegetable ivory, hard rubber or nonmetallic composition, and shall be of the size prescribed in the detailed specifications for various garments. Shirt buttons, cuff and bosom, shall be of plain gold, the latter $\frac{1}{2}$ inch in diameter, only two of which shall be visible above waistcoat on a plain white starched-bosom shirt. Those for the cuffs shall be of the link pattern. (See Plate 71.)

2-101. Shirts:

(a) Shirts shall be of plain white cotton or linen only. With Service Dress, Blue, A, B, and C, shirts with collar attached are permitted; with all other uniforms, shirts with neckband are prescribed. With evening dress coat and mess jacket, the bosom shall be stiff and starched, without plaits and showing two shirt buttons above the waistcoat. With other coats the shirt bosom may be soft.

(b) The blue flannel (chief petty officer) shirt may be worn with service dress at sea, or in such weather or under such circumstances as may warrant it when prescribed by the senior officer present. (See Plate 61.)

2-102. Collars.—Collars shall be plain white, stiff and starched. A standing wing collar shall be worn with the evening dress coat. A standing collar may be worn with the service coat, white. With other uniforms a turn-down collar shall be worn. (See Plates 3-6.)

2-103. Cuffs.--Cuffs shall be plain white and starched. With service dress, unstarched cuffs may be permitted.

2-104. Neckwear.—Neckties shall be plain black. A four-in-hand shall be worn with the frock and service coat, blue, and a bow tie with the evening dress coat and mess jacket. (See Plate 62.) 2-105. Mufflers.—The wearing of mufflers with overcoats is optional. When mufflers are worn they shall be of white silk.

2-106. Gloves.—White service gloves shall be of lisle thread or skin, with white stitching. Service gloves shall be iron gray in color and made of suede, lisle, silk, or cotton thread, with stitching of the same color. Gloves when worn with blue service dress or with overcoat shall be the service glove; when worn with any other uniforms they shall be the white.

2-107. Shoes:

(a) Black shoes, high or low oxford, shall be laced, of black leather, and shall be worn when blue trousers are prescribed.

(b) Black patent-leather shoes, conventional style, shall be worn when the evening dress coat or blue trousers with mess jacket are worn.

(c) White shoes, high or low, oxford, of canvas or leather, shall be worn when white trousers are worn.

2-108. Socks.—Socks shall be plain knitted material undecorated; black socks shall be worn with blue trousers, white socks with white trousers.

2-109. Mourning Badges.—Mourning badges shall be of black crepe; that around the arm shall be 3 inches wide, be worn on the left side, halfway between the shoulder and elbow; that on the sword hilt, of the same width, 20 inches long, shall be knotted in the middle at the sword hilt. They shall be worn when prescribed, and at no other time. (See Plate 28.)

2-110. Leggings.—Leggings shall be of the same type, pattern, and color as prescribed for the service; i. e., officers and men alike. (See Plate 49.)

CHAPTER III

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CHIEF WARRANT AND WARRANT OFFICERS

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORM

3-1. Full Dress, Blue.—Frock coat, decorations, large medals and badges, blue cap, plain blue trousers, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and black shoes.

3-2. Full Dress, White.—White coat, shoulder marks, decorations, large medals and badges, white trousers, white cap, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and white shoes.

3-3. Dress, Blue.—Same as Full dress, blue.

3-4. Dress, White.—Same as Full dress, white, but with ribbons, instead of decorations, medals, and badges.

3-5. Undress, Blue, A.—Frock coat, ribbons, blue cap, plain blue trousers, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and black shoes.

3-6. Undress, Blue, B.—Same as Undress, blue, A, but with white cap.

3-7. Undress, Blue, C.—Frock coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, undress belt, sword, white gloves, and white shoes.

3-8. Undress, White.-Same as Dress, white.

3-9. Service Dress, Blue, A.—Blue sack coat, ribbons, blue cap, plain blue trousers, gray gloves (if prescribed) and black shoes.

3-10. Service Dress, Blue, B.—Same as Service dress, blue, A, but with white cap.

3-11. Service Dress, Blue, C.—Blue sack coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, gray gloves, and white shoes.

3-12. Service Dress, White.—White coat, shoulder marks, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, white gloves, and white shoes.

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OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

3-20. Same as for other officers.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

3-30. Same as articles prescribed for other officers unless modified herein.

INSIGNIA

3-40. Sleeve Markings (Stripes):

(a) Sleeve stripes shall encircle the sleeve and be of gold lace or yellow silk lace of approved shade and pattern, broken, alternating blue and gold, except those for overcoats, which shall be of lustrous black flat braid. The stripe shall be two inches from the end of the sleeve and parallel thereto.

(b) The stripes shall be worn on blue coats as indicated:

Chief warrant officer_____ One ½-inch stripe. Warrant officer_____ One ½-inch stripe.

The gold lace shall be broken at intervals of 2 inches by ½ inch of dark blue silk thread. (See Plate 26.)

3-41. Sleeve Markings (Corps Devices):

(a) In addition to the insignia of rank indicated by the above-mentioned stripes, warrant officers shall wear $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the gold stripe the following insignia (known as corps devices), all to be embroidered and of a size to be inscribed in a circle $\frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter, except as otherwise specified. The corps devices may be made of gold embroidery or of yellow silk embroidery of approved shade and pattern. (b) CHIEF BOATSWAINS AND BOATSWAINS.— Two crossed gold foul anchors, crowns downward.

(c) CHIEF GUNNERS AND GUNNERS.—Flaming spherical gold shell, flame upward. The maximum width of the flame shall be $\frac{1}{16}$ inch; the diameter of the shell shall be $\frac{1}{16}$ inch.

(d) CHIEF MACHINISTS AND MACHINISTS.— A three-bladed gold propeller, one blade pointing upward. The outer diameter of the hub of the propeller shall be ½ inch; the inner diameter shall be ½ inch.

(e) CHIEF CARPENTERS AND CARPENTERS.— A gold carpenter's square, point down, each arm to be % inch long, and % inch wide.

(f) CHIEF SAILMAKERS AND SAILMAKERS.— A gold lozenge, or diamond, major axis in the horizontal.

(g) CHIEF PHARMACISTS AND PHARMACISTS.— A gold caduceus, point downward.

(h) CHIEF PAY CLERKS AND PAY CLERKS.— A similar device as for the Supply Corps, but without the acorn.

(i) MATES.—A pair of gold binoculars, small end upward, 2½ inches above the cuff line.

(j) CHIEF ELECTRICIANS AND ELECTRICIANS.— A gold globe of a size to be inscribed within a circle 1 inch in diameter. Surcharged on the globe shall be five lines of jaceron, representing lines of latitude, and five lines of frizz representing lines of longitude.

(k) CHIEF RADIO ELECTRICIANS AND RADIO ELECTRICIANS.—A device consisting of four zigzag rays of lightning, of a size to be inscribed within a rectangle 1¼ inches long by ¼ inch wide, narrow end to the front. (See Plate 31).

3-42. Shoulder Marks:

(a) GENERAL.—Same for all officers.

(b) The stripe shall be as specified for blue service coats.

(c) Corps devices shall be of the same sizes and shall be set, in relation to the stripe, as specified for corps devices on the sleeves of blue service coats. (See Plate 22.)

3-43. Caps:

(a) The cap for chief warrant officers shall be the same as for officers below the rank of commander.

(b) The cap for warrant officers shall be the same as for chief warrant officers except the chin strap shall be ½ inch in width, and the cap device shall consist of two crossed embroidered gold foul anchors but without shield and eagle. A cap device made of solid metal is optional. (See Plate 20.)

3-44. Other Articles of Uniform.—Same for all officers.

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CHAPTER IV

CHIEF PETTY OFFICERS

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

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4-1. Dress, Blue, A.—Blue coat, ribbons, blue cap, blue trousers, and black shoes.

4-2. Dress, Blue, B.—Same as Dress, blue, A, but with white cap.

4-3. Dress, Blue, C.—Blue coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

4-4. Dress, White.—White coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

4-5. Full Dress, Blue or White.—Same as Dress, blus, A, B, or C, or Dress, white, but decorations, medals, and badges shall be worn when Full dress, blue or white, is prescribed for officers.

4-6. Undress, Blue, A, B, or C, or White.---When any of these uniforms are designated, they shall be the same as *Dress*, *blue*, *A*, *B*, or *C*, or *Dress*, white, but will refer more particularly to clothes that may not be new, spick-and-span, but which are still in a serviceable condition.

4-7. Working Dress, Blue, A, B, or C, or White.—The same as Undress, blue, A, B, or C, or white, but refers to old clothes suitable to the occasion.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

4-10.—The uniforms for Chief Petty Officers for various occasions shall be in accordance with those prescribed for other enlisted men.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

4-20. Coat, Blue.—This garment shall be a double-breasted sack, cloth or serge, double row

of four gilt buttons, easy fitting, reaching to one inch below crotch line, rolling collar, open front; to be worn buttoned, using the four buttons on the right side. (See Plate 32.)

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4-21. Coat, White.—This garment shall be of the same cut and style as *Coat*, *blue*, but shall be made of cotton duck or twill, with detachable buttons. (See Plate 33.)

4-22. Overcoat.—This garment shall be double-breasted, navy blue (blue black) cloth, convertible collar and lapels, double row of five black anchor buttons, easy fitting with full skirts. (See Plate 36.)

4-23. Raincoat (Optional):

Type I.—This garment shall be single-breasted, black, lightweight, of waterproof material, length about one-third the distance from knee cap to ground, five black buttons; to be worn buttoned to the throat with turn-down collar. It shall be without lining and have two outside patch pockets with flaps, and back belt. (See Plate 51.)

Type II.—This garment shall be doublebreasted, dark blue, water-repellent material, convertible collar, loose fitting, full skirted, length one-third distance from kneecap to the ground, back belt, plain cuffs. (See Plate 37.)

4-24. Cover Cap, Rain.—This article shall be black or transparent water-proofed material, to fit neatly over cap.

4-25. Waistcoat, Blue.—This garment shall be of conventional cut, single-breasted, without collar, open to breast line; to be made of cloth or serge to match coat, and shall have a single line of six gilt buttons. (See Plate 18.)

4-26. Trousers, Blue.—These trousers shall be of conventional cut, cloth or serge. When wearing blue, the coat and trousers shall be of the same material and match in color. (See **Plate 38.)**

4-27. Trousers, White.—These trousers shall be the same as Trousers, blue, but the material shall be white to match white coat. (See Plate 38.)

4-28. Necktie.—The necktie shall be of plain black woven silk, satin, rayon, or wool; to be worn four-in-hand. (See Plate 62.)

4-29. Cap, Combination, Blue or White.-Frame, covers, and visors shall be the same as for warrant officers, but with patent-leather chin strap and chief petty officers' device. (See Plate 38.)

OTHER ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

4-30. Buttons, Navy, Gilt .-- Navy gilt buttons shall be 28-line (% inch) and 22%-line (% inch), entire diameter, and of standard pattern and device. Thickness of the buttons shall be ¼ inch, with ½ inch tolerance. (See Plate 71.)

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4-31. Shirts, Collars, and Cuffs:

(a) Shirts shall be of neckband type or with collar attached and made of plain white linen or cotton, without stripes, figures, or plaits of any kind, open in front and shall be buttoned with plain white buttons. Only plain white cuffs of similar material shall be worn.

(b) Only plain white, stiff, turned-down collars shall be worn.

(c) The dark navy blue fiannel or blue chambray shirt with collar attached may be worn when prescribed by the senior officer present. (See Plates 40-61.)

4-32. Shoes, High and Low, Black and White: (a) Black shoes, high and low oxford, shall be plain and of black leather with box toes, and shall be worn on all occasions when blue trousers are worn.

5-1. Dress, Blue, A .- Blue dress jumper, ribbons, blue trousers, blue cap, neckerchief, black socks, and black shoes.

5-2. Dress, Blue, B .- Same as Dress, blue, A, but with white hat.

5-3. Dress, White .- Dress jumper, ribbons, white trousers, white hat, neckerchief, white or natural color socks, and black shoes.

5-4. Full Dress, Blue or White .-- Same as Dress, blue, A, B, or Dress, white, but decorations, medals and badges shall be worn when Full dress, blue or white, is prescribed for officers.

5-5. Undress, Blue, A.-Blue undress jumper, blue trousers, blue cap, black socks, and black shoes.

5-6. Undress, Blue, B.-Same as Undress, blue, A, but with white hat.

5-7. Undress, White, A .- White undress jumper, white trousers, white hat, white or natural color socks, and black shoes.

5-8. Undress, White, B.-Same as Undress, white, A, without jumper.

5-9. Working Dress, Blue, A .-- Same as Undress, blue, A, but old clothes may be worn.

5-10. Working Dress, Blue, B.-Same as Undress, blue, B, but old clothes may be worn.

5-11. Working Dress, White .-- Same as Undress, white, but old clothes may be worn.

5-12. Watch Caps.-Watch caps may be designated with Undress or Working dress.

Men on Special Detail.-Boatswain's mates, quartermasters, guard petty officers, and other petty officers on watch on deck, mail orderlies, buglers, messengers, sideboys, sentries, men on guard or patrol detail, and the coxswains of all boats shall wear the neckerchief with undress, blue or white; but other men shall not wear the neckerchief with undress, blue or white, except on occasion when prescribed. Bodies of men under arms, including their petty officers, shall not wear neckerchiefs with undress, except the guard.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

5-30. Jumper, Blue, Dress.-This garment shall be of blue cloth, loose, square sailor collar,

5-38. CM. Cloth, Blue.-Caps shall be made

trimmed with three stripes of white tape on the edge, and shall have a machine-made white star in each lower corner. It shall be open in the neck and finished at the bottom with turn-up hem and draw string. The length shall be such that the overhang will fully cover the top of the trousers. (See Plate 44.)

5-31. Jumper, Blue, Undress.—This garment shall be of the same general cut as Jumper, blue, dress, with a plain collar without trimmings, without cuffs, and with sleeves cut square at cuff opening. (See Plate 49.)

5-32. Jumper, White, Dress.—This garment shall be made of bleached cotton twill, with loose square sailor collar of blue twill, blue twill cuffs, and shall be open in the neck. The length shall extend from 2 to 3 inches below the hip; collar and cuffs to be trimmed like the jumper, blue, dress. (See Plate 46.)

5-33. Jumper, White, Undress.—This garment shall be made of bleached cotton twill, with square plain white sailor collar, open in the neck, without cuffs, and with sleeves cut square at cuff opening; same length as Jumper, white, dress. (See Plate 48.)

5-34. Trousers, Blue.—This garment shall be made of blue cloth, cut sailor fashion, with broadfall and bell-shaped bottoms. (See Plate 45.)

5-35. Trousers, White.—This garment shall be made of bleached cotton twill, with fly front and top pockets. (See Plate 47.)

5-36. Jersey.—This garment shall be made of circular or seamed worsted (all wool) knit, dyed dark blue, with elliptical collar, and cuffs on sleeves. (See Plate 61.)

5-37. Overcoat.—This garment shall be double-breasted, of blue cloth, with circular collar, double row of five black buttons, and shall be easy fitting, reaching about to tips of fingers when arms are naturally at sides; to be worn buttoned to the neck. (See Plate 50.)

5-38. Cap, Cloth, Blue.—Caps shall be made of blue cloth, shall have a band 1% inches high, and the crown shall rake and the sides flare, with cap ribbon marked "U. S. Navy," or "U. S. Naval Reserve." All cap ribbons worn by enlisted personnel, except chief petty officers, shall carry the designation "U. S. Navy" or "U. S. Naval Reserve;" provided, that all the foregoing personnel when on active duty wear the cap ribbons designated "U. S. Navy," and all members of the Naval Reserve when in an inactive status and when performing training duty wear the cap ribbons with the designation "U. S. Naval Reserve." (See Plate 45.)

5-39. Hat, White.—Hats shall be made of bleached cotton twill with rounded crown and full-stitched brim. (See Plate 47.)

5-40. Cap, Watch.—Watch caps shall be made of blue worsted, closely knitted, conical in shape, 10 inches long with 2½-inch hem. (See Plate 58.)

5-41. Raincoat.—The raincoat shall be the same as for Type I for chief petty officers. Possession is optional. (See Plate 51.)

5-42. Neckerchief.—Neckerchief shall be square and made of black silk or rayon. (See Plate 62.)

5-43. Belt.—A plain woven, bleached cotton belt approximately 1¼ inches wide, fitted with a nontarnishable metal slip buckle and end tip, shall be worn with white trousers. (See Plate 63.)

CLOTHING, OUTFITS, AND MARKING

5-50. Outfits on First Enlistment:

(a) Men on first enlistment in the United States Navy are to be supplied gratuitously with an outfit of clothing, bedding, and small stores, not to exceed cost prescribed by the Secretary of the Navy, charged to such appropriation as Congress may specify. This clothing gratuity is not allowed to men after their first enlistment.

(b) The articles issued to the recruit prior to completion of training shall be determined by the commanding officer, depending on the climate, season, and duty to be done; but before his transfer to sea the man leaving the training station shall carry the full outfit prescribed. Thereafter all men shall be required to maintain a full outfit.

5-51. Bags and Hammocks:

(a) Each man on first enlistment and on reenlistment is furnished by the Government one bag and one hammock, complete with clews, lanyards, and lashings, provided they are required to sleep on board and are not otherwise furnished with bedding and lockers. These articles remain the property of the Government.

(b) Hammocks and bags shall be numbered in accordance with the ship or station billet number of the ship to which assigned.

(c) Numbers on hammocks shall be placed on a rectangular patch of No. 10 cotton canvas 4½ inches long and 3½ inches wide, sewed on the center line of the hammock, the upper edge of the patch being 18 inches from one end of the hammock. Numbers will not be placed elsewhere on the hammocks.

(d) Numbers will be put on similar patches on each clothes bag, the patch to be located on the side of the bag, the center of the patch being two-thirds of the distance down the bag from the top.

5-52. Civilian Clothing Allowed on Bad Conduct Discharge:

(a) Civilian clothing not to exceed in cost \$15 per man is allowed to men who are discharged for bad conduct, for undesirability, or for inaptitude.

(b) The distinctive parts of uniforms should be taken away from him before discharge in order that he may not disgrace the uniform by his future conduct.

5-53. Prescribed Outfit for Men:

(a) The minimum outfit of clothing, etc., for an enlisted man at sea shall be as given in the following table. On shore and in the tropics, the outfit of clothing may be reduced at the discretion of the senior officer present.

(b) Nothing in these regulations is to be construed to mean that a man shall not own more clothing than the outfit requires provided he desires to do so, that it is of authorized pattern, and that it is conveniently stowed. Prior to transfer of men from a training station or receiving ship to a cruising vessel, their outfits are to be completed.

(c) In the event of men who have not sufficient pay due them to entitle them to issues of clothing or small stores, the commanding officer may, in cases of need for health or comfort, direct such articles as he considers necessary to be supplied.

5-54. Ownership Markings:

(a) Every article of clothing shall be legibly marked with the owner's name, using black paint in marking white clothes and dungarees, and white paint in marking blue clothes, or with pen and indelible ink, when labels are provided for the purpose. All markings will be made with a %-inch stencil, except where garment labels are provided, the name will be legibly inscribed. Where the word "Right" or 'Left" appears, it shall be taken to mean the man's "right" or "left" when wearing the garment. On towels, bedding, etc., it shall mean the owner's "right" when standing behind the article laid out for inspection. The name on all articles when properly rolled or laid out for bag inspection will appear upright to the inspecting officer and upside down to the man standing behind his bag.

(b) The markings will be located as follows:

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CHAPTER VI

BANDSMEN

LEADER, UNITED STATES NAVY BAND

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

6-1. Uniform, Leader, United States Navy Band.—Except for the full dress uniform, the leader of the United States Navy Band shall wear the uniform of a lieutenant in the Navy with the exception that in lieu of the star on the sleeves on the blue uniforms and on the shoulder marks on white uniforms, he shall wear a musician's lyre of gold color.

6-2. Full Dress Uniform.—The full dress uniform for the leader, United_States Navy Band, shall conform in every respect to specifications given for full dress uniform, bandsman, United States Navy Band, with the following exceptions:

(1) Gold, gilt, or yellow silk frogs.

(2) Substitute for red cuffs two ½-inch gold or yellow silk stripes as prescribed in Uniform Regulations for a lieutenant.

(3) Corps device to be musician's lyre.

(4) Gold or yellow silk stripes on trousers, 1 inch in width.

- (5) Gold collar or yellow silk collar.
- (6) Gold or gilt shoulder knots.
- (7) Gold, gilt, or yellow silk band on cap.

(8) Gold chin strap.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

6-10. Uniform When Leading the United States Navy Band.—The leader of the United States Navy Band shall wear the uniform corresponding to that prescribed for the band.

UNITED STATES NAVY BAND

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

6-20. Full Dress, A.—Full-dress coat, medals, white leather belt, full-dress cap, full-dress trousers, and black shoes.

6-21. Full Dress, B.—Same as Full dress, A, but with white cap.

6-22. Full Dress, C.—Full-dress coat, medals, white leather belt, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

6-23. Dress, Blue, A.—Blue coat, ribbons, blue cap, blue trousers, and black shoes.

6-24. Dress, Blue, B.—Same as Dress, blue, A, but with white cap.

6-25. Dress, Blue, C.—Blue coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

6-26. Dress, White.—White coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

6-30. As prescribed by competent authority.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

6-40. Coat, Full Dress.—This garment shall be single-breasted, of dark blue cloth; shall have three rows of United States Navy eagle gilt buttons, with set of six gold-colored frogs of rayon or silk. It shall be close fitting, medium skirt, reaching twelve to fourteen inches below the waistline and with two Navy eagle buttons at back of skirt. It shall have straight front, buttoned to the neck; standing collar of scarlet cloth, 1¼ to 2 inches in height; cuffs of scarlet cloth, closed with three gilt buttons. (See Plate 41.)

6-41. Trousers, Full Dress.—Full-dress trousers shall be made of dark blue cloth with stripes of scarlet one inch wide, piped with yellow cloth, covering the outside seam of each leg. (See Plate 42.)

6-42. Cap, Full Dress.—Cap shall have stiff frame, standing and flaring throughout its circumference; band of scarlet cloth, 2 inches high, trimmed with yellow soutache ½ inch wide; visor of black patent leather. Cap device shall be musician's lyre, surcharged on anchor, of goldcolored rayon or silk, mounted on dark blue cloth. (See Plate 42.)

6-43. Belt, Full Dress.—This article shall be made of leather, white, with ornamented waist plate. (See Plate 42.)

6-44. Coat, Blue.—This article shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

6-45. Coat, White.—This garment shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

6-46. Overcoat.—This garment shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

6-47. Raincoat.—This garment shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

6-48. Waistcoat, Blue.—This garment shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

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6-49. Trousers, Blue.—These trousers shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

6-50. Trousers, White.—These trousers shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

6-51. Neckwear.—This article shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

FULL DRESS INSIGNIA

6-60. Sleeve Device:

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(a) The sleeve device for full dress uniform of bandsmen, United States Navy Band, shall be a musician's lyre, surcharged on an anchor, embroidered of gold-colored rayon or silk on dark blue 14-ounce cloth, and shall be placed on each arm. (See Plate 43.)

(b) The sleeve device for full dress uniform of the drum major, United States Navy Band, shall consist of the musician's lyre and anchor prescribed for bandsmen over three chevrons pointing downward. Directly below the apex of lower chevron a star of appropriate size shall be mounted, the chevrons and star to be of the same color as the musician's lyre. (See Plate 43.)

(c) The sleeve device for full dress uniform of the second leader, United States Navy Band, shall consist of the musician's lyre, anchor, and chevrons as prescribed for drum major, but without the star. (See Plate 43.)

CHAPTER VII

OFFICERS' COOKS AND STEWARDS

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

7-1. Dress, Blue, A.—Blue coat, ribbons, blue cap, blue trousers, and black shoes.

7-2. Dress, Blue, B.—Same as Dress, Blue, A, but with white cap.

7-3. Dress, Blue, C.—Blue coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

7-4. Dress, White.—White coat, ribbons, white cap, white trousers, and white shoes.

7-5. Full Dress, Blue or White.—Same as Dress, Blue, A, B, or C, or Dress, White, but decorations, medals, and badges shall be worn when Full Dress, Blue or White, is prescribed for officers.

7-6. Undress, Blue, A, B, C, or White.— When any of these uniforms are designated, they shall be the same as *Dress*, *Blue*, *A*, *B*, or *C*, or *Dress*, *White*, but will refer more particularly to clothes that may be old, but which are still in a serviceable condition.

7-7. Working Dress, Blue, A, B, or C, or White.—The same as Undress, Blue, A, B, or C, or White, but refers to old clothes suitable to the occasion.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

7-20.—The uniforms for Officers' Cooks and Stewards for various occasions shall be in accordance with those prescribed for other enlisted men, except that white coats must always be worn when on duty in the wardroom.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

7-30. Coat, Blue.—This garment shall be the same as that prescribed for chief petty officers except that it shall have black anchor buttons in lieu of gilt buttons.

7-31. Coat, White.—This garment shall be double-breasted, sack style, of white cotton duck or twill, with double row of four white anchor buttons (30-line). It shall be easy fitting, reaching to one inch below crotch line, and shall have rolling collar and open front. It shall be worn buttoned, using the four buttons on the right side. (See Plate 34.)

7-32. Overcoat.—The overcoat shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

7-33. Raincoat (Optional).—The raincoat shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

7-34. Cover, Cap, Rain.—This article shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

7-35. Waistcoat, Blue.—This garment shall be the same as that prescribed for chief petty officers except that it shall have a single line of six black rubber anchor buttons in lieu of gilt buttons.

7-36. Trousers, Blue.—These trousers shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

7-37. Trousers, White.—These trousers shall be the same as for chief petty officers.

7-38. Neckwear.—Neckties shall be of black silk, satin, rayon, or wool, not more than 36 inches nor less than 32 inches long, and not more than 1% inches nor less than % inch wide, of uniform width throughout its length, and to be tied in a double bow knot. (See Plate 62.)

7-39. Cap, Combination, Blue or White.— This cap shall be the same as prescribed for chief petty officers except that black buttons shall be substituted for gilt, and the cap device shall consist of two small, thin, parallel gilt bars bearing the letters "U. S. N.," so arranged thereon that the top of the letters shall rest upon the upper bar and the bottom of the letters and periods upon the lower bar. (See Plate 38.)

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OTHER ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

7-50. Shirts, Collars, and Cuffs.—Shirts shall be of neckband type or with collar attached and made of plain white linen or cotton, without stripes, figures, or plaits of any kind, and shall have plain white buttons and plain white cuffs. Only plain white, stiff, turned-down collars may be worn.

7-51. Shoes, High and Low, Black and White.—These articles shall be the same as prescribed for chief petty officers.

7-52. Socks.—Socks shall be of plain material, undecorated. Black socks shall be worn with black shoes, and white socks shall be worn with white shoes.

CHAPTER VIII

SLEEVE AND CUFF MARKINGS-ALL ENLISTED MEN

8-1. General.—The rating, branch, class, specialty, or other qualification, and length of service of an enlisted man are indicated by his sleeve and cuff markings. Men on shore patrol, men on the sick list, and men on ambulance duty or in first-aid parties shall wear prescribed brassards.

8-2. Rating Badges for Chief Petty Officers and Petty Officers:

(a) BLUE AND WHITE RATING BADGES.-Rating badges shall consist of an eagle, chevrons and a specialty mark, and shall have a dark blue background for use on blue uniforms, and a white background for use on white uniforms. The eagle and specialty mark shall be embroidered in white silk for use on blue uniforms, and shall be embroidered in blue silk for use on white uniforms. For pharmacist's mates, the specialty marks for both blue and white rating badges shall be made of scarlet cloth sewed to rating badge with scarlet silk thread. Chevrons shall be made of scarlet cloth applied with scarlet silk thread for use on blue uniforms, and of blue twill applied with blue silk thread for use on white uniforms. (See Plate 65.)

(b) GOLD RATING BADGES.—Chief petty officers and petty officers shall wear on blue clothing a rating badge with eagle and specialty mark embroidered in silver and with gold chevrons if they have not less than twelve years' service and hold three consecutive good conduct awards, or if they have twelve years' continuous service during which time records have been maintained with marks and qualifications equivalent to those necessary for the receipt of good conduct awards. (See Plate 66.)

(c) SILVER RATING BADGES.—Chief petty 26

officers shall wear on blue clothing a rating badge with eagle and specialty mark embroidered in silver with scarlet chevrons if they are not qualified to wear rating badge with gold chevrons. (See Plate 66.)

(d) SIZE OF RATING BADGES.--The badge shall cover a field 3¼ inches wide. The specialty mark shall be in the center of the field, in the angle of the stripes of the chevron. The talons of the eagle shall be 1% inches above the angle of the chevrons and just above the specialty mark. The background of rating badge shall be of a pentagon shape, bounded by two parallel, vertical lines 4 inches apart, crossed at the top by a horizontal line % inch above the wing tips of the eagle, and at the bottom by two converging lines parallel to and % inch below the lower chevron. In cutting out the shape of the white, serge, and whipcord rating badges. ½ inch over the prescribed dimensions on all sides will be allowed for a turnedunder edge to prevent raveling. The turnedunder edge is not required for the blue rating badge of Melton cloth.

(e) CHEVRONS:

(1) Chevrons indicate the rank or class of petty officers. They shall be scarlet cloth sewed on with scarlet silk thread for blue clothing, and of blue twill sewed on with blue silk thread for white clothing. The stripes shall be % inch wide, separated % inch, and sewed flat without padding by an overlock stitch on the edges of the stripes.

(2) Chief petty officers shall wear chevrons of three stripes, with an arch of one %-inch stripe forming the arc of a circle between the ends of the upper stripe of the chevrons, the outside radius of the circle being 1% inches, the specialty mark being in the center of the field under the arch, the eagle resting on the top of the arch.

(3) Petty officers, first class, shall wear three stripes in the chevron; petty officers, second class, two stripes; and petty officers, third class, one stripe.

(f) MANNER OF WEARING .- Chief petty officers and petty officers shall wear the rating badge on the sleeve of coats and jumpers, between the shoulder and elbow and wholly above the elbow. It shall be worn on the right sleeve by all petty officers of the seaman branch and on the left sleeve by all others. Rating badges for chief petty officers shall be applied to the outer side of the sleeve of the coat midway between the front and back sleeve creases. Rating badges for other petty officers shall be applied on the outer side of the sleeve so that the rear edge of the badge shall coincide with the side view centerline of the arm. For chief petty officers, blue rating badges shall be sewed on by hand with a blind stitch, and white rating badges may be sewed on by hand stitching or with two rows of machine stitching % inch apart. For other petty officers, blue and white rating badges shall be sewed on with two rows of plain machine stitching 1/2 inch apart, white thread being used for white badges and black silk thread for blue badges.

8-3. Rating Badges for Apprentice Chief Petty Officers and Petty Officers:

(a) BLUE AND WHITE RATING BADGES.—At training stations apprentice chief petty officers and apprentice petty officers shall wear on the right arm between the shoulder and elbow and wholly above the elbow a rating badge consisting of eagle, chevrons, and specialty mark. For use on white uniforms, rating badges shall have a white background with blue chevrons and shall have eagle and specialty mark embroidered in blue silk; for use on blue uniforms, rating badges shall have a dark blue background with scarlet chevrons and eagle and specialty mark embroidered in white silk. These rating badges may be sewed on by hand or machine.

(b) SIZE.—Badges for apprentice petty officers shall cover a field two inches in width. The talons of the eagle shall be approximately one inch above the angle of the upper chevron and shall rest on the specialty mark which shall be that of the ex-apprentice. The eagle shall be approximately two inches from tip to tip of wings and 1¼ inches from lower end of talons to a line connecting wing tips.

(c) CHEVRONS.—The stripes of the chevrons shall be approximately ¼ inch wide and separated by ¼ inch. Rating badges for apprentice chief petty officers shall consist of chevrons of three stripes, with the upper stripe continuing into and forming the arc of a circle between the ends of the upper stripe of the chevron. The outside radius of the circle shall not exceed 1¼ inches. Apprentice petty officers, first-class, shall wear three stripes in the chevron; apprentice petty officers, second-class, shall wear two stripes; and apprentice petty officers, thirdclass, shall wear one stripe.

8-4. Branch Marks:

(a) A stripe of braid % inch wide shall be worn on the shoulder seam and extend entirely around the sleeve of the jumpers of enlisted men other than petty officers as follows:

(1) By men of the seaman branch on the right sleeve, white braid on blue clothing and blue braid on white clothing.

(2) By men of the artificer branch, engineer force, on the left sleeve, red braid on both blue and white clothing.

8-5. Specialty Marks:

(a) Specialty marks are worn as part of the rating badge of petty officers, and without rating badges in certain other nonpetty officer ratings, as prescribed in article regarding "Distinguishing Marks."

(b) The specialty marks and the ratings by which worn are listed below.

(c) For blue clothing specialty marks are embroidered in white, and for white clothing in blue; except that for Hospital Corpsmen they shall be of scarlet for both blue and white clothing; for aviation pilots, yellow; on blue clothing for petty officers with not less than twelve years' service, holding three consecutive good conduct badges, they shall be embroidered in silver, and on blue clothing for chief petty officers they shall be embroidered in silver.

(d) Specialty marks are made for and worn by the following ratings:

Aerographer. (See Plate 68.) Aviation carpenter's mates. (See Plate 68.) Aviation, general utility. (See Plate 68.) Aviation machinist's mates. (See Plate 67.) Aviation metalsmiths. (See Plate 68.) Aviation ordnancemen. (See Plate 67.) Bakers. (See Plate 68.) Bandmasters. (See Plate 43.) Blacksmiths. (See Plate 68.) Boatswain's mates. (See Plate 67.) Boilermakers. (See Plate 68.) Buglers. (See Plate 67.) Carpenter's mates. (See Plate 67.) Chief commissary stewards. (See Plate 68.) Cooks, officers'. (See Plate 68.) Cooks, ships'. (See Plate 68.) Coppersmiths. (See Plate 68.) Electrician's mates. (See Plate 68.) Enginemen. (See Plate 68.) Fire controlmen. (See Plate 68.) Gunner's mates. (See Plate 67.) Hospital apprentices. (See Pharmacist's Mates.) Machinist's mates. 8-6. Cuff Markings.—Cuff markings for enlisted men are shown by stripes $\frac{1}{16}$ inch wide of white tape on the cuffs of the sleeves of the dress jumpers. Petty officers of the first, second, and third class wear three stripes. Nonpetty officers of the first class wear three stripes; of the second class, two stripes; and of the third class, one stripe. The stripes shall be laid around the cuff, midway between the top and bottom of the cuff, spaced $\frac{1}{16}$ inch apart. Stripe ends of cuffs trimmed with two or three stripes shall be joined by tape.

8-7. Distinguishing Marks:

(a) Distinguishing marks are prescribed as a sleeve marking for men who have met certain qualifications additional to those required for their rating, or who are members of a crew that has attained a specified merit in certain prescribed competitions.

(b) Distinguishing marks shall be embroidered in silk, in white on blue for blue clothing, and in blue on white for white clothing.

(c) The following marks are prescribed:

Seaman gunner. (See Plate 69.)

Gun captain. (See Plate 69.)

Gun director pointer. (See Gun pointer, firstclass, Plate 69.)

Gun pointer. (See Plate 70.)

Navy E. (See Plate 69.)

Expert rifleman. (See Plate 69.)

Expert pistol shot. (See Plate 69.)

Rifle sharpshooter. (See Plate 69.)

Ex-apprentice. (See Plate 69.)

Gun range finder operator. (See Plate 68.) Master diver. (See Plate 70.)

Diver (first class). (See Plate 70.)

Master horizontal bomber. (See Plate 69.) Bombsight mechanic. (See Plate 70.)

(d) The following are the qualifications entitling men to wear distinguishing marks:

(1) SEAMAN GUNNER.—Men who have quali-

fied as seaman gunners shall wear mark of bursting shell midway between the shoulder and elbow of the right sleeve, or one inch below the rating badge. (See Plate 69.)

(2) GUN CAPTAIN.—A man regularly detailed by the commanding officer of a vessel as a gun captain, except of a secondary battery gun (less than four-inch caliber), shall wear the distinguishing mark (a gun) with axis horizontal, muzzle pointing forward, midway between the shoulder and elbow of the left sleeve for men of the seaman branch, and on the right sleeve for others. (See Plate 69.)

(3) GUN-POINTER.—Men who have qualified as gun director pointers or gun pointers, first or second class, shall wear the gun pointer's mark (cross wires of a gun sight) midway between the shoulder and elbow of the left arm for men of the seaman branch and right arm for others. Gun director pointers, first class, and gun pointers, first class, shall wear the star 1 inch above the mark, one ray pointing up. (See Plates 69-70.)

(4) GUN RANGE-FINDER OPERATOR.—Men who have qualified as gun range-finder operators shall wear the distinguishing mark (range finder) midway between the shoulder and elbow on the left arm for men of the seaman branch and on the right arm for others. (See Plate 68.) (5) NAVY "E."

(b) INAVY E.

(a) The Navy "E," a block letter % inch high, % inch wide, embroidered in silk in lines % inch thick, is issued in three colors: White, blue, and red.

(b) It is to be worn by members of turret, gun, mine, and torpedo crews; by members of ship and fire-control parties that have made exceptionally high scores in special forms of gunnery exercises as designated by the Chief of Naval Operations; by men of the engineer's force recommended to the Chief of Naval Operations by the commanding officers of vessels awarded the Navy "E" for excellence in engineering, and by men of the communications force recommended to the Chief of Naval Operations by commanding officers of vessels awarded the

Navy "C" for excellence in communications. The white and the blue "E" shall be worn as gunnery awards, for the award of the white Navy "E" to a vessel for excellence in engineering, and for the award of the white Navy "C" to a vessel for excellence in communications. The red "E" shall be worn for the award of the red Navy "E" to a vessel for excellence in engineering, or for the award of the red Navy "C" to a vessel for excellence in communications. In the case of gunnery award, the "E" shall be worn in accordance with the Orders for Gunnery Exercises. In the case of awards for engineering and communications, the "E" shall be worn for 1 year from the time of notification of its award. Commanding officers shall take measures to insure that men not entitled to wear the Navy "E" do not wear it.

(c) It shall be worn on the right sleeve by men of the seaman branch and on the left by others, midway between the shoulder and elbow, or 1 inch below the rating badge or seaman gunner's mark if worn.

(d) Any personnel mentioned in paragraph (b) who have received consecutive awards for efficiency in engineering, gunnery, or communications are authorized to wear a horizontal bar under the Navy "E" for each successive award.

(e) The bar shall be of the same distinctive color as the prescribed "E" to be worn with the uniform and shall conform to the following: Shall be embroidered in lines ½ inch in length and ½ inch in width, spaced ½ inch below the "E"; subsequent bars shall be spaced ½ inch apart. (See Plate 69.)

(6) EXPERT RIFLEMAN AND EXPERT PISTOL SHOT.—Enlisted men of the Navy entitled to extra compensation as expert riflemen and/or expert pistol shots will wear on the right sleeve about halfway between the wrist and elbow a distinguishing mark as follows: A target consisting of a one-inch square enclosing two concentric rings ¾-inch and ½-inch diameters, with a ¾-inch bull's eye in the center, embroidered in narrow lines. Only one mark will be worn for either or both qualifications. (See Plate 69.)

(7) RIFLE SHARPSHOOTER.—A rifle sharpshooter shall wear the same mark as the expert rifleman except that the inner ¼-inch 1 ing shall be omitted. (See Plate 69.)

(8) EX-APPRENTICE.—Enlisted men who have passed through the rating of apprentice in the Navy shall wear a mark consisting of a "figure of eight" knot 2 inches long. Chief petty officers shall wear it on the coat sleeve under the rating badge midway between the elbow and the wrist; other ratings shall wear it on the breast of the jumpers just below the loop for holding the neckerchief. It shall not be worn by apprentice seamen or those who have passed through that rate. (See Plate 69.)

(9) SIGNALMAN.—Seamen when qualified as signalmen shall wear the distinguishing mark for signalmen on the right sleeve about halfway between the wrist and elbow. (See Plate 68.)

(10) RADIOMAN.—Seamen when qualified as radiomen shall wear the distinguishing mark of a radioman on the left sleeve about halfway between the wrist and elbow. (See Plate 68.)

(11) NONRATED MEN.—Nonrated men who have successfully completed the full course of instruction at a regularly established service school on shore, and other nonrated men who have successfully passed the required examinations for advancement to petty officer, third class, in the following specialties, shall wear midway between the elbow and wrist on right or left arm as prescribed for badge of the rating, the distinguishing marks as indicated:

Graduates of aviation general utility courses shall wear specialty mark consisting of aviation wings without other device between the wings. (See Plate 68.)

(12) OFFICERS' STEWARDS AND COOKS.—In lieu of rating badge, officers' stewards and officers' cooks shall wear the specialty mark with three, two, or one horizontal stripes below it to denote first, second, and third class, respectively. (See Plate 70.)

(13) MASTER DIVER.—Men qualified as master divers shall wear the mark, a diving helmet and breast plate with the letter "M" on breast plate, midway between the shoulder and elbow of the left sleeve for men of the seaman branch, and on the right sleeve for others. (See Plate 70.)

(14) DIVERS (FIRST CLASS).—Men qualified as divers first class shall wear the mark, a diving helmet and breastplate, midway between the shoulder and elbow of the left sleeve for men of the seaman branch, and on the right sleeve for others. (See Plate 70.)

(15) MASTER HORIZONTAL BOMBER.—Men who have qualified as master horizontal bombers shall wear the master horizontal bomber's mark (cross wires of a gun sight with a falling bomb in the center; white star 1 inch above the circle, one ray pointing up), midway between the shoulder and the elbow on the left sleeve for men of the seaman branch, and on the right sleeve for others. (See Plate 69.)

(16) BOMB SIGHT MECHANIC.—Men who have qualified for designation as a bomb-sight mechanic shall wear the bomb-sight mechanic's mark (a winged "B", ½ inch high, ½ inch wide), midway between the shoulder and elbow, or one inch below the rating badge, on the left sleeve for men of the seaman branch, and on the right for others. (See Plate 70.)

8-8. Service Stripes:

(a) Service stripes shall be worn by all re-

enlisted men on the left sleeve on blue and white coats and jumpers, and shall be made of scarlet cloth 7 inches long on blue clothes, and of blue twill on white clothes, the side edges of twill being turned under until they meet on the underside, each stripe showing a width of %inch; when more than one stripe is worn, they shall be % inch apart. These stripes shall be stitched on the sleeve diagonally across the outside of the forearm at an angle of 45°, with thread the color of the stripe. On coats the lower end of the first stripe shall be not less than 2 inches from the cuff end of the sleeve; on the jumpers the lower end of the first stripe shall be 4 inches above the upper edge of the cuff.

(b) Gold lace service stripes shall be worn as follows:

(1) By enlisted men holding three consecutive good conduct awards or with twelve years' *continuous* service during which time records have been maintained with marks and qualifications equivalent to those necessary for the receipt of good conduct awards, provided that in no case shall a man with less than twelve years' service be entitled to wear the gold lace stripes.

(2) By enlisted men of the Naval Reserve who perform *continuous* active duty, maintain the required marks, and meet the forcegoing qualifications.

(c) There shall be one service stripe for each four years of active service in the Navy or the Naval Reserve. (See Plates 65-66.)

8-9 Geneva-Cross Brassard.—The Geneva-Cross brassard shall consist of a band of white cotton bearing a red Geneva Cross painted or stitched on the band, to be fastened around the upper part of the right arm over the outer

garment. The band shall be four inches wide, the cross three inches in height and width, and the arms of the cross one inch wide. It shall be worn by ambulance and first-aid parties.

8-10. Sick-List Badge.—A sick-list badge consisting of an arm band of white cotton 2 inches wide shall be issued by the medical officer to cach enlisted man on the sick list, to be worn on the right arm above the elbow. The badge shall be distinctly marked in black, block figures with a number, to be entered upon the sick list furnished for use of the officer of the deck. When a man's name is removed from the sick list, he shall return his badge neatly washed to the dispensary.

8-11. Shore Patrol Brassard:

(a) The shore patrol brassard shall consist of a band of Navy standard blue cloth surcharged with gold block letters "S P" stitched on the band. It shall be worn by the members of the shore patrol and beach guard while on duty, over the outer garment, on the opposite arm from the rating badge, halfway between the shoulder and elbow.

(b) The band shall be eleven inches long over all and four inches wide, and shall be secured to the arm by black tie-ties. The four corners shall be bevelled at 45° angles to a depth of 1½ inches.

(c) The letters shall be cut out of yellow gold cloth and shall be stitched with thread to match. Letters shall be 3 inches in height and 2½ inches in width, and shall be standard half-block letters in design. The distance between letters shall be % of an inch. Letters shall be centrally dispersed on the band. (See Plate 49.)

CHAPTER IX

AVIATION UNIFORMS

9-1. General.—Officers and enlisted men of the aeronautical organization are required to possess all those articles of uniform distinguishing their respective rank or rating as otherwise prescribed in these regulations for officers and men. In addition, certain special uniforms and articles of uniform are prescribed, as hereinafter indicated.

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

9-10. Winter Working Uniform (for Commissioned and Warrant Officers).—Forestry green coat, trousers, and cap, khaki shirt, black tie, plain brown leather shoes, appropriate aviation insignia, and light tan overcoat.

9–11. Winter Working Uniform (for Chief Petty Officers Designated as Naval Aviation Pilots).—Sixteen-ounce forestry green Kersey coat, trousers, and cap, khaki shirt, black tie, plain brown leather shoes, appropriate aviation insignia.

9-12. Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant, and Chief Petty Officers).-Khaki cotton coat, trousers, and cap, khaki cotton shirt, black tie, plain brown leather shoes, shoulder marks (for commissioned and warrant officers), and appropriate aviation insignia.

9-13. Cap, Garrison (for Commissioned and Warrant Naval Aviators and Chief Petty Officers Designated as Naval Aviation Pilots).— In lieu of officers' and chief petty officers' regulation caps, a garrison cap may be worn with winter and summer working uniforms. The garrison cap when worn with these uniforms shall be made of same material as coat and trousers of uniform. Miniature aviation insignia shall be worn on left side of this cap two inches from the front.

9-14. Special Aeronautical Winter Clothing (Bureau of Aeronautics Material) for Personnel Handling Aircraft in Cold Climates (for All Enlisted Personnel).—Rubberized jackets with hood attached, trousers, and arctics.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

9-20. Summer and Winter Working Uniforms:

• (a) Working uniform may be worn when prescribed by the senior officer present.

(b) In warm climates necessitating the removal of the coats of the aviation working uniforms, the insignia of rank, a metal pin-on device, shall be worn by all commissioned and warrant officers on the collar of the shirt. The metal pin-on device shall be placed on each side of the shirt collar, one inch from the front edge, the collar being turned down. Metal pin-on devices shall be the same as those prescribed for use with the khaki uniform for officers.

9-21. Special Aeronautical Winter Clothing.—This clothing may be worn when prescribed by the senior officer present.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

9-30. Coat, Winter Working (Officers).— This garment shall be single-breasted with roll collar and notched lapels, of gabardine, elastique, serge, or whipcord, which shall be a forestry green color, with three bronze front buttons, with four outside pockets, the lower two to be
of the bellows style, to have a bellows plait in back, to have a 2-inch belt of same material as coat sewed down all around, and coat to reach about 1 inch below the crotch line. (See Plate 8.)

9-31. Coat, Winter Working (for Chief Petty Officers Designated as Naval Aviation Pilots).— This garment shall be single-breasted, with roll collar and notched lapels, of 16-ounce Kersey, with three bronze front buttons, with four outside pockets, the lower two to be of the bellows style, to have a bellows plait in back, to have a 2-inch belt of same material as coat sewed down all around, and coat to reach about 1 inch below the crotch line. (See Plate 8.)

9-32. Coat, Summer Working (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).—This garment shall be single-breasted, with roll collar and notched lapels, of cotton khaki material, with three gilt front buttons (bottom button to be in the middle of the belt), four outside pockets, the lower two to be of bellows style, to have a 2-inch belt of same material as coat, sewed down all around, and coat to reach about 1 inch below the crotch line. It shall have two loops on each shoulder to secure shoulder marks. (See Plate 9.)

9-33. Overcoat, Winter Working Uniform for Officers.—The use of a bellows plait in side seams of back is optional. This garment shall be double-breasted, made of a light tan, waterrepellent garbardine, closed with four, light brown, flat buttons; to reach one-fourth the distance from kneecap to ground; to be loose cut and drawn in at the waist by an all-around belt of same material as coat, which fastens in the front with a brown, leather-covered, tongueless buckle of nonmagnetic material. It shall have regular shoulders, convertible collar, storm flap on right breast, two slightly oblique welted pockets slanting to the rear and opening through. It shall have vent at center of the back and tabs on cuffs and straps on shoulders. (See Plate 11.)

9-34. Trousers, Winter Working (Officers).— These trousers shall be of conventional cut, made of forestry green gabardine, elastique, serge, or whipcord, with usual trouser pockets. Trousers shall match coat in fabric and color. (See Plate 17.)

9-35. Trousers, Winter Working (for Chief Petty Officers Designated as Naval Aviation Pilots).—These trousers shall be of conventional cut, made of 16-ounce forestry green kersey, with usual trouser pockets. Trousers shall match coat in fabric and color. (See Plate 17.)

9-36. Trousers, Summer Working (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).—These trousers shall be of conventional cut, made of cotton khaki, with usual trouser pockets. Trousers shall match coat in fabric and color. (See Plate 17.)

9-37. Cap—Winter and Summer Working Uniform.—This article shall be of the design prescribed for commissioned, warrant, and chief petty officers, except that the cloth top shall be of the same material as the uniform.

9-38. Cap, Garrison.—This cap shall be made of material of the same color and texture as that in the coat and trousers of uniform and shall consist of a top curving from front to rear (3 inches high in front, 4¼ inches high in center, and 4 inches high in rear), without points at either end, fitted with a sweatband, and having aprons turned up on both sides and with the left side overlapping the right side.

9-39. Shirt—Winter and Summer Working Uniform.—This garment shall be khaki, cotton or worsted, with attached collar.

9-40. Tie—Winter and Summer Working Uniform.—The tie shall be plain black, four-inhand, made of silk, rayon, or wool.

9-41. Shoes—Winter and Summer Working Uniform.—Shoes shall be made of plain brown leather and shall be of plain design.

9-42. Special Aeronautical Winter Clothing:

(a) JACKETS.—This garment shall be made of khaki-colored, double-texture fabric, with middle layer of rubber compound. It shall be a slip-over, raglan sleeve type with flannellined hood and with bottom of sleeves fitted with snap fasteners.

(b) TROUSERS.—These trousers shall be of the same material as the jacket, without front opening, with draw-string at waist and with bottom of legs fitted with snap fasteners.

(c) ARCTICS.—The arctics shall be made of black cashmerette, approximately fifteen inches high, with six adjustable buckles, with zig-zag design in rubber sole.

INSIGNIA

OFFICERS

9-50. Sleeve Markings (Stripes)—Winter Working Uniform.—Sleeve stripes shall encircle the sleeve and be of black mohair braid. Stripes shall be of the same size and spacing prescribed for use on blue service uniforms. (See Plate 8.)

9-52. Shoulder Marks.—Shoulder marks as prescribed for use with white service uniforms shall be worn with aviation summer working uniforms.

9-53. Aviation Insignia:

(a) A gold-embroidered or bronze gold-plated metal pin, winged, foul anchor surcharged with a shield ½ inch in height, 2% inches from tip to tip of wings; length of foul anchor % inch. The embroidered device shall be on a black background of full-woolen, smooth finished material, such as broadcloth. The background shall be visible as a border which follows the faired outline of the device with an average width of % inch. (See Plate 64.)

(b) To be worn on the left breast of officers who have qualified as naval aviators.

(c) Officers holding designation as naval aviation observers shall wear an insignia the same as for a naval aviator as to gold wings, but the central device shall be an "O" circumscribing an erect plain anchor, both in silver; outer diameter of "O" shall be $\frac{1}{2}$ inch, inner diameter $\frac{1}{6}$ inch. Height of anchor shall be $\frac{1}{2}$ inch. The "O" and the anchor to be in bold relief; the center of "O" being filled with gold. (See Plate 64.)

(d) When worn with ribbons or medals, the aviation insignia shall be uppermost.

(e) The embroidered device shall be worn by officers and chief petty officers on blue coats (except the evening dress) and on the coats of the winter working dress.

(f) The pin device shall be worn by officers and chief petty officers on white coats and on coats of the summer working uniform.

(g) A miniature aviation insignia (pin-on type), scale one-half of that of original, shall be worn when miniature medals are prescribed, and shall also be worn on the left side of garrison cap in center of apron and two inches from front edge.

ENLISTED MEN

9-60. Cuff and Sleeve Markings.—Enlisted men in the aviation branch shall wear cuff and sleeve markings prescribed for all enlisted men.

9-61. Aviation Insignia:

(a) The insignia is the same as that for officers.

(b) To be worn by enlisted men who have qualified as naval aviation pilots in accordance with Navy requirements as set forth from time to time in the Bureau of Navigation Manual. (c) Enlisted men holding certificate of qualification as balloon pilots shall wear the same insignia specified in paragraph (a), but with the right wing removed.

(d) The pin-on device shall be worn by enlisted men other than chief petty officers on the jumper of blue dress and white dress uniforms, but on no others.

(e) The miniature aviation insignia (pin-on type) shall be worn on garrison cap by chief petty officers designated as naval aviation pilots in same manner as prescribed for officers.

9-62. Rigid Airship Insignia:

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(a) This insignia shall be an embroidered silk dirigible, the fore and aft length of the device to be 2% inches, the other dimensions in proportion. The insignia shall be embroidered silk in white on blue for blue cloth, and in blue on white for white cloth.

(b) Enlisted men qualified for rigid airship duty in accordance with the Bureau of Navigation Manual, and whose certification of qualification appears on their service records, shall be entitled to wear the above insignia. The

rigid airship insignia shall be worn at all times by enlisted men qualified to wear it while attached to rigid airships or rigid airship bases ashore or afloat, except that enlisted men transferred to other duty shall be permitted to wear the insignia for 6 months after detachment from rigid airship duty or until they have been permanently assigned to other naval duties.

(c) This insignia shall be worn by enlisted men on the outside of the right sleeve, midway between the wrist and elbow. (See Plate 70.)

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CHAPTER X

SUBMARINE UNIFORMS

10-1. Officers on Submarines.—Officers while attached to or serving on submarines shall not be required to have on board or to wear the uniforms designated as full dress, dress, undress, evening dress, or dinner dress, but shall have such uniforms on submarine tenders, or shore stations, in readiness for wearing when required.

10-2. Enlisted Men While Serving on Submarines—Protective Clothing.—Enlisted personnel while serving on submarines may wear protective clothing provided by the Bureau of Ships, consisting of woolen coats and trousers and outer garments of hats, coats, and trousers made of waterproofed cotton cloth. These garments shall be worn when prescribed by the senior officer present. (See Plates 55, 56, 57, 58.)

INSIGNIA

OFFICERS

10-20. Submarine Insignia:

(a) This insignia shall be a bronze goldplated metal pin, showing bow view of a submarine proceeding on the surface with bow rudders rigged for diving, flanked by dolphins in horizontal position with their heads resting on upper edge of rudders; the device to be 2% inches long.

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(b) Officers who have qualified in submarines or who have qualified to command submarines in accordance with the requirements of the Bureau of Navigation Manual, shall be entitled to wear submarine insignia. The insignia shall be worn with dolphins horizontal on the left breast, and when worn with ribbons or medals shall be located just below the center of the ribbons or medals.

(c) A miniature submarine insignia (pin type), scale one-half that of the original, shall be worn when miniature medals are prescribed. (See Plate 64.)

ENLISTED MEN

10-30. Submarine Insignia:

(a) The insignia is the same as that for officers, except it shall be embroidered in silk.

(b) Enlisted men who have qualified for submarine duty and whose certification of qualification appears on their service records shall be entitled to wear the above insignia, embroidered in silk, in white on blue clothing, and in blue on white clothing. The submarine insignia shall be worn at all times by enlisted men qualified to wear it. The insignia shall be worn with dolphins horizontal on the outside of the right sleeve, midway between the wrist and elbow. (See Plate 70.)

CHAPTER XI

WORKING UNIFORMS

11-1. General.—A working uniform is authorized for use on all ships and shore stations when prescribed by the senior officer present.

11-2. Dungarees:

(a) Dungarees of the prescribed patterns may be worn by officers and enlisted men when engaged in work which by reason of its nature would soil their other uniforms. This pertains more particularly to those in the engineers force, to artisans and mechanicians, to the deck force when scaling or painting the ship or handling stores, to the crews of repair, supply, and fuel ships during working hours or when handling stores or fuel, to the crews of submarines when underway or during working hours in port, and to the aviation force at shore stations when overhauling or repairing aircraft or when engaged in their maintenance or upkeep.

(b) In no case should this be interpreted to apply to those off duty, to officers or men when not engaged in work which might soil their other uniforms, nor as a regular uniform of the day. It should be prescribed only for those on watch, on duty, or while so engaged in the above-mentioned classes of work, and at all other times everyone must conform to the regular uniform of the day. Dungarees shall be discarded for the uniform of the day after working hours or when dungarees are no longer necessary. In no case in entering or leaving port should dungarees be allowed on the upper decks, nor be worn by any others than those on watch in the engineer's department; nor in port at any time other than by those who are actually required to do so; nor by anyone at shore stations except at their places of work, or in going to and from such places from their quarters. No other than regular uniform dungarees will be allowed.

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

11-10. Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant and Chief Petty Officers).—Khaki cotton coat (with shoulder marks for commissioned and warrant officers), trousers, and cap, khaki cotton shirt, black tie, black shoes. (Plain brown shoes are optional for officers.)

11-11. Dungarees (for all Officers and Men).—Blue denim jumper and trousers, cap, black shoes. When blue denim jumper is not worn, a blue chambray shirt shall be worn.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE VARIOUS UNIFORMS SHALL BE WORN

11–20. Working Uniforms:

(a) Working uniform may be worn when prescribed by the senior officer present.

(b) In warm climates necessitating the removal of the coats of the working uniforms, the insignia of rank, a metal pin-on device, shall be worn by all commissioned and warrant officers on the collar of the shirt. The metal pin-on device shall be placed on each side of the shirt collar, one inch from the front edge, the collar being turned down.

(1) Officers of the line shall wear on each collar tip a designation of rank as follows:

Admiral	Four silver stars. ¹
Vice admiral	Three silver stars. ¹
Rear admiral	Two silver stars. ¹

Commander	Silver oak leaf.
Lieutenant commander	Gold oak leaf.

(2) Officers of the staff corps shall wear on the right collar tip a metal pin-on device designating rank (the same as for line officers); on the left collar tip, a gold metal pin-on device to indicate corps. The pin-on device to indicate corps shall be of the same design and approximately five-eighths of the size of the corps device prescribed for use on the sleeve of the blue service uniform, and so far as practicable they shall be smooth and plain and shall not simulate embroidery.

(3) Chief warrant officers shall wear on both collar tips of the khaki shirt silver corps devices of the same design and approximately five-eighths of the size of the corps device prescribed for use on the sleeve of their blue service uniforms.

(4) Warrant officers shall wear on both collar tips of the khaki shirt gold corps devices of the same design and approximately five-eighths of the size of the corps device prescribed for use on the sleeve of their blue service uniforms. (See Plates 73-74.)

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

11-30. Coat, Working Uniform (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).-This garment shall be single-breasted with roll collar and notched lapels, of khaki cotton material, with three gilt front buttons (bottom button to be in the middle of the belt), four outside pockets, the lower two to be of bellows style, to have a 2-inch belt of same material as coat, sewed down all around, and coat to reach about one inch below the crotch line. For commissioned and warrant officers, there shall be two loops of khaki material on shoulder, properly spaced, to attach shoulder marks, which shall be worn with this uniform. The use of a bellows plait in side beams of back is optional. (See Plates 9-35.)

11-31. Trousers, Working Uniform (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).—These trousers shall be of conventional cut, made of cotton khaki, with usual trouser pockets. Trousers shall match coat in fabric and color. (See Plate 17.)

11-32. Cap—Working Uniform (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).—This article shall be of the design prescribed for commissioned, warrant, and chief petty officers, except that the cloth top shall be of the same material as the uniform.

11-33. Shirt—Working Uniform (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).—This garment shall be cotton khaki with attached collar.

11-34. Tie-Working Uniform (for All Officers and Chief Petty Officers).—The tie shall be plain black, four-in-hand, made of silk, rayon, or wool.

11-35. Dungaree Jumper.—This garment shall be made of blue denim, of conventional cut, with shawl collar, and loose fitting to permit free use of arms; skirt to extend 3 to 5 inches below hips with two overlaid pockets, one on each side; opened in front and closed with five metal buttons, detachable, of Navy standard type. (See Plate 39.)

11-36. Shirt, Blue Chambray.—Blue chambray shirts with soft collars may be worn in lieu of dungaree jumper. (See Plate 40.)

11-37. Dungaree Trousers.—These trousers shall be made of the same material as jumper, with fly front, buttoned with black buttons, and fitted to wear with black belt, two top pockets, and one patch pocket on right hip. (See Plate 40.)

11-38. Belt.—A plain black web belt approximately 1¼ inches wide, fitted with a nontarnishable buckle, shall be worn with dungaree trousers. (See Plate 63.)

11-39. Shoes.—Black shoes shall be worn with all working uniforms, except that plain brown shoes are optional for officers wearing khaki.

11-40.—Plain black socks shall be worn with all working uniforms.

12-43. Socks, White,—The socks shall be of the same as those authorized for officers. 12-34. Shoes.—Plain black or white low shoes shall be worn with tropical uniform. Plain brown shoes may be worn by officers with the black shoes.

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12-1. General.—The purpose of the tropical uniform is to authorize for all officers and men in tropical or semitropical climates an appropriate uniform, the possession of which is optional. Whenever the tropical uniform is worn the helmet or cap cover, shirt, and shorts shall all be of the same color, white or khaki.

12-2. Indication of Rank:

(a) The insignia of rank, metal pin-on devices, shall be worn by all commissioned and warrant officers on the collar of the shirt. These devices shall be identical with those prescribed for wear on the working uniform shirt. (See Article 11-20.)

(b) There is no special indication of rating, branch class, specialty, or other qualification, for enlisted men prescribed for wear on the tropical uniform.

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

12-10. All Officers.—Cap, shirt, shorts, white socks, and shoes (white, black, or brown).

12-11. Chief Petty Officers and Officers' Cooks and Stewards.—Cap, shirt, shorts, white socks, and shoes (white or black).

12-12. Other Enlisted Men.—White hat, undershirt, shorts, white socks, and black shoes.

12-13. All Naval Personnel on Shore Stations.—Helmet may be worn in lieu of white cap or white hat by all naval personnel on shore stations only.

OCCASONS ON WHICH THE TROPICAL UNIFORM MAY BE WORN

12-20. On Board Ships and at Naval Shore Establishments.—The tropical uniform may be worn only on board ship and on naval shore establishments in tropical or semitropical climates when authorized by the senior officer present.

12-21. Exceptions:

(a) The white helmet may be worn with white dress or undress uniforms on liberty when authorized by the senior officer present.
(b) Officers' cooks and stewards and mess attendants shall not wear the tropical uniform while on duty in the wardroom.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

officers

12-30. Cap.—The cap shall be of the design prescribed for officers except the cover shall be of the same color as the shorts.

12-31. Shirt.—The shirt shall be of cotton or linen with short sleeves with an open roll collar forming a "V" neck, and of the same color as the shorts. (See Plate 10.)

12-32. Shorts, White or Khaki.—Shorts shall be made of plain white or khaki cotton material, cut to reach approximately two-thirds the distance from crotch to knee cap and with a sufficient circumference at bottom of leg to prevent binding when the wearer is in a stooping position. This garment shall be supported by two adjustable straps across front waistband, made from the same material as the shorts. (See Plate 10.)

12-33. Socks, White.—Socks shall be of plain white material. Anklet or long socks may be worn. When long socks are worn they shall be rolled down to top of shoes.

12-34. Shoes.—Plain black or white low shoes shall be worn with tropical uniform. Plain brown shoes may be worn by officers with khaki shorts.

12-35. Helmet, White or Khaki.—The helmet shall be of conventional style with chin strap and ventilating eyelet holes on each side. (See Plate 10.)

CHIEF PETTY OFFICERS' AND OFFICERS' COOKS AND STEWARDS

12-40. Cap.—The cap shall be of the design prescribed for chief petty officers except the cover shall be of the same color as the shorts. The cap for officers' cooks and stewards shall be identical with that prescribed for chief petty officers except that the cap shall be fitted with black buttons and a "U.S.N." cap device shall be worn in lieu of an anchor.

12-41. Shirt.—The shirt shall be of the same as that authorized for officers.

12-42. Shorts, White or Khaki.—The shorts shall be the same as those authorized for officers.

12-43. Socks, White.—The socks shall be of the same as those authorized for officers.

12-44. Shoes.—Plain white or black low shoes shall be worn with tropical uniform.

12-45. Helmet, White or Khaki.—The helmet shall be the same as that authorized for officers.

OTHER ENLISTED MEN

12-50. Hat, White.—This article shall be the white hat prescribed for enlisted men.

12-51. Undershirt.—This article shall be the plain cotton undershirt prescribed for enlisted men.

12-52. Shorts.—The shorts shall be the same as those authorized for officers.

12-53. Socks, White.—The socks shall be the same as those authorized for officers.

12-54. Shoes.—The shoes shall be plain black.

12-55. Helmet, White or Khaki.—The helmet shall be the same as that authorized for officers.

CHAPTER XIII

SPECIAL WINTER CLOTHING

13-1. General.—The purpose of special winter clothing is to provide protection for enlisted personnel assigned to duty in which they are required to undergo continuous exposure to severely cold weather. This clothing is the property of the Government and is supplied in quantities considered necessary on ships and stations, as prescribed by the Bureau of Ships.

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

13-10. Special Winter Clothing.—Jacket, trousers, helmet, mask, goggles, gloves, and arctics.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH SPECIAL WINTER CLOTHING MAY BE WORN

13-20. On Board Ship.—Special winter clothing may be worn by men whose duties require them to be exposed to the elements, whenever prescribed by the commanding officer.

13-21. Restrictions.—Special winter clothing shall NOT be worn on liberty or leave, except in expeditionary forces when prescribed by the senior officer present.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

13-30. Jackets.—Jackets shall be made from dark blue, water-repellent jungle cloth, fully lined with navy standard dark blue flannel, and closed in the front with a concealed slide fastener, and having a pocket on each side (See Plate 59.)

13-31. Trousers.—Trousers shall be made of and lined with the same materials as the jacket. They shall be of the overall type with bibs in front and back and supported with adjustable suspenders made from webbing. Tie-ties shall be provided for securing the trousers around the ankle. (See Plate 60.)

13-32. Helmet.—The helmet shall be made of and fully lined with the same materials as the jacket. It shall have shield in back of neck and adjustable chin strap and two snap loops to hold goggles in place. (See Plate 60.)

13-33. Mask, Face.—The mask shall be made from blue and white wool felt $\frac{1}{2}$ inch thick. It shall have openings for eyes, nose, and mouth, with a flap to protect mouth opening, and a patch covering nose opening, and shall be held in place by tape around the back and across the top of the head. (See Plate 58.)

13-34. Goggles.—Goggles shall be of the aviation type and shall be lined, padded, and ventilated. (See Plate 58.)

13-35. Gloves.—The gloves shall be made of leather and shall be of the one-finger type, unlined, with a cuff of elastic material. (See Plate 60.)

13-36. Arctics.—Arctics shall be black and shall be closed with buckles or slide fasteners. (See Plate 60.)

CHAPTER XIV

FOUL WEATHER CLOTHING

14-1. General.—The purpose of foul-weather clothing is to provide protection for enlisted personnel assigned to duty in which they are exposed to rain or spray. This clothing is the property of the government and is supplied in quantities considered necessary in ships, as prescribed by the Bureau of Ships.

14-2. Footwear.—Foul weather footwear is not furnished by the government. Rubber boots, arctics, and overshoes, provided by personnel for their own use, may be worn with foul-weather clothing except in small boats.

DESIGNATION OF UNIFORMS

14-10. Chief Petty Officers and Leading Petty Officers.—Sou'wester and long coat.

14-11. Other Enlisted Men.—Sou'wester, short coat, and trousers.

OCCASIONS ON WHICH FOUL WEATHER CLOTHING MAY BE WORN

14-20. On Board Ship.—Foul-weather cloth ing issued to ships as equipment may be worn in foul weather, at sea or in port, getting underway and coming to anchor, and also by boats crews unless specifically ordered not to be worn.

14-21. Restrictions.—Rubber boots shall not 42

be worn by boat crews or by personnel embarked in boats.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

14-30. Sou'wester.—The sou'wester shall be made of waterproof material with brim all around, and the brim in rear shall be of sufficient width to shed water away from coat collar. (See Plate 54.)

14-31. Long Coat.—This garment shall be made of waterproof material, and shall be of such length to extend to a point approximately halfway between the knee and the ankle. It shall have a pocket with flap on each side and shall be closed in front with buckle or snap fasteners and so constructed as to prevent water reaching inside of coat. Collar shall be so constructed that it may be fastened around neck or worn turned down. (See Plate 53.)

14-32. Short Coat.—This garment shall be similar to the long coat except there shall be no pockets and it shall be of such length to reach approximately to the crotch line. (See Plate 52.)

14-33. Trousers.—Trousers shall be made of same material as the coat and shall be of the overall type. There shall be two front pockets and crossed suspender straps which shall fasten to upper corners of front bib. (See Plate 54.) UNIPORAL REGULATIONS, UNITED STATES NAVE, 1941

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DECORATIONS, MEDALS, BADGES, AND RIBBONS

15-1. General.—Decorations, medals, badges, and ribbons shall be worn with the uniform as prescribed under the heading of "Designation of uniform." The laws governing the award of the Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service Medal, and Navy Cross are set forth in the act of Congress approved February 4, 1919.

15-2. Manner of Wearing:

(a) In order to clarify briefly the question of wearing decorations, medals, and badges, large and miniature, the following basic information and background for selection of appropriate insignia on various occasions is presented:

(1) Three types of insignia considered herein are: Large medals, miniature medals, and ribbons.

(2) Large medals or ribbons are worn with uniforms in the daytime.

(3) Miniature medals are worn with evening uniforms.

(4) Medals are worn when gold-striped trousers are worn, and also when Dress, blue, and Evening Dress, blue, "A" and "B" are worn. Ribbons are worn at all other times.

(b) The Medal of Honor is worn pendant from a ribbon placed around the neck under the coat. With Full Dress, white, the ribbons pass out from inside the coat collar between the upper and lower collar hooks, the medal hanging one inch below the collar. With evening clothes it hangs one inch below the tie. With frock coat, the medal hangs just below the opening where lapels meet.

(c) Medals and badges, except the Medal of Honor, shall be worn on the left breast, in one horizontal line, suspended from a single holding bar, the upper edge of which shall be on a line one inch below the point of the shoulder. (By "the point of the shoulder" is meant a point in front halfway between the top and the bottom of the shoulder joint.) The holding bar shall not be longer than from the fold of the left lapel of the frock coat to the armhole seam, and so placed upon the uniform that its center shall be at a point midway between the fold of the left lapel of the coat and the left armhole. When a medal or badge has an exposed bar at the top of the ribbon, such bar shall be mounted on the front of the holding bar or shall form a part of such bar, and where there are several such exposed bars on a single medal or badge, the uppermost bar shall be so mounted. When the number of medals and badges to be worn is such that they cannot all be suspended from a holding bar of the prescribed length, and at the same time be fully seen, they shall overlap sufficiently to permit them all to be mounted on the bar, each medal or badge partially covering the one on its left, and the right-hand one showing in full, the overlapping being equal for all of the medals and badges worn. The holding bar for the suspension of medals and badges shall be of metal or other material of sufficient stiffness and shall be wholly covered by the ribbons or exposed bars.

(d) Ribbons of decorations, medals, and badges shall be worn in horizontal rows of three each, if that number or more be possessed, the rows to be spaced ¼ inch apart. If not in multiples of three, the upper row shall contain the lesser number, the center of this row to be over the center of the one below it. They shall be worn on the left breast clear of the lapel, as far as practicable, and in a position corresponding to that of the bar for medals

and badges. These ribbons shall be made in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch lengths of the same ribbon that supports the decoration, medal, or badge, with sufficient stiffening to keep them from wrinkling, without intervals, and shall be sewed to the service dress, blue, coat. They shall be arranged similarly on a bar or bars to be pinned to the frock, service dress, white, and mess dress coats.

15-3. Miniatures.—Miniature replicas of all medals (except the Medal of Honor) and decorations shall be of a scale one-half of that of the original and shall be worn pinned on the left lapel in lieu of medals on uniforms as prescribed. Miniature medals may be prescribed by competent authority for full dress, white. The Medal of Honor shall not be worn in miniature.

15-4. Order of Arrangement-Medals, Badges, and Ribbons:

(a) American decorations, medals, and badges, or their ribbons, shall be worn in the following order:

Medal of Honor (old and new) (Navy). (See Plates 81, 82, 83.)

Medal of Honor (old and new) (Army). Brevet Medal.

Distinguished Service Medal. (See Plate 84.) Navy Cross. (See Plate 84.)

Yangtze Service Medal (Navy). (See Plate 91.)

Good Conduct Medals (Navy and Marine Corps). (See Plate 91.)

Bailey Medal (Navy).

Naval Reserve Medal. (See Plate 92.)

Fleet Marine Corps Reserve Medal. (See Plate 92.)

For Ribbons, see Plates 93-94.

(b) Medals or badges awarded for service performed while in the Army, Marine Corps, or other branch of the Government, if not included among the foregoing, should be worn in the order specified by the respective services. If conferred for war or campaign service, they shall be worn to conform with the chronological sequence as set forth in this list; but if for otherwise meritorious conduct or service proficiency, they shall be worn to conform to the general plan set forth in these regulations, and as far as consistent with the order specified by their respective services.

(c) The following order is prescribed for medals or badges for excellence in gunnery:

(1) Admiral Tranchard section, Navy League, turret-gun-pointer medals.

(2) Knox trophy gun-pointer medal.

(d) The following order is prescribed for medals or badges for excellence in small-arms firing (any of these medals not having ribbons will be worn with either medals or ribbons):

(1) Expert team rifleman's medal. (No longer issued.)

(2) Expert rifleman's bar. (No longer issued.)

(3) Sharpshooter's medal. (No longer issued.)

(4) Expert pistol shot's pin. (No longer issued.)

(5) Navy and Marine Corps distinguished marksman's medal.

(6) Navy and Marine Corps distinguished pistol shot's medal.

(7) Navy expert rifleman's medal. (Not worn if (5) is held.)

(8) Marine Corps expert rifleman's badge. (Not worn if (5) is held.)

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(9) Navy expert pistol shot's medal. (Not worn if (6) is held.)

(10) Marine Corps expert pistol shot's badge. (Not worn if (6) is held.)

(11) Marine Corps sharpshooter's badge. (Not worn if (5) or (8) is held.)

(12) Marine Corps marksman's badge. (Not worn if (5), (8), or (11) is held.)

(13) Marine Corps pistol shot, first-class badge. (No longer issued.)

15-5. Optional Badges:

(a) The wearing of the following badges is optional with the holder, but if these, or any of them, are worn, none of the decorations, medals, or badges listed in Article 15-4 shall be worn at the same time.

- (1) The following medals or badges for excellence in small arms:
 - (a) Marine Corps rifle competition badge.
 - (b) Fleet and Force rifle-match "place" medals.
 - (c) Marine Corps division rifle competition badge.
 - (d) Marine Corps pistol competition badge.
 - (e) Fleet and Force pistol match "place" medals.
 - (f) Marine Corps division pistol-competition badge.
 - (g) Lauchheimer trophy medal.
 - (h) Medals won by winning teams in Fleet and Force rifle and pistol matches.
 - (i) Medals won in the national matches.
 - (j) Medals given by the National Rifle Association at matches held under the cognizance of that association.

(2) Badges of military societies commemorative of wars of the United States.

(3) Badges of the Regular Army and Navy Unions and of the Army and Navy Union of the United States.

(4) Corps and division badges of the Civil War and the Spanish War.

(5) Badge of the Enlisted Men's Abstinence League.

(b) The badges referred to in subparagraph (2) of the preceding paragraph are the distinctive medals and badges adopted by societies of men who have served in the Army or Navy of the United States in the War of the Revolution, the War of 1812, the Mexican War, the War of the Rebellion, the Spanish-American War and the incident insurrection in the Philippines, the China relief expedition of 1900, and the World War. The law permits them to be worn upon all occasions of ceremony by officers and men of the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps who are members of said organizations in their own right. Persons who by right of inheritance and election are members of any of the above-named societies are members thereof in their own right.

15-6. Restriction of Number of Identical Medals to Be Issued to Any One Person.-Not more than one Medal of Honor or one Distinguished Service medal or one Navy Cross shall be issued to any one person, but for each succeeding deed of service sufficient to justify the award the President may award a suitable emblem or insignia to be worn with the decoration and the corresponding rosette or other device. By direction of the President a gold five-pointed star, ¼ inch in diameter, will be issued to any person already holding a Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service medal, or Navy Cross, to denote the award of a second Medal of Honor, Distinguished Service medal, or Navy Cross, respectively. The star will be worn on the ribbon attached to the medal or cross and also upon the service ribbon when worn in lieu of the medal or cross.

15-7. When Decorations, Medals, Badges, and Ribbons Must Not Be Worn.—Decorations, medals, badges, and ribbons shall not be worn on overcoats, nor with civilian clothes, except that on appropriate occasions miniature medals may be worn with civilian evening dress. Rosettes or buttons are authorized with all decorations, medals, and badges for optional wear with civilian clothes, to consist of the ribbons of the respective medals made up in rosette form. Honorable discharge buttons may be worn with civilian clothes.

15-8. When Medals and Badges Having No Ribbons Shall Be Worn.—Medals and badges having no ribbons shall be worn only when other medals and badges are worn, except that medals or badges for excellence in gunnery or small arms shall be worn when the ribbons of decorations, medals, and badges are prescribed, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch below the center of the ribbons.

15-9. Foreign Decorations:

(a) Foreign decorations may not be publicly shown or exposed upon the person of the officer so receiving the same except where authority of law exists therefor. The act of Congress of July 9, 1918, authorizes American citizens who, between August 1, 1914, and July 9, 1918, received decorations or medals for distinguished service in the armies or in connection with the field service of those nations engaged in war against the Imperial German Government, to wear such medals or decorations on entering the military service of the United States (10 U. S. C. 1422). This same act authorizes any officer or enlisted man in the military forces of the United States to accept and wear any medal or decoration bestowed before July 9, 1918, by the Government of any of the Nations concurrently engaged with the United States in the World War (10 U. S. C. 1423).

(b) Except as otherwise prescribed below, when authorized by law the wearing of foreign decorations or service medals and the corresponding service ribbons is optional. They shall be worn on the same occasions as prescribed for American decorations, service medals, or badges and service ribbons, respecively, and shall be arranged in the order of the dates of receipt to the left of all American decorations, service medals, and service badges, except that when one individual possesses two or more decorations from the same foreign country, the order of precedence of those particular decorations shall be determined by the rules of the country concerned.

(c) An individual not possessing a Medal of Honor and having a foreign decoration which, under the rules of the country concerned, is required to be worn at the neck will so wear it. In case the Medal of Honor has been conferred and also a foreign decoration which, under the rules of the country concerned, shall be worn in no other place than suspended from the neck, the foreign decoration shall be so worn but shall show below the Medal of Honor.

(d) So far as may be consistent with the above, foreign decorations and medals will be

19-5. Cadets, Merchant Marine Reserve and Midshipmen, U. S. N. R.—Cedets, Merchant Marine Reserve, and midshipmen of the Naval Reserve shall wear uniforms as prescribed by the Bureau of Navigation.

16-6, Occasiona When Uniform May Be-Worn:

They may wear such uniforms at resemption and memorial services. They shall not wear them at membrosced times.

(e) A person who has received a decoration from the government of a foreign country will wear the decoration as a courtesy to that country when attending any public function in any country in the house of or in honor of a public official or other distinguished citizen or subject of the country whose decoration he possesses. A foreign decoration or service medal will not be worn alone; at least one American decoration, medal, or badge must be worn with a foreign award.

CHAPTER XVI

NAVAL RESERVE UNIFORMS

16-1. Uniform for Naval Reserve:

(a) Officers and men of the Naval Reserve shall wear the uniforms prescribed for officers and men of corresponding ranks or rating in the Regular Navy.

(b) They will not be required to possess other than the following:

Service dress blue.

Service dress white.

Raincoat.

Leggings.

Sword.

Sword-knot (if commissioned).

Undress belt.

Aviation working dress (if naval aviator).

Overcoat optional.

Khaki working uniform.

(c) All other uniforms prescribed for officers of the United States Navy are optional for officers of the Naval Reserve, but such uniforms, when worn, must be of regulation pattern.

16-2. Sleeve Markings.—Officers of the Naval Reserve shall wear the same sleeve markings prescribed for officers of the same rank and corps.

16-3. Chaplains.—Chaplains shall not wear the cocked hat, epaulet, sword, sword belt, or full dress trousers. They may wear the vestments of the church to which they belong on occasions requiring it.

16-4. Aviation Cadets.—Aviation cadets shall wear the same uniform as prescribed for other Naval Reserve officers with the exceptions that the gold lace stripes on the sleeves and on the shoulder marks shall be only one quarter inch in width and the chin strap on the cap shall also be only one quarter inch in width. Aviation cadets shall not wear epaulets. The aviation device shall be of the gold embroidered type sewed on the left breast on blue uniforms and of the pin type on washable uniforms. The metal pin device to be worn on the shirt collar shall be a silver foul anchor % inch in length with a proportionate width. These devices shall be in rights and lefts and be worn with the shank of the anchor parallel with the top edge of the collar and the crown of the anchor to the front.

16-5. Cadets, Merchant Marine Reserve and Midshipmen, U. S. N. R.—Cadets, Merchant Marine Reserve, and midshipmen of the Naval Reserve shall wear uniforms as prescribed by the Bureau of Navigation.

16-6. Occasions When Uniform May Be Worn:

(a) Except as otherwise noted below, members of the Naval Reserve shall wear the uniforms of their ranks or ratings when at drills and when performing authorized training duty with or without pay. They may wear such uniforms at ceremonies and memorial services. They shall not wear them at unauthorized times.

(b) Civilian clothes may be worn when in an active duty status in conformity with the customs of the regular service.

(c) Officers of the Merchant Marine Reserve employed on vessels requiring its officers to wear uniforms, may be permitted to wear such uniforms while performing active or training duty. Merchant Marine Reserve officers so equipped are not required to possess the Naval Reserve uniforms required of other officers of the Naval Reserve, except when ordered to active duty in time of war or national emergency.

16-7. Uniforms, Officers Class I-V(S), U. S. N. R.—Officers of Class I-V (S) shall not be required to provide themselves with uniforms unless upon reporting for active duty or training duty their commanding officer orders them to do so. Such orders shall be in letter form addressed to each individual concerned, three copies of which shall accompany each voucher for uniform gratuity.

16-8. Service Stripes.—Enlisted men of the Naval Reserve who perform continuous active duty, maintain the required marks, and meet the qualifications shall wear gold lace service stripes. There shall be one service stripe for each four years of active service in the Navy or the Naval Reserve.

16-9. Insignia, Merchant Marine Reserve:

(a) The Merchant Marine insignia shall be a gold embroidered or bronze gold-plated metal pin consisting of a spread eagle surcharged with crossed anchors and shield % inch in height, 2% inches from tip to tip of wings; length of anchors % inch; underset with %-inch scroll bearing the letters "U. S." on one side of shield and "N. R." on the opposite side. (See Plate 64.)

(b) The insignia shall be worn on the left breast of the merchant marine uniform. It shall not be worn with the naval uniform.

(c) Members of the Naval Reserve who are serving as licensed officers under licenses issued by the Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation in ships under contract with the Maritime Commission (Merchant Marine Act 1936 as amended) or who are serving as staff officers on certificates of registry issued by the Secretary of Commerce are required by law to wear the Merchant Marine Reserve insignia. Other members of the Naval Reserve serving in merchant ships (or employed by, or under the supervision of the United States Maritime Commission), in positions which require them to wear a uniform appropriate to an officer, are authorized to wear the insignia with such uniforms.

16-10. Insignia Class H-V(P), Medical Corps, U. S. Naval Reserve.—Ensigns in Class H-V(P), of the Medical Corps U. S. Naval Reserve, shall wear the same corps device prescribed for the Medical Corps, U. S. Navy.

16-11. Insignia Class H-V(P), Dental Corps, U.S. Naval Reserve.—Ensigns in Class H-V(P), of the Dental Corps, U.S. Naval Reserve, shall wear the same corps device prescribed for the Dental Corps, U.S. Navy.

16-12. Insignia Class H-V(S), U. S. Naval Reserve.—Officers in Class H-V(S), U. S. Naval Reserve, shall wear the corps device prescribed for Chief Pharmacists of the U. S. Navy.

CHAPTER XVII

NAVY NURSE CORPS UNIFORMS

17-1. General.—Members of the Navy Nurse Corps are required to possess all of the articles of uniform hereinafter prescribed, except the raincoat which is an optional item of uniform. During the probationary period, which is usually of 6 months' duration, any plain white uniform may be worn; but it must conform with the regulation uniform in length of skirt and sleeves, and in addition nurses on probation will be required to wear the Navy Nurse Corps Cap, white cuff links, plain white stockings, and plain white oxfords with rubber heels.

17-2. Initial Outfit.—The initial outfit which all nurses are required to maintain, after completing the probationary period, shall consist of the following:

WARD UNIFORM:

6 uniforms, indoor, white. 3 caps, uniform with marking. 2 pair pin-on corps devices. Shoes white, plain, with rubber heels. Stockings, plain white. Cuff links, white.

OUTDOOR UNIFORM (TO BE WORN AS PRE-SCRIBED BY COMMANDING OFFICER):

Uniform hat. Sweater. Cape. Raincoat (optional).

OCCASIONS ON WHICH THE UNIFORM SHALL BE WORN

17-10. General.—Uniforms shall be worn at all times when on duty and at all times when on board hospital ships. Nurses attached to transports may be given permission to wear civilian clothes when not on duty. While on authorized leave and while off duty at hospitals, civilian attire may be worn. Nurses on duty shall at all times carry a watch in good working order.

17-11. Outdoor Uniform.—Hat, sweater, cape (or raincoat) may be worn outdoors when prescribed by the commanding officer.

ARTICLES OF UNIFORM

GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS

17-20. Uniform, Indoor, White.—The white uniform shall consist of a skirt attached to bodice at waistline, and shall button down the front with white pearl detachable buttons. The bodice shall be gathered in to the waist at front and back; the skirt shall be gathered in to waist at back only. A loose belt shall be worn. This uniform shall have a convertible collar 3% inches wide at back and shall be so made that it may be buttoned up to throat if desired, but shall normally be worn open at the throat. The skirt shall be of a length which conforms with the current trends of wearing apparel. (See Plate 76.)

17-21. Caps, Uniform White.—The cap shall be of prescribed dimensions with a pointed fold in the front and with black velvet band across full width of fold, with cap markings as follows:

(a) Superintendent of the Nurse Corps shall wear a %-inch gold band between two %-inch gold bands, all equally spaced and applied on a black velvet band 1% inches in width.

(b) Assistant Superintendent of the Navy Nurse Corps shall wear two ¼-inch gold bands equally spaced on a black velvet band 1¼ inches in width.

(c) Principal Chief Nurse shall wear a ¼-inch and a ‰-inch gold band equally spaced on a black velvet band 1 inch in width.

(d) Assistant Chief Nurse shall wear one ¼-inch gold band applied in the center of black velvet band 1 inch in width.

(e) Nurses who have completed their probationary period and have been accepted in the Navy Nurse Corps shall wear a %-inch gold band in the center of a black velvet band ½ inch in width.

(f) Nurses who have been appointed but have not completed their probationary period shall wear a black velvet band ½ inch in width. (See Plate 77.)

17-22. Corps Devices, Metal Pin-On.-The corps device shall be made of gold-plated brass and shall consist of an oakleaf and acorn, superimposed on an anchor with the bright silver letters "N. N. C." raised above the surface of the leaf. These devices shall be made in pairs and shall measure 1% inches overall in height, % inch in width across and outside of flukes and % inch across and outside of crown. The leaf shall be % inch long and ½ inch at its widest part. The letter, "N. N. C." shall be % inch in height. The corps device shall be worn on the indoor uniform on each side of the collar. 1/2 inch from side edge and 1/2 inch from front edge of collar. The shank of the anchor shall be parallel with outer edge of collar and placed with oakleaf stem pointing toward neck. (See Plate 78.)

18-10. Chocolate.—Covar the stain with borex and wash with cold water, then pour boiling water on the stain and rub vigorously between the hands. When dry, sponge with a little naphtha, chlorotorm, or benzine.

18.11. To Remove Bust, Ink, or Fruit Stains From White Enforms.—Soak the stained part is a solution of oxalic acid, or put some powdared oxalic acid or sodium or potassium acid explate on the stain previously monstened with 17-23. Shoes, White.—White shoes shall be plain oxfords, with rubber heels and may be made of canvas, suede or kid. (See Plate 78.)

17-24. Stockings, White.—Stockings shall be plain white. (See Plate 78.)

17–25. Cuff Links.—Cuff links shall be entirely white.

17-26. Hat, Uniform.—The hat shall be dark blue, fur felt, fully lined with black material. The Nurse Corps metal pin-on device shall be pinned on the right side of the hat midway between the center pleat and the right drape with the anchor at an angle of 45° pointed toward small end of center pleat, and point of anchor located one inch from extreme point of pleat. (See Plate 78.)

17-27. Sweater, Nurses.—The sweater shall be of the jacket type, with pinch back, and without collar. It shall be made of dark blue worsted yarn. (See Plate 79.)

17-28. Cape.—The cape shall be made of dark blue cloth, lined throughout with maroon cloth and shall have a velvet collar. The collar shall be closed at neck by means of hooks and eyes, and the cape shall be fastened with frogs at breast. This garment shall be full cut and of such length to reach between 12 to 14 inches from the floor. (See Plate 75.)

17-29. Raincoat.—The raincoat shall be double-breasted, loose fitting, and drawn into waist by a full belt. It shall be made of waterrepellent dark blue serge, whipcord, elastique or gabardine.

18-4. Mothes—Frequent brushing and exposore to somations and fresh air will effectually prevent moths. If uniforms are to be put away for a long time and left undertribed, thereaghly clean and then pack away with complex balls, naplithelene, bedue wood, or balls of cotton saturated with torparture.

18-5. To Remove Oil or Grease From Blue Uniforms.-Sould a piece of blue cloth in cliforoform, carbon terrachloride, petreleum

CARE OF THE UNIFORM

18-1. Necessity for Care of Uniform and Equipment.—The longest service of the various articles of the prescribed uniform can be obtained only by proper care and maintenance. The information contained in this chapter is presented in order that the useful life of uniforms and equipment may be prolonged, and also that they may be worn with the justifiable pride which should distinguish a naval or military uniform.

18-2. General Care.-No matter how well fitting a uniform, and especially the coat, is when new, it will not continue to look its best or keep its shape unless it is carefully put on and kept buttoned. The carrying of large or heavy objects in the pockets will speedily destroy the shape of the best coat. Uniforms should always be kept on hangers when not in use.

18-3. To Fold a Coat.-Spread it out, lining down, on a table and turn up the collar. Straighten out the sleeves and fold each side from the lapel notch, bringing lower corners to center seam. Fold the coat over once on center seam. If the container will not allow the coat to be packed at its full length, turn the sleeves up at the elbow before folding the coat.

18-4. Moths.-Frequent brushing and exposure to sunshine and fresh air will effectually prevent moths. If uniforms are to be put away for a long time and left undisturbed, thoroughly clean and then pack away with camphor balls, naphthalene, cedar wood, or balls of cotton saturated with turpentine.

18-5. To Remove Oil or Grease From Blue Uniforms .- Soak a piece of blue cloth in chloroform, carbon tetrachloride, petroleum

benzine, benzol, or acctone, and rub the spot briskly. The stain will be washed out. The solvent will be rapidly evaporated.

18-6. To Remove Kerosene .-- Wash in a solution of warm soapy water.

18-7. To Remove Stains From Blue Uniforms .- Paint stains, while still fresh, can be removed by use of the method given above for removing oil or grease. Old and hard paint stains are difficult to remove and oftentimes impossible. The best treatment for old paint stains is to rub them hard with a piece of blue cloth saturated in turpentine.

18-8. Paraffin, Wax, Etc.-Place blotting paper over the spot and apply a hot iron to the blotting paper. Continue this, using clean blotting paper, until the spot is removed.

18-9. Iodine Stains .- Iodine stains can be readily removed by applying a solution of "Hypo" (sometimes called "anticolor") used in photography, or sodium hyposulphite, and then rinsing thoroughly with water. It may also be removed by using starch as prepared for laundry purposes. Immerse the stained part in the starch and boil; it first turns blue then disappears.

18-10. Chocolate.-Cover the stain with borax and wash with cold water, then pour boiling water on the stain and rub vigorously between the hands. When dry, sponge with a little naphtha, chloroform, or benzine.

18-11. To Remove Rust, Ink, or Fruit Stains From White Uniforms .- Soak the stained part in a solution of oxalic acid, or put some powdered oxalic acid or sodium or potassium acid oxalate on the stain previously moistened with

water and rub with a piece of white cotton or linen. The stain will dissolve and can be washed out with water. Oxalic acid and its soluble salts are very poisonous, and care should be taken in handling them.

18-12. Care of Gold Lace.—Gold lace will rapidly tarnish and deteriorate if in contact with or hung near any substance containing sulphur, such as rubber or ordinary manila and kraft wrapping paper.

18-13. To Remove Tarnish from Gold Lace.— Gold lace may be cleaned by dipping it in a solution of potassium cyanide and rinsing it thoroughly with water. The use of potassium cyanide is very dangerous, as it is a powerful poison, and extreme care must be exercised. Never under any consideration use it when hands bear cuts or scratches. In any case, it is far safer to have an experienced tailor clean gold lace.

18-14. Mildew.—If stain is recent, simply use cold water. If it is an old stain, bleach.

18-15. To Clean Buttons That Have Turned Green.—Buttons sometimes turn green when the gold plating is worn off and the copper base becomes covered with green copper carbonate due to exposure to moist air. This can be removed by rubbing gently with acetic acid or any substance containing this acid, such as vinegar or Worcestershire sauce, followed by a thorough washing in fresh water and drying.

18-16. To Remove Shine from Serge Uniforms.—The spot to be treated should be steamed by laying a wet cloth over it and pressing with a hot iron and then rubbing it very gently with a piece of "00" sandpaper or emery cloth. This should be done by a regular tailor.

18-17. To Repair a Clean Cut in a Serge or Cloth Uniform.—A clean cut in a serge or cloth uniform can be repaired by being rewoven with threads drawn from the material in another part of the garment. This must be done by an experienced tailor. This process is rather expensive, but a cut so repaired cannot be detected after being rewoven.

18-18. To Remove a Singe Mark.—A light singe mark on a blue serge or cloth should be rubbed vigorously with the flat side of a silver coin. This will in many cases make a great improvement in appearance. It is, however, not effective in the cases of bad singes or scorches.

18-19. Cap Devices.—These and other embroidered insignia may be kept new and bright by scrubbing them occasionally with a nail brush and ammonia which has been diluted with water. This should be done as soon as there are any signs of tarnishing or corrosion. If corrosion has been allowed to continue until it has gained a stronghold, the device cannot be restored to its original condition.

18-20. Metal Cap Devices.—The gold part of this device may be cleaned by washing it with soap and water or by rubbing it with any kind of polishing cloth; the sterling silver part can be cleaned with any silver polish.

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APPENDIX

NAVY REGULATIONS AND LAWS PERTAINING TO THE NAVAL UNIFORM

NAVY REGULATIONS RELATING TO NAVAL UNIFORMS

20-1. Uniform Regulations.—Article 74 (3) (f): These shall include all regulations and instructions relative to the uniforms of all persons in the Navy and Marine Corps. The order promulgating these regulations shall be signed by the Secretary of the Navy, who shall also sign the orders for any changes that may be made in them from time to time.

20-2. Changes in Uniform Regulations.— Article 75 (7): All uniform regulations or changes therein for the Navy shall be prepared by the Bureau of Navigation, and for the Marine Corps by the Major General Commandant of the corps, and shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Navy for signature.

20-3. Possession, Ownership, and Selling of Prescribed Uniforms.—Article 122:

(1) All persons belonging to the Navy must strictly conform to such regulations for uniforms as may be published from time to time by the Navy Department.

(2) The clothes, arms, military outfits, and accoutrements furnished by the United States to any enlisted person in the Navy or Marine Corps, or required by such persons as a part of their prescribed uniforms or outfits, shall not be sold, bartered, exchanged, pledged, loaned, or given away, except by competent authority therefor.

(3) Enlisted personnel are forbidden to have in their possession without permission from proper authority any article of wearing apparel or bedding belonging to any person in the Navy other than themselves. 20-4. Uniform Designation, Official Visits, U. S. Civil Officials.—Article 232:

Note.—The uniforms prescribed in the foregoing tables shall be worn by officers of the Navy and Marine Corps when making or returning official visits to officials indicated. Boat crews shall wear the uniform corresponding to that worn by the senior officer or official embarked. The prescribed uniform shall also be worn by officers and men on watch on deck and by others participating in the reception of the official (including the entire crew when they are required to be paraded) if previous notice of the visit has been received. When previous notice has not been received the uniform shall be "Uniform of the Day."

20-7. Inspection, Uniform Prescribed by Flag Officer.—Article 257: When a flag officer goes on board a ship of the Navy to make an inspection _____. The officers and

20-9. Deceased Enlisted Men, Disposition of Effects.—Article 908 (8): The commanding officer shall exercise his discretion in causing the effects of deceased enlisted men to be sold at auction at the mast, or retaining them for transmission to the heirs, relatives, or friends. In exercising this discretion he shall be governed by the wishes of the heirs, relatives, or friends, if possible to learn them. If sold at auction, the proceeds of sale shall be disposed of in the same manner as moneys found in their effects.

20-10. Stragglers, Disposition of Effects.— Article 910: The commanding officer, when it is discovered that any person is a straggler, shall cause his effects to be collected and inventoried and placed in safekeeping. These effects shall be sold at public auction when the man is declared a deserter, except that in the cases of men whose records are closed out by desertion due to absence from his ship when it is about to sail, effects shall not be sold until a reasonable time after the ship's arrival at the next port. The proceeds of the sale shall be credited on the deserter's account, either on board or, in the excepted case, at the deserter's roll.

20-11. Officer of the Deck, Gloves and Spyglass.—Article 1072: In port the officer of the deck shall wear gloves and carry a spyglass or binocular.

20-12. Clothing and Small Stores, Issue of.— Article 1108:

(1) The division officers shall, whenever necessary, have prepared and signed memorandum requisitions for clothing and small stores or other articles required by the men. They shall not permit requisitions to be submitted for any man more frequently than necessary with the exercise of reasonable foresight.

(2) No issue of clothing or small stores shall be made to any person in debt to the Government or against whom a checkage is pending which may put him in debt, except on written authority of the commanding officer and a statement upon the requisition that the issue is necessary for the health and comfort of the person requiring it.

(3) Division officers shall require each man to whom an issue of clothing or small stores is made to present the articles drawn, together with his copy of the receipt given by him to his division officer or to some person in that division designated by such officer to check off.

(4) Division officers shall, in addition to carrying out the instructions already laid down for inspection, take special care that all outer and underclothing, overcoats, caps, hats, and bedding of the men are, in respect to quality, pattern, and color, in accordance with the prescribed uniform.

(5) They shall see that all materials drawn are used for the purpose required; that all clothing is neatly made, marked, and kept in order, and that none of it is sold; that the men are neat in person and clothing, and provided with such articles of clothing and small stores as are required by the Uniform Regulations; and that underclothing is worn at all times unless dispensed with by order of the commanding officer. All work done by ship's tailor shall be submitted to the division officer concerned for inspection and approved before it is accepted or any payment made therefor.

20-13. Clothing, Disposition of.—Article 1319:

(3) Clothing shall be inspected once a month, and oftener if necessary, in order to ascertain that it is clean, properly marked, and of uniform pattern, that previous issues are duly accounted for, and to take note of any deficiences; and the necessary steps shall be taken to see that every man is provided with a proper amount of stowage space for this clothing. In granting clothing requisitious due regard shall be paid to the necessities of the individuals of the crew and the state of their accounts, keeping them, if possible, out of debt. Nothing but the regulation uniform shall be worn; and in arranging the dress for the day commanding officers and senior officers present shall prescribe such as is adapted to the climate, with prompt changes to meet varying conditions of weather, so as not injuriously to affect the health. Clothing wet by perspiration must be dried and, if possible, washed before being stowed away. At morning inspection, from which no one shall be excused unless necessary, a careful examination shall be made to see that the clothing is clean, neat, and in accordance with the order for the day. Every reasonable opportunity and facility shall be given to the crew to make, mend, mark, and wash their clothing.

(4) Bedding shall be aired once a week, each piece being separately shaken out and hung up, arranged along the ridge ropes and rails without intervals. All bedding shall be of the uniform pattern and color; each man shall have two mattress covers and change them frequently; blankets shall be washed as often as necessary, special facilities, if possible, being given to firemen, mechanics, and others whose bedding requires frequent inspections and much care.

(6) A dress board, on which will be indicated the uniform of the crew, shall be kept posted in a conspicuous position.

20-14. Placing Clothing and Small Stores on Board.—Article 1383: Clothing and small stores shall not be put on board before the supply officer reports for duty.

20-15. Clothing and Small Stores, Time of Issue.—Article 1405: Clothing and small stores shall be issued at such times as may be directed by the commanding officer, except that under normal conditions no issues shall be made during the five days prior to a pay day. 20-16. Clothing and Small Stores, Issue to Men in Debt and Supernumeraries.—Article 1406:

(1) Issues of clothing and small stores may be made to supernumeraries entitled to pay on the written authority of the commanding officer, and a statement upon the requisition signed by him, that the issue is necessary for the health and comfort of the person requiring it. An officer shall witness the issues to supernumeraries and sign the receipt as such.

(2) Any officer of the Supply Corps may, upon order of the senior officer present, make issues of clothing and small stores to the crew of any naval vessel or other naval activity. In cases where the commanding officer knows that the applicant is already in debt to the Government, or will become in debt by reason of the requested issue of clothing and small stores, or may become in debt by reason of a pending checkage, the requisition shall bear a statement signed by the commanding officer that the issue is necessary for the health and comfort of the man requiring it.

20-17. Men in Confinement, Deprivation of Clothing.—Article 1835: An enlisted man of the Navy or Marine Corps sentenced by courtmartial to confinement with loss of pay shall not be deprived of such clothing and small stores as the officer commanding the ship, or other place of confinement, may deem necessary to the prisoner's health and comfort.

20-18. Discharged Men Entitled to Civilian Clothing.—Article 1836:

(1) Persons confined in prisons in pursuance of the sentence of a naval court martial shall, during such confinement, be allowed a reasonable sum, not to exceed \$3 per month, for necessary prison expenses, and shall, upon discharge, be furnished with suitable civilian clothing, only in cases where the prisoners so discharged would otherwise be unprovided with suitable clothing.

(3) Persons discharged from the naval service for bad conduct, undesirability, inaptitude, and in addition, in the case of marines, for unfitness, may be required upon discharge to surrender 313599°-41-5 their outer uniforms, and may be furnished with necessary civilian outer clothing at the expense of the Government at a cost not to exceed \$15 in each case.

20-19. Deceased Personnel, Clothing for.— Article 1841:

(4) Where available clothing belonging to a deceased officer or enlisted man is not sufficient in quantity or of proper kind or quality, or is too much worn, new clothing (outer and under) shall be obtained as may be necessary from the Supply Department and charged to the appropriation "Care of the dead."

LAWS RELATING TO THE NAVAL UNIFORM

20-30. Discrimination Against the Naval Uniform .- "No proprietor, manager, or employee of a theater or other public place of entertainment or amusement in the District of Columbia, or in any Territory, the Territory of Alaska, or insular possession of the United States, shall make, or cause to be made, any discrimination against any person lawfully wearing the uniform of the Army, Navy, Coast Guard, or Marine Corps of the United States because of that uniform, and any person making, or causing to be made, such discrimination shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500." (Act March 1, 1911, as amended; 18 U.S. Code, 523). (For information as to various State laws, the statutes of the various States should be consulted.)

20-31. Unlawful Wearing of Naval Uniform.—Section 125 of the act of Congress approved June 3, 1916, made it unlawful for any person not an officer or enlisted man of the United States Army, Navy, or Marine Corps to wear the duly prescribed uniform of the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps, or any distinctive part of such uniform, or a uniform any part of which is similar to a distinctive part of the uniform excepting the National Guard and certain other specified organizations, societies, and individuals. This act was further amended by section 8 of the act of June 4, 1920, to include societies specified by the Secretary of the Navy.

20-32. Wearing of Naval Uniform by Members of Naval Reserve.—"All members of the Naval Reserve, when employed on active duty, authorized training duty, with or without pay, drill, or other equivalent instruction or duty, or when employed in authorized travel to or from such duty, or appropriate duty, drill, or instruction, or during such time as they may by law be required to perform active duty, or while wearing a uniform prescribed for the Naval Reserve, shall be subject to the laws, regulations, and orders for the government of the Navy: * * *." (Section 301, Act June 25, 1938; 34 U. S. Code, Supp., 855.)

20-33. Reimbursement of Naval Personnel for Lost or Damaged Property .-- "That the Paymaster General of the Navy be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to reimburse such officers, enlisted men, and others in the naval service of the United States as may have suffered, or may hereafter suffer, loss or destruction of, or damage to their personal property and effects in the naval service due to the operations of war or by shipwreck or other marine disaster when such loss, destruction, or damage was without fault or negligence on the part of the claimant, or where the private property so lost, destroyed, or damaged was shipped on board an unseaworthy vessel by order of an officer authorized to give such order or direct such shipment, or where it appears that the loss, destruction, or damage of or to the private property of the claimant was in consequence of his having given his attention to the saving of the lives of others or of property belonging to the United States which was in danger at the same time and under similar circumstances. And the liability of the Government under this act shall be limited to such articles or personal property as the Chief of the Bureau of Navigation of the Navy Department, with reference to the personnel of the Navy, or the Major General Commandant of the Marine Corps, with reference to the personnel of that corps, in his discretion, shall decide to be reasonable, useful, and proper for such officer, enlisted man, or other person while engaged in the public service

in the line of duty, and the certificate of said chief of bureau or Major General Commandant, as the case may be, shall be sufficient voucher for and shall be final as to all matters necessary to the establishment and payment or settlement of any claim filed hereunder; and the action of the said chief of bureau or Major General Commandant, as the case may be, upon all claims arising under this act shall be final, and no right to prosecute a claim or action in the Court of Claims or in any other court of the United States, or before any accounting officers of the United States, or elsewhere, except as herein provided, shall accrue to any person by virtue of this act:

"Provided, That the liability of the Government under this act shall be limited to such articles of personal property as are required by the United States Naval Regulations and in force at the time of loss or destruction for such officers, petty officers, seamen, or others engaged in the public service in the line of duty:

"Provided further, That with reference to claims of persons in the Marine Corps filed under the terms of this act the paymaster of the Marine Corps shall make the reimbursement in money, and the quartermaster of the Marine Corps shall make the reimbursement in kind herein provided for, and

"Provided further, That all claims now existing under this act shall be presented within two years from the passage hereof and not thereafter; and all such claims hereafter arising shall be presented within two years from the occurrence of the loss, destruction, or damage, and

"Provided further, That the term 'in the naval service,' as herein employed, shall be held to include service performed on board any vessel, whether of the Navy or not, provided the claimant is serving on such vessel pursuant to the orders of duly constituted naval authority, and

"Provided further, That all claimants under this act shall be required to submit their claims in writing and under oath to the said Chief of the Bureau of Navigation or Major General Commandant, as the case may be, and "Provided further, That claims arising in the manner indicated in this act and which have been settled under the terms of previously existing law shall be regarded as finally determined and no other or further right of recovery under the provisions hereof shall accrue to persons who have submitted such claims as aforesaid, and

"Provided further, That reimbursement for loss, destruction, or damage sustained and determined as herein provided shall be made in kind for such articles as are customarily issued to the service and shall be made in money for other articles at the valuation thereof, at the time of their loss, destruction or damage, and

"Provided further, That in cases involving persons in the Navy, reimbursement in money shall be made from the appropriation 'Pay of the Navy,' and reimbursement in kind shall be made from the appropriation 'Outfits on first enlistment,' and in cases involving persons in the Marine Corps reimbursement in money shall be made from the appropriation 'Pay, Marine Corps,' and reimbursement in kind shall be made from the appropriation 'Clothing, Marine Corps,' respectively, current at the time the claim covering such loss, damage, or destruction is paid, and

"Provided further, That as herein employed (1) the term 'vessel' includes any aircraft, (2) the term 'unseaworthy' includes 'unairworthy' in the case of an aircraft, and (3) the term 'shipwreck or other marine disaster' includes the wreck of an aircraft or other disaster thereto, wherever occurring; reimbursement shall not be made in pursuance of this proviso for loss, destruction, or damage occurring prior to January 1, 1925." (Act of October 6, 1917 (40 Stat. 389), as amended by act of March 3, 1927 (44 Stat. 1368) (34 U. S. Code 981, 982, 983).)

(a) MATERIAL.-Cloth, dark blue (blueblack), broadcloth or Kersey finish, 15- to 18ounce.

(b) GARMENT DESCRIPTION.-This garment shall be a double-breasted, close-fitting, fullskirted body coat with two rows of Navy buttons on the breast.

(c) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—Double-breasted dress coat similar to conventional afternoon coat, with five buttons down each forepart, so spaced that top buttons are just clear of lapel and fully visible, the four lower buttons on the right-hand side being buttoned.

(2) LENGTH.-To come to lower edge of knee cap.

(3) COLLAR AND LAPELS.-Rolling collar; no buttonholes in the turn of the lapel; width at waistline to be 2¼ inches and at the fourth button from the bottom 3¼ inches. Front to have four buttonholes about 3¼ inches apart, leaving the turn of lapel about 10 inches long on outer edge.

(4) POCKETS .- Two in back of skirt and two inside breast pockets. Left inside breast pocket to have vertical opening.

(5) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.—Cuffs closed, without buttons.

(6) LINING.-Black silk, rayon, venetian or similar body lining; white silk, venetian or similar sleeve lining.

(7) BUTTONS.-Navy eagle, gilt, 35-line; five on each forepart and two at top of skirt at back.

(8) SEAMS AND EDGES.-Plain.

(9) SWORD HOOK.-Large hook, covered with same material as coat, to be set in waist seam on left hip to support the sword belt.

(10) ATTACHMENTS FOR EPAULETS.-Two cloth loops on shoulders for attaching epaulets. (11) RANK AND CORPS DEVICES.—Both sleeves shall bear stripes of U.S. Navy standard gold lace with corps devices.

A-2. Service Coat, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be either dark navy blue cloth as prescribed for the frock coat, dark navy blue serge with not less than twelve wales to the inch, whipcord, elastique Palm Beach or similar light-weight material

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—Double-breasted sack coat, three buttons down each forepart, all three buttons to button; seam back; no vent; semifitting.

(2) LENGTH.—Length to come 1 inch below crotch line.

(3) LAPELS.—Peaked rolling lapels to come 3½ inches below breast line. Length of lapel on outer edge to be about 12 inches.

(4) POCKETS.—To have three outside pockets, one on each hip and one on the left breast, all to be made with welts, no flaps. The breast pocket to be horizontal with a 5-inch opening, the welt to be 1 inch deep and the pocket 61/2 inches deep. The side pockets to be 61/2 to 7 inches wide, and the welt 11/2 inches deep, and the pockets 7½ to 8 inches deep. There shall be one inside breast pocket in the right breast, having a horizontal opening 6 inches wide and depth of 6½ inches. All pockets shall be stayed to prevent sagging.

(5) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.-Cuffs closed without buttons.

(6) LINING.—The coats to be lined with black rayon, silk, or mohair serge. Sleeves

shall be lined with rayon or striped cotton material. Coats may be full-lined, half-lined, or quarter-lined as desired. Full-lined—lined throughout; half-lined—forepart lined, back unlined except for a yoke at top; quarter-lined forepart lined at shoulder only, back to have yoke of lining at top, side pockets to be covered with cloth.

(7) BUTTONS.—Navy eagle gilt, 35-line, three on each forepart 5 inches from the edge. Top button 3½ inches below breast line; bottom button in a line with center of welt on hip pockets. Middle button to be midway between top and bottom buttons.

(8) SEAMS.-Plain.

(9) EDGES.—Serges: Single stitched close to edge. Cloths: Plain.

(10) SWORD SLIT.—There shall be a vertical slit about 3½ inches long over the left hip to allow the short sling of the sword belt to pass through, and the sword to be hooked up outside; bottom of sword slit to be at top of the pocket. The slit shall be fitted with an inside flap to cover opening when not in use; flap to button inside.

(11) WEARING.—Coat shall always be worn buttoned.

(12) RANK AND CORPS DEVICES.—Both sleeves shall bear stripes of U. S. Navy standard gold lace with corps devices.

A-3. Service Coat, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be plain bleached linen duck, union duck, cotton duck, twill, or bleached Palm Beach cloth.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—Single-breasted, button through to neck, with standing collar, formfitting. Unlined. Five buttons. Outside breast pockets only. A dart may be sewed up in breast from gore to center of breast-pocket flap. To be worn with shoulder marks.

(2) LENGTH.—To come about 1 inch below crotch line.

(3) COLLAR.—Standing collar from 1½ to 2 inches high, made of four thicknesses of fabric so that it may be worn without a linen collar. Fastened in front with heavy white metal hooks and eyes at base and top. Inside the front of collar shall be fitted a small tongue to close back of opening and prevent hooks touching throat.

(4) POCKETS.—To have two outside breast pockets, patched on. Pockets to be 5 inches wide by 6½ inches deep. Flap to be "shieldshaped" 2¼ inches deep at ends and 2½ inches deep at center. Lower corners of flap and pocket slightly rounded. Top of flap on level with second button.

(5) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.—Cuffs closed without buttons.

(6) BUTTONS.—Five detachable 35-line Navy standard eagle gilt buttons down right forepart attached through eyelet holes. Right facing made open, giving access to back of eyelet holes. Top button ¾ inch below collar seam at throat. Bottom button from 9 to 10 inches from bottom of blouse, the three others equally spaced between. Pocket flaps to button with 22½ -line detachable Navy standard eagle gilt buttons.

(7) SIDE VENTS.—There shall be a slit at each hip extending on the right side 5 inches from the bottom of the coat and on the left side as high as the position of the lower edge of the sword belt. These slits to button with mediumsize buttons other than corrosive metal. In lieu of side vents with buttons, a closed vent with a sword slit inserted over the left hip may be used.

(8) SEAMS.—Turned in and stitched ½ inch wide, no raw edge of material to show inside coat.

(9) EDGES.—One-eighth inch wide, single stitched.

(10) Loors.—Two loops on each shoulder for attaching shoulder marks.

A-4. Evening Dress Coat:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for the frock coat.

(b) GARMENT DESCRIPTION.—A uniform body coat for evening-dress wear; shaped to figure; double-breasted front; two rows of eagle gilt buttons on front, one row on each side; to (c) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) LENGTH.—To extend to the hollow at back of knee joint.

(2) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—To be faced with cloth. Peaked, rolling lapel down to level of second button; 3½ inches wide at top. No buttonholes in lapel. Two buttonholes in front edges on both sides, the lower buttonhole to be 1½ inches from bottom of forepart and the upper 4 inches above the lower buttonhole. Top buttonholes shall be open and bottom buttonholes shall be blind.

(3) POCKETS.—Two pockets in back of skirt and two inside breast pockets, the left breast pocket to have vertical opening.

(4) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.—Cuffs closed without buttons.

(5) LINING.—Black rayon, silk, or serge body lining. White rayon or silk sleeve lining.

(6) BUTTONS.—Navy, eagle, gilt, 35-line; three on each forepart, the bottom button to be 1¾ inches from the lower edge and 2¼ inches from front edge. Buttons shall be 4 inches apart in an oblique line so that the top button comes just clear of the lapel. Two buttons on back at top of the plaits. Two 35-line, Navy, eagle, gilt buttons linked together to close front at top buttonholes.

(7) SEAMS AND EDGES.—Plain.

(8) ATTACHMENT FOR EPAULETS.—Two cloth loops on shoulders for attaching epaulets.

(9) RANK AND CORPS DEVICES.—Both sleeves shall bear stripes of U. S. Navy standard gold lace with corps devices.

A-5. Mess Jacket:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be linen duck, union duck, cotton duck, or bleached Palm Beach cloth.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—A short white body coat without skirts.

(2) LENGTH.—To come about 2½ inches

below waist line. Bottom edge curved slightly over hips and dipping in front.

(3) COLLAR.—Regular collar. Peaked lapels as evening dress coat.

(4) LININGS.—Unlined.

(5) POCKETS.--No pockets.

(6) BUTTONS.—Navy standard, eagle, gilt. Two buttons on each side, 28-line, so placed that top button is 3½ inches from front edge, and lower button 2½ inches from front edge. Buttons to be 3½ inches apart vertically. Lower buttons to be 1½ inches from bottom edge. Two 28-line buttons linked together to close fronts at top buttonholes.

(7) BUTTONHOLES.—Two on each edge 3½ inches apart. Lower hole is to be 1½ inches from bottom of jacket.

(8) SEAMS.—Turned in and stitched ½ inch wide. No raw edge of material to show inside garment.

(9) EDGES.-Single stitched ½ inch wide.

(10) Loops.—Two loops on each shoulder for attaching shoulder marks.

A-6. Overcoat:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be dark navy blue (blue-black) cloth.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—A double-breasted, easy-fitting winter overcoat with full skirt. Shaped at waist and held by means of a halfbelt at the back. Collar cut so that it may be worn open or buttoned to the throat.

(2) LENGTH.—To come one-third distance from kneecap to the ground.

(3) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—To be made with convertible collar and lapels so that it may be worn buttoned to throat if desired. Collar to be 4½ inches wide at center of back. The top of lapel to be as wide as the end of collar (about 4½ inches), the two to lie close together. Lapel to extend 3 inches below breast line, making length about 11 inches on outer edge. Collar to be fitted with a tab to button across throat when collar is turned up. Tab to button with two medium-size black buttons.
(4) POCKETS.—Two outside welted pockets (welts 1% inches wide) opening about 7% inches long. Center of opening on the same vertical line with the front seam of armhole at the height of the hip bone, and bottom of opening 2 inches to the rear of the top. Pockets to open through lining. Two inside breast pockets, the left one to have vertical opening.

(5) BACK.—The overcoat shall be made full in the back and fitted with half-belt. Vent in center 16 to 25 inches long, the right side of the vent overlapping the left side 2 inches and made with a fly fastened with three mediumsize flat black buttons.

(6) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.—Cuffs closed without button; black lustrous flat braid according to rank as prescribed in sleeve markings.

(7) BELT.—Belt to consist of two short straps 2¼ inches wide let into side seams. The right strap to have two 40-line Navy standard eagle gilt buttons about 3 inches apart. The left strap to have two buttonholes to correspond. Belt to be worn buttoned.

(8) LINING.—To be full-lined with black wool, silk, rayon, or cotton. Lower pockets to be lined with cloth or velveteen.

(9) BUTTONS.—To have two rows of 40-line Navy standard eagle gilt buttons, the rows to be about 6 inches apart when coat is buttoned. Five buttons in each row, the first button at the neck under the collar, second button 3 inches below breast line, and bottom button at the height of the crotch. The four lower buttons to be equally spaced.

(10) SEAMS.—Plain.

(11) EDGES.—Front edges, collar, pockets, and belt stitched one row, one-half inch from the edge.

(12) SWORD SLIT.—There shall be a vertical slit about 4 inches long over the left hip to allow the short sling of the sword belt to pass through, and the sword to be hooked up outside. The slit to be fitted with an inside flap to cover opening when not in use; flap to button inside.

(13) SHOULDERS.—Regular; loops for attaching shoulder marks. A-7. Boatcloak:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be dark Navy blue (blue-black) cloth, Kersey finish or beaver.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—A plain cloth cape cut full three-quarters of a circle.

(2) LENGTH.—The length shall extend to 2 inches below the lower edge of knee cap when worn with epaulets.

(3) COLLAR.—Black velvet collar made with stand and fall. Stand to be 1 inch deep in front to 1½ inches deep at back. Fall of collar to be 4 inches deep all around. Collar to fasten at throat with two hooks and eyes.

(4) POCKETS.—Two oblique inside pockets on level with elbows, opening forward. Pocket opening to be 7½ inches wide and pockets large enough to contain the hands.

(5) LINING.—Full-lined with black silk, rayon, satin, or venetian.

(6) FROGS.—Fronts to be fastened with a pair of black silk or mohair frogs at level of breast line, made and laid on, conforming to pattern.

(7) SEAMS.—Plain.

(8) EDGES.—Single stitched, five-eighths inch wide. Bottom raw 'edge 'single stitched, fiveeighths inch wide.

A-8. Waistcoat, Evening Dress, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Only plain bleached pure linen duck, union duck, or similar cotton material may be used.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Singlebreasted, with slightly pointed ends, length to correspond with length of dress coat fronts; two outside pockets with welts; four 22¹/₂-line Navy standard eagle gilt buttons, secured through eyelet holes.

A-9. Waistcoat, Service Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for blue service coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Singlebreasted; no collar; opening to breast line; four outside welt pockets; one inside breast pocket. Six 22½-line Navy standard eagle, gilt buttons. Edges to correspond with coat.

A-10. Trousers, Full Dress:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for frock coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Shall be close-fitting around the buttocks and cut high in the rise to come well up under the dress waistcoat and mess jacket. Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, bottom size to be between 18 and 22 inches, inclusive. Two fob pockets; no side or hip pockets. Fly front; no belt loops or back strap. To be worn with suspenders.

(c) GOLD LACE.—The outside seams of trousers shall be covered with a stripe of U.S. Navy standard gold lace of the width prescribed. (See Uniform Regulations, U.S. Navy, Article 2-87.)

A-11. Trousers, Dress, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for the frock coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Shall be cut high in the rise to come well up under the dress waistcoat and mess jacket. Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, bottom size to be between 18 and 22 inches, inclusive. Two fob and no side or hip pockets. Fly front; no belt loops or back strap. To be worn with suspenders.

A-12. Trousers, Service, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for the blue service coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, bottom size to be between 18 and 22 inches, inclusive. Trousers shall have two side pockets; hip pockets; fob pocket on right front. Seven belt loops 1½-inch clearance inside; suspender buttons inside waistband; no back strap; plain seams; fly front. To be worn with either belt or suspenders.

A-13. Trousers, Mess Dress, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as used for mess jacket.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—No side pockets, or hip pockets; fob pocket in right front; no loops; no back strap. Cut higher in body than service trousers to come up under dress vest and are to be worn with suspenders. Suspender buttons inside waistband; fly front; plain seams.

A-14. Trousers, Service, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for white service coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, bottom size to be between 18 and 22 inches, inclusive. Trousers shall have two side pockets; two hip pockets; fob pocket on right front. Seven belt loops, 1½-inch clearance inside; suspender buttons inside waistband if desired; no back straps; plain seams; fly front. To be worn with either belt or suspenders.

A-15. Raincoat:

(a) MATERIAL.—Dark blue (blue-black) serge, whipcord, gabardine, or elastique may be used. Fabric used shall be water-repellent and shall weigh not less than twelve ounces, nor more than nineteen ounces, per linear yard.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS:

(1) GENERAL STYLE.—Double-breasted, cut full and loose, drawn in at the waistline by a belt going all around coat and fastening in front with a black, leather-covered, tongueless buckle of nonmagnetic material.

(2) LENGTH.—To be one-third the distance from the kneecap to the ground.

(3) SHOULDERS.—Regular.

(4) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—To be made so that coat may be worn with lapels opened or buttoned up to the throat. Collar to be 3½ inches deep at the back and 4½ inches at notch to correspond with notch of lapels. The outer edge of lapels to be eleven to twelve inches long and top of lapels 4½ inches wide.

(5) POCKETS.—To have two outside welted pockets, welts 1% inches wide; opening about eight inches long; center of opening in the same vertical line with the front seam of armhole, at the height of the hip bone and bottom of opening 1½ inches to the rear of the top; pockets to open through lining. Inside breast pockets are permissible.

(6) BACK.—To have seam back with vent sixteen to twenty inches long, the right side of vent overlapping the left side two inches and made with fly, fastening with three small flat black buttons.

(7) CUFFS.—Sleeves to have tabs 1% inches wide let into hind-arm seam and buttoning over on to the top side of sleeve; two buttonholes in tab, four small buttons on sleeve.

(8) BELT.—To be 2¼ inches wide and pass under four loops placed at side seams and tops of pocket openings. Sliding loop on belt to hold loose end in front.

(9) LINING.—Body either full or skeleton lined with rayon or venetian lining. Sleeves lined with the same material as the body. Where required, a removable flannel lining held in place by slide fasteners may be used.

(10) BUTTONS.—Black vegetable ivory or composition, four-hole, flat buttons, 50-line, to be reinforced by small inside stay buttons. The top button to be located at neck under collar; the second button three inches below breast line; the bottom button on a line with the crotch, and the other two buttons spaced evenly between the second and bottom buttons. Buttons stand to be six inches from front of buttonholes, so that the rows of buttons will be six inches apart (measuring from centers) when the coat is buttoned.

(11) SEAMS.—All seams raised and single stitched three-eighths inch wide.

(12) EDGES.—Edges double stitched threefourths inch wide.

(13) VENTILATION EYELET HOLES.—Four ventilation eyelet holes under each armpit. A-16. Raincape.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-17. Cap Cover, Rain:

(a) MATERIAL.—To be made of waterproofed material, which may be either black or transparent.

(b) DESCRIPTION.—The cover shall fit closely over the cap and cap device. For caps with embroidered visors, there shall be an extension of the cap cover to protect the visor.

A-18. Cocked Hat.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-19. Cap, Blue and White.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-20. Cap Covers.—See Navy Department Specification for "Caps, Combination, Blue and White, and Covers, Officers."

A-21. Sword and Scabbard.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-22. Sword Knot.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-23. Belt, Full Dress.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-24. Belt, Undress.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-25. Epaulets.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-26. Shoulder Marks.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-27. Aiguillettes.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

A-28. Mufflers.—Mufflers shall be of pure white silk or rayon, plain or ribbed, woven or knitted, to be of approximately commercial size.

A-29. Neckwear.—Neckties shall be of plain black woven silk, satin, rayon, or wool.

ANNEX B

CHIEF PETTY OFFICERS

B-1. Coat, Blue:

(a) MATERIALS.—Shall be either dark navy blue cloth, serge, or whipcord.

(b) DESIGN:

(1) GENERAL.—Double-breasted sack coat; four buttons down each forepart; all four buttons to button; seam back; no vent; cut shapely.

(2) LENGTH.—To come 1 inch below crotch of trousers.

(3) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—Peaked lapels to come not more than 1½ inches below breast line and to be about 10½ inches long on outside edge; rolling collar.

(4) POCKETS.—To have three outside pockets one on each hip and one on left breast, all to be made with welts, no flaps. The breast pocket to be horizontal with a 5-inch opening, the welt to be 1 inch deep, and the pockets $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep. The side pockets to be $6\frac{1}{2}$ to 7 inches wide, the welt $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep, and the pockets $7\frac{1}{2}$ to 8 inches deep. One inside breast pocket in the right breast to have a horizontal opening 6 inches wide and $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches deep.

(5) CUFFS.—Closed, without buttons.

(6) LINING.—Full lined with black silk, rayon, mohair, serge, or dark blue flannel. Sleeves lined with rayon or striped cotton.

(7) SEAMS.—Plain.

(8) EDGES.—Single stitched ½ inch wide.

(9) BUTTONS.—Eight Navy standard eagle gilt buttons, 28-line, four on each forepart, 5 inches from the edge. Top button not more than 1½ inches below the breast line. Bottom buttons opposite pocket, other two equally spaced between.

B-2. Coat, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be plain bleached linen duck, union duck, or cotton duck, or Navy standard twill, bleached.

(b) DESIGN:

(1) GENERAL.—Double-breasted, 4-button, unlined sack coat with patch pockets; seam back; no vent.

(2) LENGTH.—To come 1 inch below crotch of trousers.

(3) COLLAR AND LABELS.—Peaked lapels to extend not more than 1½ inches below breast line and to be 10½ inches long on outside edges; rolling collar.

(4) POCKETS.—Three outside patch pockets, one on each hip and one on the left breast; no flaps or buttons; lower pockets to be about 7% inches wide by 7% inches deep. Breast pocket 5 inches wide by 5% inches deep.

(5) CUFFS.—Closed, without buttons.

(6) LINING.—Unlined.

(7) SEAMS.—Turned in and stitched ¼ inch wide.

(8) EDGES.—Single-stitched ¼ inch wide.

(9) BUTTONS.—Eight Navy eagle gilt buttons, 28-line, detachable, shank buttons to pass through eyelet holes and to be held by split rings or bodkin fasteners; top button to be located not more than 1½ inches below the breast line; bottom button opposite pocket, other two buttons spaced equally between; all buttons to be 5 inches from edge.

B-3. Overcoat:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be all wool, dark navy blue (blue-black) cloth of a fast color and with Kersey finish, weighing not less than 22 ounces

or more than 32 ounces per linear yard when 55 inches wide.

(b) DESIGN:

(1) GENERAL.---A double-breasted, easyfitting, winter overcoat with full skirt. Collar shall be cut so that it may be worn open or buttoned to the throat.

(2) LENGTH.—To come one-third distance from kneecap to the ground.

(3) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—To be made with convertible collar and lapels so that it may be worn buttoned to throat if desired. Collar to be 4½ inches wide at center of back. The top of lapel to be as wide as the end of collar (about 4½ inches), the two to lie close together. Lapel to extend 3 inches below breast line, making length about 11 inches on outer edge. Collar to be fitted with a tab to button across throat when collar is turned up. Tab to button with two medium-size buttons.

(4) POCKETS.—Two outside welted pockets (welts 1% inches wide) opening about 7% inches long. Center of opening on the same vertical line with the front seam of armhole at the height of the hip bone and bottom of opening 2 inches to the rear of the top. Pockets to open through lining. One inside breast pocket on left side.

(5) BACK.—The overcoat shall be made easyfitting in the back. Vent in center 16 to 25 inches long, the right side of the vent overlapping the left side 2 inches and made with a fly fastened with three medium-size, black buttons.

(6) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.—Cuffs closed without buttons.

(7) LINING.—Lined throughout with black cotton, silk, or rayon material; lining stitched down on facing.

(8) BUTTONS.—To have two rows of 50-line navy standard black anchor buttons, securely sewed with points of anchors down; rows to be about 6 inches apart when coat is buttoned, five buttons in each row; top button shall be at neck under collar, second button 3 inches below breast line, bottom button to be at height of crotch, and the four lower buttons to be equally spaced. (9) BUTTONHOLES.—Top buttonhole 1½ inches from tip to lapel, lower buttonhole level with crotch, all spaced to correspond with buttons. Buttonholes to be ½ inch from edge; to have separate bar tack.

(10) SEAMS.—Plain; pressed open.

(11) EDGES.—Single stitched, ½ inch wide.

(12) HANGER.—Hanger 2½ inches long, stayed with tape and sewed through stand of collar.

B-4. Raincoats:

TYPE I.—See Navy Department Specification for "Raincoats, Enlisted Men's."

TYPE II.

(a) MATERIAL.—Serge or whipcord, waterrepellent, dark blue (blue-black). Authorized variations, not lighter than 12-ounce; not heavier than 16-ounce.

(b) DESIGN:

(1) GENERAL.—Double-breasted, cut full and loose, having convertible collar and lapels so it may be worn buttoned to the throat if desired.

(2) LENGTH.—To be one-third the distance from the kneecap to the ground.

(3) SHOULDERS.—Raglan.

(4) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—Collar to be 3½ inches deep at the back and 4½ inches at the notch, to correspond with notch of lapels; outer edge of lapels to be 11 to 12 inches long, top of lapels to be 4½ inches wide.

(5) POCKETS.—To have two outside welted pockets, welts 1% inches wide; opening about 8 inches long; center of opening in the same vertical line with the front seam of armhole, at the height of the hip bone, and bottom of opening 1% inches to the rear of the top of the pocket; pockets to open through the lining. Inside breast pockets are permissible.

(6) BACK.—To have a seam back with a vent 16 to 20 inches long, the right side of the vent overlapping the left side 2 inches, and made with fly fastening with one small, black button.

(7) CUFFS.—To be plain.

(8) BELT.—A half belt 2½ inches wide placed in back extending from side seam to side seam; the lower edge of the belt on a line with the top of pocket openings.

(9) LINING.—Lined throughout with black cotton, silk, or rayon material; lining stitched down on facing.

(10) BUTTONS.—Black bone or com posiion 4-hole flat buttons, 50-line, to be reinforced by small inside stay buttons. Two buttons to be located at the neck under collar; second button 3 inches below the breast line; the bottom button on a line with the crotch, and the other two buttons spaced evenly, between. Button stand to be 6 inches from front of buttonhole, so that the rows of buttons will be 6 inches apart (measuring from centers) when the coat is buttoned.

(11) SEAMS.—All seams at the edges of the coat, collar, belt, and pockets shall be double-stitched % inch wide.

(12) VENTILATION EYELETS.—Four ventilation eyclet holes under each armpit.

B-5. Cover, Cap, Rain:

(a) MATERIAL.—The material shall be waterproofed and be either black or transparent.

(b) DESIGN.—The cap cover shall be designed to fit snugly over the cap.

B-6. Waistcoat, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for blue service coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Singlebreasted; no collar; opening to 4 inches below collar button; four outside welt pockets; one inside breast pocket. Six 22½-line Navy standard eagle gilt buttons. Edges to correspond with coat.

B-7. Trousers, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for the blue service coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, bottom of trouser legs to be between 18 and 22 inches in circumference; two side pockets; two hip pockets; fob pocket on right front; seven belt loops, 1½ inches clearance inside; suspender buttons inside waistband; no back strap; plain seams; fly front; to be worn with either belt or suspenders.

B-8. Trousers, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be the same as for white service coat.

(b) GARMENT SPECIFICATIONS.—Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, bottom of trouser legs to be between 18 and 22 inches in circumference; two side pockets; two hip pockets; fob pocket in right front; seven belt loops, 1½-inch clearance inside; suspender buttons inside waistband if desired; no back strap; plain seams; fly front; to be worn with either belt or suspenders.

B-9. Necktie:

(a) MATERIAL.—The necktie shall be made of plain black woven silk, satin, rayon, or wool.

(b) STYLE.—The necktie shall be four-in-hand.

B-10. Caps, Blue and White, and Covers for Same.—See Navy Department Specification for "Caps, Combination, Blue and White, and Covers."

B-11. Shirt, Flannel.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

To this a loop of braided cotton cord, 2½ to 3 inches long, shall be fastened, and the long loop shall be provided with an eight-strand braided slide. Norg.—The knife lanyard is not an article of uniform. On working dress, or when engaged in work requiring use of a knife, the lanyard may be worn around the waist or around the neck as most convenient.

BANDSMEN

D-1. Coat, Full-Dress:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be of dark-blue broadcloth, or Kersey finish, Navy standard, 16ounce.

(b) DESIGN:

(1) GENERAL.—This garment shall be single breasted of cloth, Navy standard, dark blue, 16-ounce; shall have three rows of United States Navy eagle gilt buttons, 35-line; shall be close fitting, medium skirt, reaching 12 to 14 inches below the waistline; front shall be straight buttoned to the neck; standing collar shall be 1½ to 2 inches in height, fastened at the neck with heavy metal black hooks and eyes at base and top.

(2) GARMENT SPECIFICATION.—Shall be a single dress coat; shall be form fitting similar to the back of Navy frock coat.

(3) FRONT AND BOTTOM.—Shall be straight, square cornered; shall be piped in yellow cloth, 12-ounce, all around up to the waistline in the back; shall have six frogs, yellow silk, or rayon, on each forepart.

(4) BUTTONS.—Shall have three rows of Navy eagle gilt buttons, 35-line, six on each row in front, and two Navy eagle gilt buttons, 35-line, at the back of skirt.

(5) COLLAR.—Shall be standing, of scarlet cloth, 16-ounce, piped in yellow cloth, 12ounce, and shall be 1½ to 2 inches high.

(6) COLLAR DEVICE.—Shall consist of two thin parallel gilt bars bearing, in gilt, letters "U. S. N." so arranged thereon that the top of the letters shall rest on the upper bar and the bottom of the letters and periods upon the lower bar. Letters to be % inch high. Devices to be in pairs (left and right) fitted with hinged pin and catch of brass soldered to the back of device.

(7) FROGS.—Shall consist of a set of six graduated double loops ranging in size from about 14½ inches for the longest to 9½ inches for the shortest; loops shall be made of ¾-inch basket-weave tubular braid, sewed together so as to form a braid ¾ inch wide with a double turn over the braid at the center of each loop; each end of the loop shall be spaced for a 35line button to pass through it, and shall be open; at the other end there shall be two loops 2¾ inches long and 1¼ inches wide over all; material shall be gold-color silk or rayon.

(8) LENGTH.—Length of the coat shall be 12 to 14 inches below the waistline.

(9) POCKETS.—Shall have one inside breast pocket on the left forepart with vertical opening.

(10) SLEEVES AND CUFFS.—Sleeves shall be closed with three buttons, Navy, eagle, 22½line, on each sleeve. Cuffs shall be of scarlet cloth, 16-ounce, military style; shall be 4 inches at the side, rising on center of sleeve, in a slight curve to a peak 6½ inches high.

(11) SLEEVE DEVICE.—Shall be musician's lyre surcharged on an anchor; height of the anchor shall be 3½ inches and the flukes shall be 2 inches apart; the width of the lyre shall be 1½ inches at the top and bottom; shall be of gold color, silk or rayon, and shall be mounted on cloth, blue, dark, Navy standard, 16-ounce.

D-2. Trousers, Full-Dress:

(a) MATERIAL.—Trousers shall be made of the same material as the coat.

(b) DESIGN:

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(1) GENERAL.—The trousers shall be of conventional style, and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice, circumference of bottom of trouser legs shall be between 18 and 22 inches. They shall have a stripe of scarlet cloth 1 inch wide, piped with yellow cloth, covering the outside seam of each leg.

(2) POCKETS.—The trousers shall have two side pockets and a fob pocket in right front.

(3) BELT LOOPS.—There shall be seven belt loops with 1%-inch clearance inside of loop.

(4) BUTTONS.—There shall be suspender buttons properly spaced inside waistband and buttons properly spaced on fly.

(5) SEAMS.—All seams shall be plain.

(6) FRONT.—The trousers shall have fly front fastened with buttons.

(7) BACK.—The back shall be plain without strap.

D-3. Cap, Full-Dress:

DESCRIPTION.—The frame shall be stiff, standing and flaring through its circumference to give the outer edges of the cover a rolled or rounded effect, rather than one having a thin edge; in general the measurements, with the cover on, should be as follows:

(1) CROWN.—Length of crown 10½ inches, width 10 inches, height in rear from bottom of frame 2½ inches, in front from visor to top 3% inches, width between buttons across front 11½ inches. Hat to be fitted with a grommet of whalebone or nonrustable, nonmagnetic material about ½ inch wide, sewed into the binding at the top.

(2) BAND.—Shall be of scarlet cloth, 16ounce, 2 inches high, and trimmed with yellow soutache %-inch wide, the upper trimming to be close to the cover and the lower trimming to be %-inch from bottom edge of cap. A %-inch stripe of yellow gold silk lace shall be circumscribed in the center of the band except for a space in the front of approximately 2% inches.

(3) BUTTONS.—Shall have a brass-threaded

socket into which shall be secured a Navy standard 22%-line gilt button.

(4) CHIN STRAP.—Shall be of black patent leather $\frac{1}{16}$ inch wide.

(5) COVER.—Shall be of cloth, Navy standard, blue, dark, 16-ounce, and to have four metal eyelets set into the cover, two on each side of cap, 1% inches apart and to be % inch from top of rim. Inside of cover shall be lined with black sateen or venetian and shall have a diamond-shaped piece of isinglass or oiled silk material; length of points to be 6% inches, width 4% inches.

(6) FRAME.—The frame shall be made of a band of woven cane 2¼ inches high with a stiffened front approximately 2½ inches wide and 2 inches high secured to the top of the cane band and to the grommet. There shall be two holes in the frame where the ends of the visor join the same; center of eyelet to be ½ inch from welt and to be fitted with brass-threaded sockets into which shall be secured a 22½-line button with a lyre design for holding chin strap and cloth band. Caps shall have a sweatband 1½ inches wide.

(7) VISOR.—The visor shall be of leather, molded to shape and covered with a polished black material, dark green leather underneath and bound with black patent leather or polished black material $\frac{1}{16}$ inch wide.

(8) CAP DEVICE.—Shall consist of a yellow gold silk embroidered lyre surcharged on an anchor and similar to that used on the sleeve of Navy bandsman's dress coat, except that the height of the anchor shall be approximately 2% inches, width between flukes 1% inches, and lyre made in proportion.

D-4. Belt, Full-Dress:

MATERIAL.—This belt shall be of white leather with polished surface, or of synthetic materials of same appearance. This belt shall be approximately 1½ inches wide and shall be fastened with waist plate ornamented with spread eagle.

ANNEX E

OFFICERS' COOKS AND STEWARDS

E-1. Coat, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Same as coat, blue, for chief petty officers.

(b) DESIGN.—Same as for coat, blue, for chief petty officers, except that Navy standard black anchor buttons shall be substituted for gilt buttons.

E-2. Coat, White:

(a) MATERIAL. Same as coat, white, for chief petty officers.

(b) DESIGN.—Same as for coat, white, for chief petty officers, except that white anchor buttons shall be substituted for gilt buttons.

E-3. Overcoat.—The overcoat shall be of the same material and design as prescribed for chief petty officers.

E-4. Raincoat.—Types I and II: Raincoats shall be of the same material and design as prescribed for chief petty officers.

E-5. Cover, Cap, Rain.—This article shall be the same as prescribed for chief petty officers.

E-6. Waistcoat, Blue:

(a) MATERIAL.—Same as waistcoat, blue, for chief petty officers.

(b) DESIGN.—Same as for waistcoat, blue, for chief petty officers, except that black rubber anchor buttons shall be substituted for gilt buttons.

E-7. Trousers, Blue.—These trousers shall be of the same material and design as prescribed for chief petty officers. E-8. Trousers, White.—These trousers shall be of the same material and design as prescribed for chief potty officers.

E-9. Neckwear:

(a) MATERIAL.—The necktie shall be made of black woven silk, satin, rayon, or wool.

(b) STYLE.—The necktie shall be a bow from 32 to 36 inches long and from ½ to 1½ inches wide, of uniform width; to be tied in a double bow knot.

E-10. Cap, Combination, Blue or White.— This cap shall be the same as prescribed for chief petty officers, except that black buttons shall be substituted for gilt, and the cap device shall consist of two small, thin, parallel gilt bars bearing the letters "U. S. N.," so arranged thereon that the top of the letters shall rest upon the upper bar and the bottom of the letters and periods upon the lower bar.

E-11. Shirt, White:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shirts shall be made of plain white linen or cotton material without stripes, figures, or plaits of any kind.

(b) STYLE.—Shirt shall be of neckband style or with collor attached, of conventional cut, and shall have plain white buttons and plain white cuffs.

E-12. Collars:

(a) MATERIAL.—Collars shall be made from plain white material.

(b) STYLE.—The collar shall be white, stiff, and turned-down.

ANNEX F

AVIATION UNIFORMS

AVIATION WINTER WORKING UNIFORM (OFFICERS)

F-1. Coat, Aviation Winter Working (Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—To be of gabardine, elastique, serge, or whipcord.

(b) COLOR.—Winter uniform to be of forestry green.

(c) STYLE OF COAT:

(1) FRONT.-To be a single-breasted, threebutton coat; roll collar and notched lapel; to have four outside pockets, upper pockets sewed flat to coat, lower pockets to be of the bellows style. Each pocket to have a flap. Coat to be lined with a green material. The coat to extend to the crotch, or a little below, according to the height of the wearer, and to be cut to fit the figure easily. Around the waist to be a belt two inches in width of the same material as the coat, to be sewed down all around. The bottom coat button to be in the middle of the belt; the three front buttons spaced approximately 3% inches apart. All seams to be plain, and the edges of the coat front, collar, belt, pockets, flaps, and shoulder straps to have one row of stitching % inch from the edge. The back seam to be an open vent below the belt.

(2) BACK.—To have a bellows plait from outer edge of each shoulder seam to the belt, following the line of each side seam. This is to allow ease in any position of the arms.

(3) SHOULDER STRAPS.—To have one strap on each shoulder lined with green, sewed in at the shoulder seams only, extending to the base of the collar, and to be $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches at the shoulder seam, tapering to $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches at a point 1 inch from the collar end, the collar end to be pointed and attached to the coat through a buttonhole by a small bronze Navy button attached to the coat.

(4) POCKETS.—To have the inside breast pockets placed in any desired position.

(5) UPPER POCKETS.—The two outside top pockets, one on each breast, to be sewed flat to the coat and to be 5½ inches at the top and 6¼ inches at the bottom and 7 inches in height; lower corners to be rounded; the top of the pockets to be placed on a line approximately 1½ inches above the top coat button.

(6) LOWER POCKETS.—To be of the bellows style, with rounded lower corners, extending from 1 inch below the belt to 1 inch above the bottom of the coat, width at the top 9½ inches and at the bottom 12½ inches.

(7) FLAPS.—The outside pockets to have flaps of the same material stitched just above the pocket opening and to be three-pointed with a vertical buttonhole in the center point to accommodate a button sewed to the pocket, the top flaps to be 2½ inches deep; the tops of the flaps of the bottom pockets to be sewed under the lower edge of the belt and to be 3½ inches deep.

(8) BUTTONS.—To be of the standard Navy design in bronze metal; the three front buttons to be 35-line; the buttons for the shoulder straps and pocket flaps to be 22½-line.

(9) INSIGNIA OF RANK.—Stars to be embroidered in black silk. Rank to be designated in black mohair braid.

F-2. Trousers, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—To be of the same material as coat, winter working (officers).

(b) STYLE.—Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice. The circumference of bottom of trouser legs shall be between 18 and 22 inches.

F-3. Cap, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Officers):

DESIGN.—The cap shall be the same as the cap prescribed for use with officers' blue service uniform except that it shall have a cloth top made of the same material as that used in the uniform.

F-4. Cap, Garrison:

(a) MATERIAL.—The cap, garrison, shall be made of material of the same color and texture as that in coat and trousers, and shall be fitted with a sweatband 1% inches in width and made of leather in cap for winter use and of cotton khaki material in cap for summer use.

(b) DESIGN.—To be a soft folding cap made of suiting of adopted standard of the same color and material as the working uniform being worn. Top to curve from front to rear with no points at the ends or top. Back of cap to slant upward and forward. Height in front, 3 inches; in center, 4% inches; in rear, 4 inches. To have an apron upturn from bottom 31/ inches in width at rear, slanting to 2½ inches at front. Apron on left side to overlap apron on right side with a triangular effect, slanting from top of apron in front to a point at bottom on right side approximately 4 inches from front edge. Top of cap to be formed by a gusset oval in shape, 4 inches in width at center, tapering to points at the ends. On the inside of the cap the gusset to be stitched together about % inch from the joining seam to cap so that when cap is worn the spread at the top will be approximately 1½ inches at the center. Stitching at top of cap where gusset joins the cap to be % inch. Apron to have a double row of stitching around top edge % inch apart.

F-5. Khaki Shirt, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—The shirt shall be made from cotton or flannel material of khaki color. (b) STYLE.—The shirt shall have collar attached.

F-6. Tie, Black Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—The tie shall be of silk, rayon, worsted, or woolen material dyed a fast black.

(b) STYLE.—The tie shall be a four-in-hand.

F-7. Shoes, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—Shoes shall be of plain brown leather.

(b) STYLE.—Shoes shall be plain and either high or low.

F-8. Overcoat, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—The overcoat shall be made from light tan, water-repellent, worsted gabardine.

(b) GARMENT DESCRIPTION:

(1) GENERAL.—The overcoat shall be doublebreasted, loose cut, medium length, drawn in at the waist by an all-around belt which fastens in front with a brown, leather-covered, tongueless buckle of nonmagnetic material. It shall have regular shoulders and convertible collar capable of being worn open or buttoned to the throat.

(2) LENGTH.—This coat shall be of such length to reach one-quarter the distance from kneecap to ground.

(3) COLLAR AND LAPELS.—Collar to be made so that the coat may be worn with lapels opened or buttoned up to the throat. Collar to be 3½ inches deep at the back and 5 inches at notch. The outer edge of lapels to be 11 to 12 inches long with a 1½-inch notch opening between points. Top of lapels to be 5 inches wide. Edge of collar, lapel, and coat front to be doublestitched ¾ inch wide. Under side of collar shall be faced with collar cloth of a blending color.

(4) SHOULDER STRAPS.—On each shoulder, attached at the shoulder seams only, there shall be a strap made of same material used in coat and extending from the shoulder seam to the base of the collar. These straps shall be 2½ inches wide at the shoulder seam, tapering to 1½ inches at a point 1 inch from the inner end. The inner end of the strap shall be attached to the coat with a small flat round button attached to the coat.

(5) FRONT.—The front of overcoat shall have two rows of buttons, four buttons in each row, and shall have a storm flap placed over right breast to cover edge of lapel to prevent rain from entering under lapel when top button is closed.

(6) BUTTONS.—Buttons on front of overcoat shall be 50-line, flat, four-hole, light tan in color, made from bone or composition. These buttons shall be reenforced by small inside stay buttons and shall be located as follows:

- (a) Top button to be at the neck under the collar.
 - (b) Second button to be 5 inches below the breast line.
 - (c) Third button to be centered between second and bottom button.
 - (d) Bottom button to be on a line with the crotch.

Buttons stand to be 6 inches from front of buttonhole, so that rows of buttons will be 6 inches apart (measuring from centers) when coat is buttoned.

(7) POCKETS.—There shall be two outside welted pockets (welts shall be 1% inches wide) opening about 8 inches long. The center of pocket opening should be in same vertical line with front seam of armhole at height of the hip bone and to be open through lining. The pocket opening shall be oblique. The bottom of the opening to be $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches to the rear of the top. There shall be inside pockets of conventional size on right and left breast.

(8) CUFFS.—Sleeves shall have tabs 1% inches wide secured in the front arm seam and buttoning around the outer side of the sleeve. There shall be two buttonholes in the tab and four small light tan buttons on the sleeve, on which to button tab.

(9) BELT.—The belt shall be 2¼ inches wide and shall pass under loops located at side scams and tops of pocket openings. The loops at top of pocket shall be extensions of pocket welt. The belt shall be stitched in a manner to form six raised welts along its length and shall have two sliding loops on belt to hold loose end in front.

(10) BACK.—The overcoat shall have a seamed back with vent 16 to 20 inches long. The right side of vent shall overlap the left side 2 inches, making a fly effect, and there shall be three small flat tan buttons to fasten vent.

(11) SEAMS.—All seams shall be raised and stitched % inch wide.

(12) EDGES.—Edges shall be ¾ inch wide.

(13) LINING:

(a) The body shall be skeleton lined with brown rayon yoke, and sleeves shall be lined with same material.

(b) There shall be a detachable 18-ounce tan flannel lining with sleeves. This lining shall be attached to coat by means of single slide fastener running up lines of buttons and around collar. This lining shall have slits for outside pocket openings, and shall be 2 inches shorter than coat, with vent to match that in back of coat.

AVIATION WINTER WORKING UNIFORM (CHIEF PETTY OFFICERS)

F-20. Coat, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Chief Petty Officers Designated as Aviation Pilots):

(a) MATERIAL.—The coat shall be made of 16-ounce Kersey of forestry green color.

(b) STYLE.—The coat shall be of the same style and design as that prescribed for coat, aviation winter working uniform (officers), except that in lieu of stripes and corps device this uniform shall have rating badge made on khaki background applied to sleeve as prescribed for chief petty officers.

F-21. Trousers, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Chief Petty Officers Designated as Aviation Pilots):

(a) MATERIAL.—The trousers shall be made of same material as prescribed for coat of this uniform. (b) STYLE.—The trousers shall be of the same design as those prescribed for the trousers, aviation winter working uniform (officers).

F-22. Cap, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Chief Petty Officers Designated as Aviation Pilots):

DESIGN.—The cap shall be the same as the cap prescribed for chief petty officers' blue cap, except that it shall have a cloth top made of the same material as that used in the uniform.

F-23. Cap, Garrison.—The cap, garrison, shall be of the same material and design as prescribed for officers.

F-24. Shirt, Khaki, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Chief Petty Officers Designated as Aviation Pilots).—This garment shall be the same as that prescribed for shirt, khaki, aviation winter working uniform (officers).

F-25. Tie, Black, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Chief Petty Officers Designated as Aviation Pilots).—This article shall be the same as that prescribed for tie, black, aviation winter working uniform (officers).

F-26. Shoes, Aviation Winter Working Uniform (Chief Petty Officers Designated as Aviation Pilots).—Shoes shall be the same as those prescribed for shoes, aviation winter working uniform (officers).

AVIATION SUMMER WORKING UNIFORM

F-40. Coat, Aviation Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant, and Chief Petty Officers):

(a) MATERIAL.—The coat shall be made of a fast-dyed cotton khaki material.

(b) STYLE.—This garment shall be of the same style and design as that prescribed for working uniform for all commissioned officers, warrant and chief petty officers. Chief petty officers shall wear rating badges with khaki background.

F-41. Trousers, Aviation Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant, and Chief Petty Officers): (a) MATERIAL.—The trousers shall be made of the same material prescribed for coat, aviation summer working uniform (for commissioned, warrant, and chief petty officers).
(b) DESIGN.—These trousers shall be of the same design as those prescribed for trousers, aviation winter working uniform (chief petty officers).

F-42. Cap, Aviation Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant and Chief Petty Officers).—The cap shall be of same design and material as that prescribed for cap, winter working uniform (chief petty officers designated as naval aviators), except that it shall have cover made of a fast-dyed cotton khaki material.

F-43. Shirt, Khaki, Aviation Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant and Chief Petty Officers).—The shirt shall be the same as that prescribed for shirt, khaki, aviation winter working uniform (for commissioned and warrant officers).

F-44. Tie, Black, Aviation Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant and Chief Petty Officers).—This article shall be the same as that prescribed for tie, black, aviation winter working uniform (officers).

F-45. Shoes, Aviation Summer Working Uniform (for Commissioned, Warrant and Chief Petty Officers).—Shoes shall be the same as those prescribed for shoes, aviation winter working uniform (officers).

SPECIAL AERONAUTICAL WINTER CLOTHING

F-60. Jacket, Special Aeronautical Winter Clothing:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shall be a khaki-colored, double-texture fabric composed of an outer surface cloth and an inner lining cloth, combined and held together by a middle layer of rubber compound. The assembled fabric shall be heat vulcanized. (b) DESIGN.—Shall be a slip-over, raglan sleeve type with hood; front opening closed with an automatic fastener; bottom hemmed to form a channel for drawstring. Hood shall be lined with flannel, fitted with a drawstring and snap fastener at the neck. There shall be a patch pocket with flap over left breast and fitted with a snap fastener. Sleeves shall be fitted with snap fasteners for adjustment. All seams of jacket shall be covered on the inside with tape cemented over the stitches.

F-61. Trousers—Special Aeronautical Winter Clothing:

(a) MATERIAL.—The material in trousers shall be the same as that in jacket—special aeronautical winter clothing.

(b) DESIGN.—Shall be without front opening, with waist hemmed to form a channel for drawstring. Bottom of legs shall be fitted with

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snap fasteners for adjustment. All seams shall be covered on the inside with tape cemented over the stitches.

F-62. Arctics—Special Aeronautical Winter Clothing:

(a) MATERIAL.—Black cashmerette outer fabric and lining of gray fleece both coated with rubber compound and comented together. Cotton Osnaberg and sheeting shall be frictioned and coated with rubber compound and used in essential parts and as reinforcements for arctics. Outsole to consist of molded rubber.

(b) DESIGN.—An arctic of conventional style properly vulcanized. Fifteen inches high in front with six adjustable buckles. Outsole shall have a design of zigzag lands so designed that pressure in any direction causes these lands to fold and grip the surface. Sizes shall range in full sizes from 7 to 11.

WORKING UNIFORMS

WORKING UNIFORM (COMMISSIONED OFFI-CERS, WARRANT AND CHIEF PETTY OFFICERS)

H-1. Coat, Working Uniform:

(a) MATERIAL.—Coats shall be made from fast dyed, cotton khaki material.

(b) Design:

(1) STYLE.—To be a single-breasted, threebutton coat, roll collar and notched lapel; to have four outside pockets, upper pockets sewed flat to coat, lower pockets to be of bellows style, each pocket to have a flap. The coat to extend to the crotch, or a little below, according to the height of the wearer, and to be cut to fit the figure easily. Around the waist to be a belt 2 inches in width of the same material as the coat. to be sewed down all around. The bottom coat button to be in the middle of the belt, the three front buttons spaced approximately 3% inches apart. All seams to be plain and the edges of the coat front, collar, belt, pockets, and flaps to have one row of stitching % inch from the edge. The back seam to have an open vent below the belt.

(2) BACK.—To be plain, easy-fitting, to allow ease in any position of the arms. The use of a bellows plait in the side seams of back is optional.

(3) SHOULDER LOOPS.—To have two loops on each shoulder of the same material as the coat, for attaching shoulder marks for Commissioned, and Warrant Officers.

(4) INSIDE POCKETS.—To have inside breast pockets, one on each side.

(5) UPPER POCKETS.—The two outside top pockets, one on each breast, to be sewed flat to the coat and to be 5½ inches at the top and 6¼ inches at the bottom and 7 inches in height; lower corners to be rounded. The top of the pockets to be placed on a line approximately 1¼ inches above the top coat button. (6) LOWER POCKETS.—To be of the bellows style, with rounded lower corners, extending from 1 inch below the belt to 1 inch above the bottom of the coat; width at top, 9½ inches, and at the bottom, 12½ inches.

(7) POCKET FLAPS.—The outside pockets to have flaps of the same material stitched just above the pocket opening and to be threepointed with a vertical buttonhole in the center point to accommodate a button sewed to the pocket, the top flaps to be 2½ inches deep; tops of the flaps of the bottom pockets to be sewed under the lower edge of the belt and to be 3½ inches deep.

(8) BUTTONS.—To be of standard Navy design in gilt buttons, the three front buttons to be 35-line for officers and 28-line for chief petty officers; the buttons for pocket flaps to be 22½line.

(9) INSIGNIA OF RANK.—Officers shall wear shoulder marks, and Chief Petty Officers shall wear rating badges with khaki background.

H-2. Trousers, Working Uniform:

(a) MATERIAL.—Trousers shall be made of the same material as prescribed for coats, working uniform.

(b) DESIGN.—Trousers shall be of plain design and cut in accordance with prevailing tailoring practice. The bottoms of trouser legs shall be between 18 and 22 inches in circumference.

H-3. Cap, Working Uniform:

(a) MATERIAL.—The cap cover shall be fastdyed, cotton khaki material.

(b) DESIGN.—The cap shall be of the same design and construction as that prescribed for Officers and Chief Petty Officers.

H-4. Shirt, Khaki, Working Uniform:

(a) MATERIAL.—The shirt shall be made of fast-dyed, cotton khaki material.

(b) DESIGN.—The design shall be conventional with collar attached.

H-5. Tie, Black, Working Uniform:

(a) MATERIAL.—The tie shall be made from silk, rayon, woolen or worsted material, dyed a fast black.

(b) STYLE.—The tie shall be a four-in-hand.

H-6. Metal Pin-on Devices (Khaki Shirt):

(a) MATERIAL.—Pin-on devices shall be made of silvered white metal or gold-plated on copper base, fitted to fasten with brooch pin. Rolled gold and sterling silver devices are optional.

(b) DESIGN:

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(1) ADMIRAL.—Four silver five-pointed stars of a size to be inscribed in a %-mch circle. These stars shall be arranged in a straight line and fastened together. The surface of stars shall be plain, raised, and rounded. When this device is in a horizontal position, one point of each star shall point upward and at right angles to a line drawn through the center of the stars.

(2) VICE ADMIRAL.—Three silver five-pointed stars of a size to be inscribed in a %-inch circle. These stars shall be arranged in a straight line and fastened together. The surface of stars shall be plain, raised, and rounded. When this device is in a horizontal position, one point of each star shall point upward and at right angles to a line drawn through the center of the stars.

(3) REAR ADMIRAL.—Two silver five-pointed stars, of a size to be inscribed in a %-inch circle. These stars shall be arranged in a straight line and fastened together. The surface of stars shall be plain, raised, and rounded. When this device is in a horizontal position, one point of each star shall point upward and at right angles to a line drawn through the center of the stars.

(4) CAPTAIN.—Silver spread eagle, eagle's head to face to the front; width across wings approximately ³% inch; height, approximately ¹% inch. These devices shall be made in rights and lefts.

(5) COMMANDER.—Same as for lieutenant commander except leaf shall be silver.

(6) LIEUTENANT COMMANDER.—Gold oak leaf, made in rights and lefts; from end of stem to tip approximately 2[%]/₂ inch; width % inch. These devices shall be plain, raised and veined.

(7) LIEUTENANT.—Two silver bars, each approximately $2\%_1$ inch by % inch, to be set % inch apart and joined by small wire at each end. The bars shall be plain and flat.

(8) LIEUTENANT (JUNIOR GRADE).—Same as for ensign except bar shall be of silver.

(9) ENSIGN.—One gold bar, approximately 2%2 inch by ¼ inch. The bar shall be plain and flat.

(10) Staff corps devices shall be of gold, approximately five-eighths the size of those prescribed for use in marking sleeves of blue service uniform, and shall be "lefts" in cases where devices are made in "rights" and "lefts." These devices so far as practicable shall be smooth and plain and shall not simulate embroidery.

(11) Chief warrant and warrant officers' devices shall be of the same design and approximately five-eighths the size of those prescribed for use in marking sleeves of the blue service uniform, and shall be made in rights and lefts. The devices for chief warrant officers shall be of silver, silver plate, or white metal and for warrant officers shall be of rolled gold, gold plate or gilt.

H-7. Shoes, Working Uniform:

(a) MATERIAL.—Shoes shall be of black or brown leather.

(b) STYLE.—Shoes shall be plain and either high or low.

H-8. Jumper, Dungaree, Working Uniform.— See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

H-9. Trousers, Dungaree, Working Uniform.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

H-10. Shirt, Blue Chambray, Working Uniform.—See Navy Department Specification covering this item.

H-11. Shoes, Black, Working Uniform— Enlisted Men.—Enlisted ratings shall wear plain black shoes.

The anchor to have superimposed thereon, and integral with it, an oak leaf and acorn with the letters "N. N. C." raised 0.020 inch above the surface of the leaf. The leaf shall be $\frac{1}{16}$ inch long and $\frac{9}{16}$ inch at its widest part. The letters "N. N. C." shall be % inch in height. The cable around the anchor shall be made of two strands of wire 0.022 diameter and having 22 twists to the inch. Device to be fitted with nickel-silver joint, pin-tongued and ball-type safety catch. All connections to be hard soldered, joint of pin tongue to be riveted.

(1) METAL.—All metal used for anchor, chain, and leaf to be brass.

(2) PLATING.—To be plated with three pennyweight of fine gold per dozen pair.

(3) FINISH.—Anchor and chain, bright gold, leaf and acorn, rose gold; letters, "N. N. C.," bright silver.

L-4. Shoes.—White shoes shall be plain oxfords and shall be made of canvas, suede, or kid. Heels shall be of medium height and fitted with rubber; soles medium.

L-5. Hat, Navy Nurse Corps.—See Navy Department Specification for "Caps, Hats, and Hat Covers, Navy Nurse Corps."

L-6. Sweater, Nurses.—See Federal Specification for "Sweaters, wool, Knitted," and requirements therein under Section H, pertaining to type and color requirements for Navy purchases.

1. The Uniform Regulations, United States Navy, 1941, are hereby made to apply to Coast Guard personnel in relationship to the Coast Guard as they apply in the Navy, subject to such modifications as may be promulgated from time to time in order to adapt them to the needs of the Coast Guard.

2. These regulations supersede Uniform Regulations, U. S. Coast Guard, 1930.

CHANGES TO UNIFORM REGULATIONS, UNITED STATES NAVY, 1941, FOR COAST GUARD

Change No. 1

Art. 1-25. Add new article.

1-25. The uniforms for the Coast Guard Band shall be prescribed in the Regulations for the Coast Guard Academy.

Art. 2-82. Strike out and substitute the following:

2-82. Sleeve Markings (Corps Device). -- In addition to the insignia of rank indicated by the above-mentioned gold stripes commissioned officers, except chief warrant officers, shall wear 1 inch above the upper stripe a corps device consisting of a gold (yellow silk) embroidered shield one inch in length, set midway between the seams. The shield shall be of the same material as the stripes.

Art. 2-86. (d) Strike out and substitute the following:

2-86. (d) The cap device for all commissioned officers shall be embroidered in high relief on mohair band and backing combined, so placed that the center of the shank of the anchor shall be 5/8 inch below the top of the mohair band. The device to consist of a gold embroidered spread eagle face to right, when cap is worm, with wings extended, showing separated feathers, tips of wings 2 3/4 inches apart and on a line 3/8 inch higher than the head of the eagle. On the breast of the eagle there shall be a shield embroidered in silver, 7/8 inch in height, with point touching upon edge of the shank of the anchor, the talons of the eagle to grasp the shank of a silver embroidered foul anchor with gilt cable, $1 \ 7/8$ inches long over all; from top of head of eagle to shank of anchor, $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches. A cap device of solid metal is optional.

Art. 2-100. (a) Strike out and substitute the following:

2-100. -- Buttons:

(a) Coast Guard gilt buttons shall be convex, of standard pattern and of four sizes. The outer rim shall be plain and smooth burnished, with an inner rim.of rope design; in the center a perpendicular foul anchor with wooden stock, the crown and flukes resting between a laurel and oak wreath, 13 leaves on each side, and perched upon the anchor stock, with a claw on each side, an eagle rising, facing center. Buttons shall be of the following sizes: 40-line (1 inch), 35-line (7/8 inch), 28-line (7/10 inch), and $22\frac{1}{2}$ -line (9/16 inch). Thickness of the $22\frac{1}{2}$ and 28-line buttons shall be $\frac{1}{4}$ inch and that of the 35 and 40-line buttons 3/8 inch, with 1/32 inch tolerance either way.

Art. 3-41. (a) Strike out and substitute the following:

3-41. -- Sleeve Markings (Corps Devices):

(a) In addition to the insignia of rank indicated by the abovementioned stripes, warrant officers shall wear a shield one inch in length, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the stripe; and $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the shield, the following insignia (known as corps devices), the latter to be of a size to be inscribed in a circle $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter, except as otherwise specified. The shield and corps devices shall be made of gold embroidery or of yellow silk lace of approved shade and pattern, the stripes, shield, and corps device to be of the same material.

Art. 3-43. (b) Strike out and substitute the following:

3-43. (b) The cap for warrant officers shall be the same as for chief warrant officers except the chin strap shall be $\frac{1}{4}$ inch in width, and the cap device shall consist of two crossed embroidered gold foul anchors, each $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches long, crossed on center of shanks, with a silver shield, 3/4 inch in height, placed upright upon the crossing of the anchors. A cap device made of solid metal is optional.

Art. 5-45. Add new article.

5-45. Men who, on 31 October, 1941, were authorized to wear the surfman uniform shall provide themselves and wear the articles of uniform as shown in the third column of the table in Article 5-53, with the option, if they so desire, of providing themselves and wearing, in lieu of the articles prescribed in Articles 5-30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 38, 39, and 42, the following articles distinctive of the surfman uniform.

(a) BLUE COAT. -- For enlisted men at stations, other than chief petty officers: The blue coat shall be of dark navy-blue cloth or serge.

Garment Specifications. -- Single-breasted, 4-button, lined sack coat, with patch pockets, seam back, no vent, cut shapely.

Length. -- To come one inch below crotch of trousers.

Collar and lapels. -- Peaked lapels to extend not more than $l_{\overline{2}}^{1}$ inches below breast line and to be about 9 inches long on outside edges

of lapel; rolling collar ranging from l_2^1 inches wide in back to about $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches at widest point, juncture of collar and lapel; lapel at widest point to be about 3 3/4 inches wide; space of vent between collar and lapel to be not more than $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide at widest point.

Pockets. -- Four outside, horizontal patch pockets, one on each hip and one on each breast; lower pockets to be about $7\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide by 7 3/4 inches deep; square, with slightly rounded corners at bottom and no flaps or button. Breast pockets to be square, about 5 inches wide by 5 inches deep, with slightly rounded corners at bottom; upper flap, 3- point, sewed to coat, about 5 inches wide; $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches from top through points and about 2 inches from top to narrowest portion between points; middle point to be fitted with a buttonhole; to be worn buttoned. One inside breast pocket on right breast to have a vertical opening 6 inches wide and the depth to be about 11 inches to top of opening.

Cuffs .-- Closed without buttons.

Lining. -- Full lined with black venetian, mohair, serge, or darkblue flannel. Sleeves lined with striped cotton.

Seams. -- Plain.

Edges. -- Single stitch, 1/4 inch wide.

Buttons. -- Four Coast Guard gilt buttons (28-line). Top button to be about $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ inches below breast line on a line with buttons on breast pockets; bottom button to be on a line with top of side pockets, other two buttons equally spaced between. Two $22\frac{1}{2}$ -line Coast Guard gilt buttons, one in the top middle of each breast pocket.

Sleeve Markings. -- To be worn as now prescribed.

(b) WHITE COAT. -- For enlisted men at stations other than chief petty officers. The white coat shall be plain bleached linen duck, union duck or drill of similar characteristics.

Garment Specifications. -- Cut, style, and general shape to be the same as the blue coat. White coat to be unlined.

Seams. -- Turned in and stitched 1/8 inch wide, no raw edge of a material to show inside of coat.

Edges. -- Single stitch, 1/8 inch wide.

Buttons. -- To be the same as on blue coat, but detachable.

(c) BLUE THOUSERS. -- Same as for chief petty officer.

(d) WHITE TROUSERS. -- Same as for chief petty officer.

(e) BLUE WAISTCOAT. -- The wearing of a waistcoat with the blue coat above prescribed for enlisted men at stations, other than chief petty officers, is optional. If a waistcoat be worn, it shall be of the same material as the coat and of the same description as the waistcoat now prescribed for chief petty officers, except that black buttons shall be substituted for gilt buttons.

(f) SHIRT, COLLAR, AND NECKTIE. -- Same as for chief petty officers.

(g) CAP. -- A blue cap and a white cap are prescribed, to be the same as prescribed for chief petty officers except with respect to cap device. The cap device shall be brass, gold plated, fitted with a hinged clasp pin; crossed oars superimposed on a circular life buoy; oars to be about 1 3/8 inches in length, crossed in the middle of the life buoy; life buoy to be about 3/4 inch in diameter.

The designation of surfman uniforms for various occasions shall be in accordance with those prescribed for chief petty officers.

Art. 8-1. Designate the present paragraph (a) and add a second paragraph:

(b) Every enlisted man in the Coast Guard shall wear the distinguishing mark of the Coast Guard, a shield one inch in height, on the right arm midway between the top of cuff and elbow. If two or more distinguishing marks are prescribed for the right forearm, they shall be placed $\frac{1}{2}$ inch apart, with the shield below. The color of the shield shall be dark blue on white clothing and white on blue clothing, and on khaki and forestry green, shall be black. Chief petty officers and petty officers wearing gold rating badges shall wear the shield embroidered in gold, and chief petty officers wearing silver rating badges shall wear the shield embroidered in silver.

Art. 11-20. (3) and (4) Strike out and substitute the following:

11-20. (3) Chief warrant officers shall wear on both collar tips of the khaki shirt silver corps devices of the same design and approximately 5/8 of the size of the corps device prescribed for use on the sleeve of their blue service uniform, omitting the shield.

(4) Warrant officers shall wear on both collar tips of the khaki shirt gold corps devices of the same design and approximately 5/8 of the size of the corps device prescribed for use on the sleeve of their blue service uniform, omitting the shield.
