Introduction


State-listed rare, threatened, and endangered grassland birds are known to occur at Naval Air Station (NAS) Brunswick. The approximately 500-acre grassland undeveloped portion of the airfield hosts common and rare grassland birds. State-listed species known to occur at NAS Brunswick include the endangered grass-hopper sparrow (*Ammodramus savannarum*) and the threatened upland sandpiper (*Bartramia longicauda*). State species of special concern include the eastern meadowlark (*Sturnella magna*) and horned lark (*Eremophila alpestris*) (MDIFW 2009). The East Brunswick Radio Transmitter Site has also been identified as potentially supporting rare grassland birds.

In support of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Disposal and Reuse of NAS Brunswick, point count surveys were conducted within the grassland communities at NAS Brunswick and East Brunswick during the 2009 breeding season. The purpose of the surveys was to determine whether state-listed species were present. The methodology and results of the survey are discussed below.

Methods

Point count stations were established based on survey stations used in previous grassland bird studies at NAS Brunswick (Siegel and Kaschube 2005). Thirty stations were located approximately 250 meters apart and covered the maintained grassland areas associated with the airfield (see Figure 1). At East Brunswick Radio Transmitter Site, stations were randomly established at approximately 250 meters apart to cover the grassland portion of the property. This yielded four stations across the length and breadth of the East Brunswick property (see Figure 2).


Five-minute counts were conducted at each of the stations on June 3 and 4, during the 2009 breeding season. Beginning at preselected stations located in the field using geographic information system (GIS) -produced maps, the counts began within 30 minutes after sunrise and continued for no more than 5 hours after sunrise each day. All birds identified by sight or sound in the 5-minute periods at the selected survey points were documented.

Figure 1 Grassland Bird Survey Points NAS Brunswick Brunswick, Maine





Results

NAS Brunswick

During the counts at NAS Brunswick, 330 detections of 44 species were recorded (see Appendix A). Grasshopper sparrows were not recorded at any stations. Upland sandpipers were recorded eleven times and at eight separate stations. Eastern Meadowlarks were recorded 61 times and at all but three stations. The most abundant species detected was the savannah sparrow (total of 85 detections and at but one station). A summary of the bird species recorded is provided in Table 1.

East Brunswick Radio Transmitter Site

During the counts at the East Brunswick Radio Transmitter Site, 78 detections of 32 species were recorded (see Appendix B). Most of the bird species detected are more commonly associated with edge and forested habitat. No state-listed threatened or endangered species were detected during surveys; however, one state species of special concern was identified (Eastern Meadowlark, two detections). A summary of the bird species recorded is provided in Table 2.

Discussion

The grassland area at NAS Brunswick is an important resource for grassland birds. Although grasshopper sparrows were not detected during the field season, this species has been detected at NAS Brunswick in the past. Grasshopper sparrows were last documented at NAS Brunswick in 2005, which is the last time that surveys were conducted prior to the 2008 and 2009 surveys (Siegel and Kaschube 2005). Based on the most recent surveys, it is possible that grasshopper sparrows have been extirpated from NAS Brunswick. Little change in habitat has occurred within and around the airfield at NAS Brunswick over the past four years to cause the extirpation of this species, however, grasshopper sparrows have been reported as being in decline over much of their range in Maine and the northeast (MDIFW 2003). Additional surveys during the next few breeding seasons would be necessary to accurately gauge the status of this population at NAS Brunswick.
