Fire Dept. Gives Safety Ideas For A Merry Christmas

Rules and regulations concerning safety of Christmas decorations have recently been announced by the Pope AFB fire department,

Department personnel stated that the purchasing of a fresh tree is one of the first steps for assuring a fire-safe holiday. Being wary of so-called "fire-proof" trees is another precaution, as is keeping the tree in a cool place before putting it up. Also, don't leave the tree up for more than fifteen days.

Keeping the tree away from fireplaces, radiators, television sets, hot lights and other sources of heat will also provide a greater margin of safety. When artificial aluminum trees are used, fire department personnel say that the tree should be adequately grounded to do away with the possibility of electrical fires.

Not using candles for decorations on trees helps to insure against-fire as does using only approved electric lights. Finally, according to the fire department, be sure that the ends of metallic icicles or other hanging decorations don't dangle into light sockets, causing short circuits and possible fires.

During his remarks to the combined committees, Colonel Spencer presented a briefhistory of the progress the Air Force has made in the field of equal employment opportunities since its formation as a separate service 20 years

He also told of plans to send, with the permission and cooperation of the institutions concerned, two qualified officials from the base to local high schools, colleges and technical schools having large or total minority student bodies, for the purpose of providing orientation counseling and guidance to students who may be interested in Federal employment at all levels.

Colonel Spencer closed by ad-

ding that "It is my personal belief that a man's opportunities and achievement should be based solely upon his meritorious performance of work or duties..."

Mr. Coltrane's address included remarks on the problem of establishing channels of communication with the unemployed and low income minority groups to point out the job opportunities open to them.

Mr. Coltrane added that the road to equal employment opportunities lies with providing negroes and minority groups the opportunity for proper schooling and training for these jobs. He continued that unemployment can lead to "frustration" in negro youth and that these frustrations could lead to violence

In closing, Mr. Coltrane stated that "we must adopt a new, revitalized program to deal with the problems of equality."



Clove Hitch III

Exercise Clove Hitch III began in April in the vicinity of Puerto Rico, involving almost 21,000 Air Force, Army Navy and Marine personnel and units of the Puerto Rico Air National Guard, Included in the massive exercise were C-130E Hercules of the 464th TAW.

May was a busy time for Pope, During the early part of the month, Pope, Ft. Bragg and the United States Strike Command hosted the semi-annual firepower exercise, Blue Chip IX. Before U. S. and foreign military leaders, the joint service command staged an awe-some display of tactical firepower and lightning fast reaction forces.

and lightning fast reaction forces. Also in May, Pope hosted a large exercise, named FTX Normandv. with C-119 Flying Boxcars of the Continental Air Command. During this week long exercise, almost 10,000 troops of the 82nd Airborne Division at Ft. Bragg were dropped into the drop zones at this large Army installation.

Brig. Gen. Joseph N. Donovan arrived at Pope in June to take command of the USAF Tactical Airlift Center. The former 838th Air Division commander at Forbes AFB, Kans., he replaced Colonel Silliman, who had served as both wing and TALC commander.

New Squadron

Pope gained a new squadron in July with the formation of the 464th Services Squadron, Former services divisions of all Tactical Air Command bases were formed into squadrons July 1 in accordance with a TAC directive.

Also during July, wing aircraft and crews were sent to the Republic of the Congo, at the request of President Mobutu, to fly logistics support for the Congolese government troops in their fight against attacking mercinary forces. The last unit sent to the Congo returned to Pope in early December.

To support local police and National Guard forces, the 464th TAW airlifted units of the 82nd and 101st Airborne Divisions to Selfridge AFB, Mich., during the riots in

Detroit in late July, More than 140 flights were made by C-130s from six Tactical Airlift Wings.

A new method of rotational duty to England began in August with the deployment of the 777th Tactical Airlift Squadron for three months duty at Mildenhall AB, England. The entire squadron, including maintenance personnel and equipment, left Pope for the temporary duty assignment.

Personnel of the USAF Tactical Airlift Center at Pope celebrated their first anniversary, Sept. 1, as a TAC agency tasked with testing and developing new concepts in tactical airlift operations and equipment,

Another squadron began at Pope Sept. 1, with the formation of the Headquarters Squadron Section, 464th TAW.

NATO Exercise

Exercise Deep FurrowI, a North Atlantic Treaty Organization exercise, began in Turkey, Oct. 2, Aircraft of the 464th TAW participated with NATO units to make this large exercise a success, Also during October, another USSTRICOM exercise, Brass Strike I (formerly called Blue Chip), was held in the Pope-Ft, Bragg area.

Traffic Safety School Gives Base Personnel Lessons In Good Driving

Traffic Safety is a subject commanding a great amount of discussion and concern in the Air Force

At Pope AFB, the base safety center in co-operation with the orderall Air Force program, is doing its part to keep drivers aware of the dangers present whenever the ignition key is turned on.
Wednesday (Dec. 20) the base
Traffic Safety School graduated its
1,000th student from the two week
safety course. Begun at Pope
more than a year ago, the traffic
safety course was the idea of the
Air Force safety department headquartered at Norton AFB, Calif.

Conducting the course, a program for sergeants and airmen below the age of 26, is Ervin L. Maye, assistant ground safety officer. Mr. Maye attended a three week instructor's course at Stanford University, Palo Alto, Calif., in Sept. 1966, to prepare him for the job of teaching airmen how to save their lives on the highways.

During this course, the safety directors from bases throughout the country were taught how to use the new electronic teaching system, now in use at most Air Force bases. With this system, two projectors, one for motion pictures and one for film strips, are synchronized with a tape recorded narrative. Tone signals automatically turn the motion picture or film strip projector on at the appropriate moment.

At times during the presentation, questions are projected on the screen for the students to answer the questions each student pushes a lettered button in the four button "responder" on every chair. Lettered "A", "B", "C" and "D".

To date, the traffic safety school boasts an impressive record among its graduates. Since its implementation, only two airmen were involved in reportable accidents, of which only one caused bodily injury. Also, only one of the 1,000 graduates received a traffic ticket for a moving violation.

Mr. Maye stated that many students enter the school with the mistaken idea that it is a driver training school. He added that "Thus is not a driver's school, Here, we try to teach safety and defensive driving, not the fundamentals of driving,"
