I would like to use this column, however, to select those questions which pertain to more than the individual involved.

Your absentee vote can make a difference

So you don't like the way the government is handling things? You complain to the people you work with and offer solutions to the problems at hand. Yet, come Election Day, you can't be bothered to vote.

You're in the military and far from home. You say whoever is elected in your home state really doesn't affect you. But you're wrong; it does. How about the state taxes you pay there on your income or that piece of property in the old hometown? Not much guesswork is involved in determining who sets the tax rate.

And what about the rest of your family and relatives? They still live in your home state and before long, whether through retirement or separation, you may choose to go back there to live. You can't escape it—you are still directly affected by the lawmakers in your home state.

You don't think your one vote will make a difference? You're wrong on two counts. First, it is not unheard of for a mere handful of voters to determine the outcome of important elections.

In a 1962 gubernatorial election in Minnesota, the incumbent had a 142-vote margin of victory.

In the 1960s contest between John F. Kennedy and Richard M. Nixon for the presidency, the popular vote was determined by about 114,000 ballots

More recently, in the presidential election won by Jimmy Carter, results in three states were determined by less than 5,000 individuals who took the time to vote.

On the local level especially and in the presidential primary battles people who vote ofter, find their ballots have enormous impact.

That's the second point, the impact of individual's ballot in a shrunken elector. Unfortunate but true, when the number of voters is less than 50 percent of those eligible, as sometimes happens, the person who casts a ballot could be said to be voting for two.

You vote for officials because you believe they are qualified to handle the job. Usually their views generally coincide with yours. Voting is the only way you can get the representation you desire.

See your voting officer today.

Cast your ballot. It's not only one of the privileges you insure by the uniform you wear—it's your duty. (AFNS)



Santa files flight plans with Air Force command

Boys and girls around the world can be sure Santa will have a safe trip again this year, thanks to the air traffic controllers assigned to the Air Force Communication Command.

The command provides worldwide air traffic control and air navigational aid services and facilities for the Air Force.

Air traffic control officials have approved a flight plan for an overnight trip beginning Monday. The flight plan was filled out in red and green inks by an elderly bearded gentleman who signed as S. Claus.

"I'm filing the flight plan because of increased concern in past years of reports by news media of

an "unknown" inbound, incraft, usually sighted on radar shortly before midnight Monday," said Mr. Claus.

"I'm well aware of the increase in air traffic and the growing importance of safety rules, and I wanted to be certain of getting safely to the homes of boys and girls to deliver my cargo," he added

The information in the flight plan specifices a departure time from the North Pole of 11:30 p.m., Monday. The aircraft is identified as a miniature sleigh with a nine-reindeer power propulsion system, with Rudolph modifications.


The weight of the aircraft may be borderline. To make sure it's not overloaded, loading specifications are clearly stated as: one fat, jolly old man, and a large assortment of toys, games


and gifts. Sufficient space will be reserved for a minimum fuel reserve of four bales of hay.

Flight will be at rooftop level. The vehicle speed is not releasable, since it is classified information. The aircraft call sign is listed as Santa 1. Routine communications will be limited to "ho, ho, ho" or sleigh bells.

Air traffic controllers, the Federal Aviation Administration and foreign countries have been asked to give this vehicle right of way and top priority over all other aircraft.

A final note on the flight plan calls for departure from the last stop to be made in time for a return to the North Pole before dawn. Final message to be transmitted, prior to departure, will be "A merry Christmas to all, and to all a good night."





Procedures outlined for Claus visit

An official visit by Maj. Gen. Santa Claus is expected Dec. 25, 1979. The following procedures will govern activities during General Claus' stay.

1. Not a creature will stir without official permission. This will include indigenous mice. Special stirring waivers will be issued to staff agencies through normal command channels. Services Division will be in charge of granting mice-stirring permits.

2. Key personnel will deploy their brains for a long winter nap on or about 2000 hours, Dec. 24, 1979. Uniform for nap will be: pajamas, cotton, lightweight, drowsing style with kerchief, general purpose. Cap, fatigue, olive green with ear flaps is optional. Sleeping caps may be drawn from supply prior to 1900 hours.

3. Personnel will use standard ration sugar plums to enable required visions to dance through their heads. The inflight kitchen will distribute sugar plums.

4. Stockings, wool type, cushion sole, white athletic style with AF Shade 1550 blue trim, shall be hung by chimney with care. Necessary safety precautions should be experienced to avoid stocking fires. Unit safety officers will submit stocking hanging plans NLT 0800 hours, Dec. 22, 1979

5. At the first sign of clatter from lawn landing area, all personnel will spring from their beds to investigate causes. Immediate action will be taken to throw open window sashes and tear open shutters. (Reference OPLAN "St. Nick" No. 8, para 2A, Sec. (2), Nov. 14, 1977) All sash throwing and shutter tearing should be in accordance with this directive to facilitate

synchronized performance. All commanders are responsible for seeing that no sash throwing or shutter tearing occurs prior to the official Claus alert

6. Prior to midnight, date of visits, all personnel will be assigned "Wondering Eye" positions. After sash throwing and shuttle tearing, these positions will be filled.

7. Transportation Squadron will assign one sleigh, miniature, two passenger; and eight deer, rein, tiny, for use by General Claus. One motor pool driver with rooftop license will also be provided. Driver should be fully qualified and have 5-level OJT in Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen operations. Rudolph qualification is not necessary but helpful.

8. General Claus will inspect quarters using chimney entrance. All base housing occu without chimneys should draw chimney simulator M-4 from base supply on AF Form 2775 (in triplicate) prior to Dec. 23, 1979.

9. Personnel should be aware that General Claus sometimes travels with his staff. All subordinate Clauses should be treated with respect concurrent with their positions. Protocol will make sure extra milk and cookies are left near all fireplaces in the event the visiting party is larger than expected.

10. All key personnel will attend shouting rehearsal at 0830 hours, Dec. 24, 1979. Shout will consist of "Merry Christmas to all and to all a good night." Squadron commanders are responsible for uniformity in shouting.

"I'm off now to Thule, and boy am I late!"





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



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
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Christmas merry for base airmen

"First sergeants were asked by the chapel to see if anyone in their squadron needed financial help on a one-time basis during the Christmas holiday season," said Chaplain (Maj.) Richard L. Depriter, 317th CSG.

"Under the system," he said, "first sergeants write a recommendation letter for people needing money."

The chapel also has toys, in case people can't afford them, because of justifiable reasons. The chaplain explained, toys are available for people who get in binds and don't have the money to buy their children toys. This may be because of bills or other unforeseen circumstances.

Currently there is approximately \$1,600 in the fund. Out of this, \$1,200 may be used for people needing money during Christmas. The rest will be saved for emergency situations, after the holiday season.



The base motor pool recently changed the base shuttle bus route and schedule.


The shuttle bus stops are numbered one through 16. The bus departs stop one following the solid line (see map below) on the hour and on

New post card simplifies voting

The familiar red-and-white Federal Post Card Application has been redesigned to make absentee registration and voting easier for the estimated five million U.S. citizens who will be away from home during the 1980 elections.

The revised FPCA will be available by January at military installations, embassies and consulates.

FPCAs are postage-free when mailed in a U.S. postal facility or from APOs or FPOs.

Officials of the Federal Voting Assistance Program said current FPCAs available from voting assistance officers and counselors worldwide will continue to be used until supplies run out.

Use of the new FPCAs is recommended because almost all the states will accept the form as a simultaneous application for both registration and application for an absentee ballot.

Some states, however, will still treat the FPCA as a registration request only and require voters to send a second FPCA requesting absentee hallots.

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
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Centralized flight training currently under way here
