During their stay here they will visit the individual sections and the flightline to spend as much time as possible talking with the people and getting first hand information about their operations. They will also be observing the general condition of maintenance facilities and equipment.

Another area covered will be compliance with AFM 66-1, Maintenance Management, in all aircraft maintenance activities on base.

Earlier this year it was announced that Pope had won the MAC Commander's Trophy for Aircraft Maintenance and would represent Daedalian MAC in the competition.

be more than a dozen different versions of the C-130 aircraft, exhibiting the versality of that aircraft. The C-130 is in its 25th year of service with the Air Force. The world's largest aircraft, the C-5 Galaxy, is also scheduled to appear.

Other displays include equip-

ment from the 82nd Airborne Division at Ft. Bragg and exhibits from various community organizations.

The Open House, commerorating the 60th anniversary of Pope, will be open to the public through the day. The first show is slated for 11 a.m.

The critity will have all base police functions except pass and ID registration and the security clearance sections which will remain in building 306. The military working dog section will also remain at its present location.

MAC lists entitlement priorities to Air Force

During the last year, Gen William G. Moore Jr., Military Airlift Command (MAC) commander in chief, has submitted to Air Force several command proposals which affect members' pay and entitlements. MAC formulated its own proposals and monitors other programs meant to improve military pay and travel entitlements.

High on MAC's list of priorities is the elimination of inequity of officer and enlisted per diem and subsistence payments. General Moore hopes for a change to provide enlisted people both subsistence and per diem entitlements while on temporary duty.

Serious inequity

Air Force enlisted members who spend a great deal of time on temporary duty consider the inequity issue a serious problem.

Officers are already entitled to the subsistence allowance, even while on temporary duty. Presenly, enlisteds on temporary duty may not receive basic allowance for subsistence (BAS) and the subsistence portion of per diem.

MAC also hopes for a rule change to permit people to collect a dislocation allowance when permanent change of station orders are cancelled or revoked. This would occur after the service members leave their duty stations, but before the effective dates of orders.

TDY reimbursements

Also, MAC wants to permit reimbursements to persons for lodging costs paid while on temporary duty and drawing a temporary lodging allowance.

The lodging cost proposal would permit people to recover out-of-pocket costs they incurred when assigned to temporary duty almost immediately after reporing to new duty stations. When this happens, membes often aren't yet settled into their new residences and must use hotel or motel accommodations.

The temporary lodging allowance normally covers motel or

hotel costs. However, when members are on temporary duty the lodging allowance ceases while hotel or motel accommodation costs continue.

MAC, however, did not just make proposals last year. It took several direct steps toward helping its members financially when on temporary duty. In July, for example, MAC began testing a change to the way billeting fees are paid by MAC travelers on temporary duty.

Under the present system, travelers pay billeting fees and are reimbursed when they return to their home stations. Under the test payment system, travelers may sign for lodging instead of paying cash.

Test system OK

Travelers, aircrew members in particular, like the test payment system. A big plus is the reduction in out-of-pocket expenses—it allows travelers to carry less cash or spend their money on essentials other than billeting.

McGuire AFB, N.J., Rhein-Main AB, Germany, and Lajes AB, Azores, are working the test payment system with support from all MAC finance offices. The Strategic Air Command and U.S. Air Forces in Europe have joined MAC in the test on a limited basis.

"Charge it"

MAC crews (including aircrews from Dyess AFB, Texas, or rotational assignment to Mildenhall RAFB, Fland, and Torrejon AB, Spain) eds. "charge" the cost of their rooms. MAC has not set a test end date yet.

Last year, Air Force approved MAC's proposals permitting dual incentive pay. Pararescue specialists receive hazardous duty pay as aircrew members and as parachutists. Combat controllers draw jump pay and demolition pay.

General Moore says he will continue to support proposals for improvements in pay and travel entitlements.



Move the muscle

When the going's rough and time is short, Military Airlift Command has some tough airlifters who see to it that the muscle needed by our forces—the tanks, trucks, ammunition, food, and medical supplies—gets moved.

Tactical airlift and strategic airlift are vital parts of the MAC airlift team. After the strategic or long-haul airlifters bring their cargo to a convenient staging area, tactical airlifters deliver the cargo exactly where it will do the most good. Most of the time they operate under some pretty rough conditions to move that muscle.

If necessary, we're prepared to airlift more cargo out of the United States in two days than we move during 30 days in peacetime. Airlift is this country's only means of getting reinforcements and supplies directly to the action—fast.


The United 76ers scored both of their goals in the second half.


