Senate completes action on DoD Authorization pay bill

The senate has completed action on the fiscal year 1981 Department of Defense Authorization Bill. A major feature of the bill is a 11.7 percent pay raise for service members which is considered a critical first step in restoring military pay to the relative levels of comparability that existed with the private sector in 1982.

The senate version of the defense bill calls for the pay raise to be effective Oct. 1, 1980. A joint house/senate conference will have to be held on the authorization bill because the house version does not contain the special pay provisions. Other parts of the bill include:

Authorize \$45 million for a one-year test program in various education incentives.

Extend current authority from Sept. 30, 1980, to Sept. 30, 1985, for the selected reserve enlistment and re-enlistment bonus and educational asistance programs.

Establish a system using a high-three-year average of basic pay for calculating retirement pay for members with less than ten years of service.

Require annual cost of living adjustments for retired military personnel, contingent upon the enactment of similar legislation for civil service annuitants.

Authorize an affiliation bonus for selected reserve units.

Exempt active-service members from paying monthly parking fees.

The Senate's bill also contained several provisions from the President's "Fair Benefits Package" that have been favorably reported by the House Armed Services Committee. They are:

Authorize a Family Separation Allowance for E-4s and below.

Eliminate the 74-cents-per-mile restriction on reimbursement for the shipment of mobile homes or trailers.

Increase the continental United States per diem rate from \$35 to \$50 per day and maximum high-cost per diem from \$50 to \$75 per day.

Permit the Secretary of Defense to pay a continuation bonus to officers with critical rated skills.

Increase the maximum enlistment bonus from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

Authorize a \$600 bonus for individuals who enlist, re-enlist, or voluntarily extend in the ready reserve for three years.

Increase monthly CHAMPUS assistance for handicapped family members from \$350 to \$1,000. Permit CHAMPUS immunizations for dependent children under age two.

It is anticipated the House/Senate Conference Committee will approve these actions already favorably reported by the House Armed Services Committee

The Senate and House are recessed until July 21. The Conference Committee will meet sometime after then to resolve their differences.

Child Care Center rates increase

Child Care Center officials announced a new rate increase for child care service will start Aug. 15. This is due to inflation salary increases and to help pay for the new addition to the center.

The rates are:

Hourly 75¢ first child 30¢ each additional child

Daily (9 hours)


\$6 first child \$3 each additional child

Weekly (25 hours) \$14 fir

\$14 first child \$7 each additional child

Weekly (50 hours)

\$28 first child \$14 each additional child



A Department of Defense computer identification system will be implemented at all North Carolina military installations today. The system will effect all active duty and retired military personnel, their dependents and survivors.

The Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting system (DEERS) will be used to record and verify each applicant's eligibility for military health and medical care benefits.

Active duty and retired members are automatically enrolled in the DEERS program by respective military personnel centers.

Enrollment for dependents, however, is the responsibility of the sponsor, or of the eligible dependent of a deployed or deceased sponsor.

Although the responsibility to register dependents rests solely with the sponsor, usually the spouse is the person who requests any missing documents. Contact the Personal Affairs Office, 394-4308, for address of Vital Statistics Departments in the United States.

"Enrollment applications will be sent in a package to all retired Air Force members in the Pope-Ft. Bragg area," said 2nd Lt. Donna F. Bullard, DEERS project officer for Pope.

The applications must be mailed or brought in to the Pope AFB DEERS Processing Center, Bldg. 306, with originals or copies of birth certificates, marriage licenses, adoption orders, etc., to prove the dependents eligibility. All documents must have a raised seal or have the verification clearly identified.

The central enrollment center will be in the basement of Bldg. 306 and open Monday through Friday from 7:15 a.m. to 4:15 p.m. There will also be a mobile team to process enrollments in work areas.

Persons who are eligible for medical care, but have not registered with the DEERS program, must register as soon as possible or may be billed for the services administered to them for medical treatment.

"After full implementation of the system at military medical facilities, DEERS may eventually expand to verify eligibility of shoppers at the base exchange and commissaries," said the lieutenant.

Pope's Personal Financial Management Center welcomes the opportunity during this week to emphasize and reacquaint you with the many personal financial services available to base

Many Air Force people may experience financial problems and from time to time may have difficulty making "ends meet". This situation is quite understandable in today's inflationary environment where pay raises may fail to keep pace with increases in the cost of living.

The Personal Financial Management Program is designed to increase the financial awareness of our Air Force people. By increasing the financial awareness we are providing an opportunity for you to maximize your purchasing power, thereby improving your standard of living. By alleviating or minimizing the everyday problems of financial concerns, we can possibly increase Air Force personnel satisfaction, enhance AF personnel productivity, and reduce work associated with bad checks, debt complaints, and emotional and human relations problems.

The PFM program offers education, information, and counseling services. The cornerstone of our educational services is a three-day, nine-hour course on personal financial management. The objective of the course is to provide a broad scope approach to the many decisions required by individuals and families which will affect their personal financial condition.

The course covers information on budget preparation, checkbook maintenance, consumer protection and credit interest rates, estate planning and other subjects relating to financial management and personal affairs. Guest speakers from base organizations and the local community such as the Legal Office, Credit Union, bank, Personal Affairs, and an insurance representative are presented throughout the course to provide you with information in their areas of expertise.


Our information service provides general and localized information on a variety of topics and news items relating to financial management. For example, consumer savings tips may cover such topics as checking accounts, credit sources, saving money on car insurance and so on. Inflation fighter articles will soon appear in the base newspaper providing information on such topics as cutting clothing and food costs, what credit costs, insurance and a host of other topics.

Our counseling service is designed to provide confidential financial guidance to people seeking personalized assistance in financial matters. To do this, our counselors work jointly with you on a 'one to one" basis in a private environment to analyze your financial situation, pinpoint problem areas, formulate a budget and, if required, propose a payment plan. The emphasis of our counseling service is identification and resolution of financial questions and prevention of existing difficulties from recurring.

All of the counselors are trained volunteers with a sincere desire to help people with their financial concerns. 

Seek legal assistance

General power of attorney requires caution

So you are preparing for overseas shipment or merely a brief in-country TDY or vacation and before you go you think you should obtain a general power of attorney for your spouse or friend "in case something comes up"--after all, doesn't everyone get one? Well, before you execute a general power of attorney, there are a few things you should be aware of about this normally easy to acquire legal document.

You should know of the consequences and inherent dangers involved in granting to others the almost unlimited power to act in your place and stead. The "blank check" function of the general power of attorney should be fully understood before executing one, for too often I have encountered airmen, both officers and enlisted. who have complicated legal problems which were caused almost entirely because of an uninformed, unintelligent execution of a general power of attorney.

A power of attorney is the designation of another individual (an agent) to act on behalf of the grantor (the principal) of the power (you, the person who signs the power) as your attorney-infact or personal representative. The general power of attorney gives such broad powers and authority to the attorney-in-fact that it can be a dangerous instrument in the hands of persons inexperienced in business matters, persons of unstable temperament, or anyone in whom the grantor does not have the utmost trust and confidence, such as a spouse with whom you are currently having marital troubles. It is a "blank check" which empowers the attorney-in-fact to take such actions as he or she deems desirable whether or not you would have thought them to be dangerous, foolhardy, and stupid

One provision normally found in the general power of attorney is the following:

Further, I do authorize my aforesaid

attorney-in-fact to execute, acknowledge and deliver any instrument under seal or otherwise, and to do all things necessary to carry out the intent hereof, hereby granting

unto my said attorney-in-fact full power and authority to act in and concerning the premises as fully and effectually as I may do if personally present.

That provision has the effect of saying that the attorney-in-fact can do as he wishes in your name as though you yourself had personally been present and so acted. Nothing is withheld and no powers, actions, or activities are exempted.

A few weeks later you return from you trip only to find that you now have bills amounting to thousands of dollars, your car and house have been sold for a fraction of their worth, and your valuable stamp collection has been exchanged for an old set of golf clubs--and you don't even play golf. Of course you are going to march right down to someone--you are not quite sure to whom--and demand that the sales and exchanges be immediately voided as being unauthorized, unjustified, and illegal. Sorry about that! Another provision normally found in the general power of attorney is the one that says you can't change your mind after you learn of the actions taken in your name:

I further declare that any act or thing

lawfully done hereunder by my said attorney shall be binding on my self and my heirs legal and personal representatives and assigns.

This of course is not to suggest that a general power of attorney does not have its proper place among legal instruments. There are circumstances when it is not only appropriate but advisable to have one when the authority granted by a special

power of attorney would be inadequate.
So, before requesting a general power of attorney seek the assistance of the Base Legal Office and discuss the dangers of executing such a document and ascertain whether or not a special power of attorney would be sufficient for your purposes. Think of the person to whom you would be giving this "blank check" and ask yourself if he or she can be relied upon to protect






