3MAPS, Reservists support 317th TAW training exercise

Supporting a mass four-day exercise requires a lot of hard work by a lot of people. During last week's 317th Tactical Airlift Wing's exercise to test its combat capability, the 3rd Mobile Aerial Port Squadron and Air Force Reservists from the 69th MAPS, 53rd MAPS, 459th MAPF, 84th APS and the 89th APS deployed to Fort Campbell Military Reservation near Hopkinsville, Ky

The Air Terminal Team recovered and recycled 18 heavy equipment loads, 36 Container Delivery System loads, 72 sandbags and 72 G-12 parachutes, airdropped by the 39th, 40th and 41st Tactical Airlift Squadrons.

The exercise also provided an intersquadron competition for the flying squadrons, won by the 41st TAS

The Air Terminal team worked in

two shifts, sometimes up 16 hours a day. Pope's Combat Control Team controlled all scheduled airdrops, airland operations and provided strike reports for all scored events.

"The reserve units got an excellent opportunity for real world, hands-on training," said MSgt. Tom Young, mission commander. "And, they arose to the occasion very well. As far as I know, this is the first time reserve units were combined with active duty people



to form this type of work force

"The Reservists involved can deploy with me anytime, anywhere.

The Aerial Port Squadron provided airdrop loads and load teams at Pope

and Fort Campbell, recovered loads at drop zones, and provided air terminal services for recycling the airdropped loads at Pope.

Awaiting president's signature

Senate, House pass Officer Grade Limitation Act

Now that the Senate and House have passed the Officer Grade Limitation Act, the next step is for the President to sign it into law. The act also includes the Nunn-Warner Amendment.

The act provides for a 25 percent increase in flight pay for officers and enlisted crew members.

In addition, it establishes a conus variable housing allowance system based on the difference between the average monthly housing costs and 115 percent of basic allowance for quarters.

The Secretary of Defense would have discretionary authority to determine the amounts payable in fiscal

Armed Services and Office of the Secretary of Defense staffs will jointly review the results of the on-going Veteran's Housing Administration housing

They will also assist in developing the appropriate geographical groupings for establishing the average housing costs in a given area and assist in the development of the precise payment formulas which will be used during the first year.

Since the VHA is discretionary for 1981 and the precise costs will not be determined until the results of the survey are completed, it is uncertain at this time if members in high cost areas will receive a VHA equivalent to the difference between average housing

costs and 115 percent of average BAQ.

However, the conferees expressed their unanimous desire and intent that VHA be implemented effective no later than October 1980 and that funds be provided

generally the same level as would be required if VHA were an entitlement.

The VHA will become statutory entitlement payable by grade effective Sept. 30, 1981. The VHA provisions would also apply to dependents who remain in the conus when the member is stationed overseas.

Repealing the 10 cents per mile reimbursement limitation on permanent change of station moves. Reimbursement would be 18.5 cents per mile. Although the statutory limit for dependent travel would also be repealed, the rates would remain at the same at present-seven cents per mile for adults and three and a half cents for children aged two through 11 years

Increasing separate rations allowance by 10 percent for officers and enlisted people.

Revising save-pay provisions for enlisted people and warrant officers who accept commissions. This ensures officers would receive the same increases in basic pay, BAS, BAQ and longevity they would have received as enlisted members or warrant officers.
Increasing sea-pay rates by 15 percent.

Extending the officer grade Limitations Act tables to Sept. 30, 1982, thus providing the Air Force with grade relief until Sept. 30, 1983.

Extending disability retirement and separations provisions for those with less than eight years of service until Sept. 30, 1982.

Permitting reserve enlisted members to receive retirement prior to age 60 if they complete at least 20 years of active-duty service.

Arts and Crafts Center offer classes

Many people are asking what's new at Pope. Morale, Welfare and Recreation announces the following classes start Sept. 15, and 15 students or more are considered an acceptable enrollment for each class.

Art, Oil Painting - This course is a basic introduction to oil painting designed for the student with little or no art experience. It includes color value and composition and methods of applying paint to canvas with highlights

Basketry - Includes the history of baskets, an introduction to different fibers, curing and drying. Four different baskets should be completed during the course of introducing various fibers and patterns.

Cake Preparation and Decoration - This course is concerned with the basic fundamentals of cake preparation and decoration. The techniques of borders, florals, lattice work, basket weave and silhouette's are utilized

Cake Preparation and Decoration II - Using the technique learned in the beginners course in a new and more versatile medium. Cake Preparation and Decoration II includes royal icing, gum paste and the making of cakes utilizing cake carving for various shapes. Also covered will be molded sugar and wedding cakes.

Calligraphy - Calligraphy is the art of beautiful writing or penmanship. The course covers the history and cultivation of calligraphy and concentrates on teaching the students a more artisite way with words

Clownology - Is the teaching of professional techniques used by clowns around the world. This course consists of background in the history of clowing, make-up, and costuming, simple magic tricks, games, gimmicks and

Gourmet Cooking - The art of preparing fine foods, with special emphasis on fine foods around the world. Primary focus is placed on preparing these dishes, selecting the correct food products and cooking and

Floral Arranging - This course involves the art of arranging live, dried and artificial flowers. Students are instructed in the use of flowers, containers and accessories, design principles, color and texture and special occasion arrangements

Method Painting - This course presents a method of learning to oil paint using patterns. Each student in class will complete several paintings which anyone should be proud to frame.

Tole Painting - Sometimes called American Folk Art, Tole Painting is painting decorative designs and patterns on wood or metal in oils.

Ceramics - Formal classes in ceramics are taught at the Multi-Purpose Workshop every 12 weeks. Classes last for 11 weeks and 10 ceramic techniques are taught.





MWR offers recreation services to base people

Playing an intramural or varsity sport this year? Ever wonder who pays for the uniforms, equipment, odds and ends most athletes use?

The Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division. In fact, MWR programs, facilities and services cost hundreds of thousands of dollars a year

Where does the money come from? Two places. Part of the funds come from Congress called appropriated funds. That money is used to pay salaries for military and civilians who work for MWR. It's also used to buy equipment and for construction projects.

But, with as many programs MWR must provide with funds for each year, the appropriated funds is not enough. The money must come form somewhere and

someone. Thus the term nonappropriated fund appears.

What's that? It's simply money made from base exchanges, theaters, packaged beverage sales, fees and charges at activities like the golf course and bowling centers. The very places that are used extensively by military members and their dependents.

In other words, the two funds together make for a well-rounded, comprehensive MWR program to be enjoyed by people at Pope year-around.

Ok, that is now understood. How about the open

messes? They're under the MWR Division.

True, but the open mess nonappropriated funds are somewhat different than the others

The open messes charge membership dues and pay to the Military Airlift Command an assessment of one percent of their total sales.

Also open messes do not receive direct allocations of funds from the Air Force or MAC. However they may receive a loan or grant from MAC.


MAC will bank the one percent assessment of each open mess, invest it and keep custody of the money so they can assist an open mess through minor construc-

tion and alteration projects.

Just about any MWR activity utilized on base is cheaper and has newer equipment than those off-base. A good example is the low fees charged at the Pope golf course and bowling center.

The sole purpose of the MWR Division is to provide the best possible facilities, programs and services at the lowest possible prices

Large profits are not the object, but break-even or return is mandatory.


