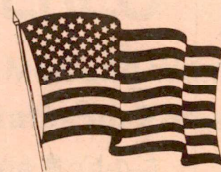

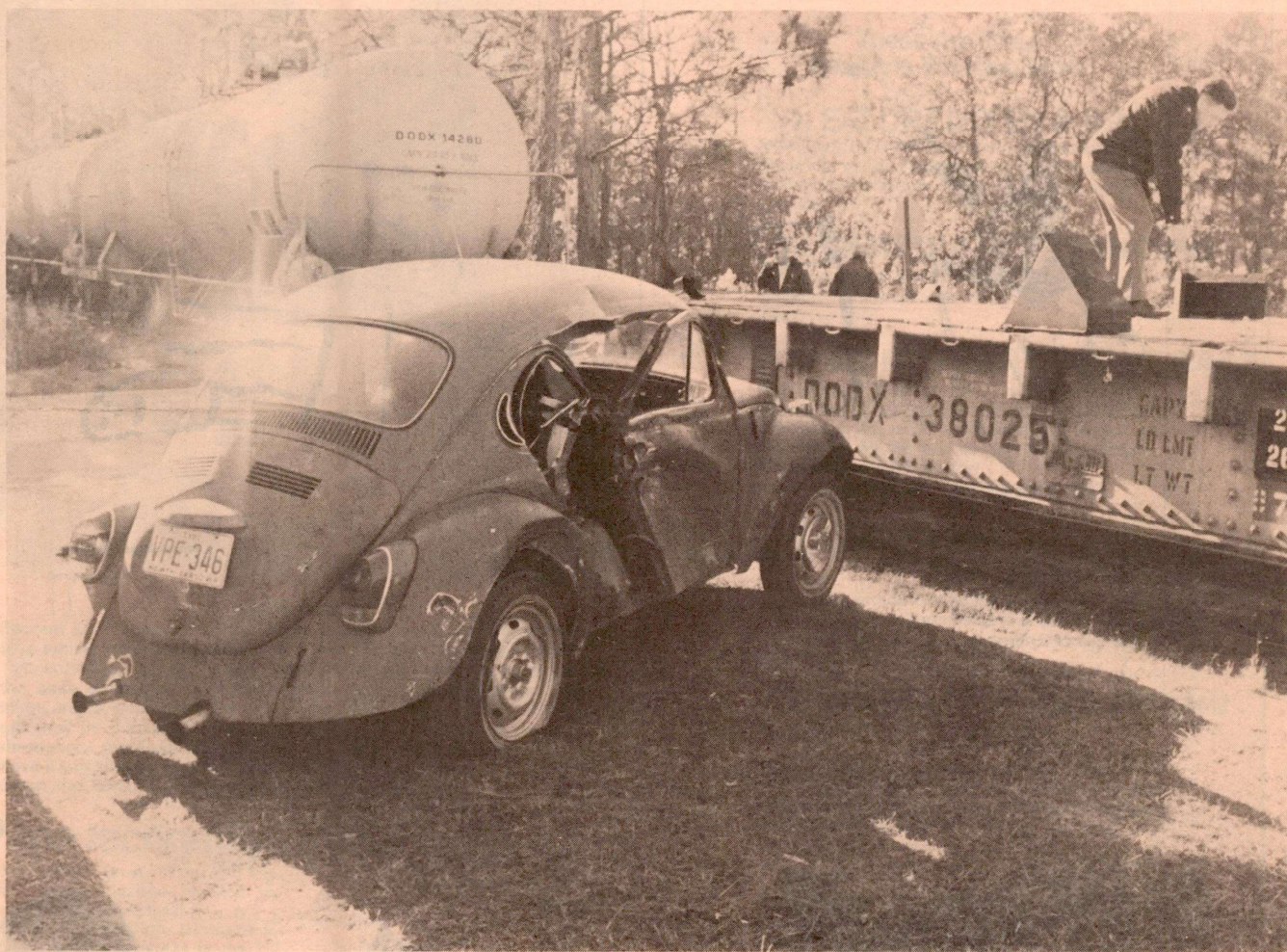

## Car, train collide on Hurst Drive

A car and a train collided at the intersection of Hurst Drive and the Cape Fear Railroad Nov. 13 about 8:30 a.m. No one was injured in the crash.

According to the Safety Office investigator, SSgt. Raymond Johnson, the train's engineer and fireman and the automobile driver each said they didn't see the other vehicle until just before impact. The driver also stated he didn't hear the train's horn until just before impact.

According to Security Police reports, cars approaching the railroad inter-

section from the opposite side of the track had stopped and drivers of those cars tried to warn the approaching driver to stop by waving their arms.

Sergeant Johnson said the apparent cause of the accident was inattention of the driver.

The train was travelling 3-5 mph at the time of impact. The coupler on the front of the engine pierced a gaping hole in the car's right rear side and pushed it about 80 feet down the track. The car then spun off and came

to a halt. The train continued another 40-50 feet before coming to rest.

The crossing is marked by a black railroad crossing warning sign on a

yellow background which by law automatically means caution and yield. The driver was charged with failure to yield to a train at a marked crossing.

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# Turkey time:

Is there danger lurking in your kitchen this holiday season? A frozen turkey looks harmless enough, so does the potato salad and the banana cream pie. But each of these, and more, could be waiting to catch you and your family in an unguarded moment.

If mistreated they can spoil your holiday fun. Their weapon is called by the general term "food poisoning."

It causes a wide variety of problems ranging from mild abdominal cramps to nausea, vomiting and diarrhea, and -- in some cases--death.

## Guidelines

Observe the following rules and enjoy a safe and healthy Thanksgiving.

Thaw turkey (or any frozen food) in the refrigerator. A turkey of 16 pounds or less should thaw for one or two days, above 16 pounds, two or three days.

Don't allow food to stand at room temperature more than two hours. Never thaw overnight at room temperature. Don't thaw in a "slow" oven.

Turkey is naturally contaminated with Salmonella, one of the bacteria that causes a form of food poisoning. At temperatures below 45 degrees it can not grow. At temperatures above 140 degrees it is destroyed. Between 45 and 140 degrees it grows well and spoils the meat.

Keep foods mixed with mayonnaise refrigerated until ready to serve. Don't allow mayonnaise based foods to stand at room temperature.

When mixed with other foods mayonnaise spoils quickly. At room temperature the process accelerates.

## Dairy products

Being rich in protein, dairy products are an excellent place for bacteria to grow so keep dairy products and foods made with dairy products refrigerated until ready to serve. This includes cheese, eggs and cream in any form, fresh or cooked such as meringue, cream pies, whipped cream, cheese cake, pudding, egg nog, custard and eclairs.

Don't allow dairy based foods to stand out at room temperature during the rest of the meal. Don't put these on a buffet; bring them out later.

To avoid contamination of one food by another, mix dressing just before stuffing the bird--then roast immediately after stuffing. Don't mix dressing ahead of time or refrigerate the stuffed bird.

The moisture in the dressing encourages bacterial growth. The egg that most of us use to hold the dressing together makes matters worse. When this combination is left in the turkey (which is already contaminated) the bacteria have a Thanksgiving feast of their own.

# Holiday meal hides lurking danger from cooks unaware

Separate the dressing from the turkey immediately after roasting. Serve and then refrigerate turkey and dressing separately.

Don't leave dressing in the turkey while serving or place it in the turkey to save space in the refrigerator. Should there be any contamination, the combination provides a better place for bacterial growth than either would alone.

## Utensils

Clean and sanitize utensils that come in contact with food, especially raw meat. Don't use the same utensil for more than one food preparation chore.

Wash utensils with water at 160 degrees or with a solution of one teaspoon chlorine bleach per gallon of water. If using a cutting board, scrub it with the chlorine solution. Wash hands well (under nails too) after working with raw meat.

Don't just rinse utensils and then reuse them. Don't use the same cutting board for raw meat and for other foods.

Roast meat at the recommended temperature. Don't cook at a temperature less than 140 degrees.

**Slow cooking at less than 140 degrees will eventually cook the meat but will only provide an incubator for the bacteria with the meat providing the nourishment.**

Refrigerate leftovers as soon as the

meal is finished. Don't allow food to cool down before placing in the refrigerator.

Long standing at room temperature allows the bacteria to grow. Refrigeration doesn't destroy them. The cool down idea is a hold over from the days of ice boxes when hot food would have caused the cooling agent--ice--to melt.

When reheating leftovers, heat to at least 140 degrees. Don't warm them just enough to eat.

## Canned foods

Inspect canned goods for leaks and bulges, especially home canned items. Don't "taste test" foods from bulging, leaking cans or jars.

Botulism is deadly. It occurs most often in home canned goods with low acid levels. (Tomatoes are relatively acidic and rarely cause trouble, but even here don't take chances.) Cooking does not eliminate the danger since this is caused by a poison the bacteria produced while it was in the can, not by the bacteria itself.

Turkey with dressing, sweet potatoes, cranberry sauce, pumpkin pie with whipped cream topping--all part of the delicious Thanksgiving tradition. So put them on your holiday menu along with a serving of caution generously garnished with love.

And have a happy Thanksgiving.

# Secretary announces Persian Gulf policy

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- While the attention of most Americans has been on the elections and the hostages, actions of vast importance to our national security have been taking place in the Middle East.

Just what is the United States' policy on the conflict in the Persian Gulf region -- the war between Iran and Iraq?

Warren Christopher, deputy secretary of State, recently told newspaper editors the United States has two broad objectives.

"The first is peace. The U.S. has firmly supported the effort of international institutions to move the dispute from the battlefield to the peace table as quickly as that can be done."

The second broad objective, said Secretary Christopher, "is to prevent this conflict from spreading. Our aim is to assure, in cooperation with others, that it does not disrupt the peace of the region or the economy of the world."

He summarized in these words our

intentions with respect to the Persian Gulf conflict:

First, the United States is neutral in the conflict between Iran and Iraq. We will not intervene on either side.

Second, we expect the Soviet Union to act with restraint.

Third, neutrality in this conflict does not mean American indifference. We will defend our vital interests in the Persian Gulf region. Specifically:

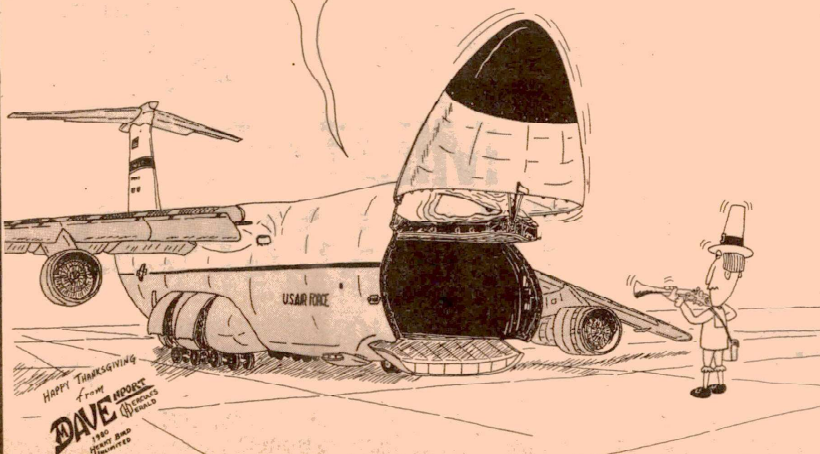
- There must be no interference with free transit in the Strait of Hormuz and

the Persian Gulf. We will do what is required to prevent such interference.

- To prevent the conflict from expanding in ways which threaten the security of the region, we will also respond to requests for assistance from non-belligerent friends in the area who feel threatened by the conflict.

Fourth, there must be an early end to the conflict. No one stands to gain from its continuation. We will support the efforts of international institutions to bring about a peaceful settlement.

## Public Affairs Division offers hometown radio tape program

The Wing Public Affairs Division is looking for people who want to be on the radio. That's right. They're sponsoring a hometown radio tape program and looking for award winners and other 'news makers' to record hometown radio tapes.

In this case, news makers are anyone who has: received an award good for promotion points, been selected for the Airman's Education and Commissioning Program, received a suggestion award that saved money or was awarded money, selected as Wing Airman/NCO/Officer of the Quarter or Year, participated in a civic action, won a state-wide competition or higher

or participated in a humanitarian effort.

To record a tape, people should contact the Public Affairs Division, Ext. 4183, and make an appointment for a taping session. The division will provide a script outline and guidance on "telling your story" for radio. The recording lasts about 30-90 seconds and will be sent to a radio station serving your hometown (or the station you chose).

According to a Public Affairs spokesman, people should make their appointment as soon as possible after the news event so the tape can reach their hometown in a timely manner.

## President signs new law increasing educational benefits

Changes in veterans-educational benefits went into effect recently when the president signed the veterans benefits legislation into law. Any questions should be directed to the regional Veterans Administration Office at 323-1242.

Public Law 96-466:

- authorizes an overall 10 percent increase in educational assistance benefits for service members eligible for the old GI Bill. (This includes service members who served on active duty or were in the delayed enlistment program before Jan. 1, 1977, and ROTC cadets called to active duty during 1977.)

The 10 percent increase will be implemented in two steps -- a 5 percent increase effective Oct. 1 and 5 percent effective Jan. 1, 1981. The monthly assistance rates effective Jan. 1 will be:

Program Type	Single	One family member	Two family members	Each additional family member
Full time	\$327	\$389	\$443	\$27
¾ time	\$245	\$292	\$332	\$20
½ time	\$146	\$195	\$222	\$14
Work/study	\$246	\$309	\$351	\$21

- adjusts Veterans Education Assistance Program minimum and maximum contributions. Minimum VEAP contribution is reduced from \$50 to \$25 and the maximum contribution increased from \$75 to \$100.

- reduces Veterans Administration flight-training payments to 60 percent of costs. The previous amount paid was 90 percent. Veterans enrolled in flight-training programs are eligible for VA educational loans of up to \$2,500 per year.

- reduces the VA correspondence-training payment to 70 percent of costs. Previous amount was 90 percent.

The law does not include a Senate proposal to extend the old GI Bill's use-or-lose date of Dec. 31, 1989. The House Veterans Affairs Committee has made a commitment to review that issue during next year's efforts to design an all-volunteer-force GI Bill.

### "Enola Gay" remake airs

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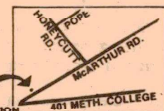

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# Former CMSgt. of AF speaks at Dining Out

Former Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, Donald L. Harlow, spoke Tuesday evening to 226 people at the Enlisted Dining Out at the NCO Club.

Harlow was the second Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force from August 1969 to October 1971. After retiring from the Air Force, he began working with the Air Force Sergeants Association International Headquarters in Washington, D.C., as the Deputy Executive Director of Legislation.

In an interview Tuesday afternoon, Harlow said, "I'm just delighted that I could be here to represent the Air Force Sergeants Association at Pope. I was here about 11 years ago when I was Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force and I enjoyed my visit then. You've got some fine people here, dedicated and working hard, and I'm proud to serve them as the primary spokesman for the Air Force Sergeants Association."

Harlow considers his job with the AFSA as just a continuation of his former Air Force duties. "I retired nine years ago and I've been in this job working for the AFSA ever since," he said. "To me there was no transition,

because I was just doing an extension of the job I had as Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force. The primary difference was that once I took the blue suit off, I could speak out and talk differently because I was not a member of the establishment.



"My job for the AFSA is to educate the people on Capitol Hill of the

requirements and needs of our people in the military and the Air Force," he added. "Especially the needs of the enlisted people, because 85 percent of our entire force is enlisted."

Getting better benefits and pay for those enlisted people is the major goal Harlow, and the AFSA, works for. "I think the Nunn-Warner measure and some of the other benefits that were approved and signed into law and the substantial pay raise this time was a great step forward. However, it is not the final answer," he said. "Therefore, I fully substantiate and agree with the new administration which says that we still need a substantial pay raise next year in order to bring our military people up to a better standard of living."

"We need to keep good people, highly experienced people, which we have been losing recently," he said. "We've got the start, but there's a long way to go yet."

In order to be effective in his efforts, though, Harlow says he needs the support of Air Force members. "I en-

courage people to join our association for the simple reason that we need their support," he said. "We need their



support in writing letters to the members of congress to substantiate and support my efforts up there on Capitol Hill."

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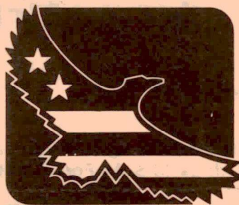

remaining points on two of three attempted point-after-kicks and on a safety which came early in the first half.

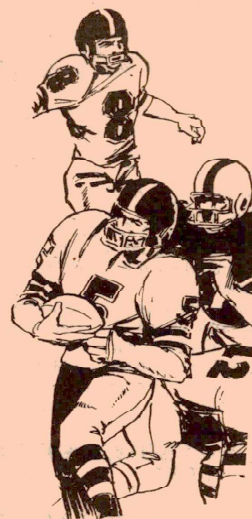
The 41st managed their only points early in the second half on a 45 yard pass play and a successful extra point conversion.

## 'Magic belts' offer something for nothing

Getting something for nothing happens only in the world of magic. In the real world, anything valuable, such as improving the probability of surviving an automobile crash, must be earned by a positive effort such as properly fastening a safety belt.

A common argument against using safety belts is that it is safer to be thrown out of a car in a collision than it is to stay inside. Not so. Occasionally someone will be effected and miss all the traffic, trees, utility poles and other structures near roadways, and survive. You hear about this percisely because it is unusual, not because it is the rule.

In a recent study of rollover accidents, half of those thrown out of their

vehicles died, while only seven percent of those remaining inside died. No motorist secured by a safety belt was effected. Wearing a safety belt keeps you in a vehicle, improves the probability of saving your life in a collision, and may reduce the severity of your injuries or even prevent them entirely.

In some states, there have been court decisions unfavorable to a person who failed to use a safety belt on the grounds that this person did not exercise "due care" before the accident to prevent or minimize injury.

Don't depend on magic--depend on a properly fastened safety belt.

## 'Nav aids' help boaters

Early in every boating career, the importance of various aids to navigation comes through loud and clear. Why? Because these day markers, buoys, lights, ranges and similar devices take the place--on the water--of street signs, highways markers and road map symbols.

Along coasts, rivers, lakes, waterways, channels and harbors, aids to navigation serve as markers and guides to help the boater locate position and avoid hidden dangers.

They range all the way up to lighthouses, Texas Towers and sophisticated electronic devices and systems such as radio beacons and LORAN...all designed for one purpose: aiding boaters, recreational as well as commercial.

Aids to navigation assist the skipper in making land from the open sea. They can lead you through harbors, and through rivers and channels. Aids provide a continuous chain of chart marks for coastal piloting. In short, they are indispensable to safe boating.

Most common is the day marker, also the red and black buoys, which flank the United States coastline. Through an arrangement of colors, shapes, numbers, lighting and other characteristics, these aids instruct the boater on how to proceed.

They have been placed along coastal waters in a lateral system, proceeding southerly down the Atlantic Coast; in a northerly direction along the Gulf Coast; in a northerly direction on the Pacific Coast; in a westerly and northern direction on the Great Lakes except Lake Michigan where they are southerly.

Since all channels do not lead from seaward, these are arbitrary guidelines established for a consistent system.

For example, as your boat proceeds in from seaward or open water, black markers or buoys mark the left side of the channel. Red markers or buoys mark the right side. Thus, the handy saying "red right returning" applies as you proceed landward.

Proceeding along the U.S. coastline, red markers or buoys always will be found on the landward side.

There are a number of special-purpose buoys that aid the boater's navigation and other piloting uses. For example, vertically striped black-and-white buoys mark the fairway or mid-channel. Red and black horizontally banded buoys mark junctions in the channel or obstructions. A white buoy denotes a safe anchorage.

Because of their many styles, shapes, and color patterns, the Coast Guard Auxiliary recommends that boaters keep aboard and up-to-date chart which interprets the meaning of these informational aids.
