Enlisted receive new per diem rates

Enlisted members on temporary duty assignments began receiving basic allowance for subsistence and the subsistence element of per diem in cash Nov. 1. The rates are \$9.30 per day when government mess is available, \$19.50 when it is not.

Enlisted members on TDY must now be charged for meals in government dining facilities at the same rate as officers -- currently \$9.30 per day.

Members on TDY will pay the following per diem meal charges: \$1.10 for breakfast, \$2.25 for lunch and dinner and \$3.40 for holiday meals.

Peacekeeper Challenge '81

Five Pope SPs make command team

Five Pope security policemen are among 14 men who are representing the Military Airlift Command in the first Air Force Security Police Peacekeeper Challenge competition at Kirtland AFB, N.M. Oct. 29-Monday.

The five members of the 317th Security Police Squadron are SSgt. Billy R. White, Sgt. Roy D. Whitson, A1C Kenneth Volk, SrA. Malcolm Brown and SrA. Kevin M. Lange.

"We sent more individuals than any other base in MAC and we are quite proud of the selection of so many of our people," said Capt. Eugene Hindle, 317th SPS commander.

Captain Hindle explained all of the MAC competitors received extensive training and maximum output during the MAC Peacekeeper Challenge at Pope in September.

"Having seen all the MAC representatives at Pope, I feel they have a very good chance of winning the Air Force competition," Captain Hindle said.

According to Col. Stephen T. Frazier, MAC chief of Security Police, "MAC is hosting the first Peacekeeper Challenge, which is a combat competition for security police units,

federal agencies and allied countries worldwide. The contest involves about 13 Air Force teams totaling more than 100 people.

Other MAC team members, in addition to the Pope contingent, are MSgt. Michael Washinski, SrA. William M. Judd, SSgt. Charles L. Henson and A1C James E. Hosfelt, Dover AFB, Del.; Sgt. Craig R. Hilehey and A1C Anthony M. Robideau, McGuire AFB, N.J.; and SSgt. Henry R. Greer, SrA. Joel A. Mason and SrA. David C. Hill, McChord AFB, Wash.

Capt. Roy Gmitter of Scott AFB, Ill. is the team captain.

The week-long competition features team and individual events and involves law enforcement and security scenarios.

"Previous marksmanship competitions didn't adequately portray what we do," Colonel Frazier said. "This competition tests basically everything we do."

Eight members of the MAC team will compete in the full range of duties to be evaluated, including tactics, revolver and rifle firing, combat patrol, military working dog events, machine gun firing, grenade launching, accident investigation, physical security survey and land navigation.

"We're concentrating on physical fitness," said the colonel. Noting that MAC had constructed the obstacle course at Kirtland. Another obstacle course was recently completed at Little Rock AFB, Ark., which the colonel described as "awesome".

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News briefs

Space-A changes make trip planning easier

Recent changes in travel policies will help make trip planning easier for military members traveling by space available flights and contract air carriers.

Now passengers may sign up for the space-A flight of their choice, but will only need to return to the Military Airlift Command passenger terminal every three days to post their travel intentions.

People leaving from commercial gateways such as St. Louis will only need to revalidate their travel intentions every seven days, because of infrequent schedules.

Previously, space-A travelers had to be present for all scheduled departures to their destination or be removed from the space-A list. Under the new system, passengers will not be removed from the list for failing to meet any space-A call, including flights posted for 24 hours.

Passengers who don't meet a space-A call will retain their standing on the list, as long as they revalidate their intentions every three days.

Also, military members and their families traveling MAC contract air carriers won't have to pay lodging or transportation costs caused by weather or delays beyond the carrier's control. The contract airline will now pick up the tab, except for meals.

This will ease the burden of unexpected out-of-pocket expenses for most travelers, say MAC transportation officials.

MAC finance officials say that advance travel pay can help defray some of the other expenses incurred at commercial gateways.

Flu vaccination drive success

The 1981 version of the Influenza Vaccination Program concluded here last week.

According to Lt. Col. Peter Hoffman, director of Base Medical Services, "A major influenza outbreak can cripple an air base unless it's people are protected; and Pope AFB is."

"Our goal," he continued, "was to reach 96 percent of assigned personnel, and thanks to a lot of concerned and interested commanders and first sergeants, we were able to complete this year's effort at nearly 98 percent."

According to USAF Clinic sources, the following units achieved, at least, a 99 percent participation percentage.

There are ten basic commandments of firearms safety which every hunter should follow:

- Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.
- Watch the muzzle.
- Be sure barrel and action are clear of obstructions.
- Be sure of your target.
- Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot.
- Never climb a fence or tree, or jump a ditch with a loaded gun.
- Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface.
- Store guns and ammunition separately.
- Avoid alcoholic beverages before and during shooting.

When you go hunting, always remember to let someone know where you are going and when to expect your return. Don't travel alone, especially in rough terrain. Plan your activity, and be aware of the terrain and landmarks.

Take enough food for a few extra days, and have basic survival equipment and proper clothing. Be familiar with first aid procedures.

Pope recognizes school graduate

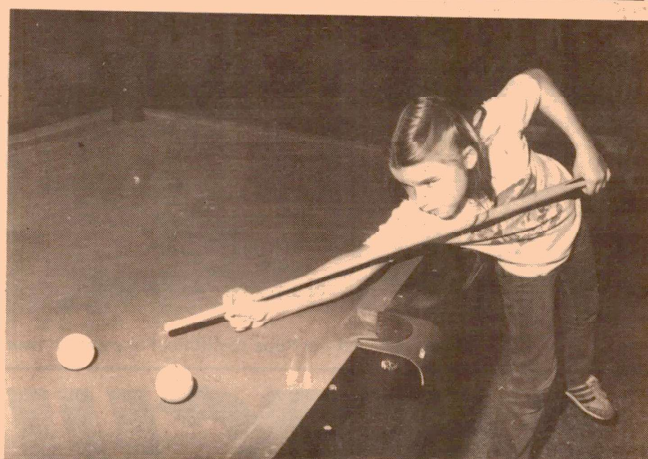

"These training tools are necessary as we need to be in top physical shape to withstand the strenuous rigors of field exercises," he explained. "A 15-mile trek through the mud and swamps doesn't compare with a mile-and-a-half run."

He hopes to have an obstacle course at every MAC base in the next few years.

Other than training, there are "obvious benefits from competitions such as Peacekeeper Challenge," said Colonel Frazier. "Not only is there an

increase in morale, but our people bring home their sharpened skills and this rubs off on their counterparts."

"As a result, it raises the professionalism of all our security police people."

Colonel Frazier said that MAC security police units are heavily tasked for defending air bases and the competition will strengthen their ability to do that.

"Competitions like these are not just a game," he stressed. "It is a real test of how we will survive when we must respond."

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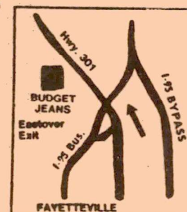

No 800 calls allowed

I have a little complaint about the new phone system we have on base. I can understand the control numbers on long distance telephone calls, but if a person has a toll-free number—for example to his or her credit union, etc.—I think

the person should be able to go to the base operator and get a toll-free number passed through rather than being denied since it isn't for official business.

In the past, individuals with access to class A or B telephone service could make toll-free calls by using "1 Plus" dialing. Abuses of this system resulted in the installation of toll restrictors to control the cost of unofficial long-distance calls. All long-distance calls must now be placed through the base operator.

The base switchboard only has positions for two operators to work at one time. The two operators on duty must also operate a separate tactical switchboard which controls the hot lines and tactical radios.

Operating these two switchboards includes placing all base-originated long distance calls, placing overseas calls through other bases and answering information calls, AUTOVON calls and trouble calls.

Simply put, base operator responsibilities have increased to the point where they often have difficulties answering all of the official calls they receive. Handling unofficial calls ("800" calls to credit unions, insurance companies, banks, etc.) could only be done at the expense of the official calls being processed. We have to put the mission first.

Our present switchboard system is being updated to improve our capabilities. Completion date is set for July, 1982.

Commander's Forum

Reliability-- a team effort

Last week's *Hercules Herald* contained an article outlining the September reliability statistics which were identified as "super". A controlled

reliability rate of 96.4 certainly reflects a super job, but is more significant when it is attained by supporting 1,532 departures. This outstanding accomplishment indicates a key factor that exists at Pope and that is the successful culmination of a team effort.

I have frequently been asked why the Military Airlift Command puts so much emphasis on an "on time" departure. The answer is simple to explain but difficult to achieve on a regular basis.

An on time departure indicates the final stage of a complicated process which involves everyone on the base--a team effort.

When requirements are levied by higher headquarters or the wing to launch an airplane, numerous agencies must start coordinating their activities

to get the job done.

Operations determines the launch date and time--usually affected by when the user wants his goods delivered. Air transportation must insure the cargo is ready for that agreed-upon launch time. Maintenance provides the airframe to use on the mission and a flying squadron provides the crew.

Sounds simple enough so far, doesn't it? But there is still much more teamwork to be done.

Many other agencies become involved. How can any of them operate without trained people assigned to do the job?

Thus support people become a part of the team. These assigned people must be fed, have a place to live and also be provided the best medical care

available to help get that on-time departure.

The bottom line of the whole operation is to get the airplane off the ground on time. But what that on time departure tells the wing commander and higher headquarters is that the Pope team is working--and working together.

If any agency doesn't do its job, then the team is not working together as a team.

Simply stated, it is a measure of our efficiency at doing our job, regardless of the agency assigned.

Therefore, those September launch reliability statistics say a lot more than some people realize. They tell the world that we do it better at Pope, we do it more at Pope and we do it as a team.

Medical service keeps Pope flying

Over the entranceways to many Air Force bases and buildings we often see the motto, "The mission of the Air Force is to fly and fight...and don't you forget it!" Conversely, the mission of the Air Force medical service is to support that flying and fighting force, and WE try not to forget it!

Not dissimilar to other base medical facilities, the clinic at Pope strives, daily, to provide the highest quality

medical services. In fact, during the last fiscal year the medical and dental activities saw in excess of 64,000 and 26,250 patients respectively, administered over 50,000 immunizations and completed some 1,000 flying physicals. All in the name of "mission" support.

In order to keep our force flying and fighting, it is imperative that health care be realistic, vital and provide both the active force and their families with a health care system second to none; a practice accomplished in several ways.

Flight surgeons at Pope have been assigned to each of our three flying squadrons which allows each an identifiable doctor. Those not on active flying status are cared for through the Primary Care Clinic.

Sick call for active duty members is held twice daily in both the flight and primary care areas. In addition, special

services, including OB-GYN, Pediatrics, Mental Health and Optometry services are provided by specially trained health care professionals.

A unique dental program, which includes dependent care, a progressive health education program, special interest seminars and a "retiree" physical examination system add immeasurably to Pope's health care package.

Health care...

Whether it be provided to our fighting force in the battle zone or to the airman and the family in peace time, it is an integral part of our combat readiness.

I cannot imagine a highly trained, professional airman attempting to guide a multi-million dollar weapons system when they are physically or mentally impaired, any more than I

can envision our superbly qualified maintenance force sending them up in a machine incapable of staying aloft. Health care...

It means, personal identification of ill health and the integrity to present oneself to a health care provider when necessary.

It means, getting immunizations when required and receiving periodic physical examinations, when scheduled, in order to maintain good health.

It means, seeing to the health of our airmen and their families as a means to decreasing physical and mental incapacities.

The personnel at the USAF Clinic Pope are committed to the health and well being of our fighting force and consider it a privilege to be YOUR health care providers and a part of the Air Force mission.

Housing occupants may have visitors

The privilege or prerogative of Air Force members to have social guests in their homes in military family quarters is not restricted to a great degree so long as there is no health, morale or welfare issue involved.

However, social visits which are expected to exceed 30 days must be approved by the base commander in writing. Such requests must be submitted through the Family Housing Office to the base commander for appropriate action.

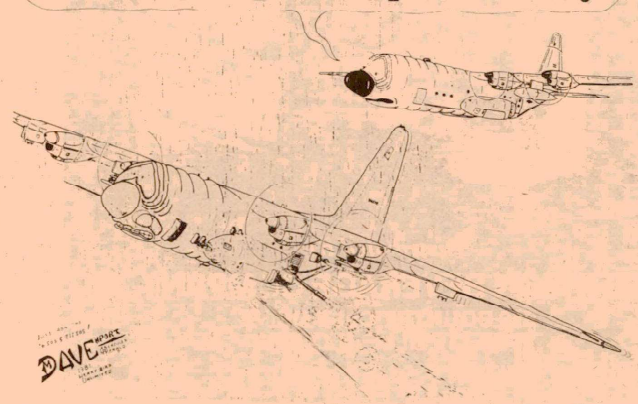
Social visits of 90 days or less by military people or their families does not change the basic allowance for quarters status of the occupant or the visitor. However, a military member who is receiving BAQ is obligated to notify the finance officer whenever a visit in family housing assigned to another member extends for a more than 90 days. BAQ of the visiting member is terminated after 90 days.

In the event of adverse conduct or behavior, destruction or abuse of property, or any other issue determined to be a health, morale or welfare problem, the commander may issue a warning or termination notice.

Violations of this policy will be subject to termination notice from the base commander.

Transportation-- more than a motorpool

"When most people think of transportation they think of a motor pool," said Capt. Tim Pegg, 317th Transportation Squadron commander. "We're a lot more than that."

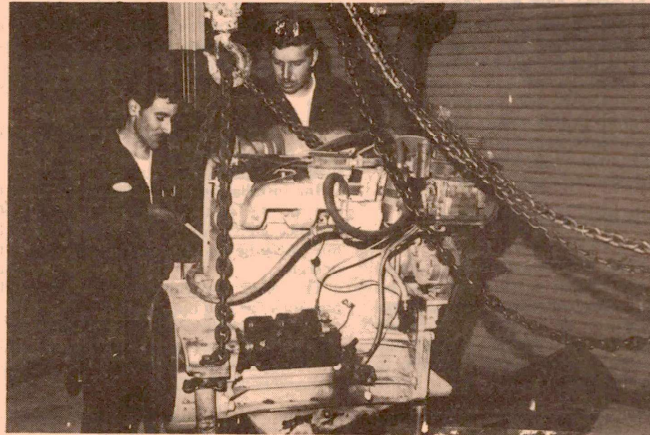
The transportation squadron is not only operates a motor pool of buses, taxis and U-drive vehicles but is also responsible for the maintenance and control of every vehicle assigned to Pope. They also handle movements of cargo and passengers coming to and leaving Pope.

Transportation's Vehicle Operations section responsible for more than seven million dollars worth of vehicles assigned to Pope. "All the vehicles on base are assigned to Vehicle Operations then submotor-pooled to various units," explained Captain Pegg.

Vehicle operations has responsibility for running the base bus service, U-drive fleet, base taxi service, crew transport and driver's license control. "And in general," the captain added, "just managing a very large fleet of vehicles."

Between three and four million miles of service are logged each year on the 312 vehicles which the section is responsible for according to 2nd Lt. Michael Harris, vehicle operation officer.

In addition to supporting Pope's own mission, Vehicle Operations also supports all exercises which come here throughout the year. "We do roughly 89-95 exercises a year," said SSgt. Weldon Borland, chief dispatcher.

"The most outstanding is Volant Rodeo. We supported 1,500 extra people with 40,000 dollars worth of rentals this year."

Transportation people also maintain every vehicle on Pope. The maintenance shop is, "...a lot like a civilian garage in terms of the cleanliness and high degree of standards maintained," said 2nd Lt. Michael Cloyd, vehicle maintenance officer. "If it weren't for the military vehicles in here, you'd think this was a civilian garage."

"What's unique about vehicle maintenance is that were the only

organization which has to account to headquarters for every man-hour of the day," Lieutenant Cloyd said.

All must comply

Air Force tightens standards

Air Force members 31 years of age or older must comply with Air Force weight standards set for service members 17 to 30 years of age.

The announcement by the Air Force officials follows a revision to the Department of Defense directive on physical fitness and weight control. Air Force Regulation 35-11, Air Force Physical Fitness Program, began reflecting the change Nov. 1, said the officials. The new weight standard chart will have just two columns, one for height and one for maximum weight.

There will be a grace period ending April 15, 1982, for those in the 31-and-older group to meet the new standard. However, Air Force time requirements for weight loss were not changed.

Until the change, the Air Force was the only service which permitted maximum weight increase after age 30, officials said.
