Pope's Security Police team is doing well in the Peacekeeper Challenge being held here this week, according to Capt. Eugene Hindle, Security Police commander.

"In raw points Pope is ahead at this time (Tuesday morning) in individual and team events," he said.

"All of the individual events are completed and Pope led in them," he said. "Now we're into team

events. Pope won the first team event which was combat patrol and won the first round of the tactical event."

Security Police teams from throughout the Military Airlift Command are at Pope this week to compete for a place on the Command's Peacekeeper Challenge team. Those chosen for the team will go on to Peacekeeper Challenge '81, the first combat competition for security police units, federal agencies and

allied countries worldwide, which will be hosted at Kirtland AFB, N.M. Oct. 29-Nov. 8.

While other SP events, such as those at Volent Rodeo held here earlier this year, mostly involve security scenarios, this competition will involve law enforcement scenarios as well, according to Capt. Edward Saxon, MAC project officer for the event.

Reforger '81 3rd MAPs supports European deployment

The 3rd Mobile Aerial Port Squadron is providing 35 augmentees and special purpose vehicles in support of Reforger '81 exercises which are taking place in Europe.

Selected as part of the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing's effort, the 3rd MAPs people are providing 24-hour air terminal services and a limited fleet service to transient aircraft stopping at

Goose Bay Labrador in route to and from Europe.

The Military Airlift Command began airlifting more than 17,000 U.S. based soldiers and airmen and nearly 1,000 tons of cargo to Europe at the end of last month through September as part of the annual Reforger, Crested Cap and Cold Fire deployment exercises.

Reforger, short for "Return of Forces to Germany" and Crested Cap demonstrate U.S. capability to move ground and air forces rapidly to reinforce NATO in a crisis situation.

Reforger, the 13th in the series, is a strategic mobility exercise designed to test and evaluate plans, capabilities and support agreements between military and civilian transportation agencies in both the United States and Europe. The exercise will involve active duty, reserve and national guard personnel from both the Air Force and Army.

Crested Cap, an Air Force mobility exercise, is scheduled to include more than 900 Air Force people and 48 fighter aircraft from two stateside Tactical Air Command bases. Twenty-four F-4Es from the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing, Seymour Johnson AFB, N.C., and 24 F-4Gs from the 37th TFW at George AFB, Ca. will deploy to Europe. MAC will fly support people and their equipment for the exercise.

Reforger '81 began Aug. 25 and continues until Oct. 20. Crested Cap began Aug. 26 and ends Sept. 30.

MAC will fly Army troops and their equipment to Europe using more than 150 C-141 Starlifters and seven C-15 Galaxies. These aircraft will operate from 26 continental United States air fields. In addition, 30 commercial aircraft which are also part of MAC's Civil Reserve Air Fleet, called CRAF, will also airlift troops from several stateside bases to host nation airfields in the Federal Republic of Germany and Luxembourg. Exercise aircraft will offload at nine points in Europe.

In this year's Reforger exercise there will also be an Air Base Defense exercise at Hahn AB, Federal Republic of

Germany. Forty-four person security police flights from Pope, Norton AFB, Calif., Little Rock AFB, Ark., and Rhein Main AB, Germany, along with a security police element from Headquarters MAC, Scott AFB, Ill., will deploy to Hahn. Also, a security police team from a stateside Tactical Air Command base will join the MAC teams at Hahn. A like amount of security policemen from several United States Air Forces in Europe bases will join the Air Base Ground Defense exercise.

MAC will test its aeromedical capabilities throughout the European Joint-Service Field Exercises. MAC's tactical aeromedical evacuation units will set up a complete tactical Aeromedical Evacuation System in the exercise area. Units will be positioned in England and in Germany's exercise maneuver areas.

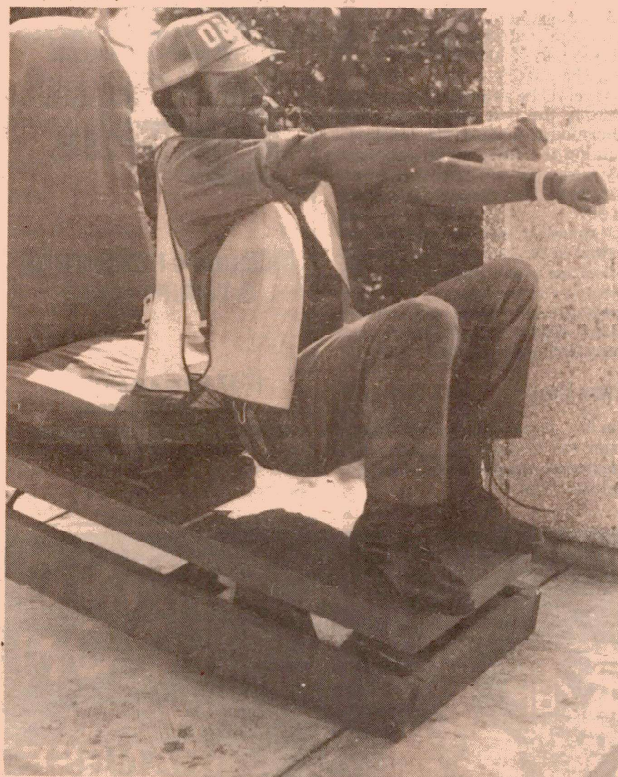
"MAC will fly more than 190 missions in the exercise, with aircrews, aircraft, airlift control element personnel, Aeromedical specialists—virtually every specialty in the command participating. Reforger '81 is an excellent worldwide rapid deployment capability," said Capt. Ronald E. Owens, the Headquarters MAC exercise planner.

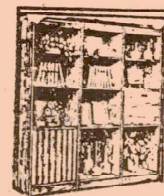

Three-day getaway

An extra day means extra risk

The new three-day holidays give you time to really get somewhere—a mini-vacation.

Great! But remember, a lot of other folks across the country will be doing the same thing—hitting the road for three cram-jammed days of getting away from it all.

That means extra risk. The National Safety Council has been keeping track of holiday safety tolls for a long time. The death count for long holiday weekends runs from 15-25 percent higher than for the same days just before and after the holiday.

It stands to reason that more traffic means extra danger on the highway. People drive further and stay on the road longer. It's simply a matter of more cars and more miles—more exposure to the chance of having an accident.

Once you recognize that fact, you're on the way to a safe three day getaway.

How far to go? This is a mini-vacation—don't plan to drive so many miles you'll have to barrel it all the way there and back. Plan a reasonable

distance that you can do at comfortable speeds. Also consider the kind of roads you'll be travelling and whether someone can spell you at the wheel.

Before you take off have your mechanic give your car a trip check: Tires, including spare, steering system, brakes, hoses and belts, exhaust system, wipers, lights, wheel alignment.

Buckle up while you're still on the driveway or at the curb. That means the entire family.

Take along emergency equipment, especially flares, lights or reflectors to protect the scene if you must make an emergency stop along the road.

Keep your speed at posted limits. In congested spots try to move along with traffic—not faster or slower. Cut your speed in rain or poor visibility.

Don't let heavy traffic bug you. Play it cool—your accident risk goes up as your patience goes down. Many holiday accidents are due to risky passing on two-lane roads when traffic is heavy. Make it a rule to pass only one car at a time.

Keep your eyes and mind on the road. Don't let back seat drivers,

rowdy kids or scenery distract you. Keep your eyes moving far ahead and to the sides. Check rear view mirrors often—always before slowing or changing lanes. Pay close attention to the driver ahead for any clue that he may slow down or come to a sudden stop.

Night time driving is far more dangerous than daytime travel. Avoid it if you can. If you must drive at night follow these safety extras:

- Cut speed about 10 mph from your normal daytime speed. You must be able to stop within your headlight range.

- Turn lights on at dusk. Use low beam when meeting or overtaking.

- Stretch out your following interval. There are more surprises at night.

- In an emergency pull as far off the road as possible and place a flare or reflector 300 feet behind your car, another 10 feet behind and on a two-lane road a third warning 100 feet ahead. Leave headlights on low beam and switch on four-way flashers if you have them.

Here are some safety extras for the expressway:

- Watch the fuel gauge; gas stops are further apart and stalls are dangerous.

- Know your correct exit and be in position.

- Don't stop—never back up. If you miss your exit go on to the next one.

- When you enter speed up in the acceleration lane so you can blend with traffic.

- Never slow down suddenly in a traffic lane.

- Use signals when passing or changing lanes.

- Keep your distance.

- Exist at posted ramp speeds.

Enjoy! You've earned your extra day of extra fun. Don't overdo it and try to cram everything into just one three day weekend. There are at least five good-weather long weekends on the calendar now and the roads will still be there.

So...see you Tuesday. Drive safely, use your seatbelt and have a happy holiday.
