- UK is not an Arctic state
- Arctic and High North of increasing strategic importance
- Responsibility to preserve the stability and security of the region
- New Defence Arctic Strategy, March 2022
- UK Defence Objectives:
 - Protect our Critical National Infrastructure and other national interests
 - Ensure our freedom to navigate and operate
 - Reinforce the rules-based international system
 - Contest malign and destabilising behaviour

The Changing Security Environment



- Russia has legitimate claims and rights
- Has steadily increased its activity in the region:
 - Increasing activity in the Greenland-Iceland-UK (GIUK) Gap and the Baltic
 - Increased submarine activity in the North Atlantic



The UK Approach



- The UK will:
 - Defend our Arctic Allies if needed
 - Contest malign and destabilising behaviours and activity
- Working with partners, we will:
 - Build on long-standing Royal Marine Commando Force co-operation with Norway and the USA
 - Focus on deep interoperability in developing our next generation Anti-Submarine Warfare frigates
 - Enhance the British Army's cold weather training
 - Increase our emphasis on exercising and operating in the High North
