High reliability rate while in Europe

Rotation runs smooth for 40th TAS

Ask someone from Bravo Squadron to characterize the latest 60-day C-130 rotation to RAF Mildenhall and the word you keep hearing is "smooth".
Since deploying to England Oct. 4,

members of the 40th Tactical Airlift Squadron have established a 98.9 per-cent controllable reliability rate for ontime takeoffs (based on the most recent available statistics).

Results like these are indicative of a smooth running organization -- a level of efficiency that Bravo Squadron Commander Lt. Col. John L. Parker attributes to the hard work of the 22 flight crews and roughtly 200 maintenance people on rotation.

"I think the rote's gone very well," Colonel Parker said. "This has been a super rotation, primarily because of the hard work of the maintenance people. In rain, at night, in wind, they

continue to fix the airplanes."

The greatest value of the C-130 rotation to Europe, nicknamed "Volant Pine," according to Col. Edsel R. Field, 317th Tactical Airlift Wing commander, is to provide the aircrews first-hand training experience in a probable theater of conflict if war

"Knowing where you're going to fight is the key," the colonel added. "The purpose of Volant Pine," Colonel Field said, "is to meet the United States commitment to provide NATO with continuous intra-theater airlift capability. The Military Airlift Command is tasked to provide this capability through temporary duty assignments of tactical airlift squadrons to RAF Mildenhall."

Bravo Squadron crews fly regularly scheduled missions throughout Europe, delivering supplies, troops and equipment to various locations.

Capt. Mike Portele and Capt. Dan Bush are aircraft commanders with the 40th TAS. Captain Portele, now on his sixth rotation, feels a greater sense of purpose on the missions he flies in

"When we go to Turkey we are sup-porting a remote Army or Air Force site -- bringing their supplies, maps, mail, fresh vegetables. I'll feel bad if I can't complete the mission because I know they're depending on us," said Captain Portele.
"We get to fly in an environment

that is more like what we can expect if we go to war."

Sometimes the missions he flies are anything but routine, according to the

"One time we airlifted a pregnant lady out of Incirlik (Air Base, Turkey)," he recalled. "Another time

we had an incubator set up in the airplane to transport a sick infant.

Captain Bush is no newcomer to the European theater either, having served a three-year tour at Rhein Mein AB. West Germany.

"The biggest difference over here is more flying time and more time away from the home station," he explained. 'The crew has to be more on top of what they're doing because every country has their own rules. I really enjoy the flying over here."

Both pilots agreed that the various support services, such as mail delivery, have improved dramatically on this rotation.

"We look forward to the mail," Captain Bush said. "The system has improved to the point that we get some letters within three days.'

The exercise was conducted in conjunction with the 307th Medical Batallion at Camp McCall, Observing the exercise were Col. Bruce Purvine, 375th Aeromedical Airlift Wing commander and his deputy commander for Aeromedical services, Col, Frederic Brown.

'This exercise was an opportunity to test and practice the procedures that we've set up," said Capt. Larry Stamler, chief of Aeromedical Evacuation standards and evaluation. "We are the only active duty tactical aeromedical evacuation unit in the Air

The primary mission of 1st AES is the medical evacuation of combat casualties from forward areas through reconfiguration of the C-130 Hercules.

The four elements of the system are the airovac control center, which arranges for airlift, the liazon team, which coordinates airlift with the Army, the mobile area staging element and a flight team consisting of a flight nurse and two medical technicians

Patients arrive at the MASE about two hours, but no more than four hours, before the aircraft arrives. At this point they are administratively processed and given basic life support.

"All of our people are flight qualified, except for the radio operators and all are medical person-

nel," Captain Stamter said.
"From the time of notification we

added. "Once we get to the site and establish the area we can be operational in two hours.



in," she said.

"Everything has gone very smoothly," said SSgt. Frank Mathews, food services specialist. "In the field you work at your own pace, season the food the way you want and come up with different ideas to prepare the food.

How many times have you heard that old familar cliche, "I've just inherited a bucket of worms"? Then the conversation continues something like this, "We're overpopulated with untrained people, morale is low and we're doing lots of overtime."

Well, based on the conversation, I'd say training requirements are rapidly reaching the critical stage. One may say "no section is really that bad, and, if so, what caused its downhill slump?"

We could rationalize and say a lack of continuity, past supervision, poor quality of trainees and numerous other contributing factors were the cause. However, to look at it factually, we must conclude that the lack of a planned quality training program was undoubtedly the main cause of the work section's current poor condition.

What can be done about correcting the problem and insuring similar conditions do not reoccur?

First, you must define and analyze section's Once e your work requirements. established mission requirements are in mind, you effectively establish training requirements.

Now that you're aware of your training requirements, does it all end there? No way! However, it's a start because trainees will become motivated as goals and standards are set.

Let's back track a little and look at the on the job training objectives.

The first basic objective of Air Force OJT is to ensure that Air Force enlisted members receive the knowledge and job proficiency training to meet mandatory requirements for their speciality and perform their assigned jobs.

The second objective of the OJT program is to conduct qualification training to ensure continued job qualification.

There are certain tools at the supervisor's disposal to acheive these goals.

First among these tools recommended by the Air Force is a listing of all training requirements for your section.

Second, the Air Force recommends the use of a master job proficiency guide, briefing guides and training aids for consolidating training requirements so that the program can be understood and arranged in a logical and usable manner.

A final effort would be to support and attend some of the various OJT advisory courses offered by the local Field Training Detachment.

"Then I just unhooked my seatbelt and climbed out of the car,"the airman said. "I didn't really get hurt muc.i. My hand was a little cut because it went through the window.

Airman Ward said that the Subaru is now, "shaped like a Tk-7. The front end was smashed down into a wedge shape." The top on the driver's side was also smashed down about eight inches.
"I used to only wear my seatbelt

about 80 percent of the time depending on the length of the trip," Airman Ward said. "I wear them everywhere I go now--everywhere! I don't get in a car unless I have them on.

This accident was not Airman Ward's first. About a year and a half ago he was in a motorcycle accident when a truck pulled out in front of him. He was wearing a helmet at the time and was not too seriously injured but decided to give up motorcycles.

Having survived two serious traffic accidents because of using proper safety equipment Airman Ward said, "I guess I have someone looking out for me.'

Skiers should contact the Base Gym, Ext. 2671 or 2892 for resume forms. Deadline for resumes and fee is Jan. 30.





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

Volksmarching comes to Pope


