# New VHA should show in today's check

WASHINGTON (AFNS)--Service members eligible for the variable housing allowance will see the revised amount in today's pay checks. The following are the three major criteria that determine if you should receive

VHA:

• You are eligible for basic allowance for quarters.

· Your duty ZIP Code is in the United States--except Hawaii and Alaska--or you are on an unaccom-panied tour overseas with dependents in the United States--except Hawaii

and Alaska.

• The difference between the average rental-housing costs for your grade in your military housing area and 115 percent of your BAQ is greater than zero. There are several low-cost areas where some grades will receive no VHA.

Each of the some 400 military housing areas in the United States, excluding Alaska and Hawaii, has a mon-thly VHA rate for each grade and BAQ dependency status.

Improved statistical methods and a new, more comprehensive housing survey enabled the computation of VHA rates that will result in a more accurate reflection of local housing costs. Since VHA rates are a result of local housing costs as well as basic allowance for quarters rate, some VHA payments increase while others will decrease.

This year VHA rates will be based on

each grade. Last year an averaging system based on five grade groups was used. The change should better represent the different housing costs incurred by each grade. Additionally, separate rates will be computed for company-grade officers with prior enlisted service. They are shown in the chart as O-1E, O-2E, O-3E.

This year's large BAQ raise had a significant affect on VHA. If the October BAQ raise for a particular grade was greater than housing-cost increases in an area for that same grade, then the VHA for that area could be less. This does not mean, however, that the

member's combined total allowances for housing (BAQ plus VHA) will decrease. In most locations, the combined total allowances for housing will be greater than fiscal 81.

#### SPs tested during Cold Fire

Forty-four members of the 317th Security Police Squadron went to Hahn Air Base, Germany, Sept. 21-25 to take part in Cold Fire, a part of Reforger 81 exercises.

The Cold Fire exercise tested the capability of security police units, Military Airlift Command, Tactical Airlift Command and Air Training Command bases in defending Hahn from enemy attack outside the base perimeter.

Do you value your bicycle, stereo, tools or other items enough to lock

About 85 percent of thefts on Pope involve insecure property. A recent walk-through of parking lots revealed the following:

- Two tool boxes left insecure.
- Five power tools left insecure
- Three car tape decks left in plain sight and insecure

• One citizen's band radio left open to theft.

You can avoid losing your property by following a few simple steps

- · Secure your car to include win-
- Place your property out of sight (tape decks, CBs, etc.).
- Secure your bicycles to fixed obiects
- Lock your quarters

## Package reduces federal withholdings

WASHINGTON (AFNS)--Service members will see their federal income taxes reduced an overall 23 percent in the next three years as a result of the tax package passed by the Reagan administration.

Withholdings have been reduced by 5 percent starting this October and will be included with the pay raise in today's check. Withholdings will be reduced 10 percent July 1, 1982, and another 10 percent July 1, 1983.

To see this applied, consider the following examples. Staff Sergeant Bluesuiter is single with eight years of service. The sergeant's pay is \$965.70 per month. With the 5 percent reduction, the withholding is \$136.59. Without the reduction, \$143.96 or \$7.37 more would have been taken from the sergeant's pay.

the sergeant is married, the withholding for two people—the member and spouse--is \$87.09. The prereduction tax withholding would have been \$97.33. If the sergeant has a child and spouse--three persons including the sergeant--the withholding is \$73.75, rather than the \$82.33 figure before the

In 1982, the increase to a 10 percent reduction will result in more savings for the sergeant. If the sergeant is single, the deduction is about \$122.93. If the sergeant is married, the 1982 withholding is about \$78.38. If the sergeant has a child and spouse, the withholding for 1982 will be about \$66.37.



# Pay package Financial update for military, civilians

DENVER (AFNS)-Military pay rasies signed into law Oct. 13 by President Reagan and changes in annual variable housing allowances will be in today's end-of-themonth pay checks.

Air Force Accounting and Finance Center officials here said end of October pay will include new rates retroactive to Oct. 1 for:

Basic pay,
 Basic allowance for quarters (14.3 per-

Basic Allowance for subsistence (14.3)

percent),

New federal tax schedules,
Variable housing allowance pay may either increase or decrease, based on the results of the annual survey.

A viation career incentive pay. Members with more than six years' service will receive an increase of from 30 to 35 percent. Rated officers with more than 25 years of commissioned service, 0-6 and below, who are in operational flying positions will receive ACIP

Hazardous duty incentive pay. This will increase to \$83 for enlisted members and include three new skills: (A) servicing aircraft missiles with highly toxic fuels or propellants,

(B) Laboratory work that is handling live and dangerous bacteria or viruses or frequent exposure to highly toxic pesticides and (C) flight operations on ships from which aircraft

● Enlisted aircrew flight pay. Rates will range from \$83 to \$131 depending upon grade and years of service.

# Discipline key to military capability

The military service has long been known as an institution which demands discipline. Discipline is a key ingredient to military capabiltiy. It is the one factor in the capability equation that cannot be omitted.

Discipline, however, is often misun-derstood. Discipline is not always punishment or submission to authority. Although it can be these things, discipline is training that develops self-control, orderliness and efficiency. It is basically a very simple concept and when a person has developed self-control or selfdiscipline, there is seldom need for use of discipline as a punishment.

People who excel in their chosen craft or profession do so because they are in total control themselves. Those who fail are failures because they allowed someone or something to in-fluence their self-control.

Most of the people with whom I am in contact are in control of themselves. They are responsible citizens both on and off the job. There is, however, a fraction of the population who are not

in control - who have no self-discipline. These people do things most of us do not understand. What kinds of things?

Well, a few examples: late for work or details - or - not showing up at all; breaking windows in the dormitories; letting the air out of the tires of a Security Police vehicle; setting fire to a pool table and, believe it or not, a pair of fatigue pants; possession of a controlled substance; and, driving under the influence. If you see yourself or someone you know here, you see a problem.

These people are a problem, Mostly,

they are a problem to themselves. without exception, they lack self-discipline. Why? Where have they missed out? These are not easy questions to answer.

I do know that it is never too late to begin. Self-discipline is an on-going process and it takes thought and hard work - nothing worthwhile is easy.

Once a person has established con-

trol of his or her behavior - develops self-discipline - then orderliness and efficiency will naturally follow. This one completes the capability

### Crosstrainees find career rewarding

Thinking about changing career

Consider this point of view from former fuels specialist, A1C Early Sexton, now a manpower management specialist with Detachment 12, 1600 Management Engineering Squadron.

"I think this is an excellent job -- it is very satisfying," said the Stone Mountain, Ga. native, who has been in the career field six months. "My input has an impact on the wing's mission. You have to apply yourself and think because this is a very mental job. I'm helping everybody."

Det. 12 is a tenant organization at Pope, reporting directly to Headquarters Military Airlift Command at Scott AFB, Ill.

"Our primary job is to develop manpower standards and for the work centers throughout the Air Force," ex-plained TSgt. Chris Whitehead, an aircraft maintenance specialist for years before retraining. "We identify the number of people it takes to do a particular job in a given work center."

Manpower management specialists and technicians must retrain into the field from their original AFSCs. An eight-week training program required.

"I was looking for something a little bit different that would offer me a marketable skill when I retire," Sergeant Whitehead said.

The manpower management field correlates to industrial technology and industrial engineering in the civilian world, he explained.

The detachment is broken down into

engineering and manpower branches.
"Engineering develops standards which the manpower branch applies, Sergeant Whitehead said.

The most important part of any manpower study, Sergeant Whitehead explained, is the preliminary or identification phase, when all the workload of a particular work center is iden-

Data is collected and sent to a lead engineering team, where it is analyzed and compared with data from similar work centers throughout the Air Force. A mathematical formula is derived from which authorizations for specific units can be determined.

This is not a one-sided process, Sergeant Whitehead emphasized.

"Functional managers and com-manders, as well as the office of primary responsibility at the major command level all contribute input to the study," he added.

In addition to developing manpower andards, MACMET offers a standards, management advisory service to functional managers, commanders and work center supervisors. Once a study initiated, an engineering team will obtain information to determine a

given problem. Their recommendations may or may not be carried out.

MACMET is also the office of primary responsibility for the FASCAP and base productivity programs and the base manpower data system.

recent recruiting drive together by the detachment resulted in 25 Pope people expressing an interest in the career field. Air Force-wide the field is 200 people short of being fully manned.

"We try to insure we have tight con-trol over who enters the field," said Capt. Truman Bolden, Det. 12 commander. "I have a good feeling about our people -- what gives me this feeling is the dedicated technicians and branch chiefs who are highly qualified to do

Fire victims are children about 40 percent of the time. Approximately three to four thousand youngsters through the age of 15 die from fire each year. An estimated 25 percent of the fires take place when the children are alone or without proper super-






