A whole passel of airlift cowboys came to Pope this week for Volant Rodeo with their sights set on a trophy and a name-best tactical airlifter in the world.

The showdown got underway Monday with opening ceremonies on Pope's green ramp. Gen. James R. Allen, commander in chief of the Military Airlift Command, welcomed the 30 participating teams from the U.S. Air Force, Air National Guard, Force Reserve and four allied nations.

General Allen said Volant Rodeo is more than just an airlift competition.

"This is a NATO competition--a symbol; a solidarity of that great alliance which has preserved peace for 32 years in our part of the world," he

said.
"The competition will improve the readiness of MAC," he continued. He

added that new techniques and procedures would filter throughout the command from the competition.

Earlier, Brig. Gen. Robert B. Patterson, Volant Rodeo competition com-mander, said the finest airlifters in the world had gathered at Pope to test their skills.

"Each year the competition improves and becomes more intense," he said.

Other general officers in attendance

at the ceremony were Lt. Gen. Jack V Mackmull, 18th Airborne Corps and Fort Bragg commander, Maj. Gens. Thomas M. Sadler, 21st Air Force commander, James E. McAdoo, 14th Air Force commander, and Raymond Hebrank, adjutant general of California.

Also on hand to welcome the participants to Pope and North Carolina, were Col. Edsel R. Field, commander of the host 317th Tactical Airlift Wing, State Sens. Joe Raynor and Tony Rand, Fritz Healy, president of the Military Affairs Committee, and Joe Barr, founder of the Pope Special Activities Committee.

The Army's crack parachute team, the Golden Knights, opened Monday's ceremonies with a demonstration of aerial manuevers and precise landings in front of the reviewing stand. The Knights team members presented Gerneral Allen batons used in the demonstration. Ceremonies were concluded with a musical salute to each of the military branches by the Air Force Band of Mid-America.

Earlier, Generals Allen and Patter-son reviewed the Volant Rodeo par-ticipants as they stood in front of their

Twenty-six tactical airlift units from MAC bases plus one team each from the United Kingdom, Italy, West Germany and Canada entered the week-long event. The 30 teams were split into individual teams competing in airdrop, aircraft maintenance, combat control, joint inspection, engine running onload/offload and security police

An awards ceremony is scheduled today at 3:30 p.m. at York Theater on Fort Bragg. Because of limited seating, the ceremony will be open to competitors, competition staff and invited guests only.

A picnic follows at Pope Park at

6 p.m. Tickets are available at the information booth in the Rodeo area next to the Command Post for \$1.

Crime Stop deters vandals

They struck in the dark of night.

Slipping from house to house, carrying buckets and brushes, talking in stage whispers--they hit seven houses. In the morning, seven people emerged from their on-base homes to discover that their property had been

Seven families--all neighbors on a street in the family housing area--had their cars repainted in just one of many such recent late-night vandal attacks. Nobody heard anything. At least if they did, no one took the time to call the Security Police anonymous Crime Stop number.
"It's bad when seven cars are van-

dalized on the same street and no one

BX thefts cost the customer

DALLAS (AFNS)—Since January more than 3,000 Army and Air Force Exchange Service customers worldwide have lost their exchange shopping privileges because they were caught

AAFES employees have caught and detained 20,000 individuals for shoplifting during the past two years with the average theft amounting to \$13.89,

said Exchange officials. Clothing is at the top of the list of merchandise lost by shoplifting, followed by costume jewelry, cosmetics, cassette tapes and other items that can fit easily into a pocket or

AAFES officials say the chances of getting caught are quite good — maybe not the first time but sooner or later The Exchange trains not only its store detectives but its managers, supervisors

and all other store personnel on how to detect shoplifters.

Family members and civilians are subject to prosecution in civil courts, resulting in a federal conviction. If convicted they will lose privileges for at least six months.



Strike back at vandals with Crime

notices anything until the next morning," said SSgt. Thomas J. Neville, Security Police Crime Prevention

NCO.
Vandalism has been on the upswing recently in base housing, according to Sergeant Neville. The pranks range in severity from stealing or destroying garden hoses to stealing bicycles and painting cars.

"We suspect that the vandals are between 14-18 years old," Sergeant Neville said. "Its probably a group, because they hit in clumps.

Security Police recently compiled a chart illustrating the correlation between vandalism incidents and Crime Stop calls. A portion of the 30-day chart is shown at right.

The chart showed that on days when Crime Stop received few calls, vandals made several successful attacks. And when the Crime Stop line was kept busy, vandals made few strikes.

For instance, Crime Stop received four calls May 14 and there were no vandal attacks. Only one call was received May 17 and vandals struck four times that day.

"It's virtually impossible for us to have a patrol on every street in housing every minute of the day," Sergeant Neville said. "We have to rely on the people who live there to be our eyes and ears.

"When someone calls us on the Crime Stop line, 394-4111, to report a suspicious activity we send a patrol out right away," he explained. "Even if they don't turn up anything concrete, their very presence in the area tends to scare off would-be vandals.'

There are several other things which people can do to protect themselves against vandalism according

Sergeant Neville. "The first thing they can do is lock up their property," he said. "It's unbelievable, the number of bicycles that are just left lying on lawns or simply parked under carports in our housing area. All a thief has to do is ride away on the bike."

Marking property also is imperative. "That way, if something is stolen, then later recovered, it will be a lot easier to trace and to prove ownership," he

Lights should be kept on outside at night. Vandals are much less likely to strike a well lit house than a dark one that offers plenty of shadowy hiding

People should also make a habit of looking outside frequently and keeping an eye on neighbors' homes. "Just an eye on neighbors' homes. think how you would feel if your property was stolen or destroyed, then noticed a suspicious character lurking about and hadn't bothered to report it," the sergeant said. "This is especially important to military people who are often away on leave and tem-porary duty."

Sergeant Neville added that a large part of the responsibility for stopping on-base vandalism was with the parents of prank-pulling children. "Parents are responsible for the actions of their children," he said. "The base has a strictly inforced curfew, but parents should also know where their children are and what they're up to at all times. If their children are caught vandalizing someone's property, the parents could very well end up answering to the base commander.





Gen. Allen greets Rodeo teams

A whole passel of airlift cowboys came to Pope this week for Volant Rodeo with their sights set on a trophy and a name-best tactical airlifter in the world.

The showdown got underway Monday with opening ceremonies on Pope's green ramp. Gen. James R. Allen, commander in chief of the Military Airlift Command, welcomed the 30 participating teams from the

U.S. Air Force, Air National Guard, Air Force Reserve and four allied nations.

General Allen said Volant Rodeo is more than just an airlift competition.

"This is a NATO competition-a symbol; a solidarity of that great alliance which has preserved peace for 32 years in our part of the world," he

"The competition will improve the readiness of MAC," he continued. He

added that new techniques and procedures would filter throughout the command from the competition

Earlier, Brig. Gen. Robert B. Patterson, Volant Rodeo competition commander, said the finest airlifters in the world had gathered at Pope to test their skills.

"Each year the competition improves and becomes more intense," he

Other general officers in attendance

at the ceremony were Lt. Gen. Jack V. Mackmull, 18th Airborne Corps and Fort Bragg commander, Maj. Gens. Thomas M. Sadler, 21st Air Force commander, James E. McAdoo, 14th Air Force commander, and Raymond Hebrank, adjutant general California.

Also on hand to welcome the participants to Pope and North Carolina, were Col. Edsel R. Field, commander of the host 317th Tactical Airlift Wing, state Sens. Joe Raynor and Tony Rand, Fritz Healy, president of the Military Affairs Committee, and Joe Barr, founder of the Pope Special Activities Committee.

The Army's crack parachute team, the Golden Knights, opened Monday's ceremonies with a demonstration of aerial manuevers and precise landings in front of the reviewing stand. The Knights team members presented Gerneral Allen batons used in the demonstration. Ceremonies were concluded with a musical salute to each of the military branches by the Air Force Band of Mid-America.

Earlier, Generals Allen and Patterson reviewed the Volant Rodeo participants as they stood in front of their aircraft

Twenty-six tactical airlift units from MAC bases plus one team each from the United Kingdom, Italy, West Germany and Canada entered the weeklong event. The 30 teams were split into individual teams competing in airdrop, aircraft maintenance, combat control, joint inspection, engine running onload/offload and security police events.

An awards ceremony is scheduled today at 3:30 p.m. at York Theater on Fort Bragg. Because of limited seating, the ceremony will be open to competitors, competition staff and invited guests only.

A picnic follows at Pope Park at 6 p.m. Tickets are available at the information booth in the Rodeo area next to the Command Post for \$1.

They struck in the dark of night

Slipping from house to house, carrying buckets and brushes, talking stage whispers--they hit houses. In the morning, seven people emerged from their on-base homes to discover that their property had been vandalized.

Seven families--all neighbors on a street in the family housing area--had their cars repainted in just one of many such recent late-night vandal attacks. Nobody heard anything. At least if they did, no one took the time to call the Security Police anonymous Crime Stop number.

His first impressions of Pope people, Colonel Scott says, is that they are "...absolutely superior. We've got a tremendous mission, and the people here are really dedicated toward sup-porting that mission. Pope is the busiest base in MAC and it takes super folks to do the job.

Strike back at vandals with Crin

notices anything until the next morning," said SSgt. Thomas J. Neville, Security Police Crime Prevention NCO.

Vandalism has been on the upswing recently in base housing, according to Sergeant Neville. The pranks range in severity from stealing or destroying garden hoses to stealing bicycles and painting cars.

"We suspect that the vandals are between 14-18 years old," Sergeant Neville said. "Its probably a group, because they hit in clumps.

Security Police recently compiled a chart illustrating the correlation between vandalism incidents and Crime Stop calls. A portion of the 30-day chart is shown at right.

The chart showed that on days when Crime Stop received few calls, vandals made several successful attacks. And when the Crime Stop line was kept busy, vandals made few strikes.

For instance, Crime Stop received four calls May 14 and there were no vandal attacks. Only one call was received May 17 and vandals struck four times that day.

"It's virtually impossible for us to have a patrol on every street in housing every minute of the day," Sergeant Neville said. "We have to rely on the people who live there to be our eyes and ears.

"When someone calls us on the Crime Stop line, 394-4111, to report a suspicious activity we send a patrol out right away," he explained. "Even if they don't turn up anything concrete, their very presence in the area tends to scare off would-be vandals.'

There are several other things which people can do to protect themselves against vandalism according

Sergeant Neville. "The first thing they can do is lock up their property," he said. "It's unbelievable, the number of bicycles that are just left lying on lawns or simply parked under carports in our housing area. All a thief has to do is ride away on the bike."

Marking property also is imperative. "That way, if something is stolen, then later recovered, it will be a lot easier to trace and to prove ownership," he

Lights should be kept on outside at night. Vandals are much less likely to strike a well lit house than a dark one that offers plenty of shadowy hiding places

People should also make a habit of looking outside frequently and keeping an eye on neighbors' homes. "Just think how you would feel if your property was stolen or destroyed, then

you found that your neighbor had noticed a suspicious character lurking about and hadn't bothered to report it," the sergeant said. "This is especially important to military people who are often away on leave and tem-porary duty."

Sergeant Neville added that a large part of the responsibility for stopping on-base vandalism was with the parents of prank-pulling children. "Parents are responsible for the actions of their children," he said. "The base has a strictly inforced curfew, but parents should also know where their children are and what they're up to at all times. If their children are caught vandalizing someone's property, the parents could very well end up answering to the base commander."






