Vice President visits Pope, Fort Bragg

Vice President George Bush boarded an engine-running C-130 on Pope's green ramp seconds after arriving here

Feb. 5 on Air Force Two.
Maj. Gen. Thomas M. Sadler, 21st Air Force commander, and Col. Edsel R. Field, 317th Tactical Airlift Wing commander, welcomed the vice president to Pope. Also on hand to greet the vice president were Lt. Gen. Jack V. Mackmull, commander XVIII

Airborne Corps and Fort Bragg and Maj. Gen. James J. Lindsay, 82nd Airborne Division commander.

After boarding the C-130 Hercules with Colonel Field and 64 82nd Airborne Division paratroopers, Vice President Bush was flown to Sicily Drop Zone for an assault landing.

The vice president observed demonstrations of the low altitude parachute extraction system, heavy equipment drops and a mass personnel drop of about 630 paratroopers and equipment from 10 C-130s and six C-141s.

He later visited various Fort Bragg facilities.

Before boarding his jet and proceeding to Cape Canaveral, Fla. and the Kennedy Space Center, Vice President Bush was presented by Colonel Field with a framed picture of a C-130 formation from the men and

women of the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing.

The vice president departed Pope about 12:20 p.m.

Wing officials said that Gen. James Allen, commander in chief of the Military Airlift Command called from headquarters MAC, Scott AFB, Ill., and expressed his thanks to everyone involved in the vice president's visit for "A job well done."

New hospital rates explained

Due to a public law, effective September 1981, active duty enlisted people will be charged a flat subsistence rate of \$3.70 per day while hospitalized at Womack Army hospital, according to the hospital's patient administration division.

The charge is not dependent upon the number of meals consumed. Enlisted persons not on separate rations will be placed on separate rations for the period they are hospitalized. Reinbursement for the charge will be made by the member's finance officer after the member is discharged from the hospital. The subsistence charge must be paid at the time of the member's discharge from the

MAC assists with **Operation Deep Freeze**

Twenty-six airlift missions were flown from Christchurch International Airport, New Zealand, to McMurdo Station, Antarctica, for an annual operation known as Deep Freeze. Its purpose is to transport summer-season scientists in the U.S. Antarctic Research Program -- with support people and equipment -- to and from McMurdo

As the main entrance to the Antarctic, McMurdo provides facilities for about 900 people during the summer operating season, as well as the major staging base for support of inland and remote field stations. Its ice runway, serviceable to wheeled aircraft such as the C-141B Starlifter from October through December, can present various hazards.

A common problem is "whiteout." This hazardous situation occurs when large expanses of snow blend with dense, low stratus clouds and blot out all traces of the surface.

Operation Deep Freeze requires that MAC forces work with the Navy, Army and the Royal New Zealand Air

During 1981 Deep Freeze operations, more that 1,100 passengers and about 1.2 million tons of cargo were airlifted to and from "the ice."

The wife of Lt. Col. Carl McPherson, Mrs. McPherson is the coordinator of family services. It is an organization that affirms through its work the well-known phrase, the Air Force takes care of its own. She has been a family services volunteer for a year and a half.

"We have a positive attitude about Pope and we try and communicate that feeling to the people who come in here," she said. "This is a really nice assignment."

Family services, located next to the Base Exchange Barber Shop, maintains a well-stocked loan closet. Air Force members can temporarily borrow a wide variety of household items, including cots, kitchen utensils, card tables, chairs and baby furniture like playpens and cribs.

The Center also provides a brochure file with up to date information on every Air Force installation in the United States and overseas, maintains sponsor kits and conducts an orientation briefing for newly arriving

"I find this job to be very fulfilling," Mrs. McPherson said. "We are serving a useful purpose. When somebody walks in here and their household goods may not arrive for months, it is very satisfying to know you can help them," she said. "No one walks in here unless they really need something.'

Mrs. McPherson said that she also derives a great deal of satisfaction from the monthly newcomers orientations for wives that the center con-

"We try and put the women at ease," she said. "Our briefings are in-formal and we try and get the women to interact and talk. We talk about shopping and places to eat-things that wives are interested in.

Mrs. McPherson was in charge of publicity for last May's personal af-fairs briefing for wives which saw a significant increase in attendance over

the previous year.

percent mental. Golfers can talk themselves into trouble. Workers can talk themselves into accidents by talking themselves into violating safety rules.

However, the most important similarity between golf and working safely is concentration. In both instances we must concentrate on what is about to be done. Many golfers, and I am one of them, have some difficulty in keeping their minds on the shot they are about to make. I know that I find myself putting for a birdie in my head while I am still in the process of getting onto the green.

When you are on the job and your mind is on the coming weekend's fishing trip, you may miss the fishing trip if the job at hand gets away from you. Of if you are driving and can't remember whether you stopped at a stop sign, you are in trouble. In golf or on the job, we must concentrate on what we are doing.

Another thing that gives me and a lot of other golfers trouble is the failure to correct a recognized failure. At times I find that when I am taking my backswing I feel that something is wrong: I don't feel comfortable, my feet are not right, my grip is not right. In that case, the thing to do is stop the swing, back away from the ball, and start over. But do I? Not often. The tendency is to continue the shot and try to make it work. Usually it doesn't

Many times on the job, a worker will face the same problem. A load is too heavy or is being handled wrong, positioning is bad, or a number of other things. The thing to do is stop and start over again, and do it right. Unfortunately, many workers continue with the job and end up hurting themselves. Many back and shoulder injuries are the result of this kind of action. Don't go ahead with something when you know it is wrong.

Did you ever watch the pros play golf on television? They look over the lie of the ball and remove anything that they can (within the rules) that might affect the ball. On the green in particular, they pick up such small things

as blades of grass. Mostly, it is not because the grass, or whatever, will affect the ball.

These things are removed because they have caught the golfer's attention and might cause a break in concentration during the shot. It is the same on the job or when driving a vehicle. If there is something that is distracting you, get rid of it.

A golfer can save some grief by con-centrating on the game. A worker can save grief on the job the same way.

Key to golf and safety: concentration



Home heating fires increase

were the main factors in a 32 percent increase in heating fires in one and two-family dwellings between 1979 and

According to figures released by the Federal Emergency Management Agency's U.S. Fire Administration, solid fuel heating fires-primarily those in fireplaces and woodburning stoves-showed a dramatic 66 percent increase, while other types of heating fires in these residences increased only about eight percent for the period.

Woodburning stoves and fireplaces eight percent for the period. Solid-fuel Solid-fuel heating also was responsible for 42 percent of the fire deaths in one and two-family dwellings in 1980.

Improper installation, putting bedding and other combustible materials too close to the fireplace or stove and lack of maintenance allowing creosote to build up were the major problems in fires involving woodburning stoves and fireplaces.

Base Fire Inspectors will provide needed safety information about these and other winter hazards.

Pope crews support "Team Spirit '82"

The Military Arilift Command's "Team Spirit '82" exercise will begin February 13, with MAC flying about 280 missions, airlifting more than 14,000 troops and nearly 3,600 tons of cargo to Korea.

Seventy-four Pope Air Force Base people will take part in the exercise, in-cluding eight crews from the 41st Tactical Airlift Squadron, 17 maintenance personnel, 7 from intelligence and 2 people from the 317th Supply Squadron.

This 5-week Joint Chiefs of Staff-directed, United States Pacific Command-sponsored field training exercise is designed to test the deployment reception and employment of Republic of Korea and U.S. forces responding to possible contingencies in Korea.

MAC airlift control elements and mission support teams will be sent to 24 locations throughout the United States and to major Pacific bases to handle the onload and off-load of Department of Defense forces flying to the exercise area.

Government must increase women's role Weinberger says

WASHINGTON (AFNS)--"This Administration desires to increase the role of women in the military and I expect the service secretaries actively to support that policy," Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger told secretaries of the military departments

in a recent memorandum.
"Women in the military are a very important part of our total-force capability. Qualified women are essential to obtaining the numbers of quality people required to maintain the readiness of our forces," the memo

reads.
"While we have made much progress, some institutional barriers still exist. I ask that you personally review your service policies to ensure that women are not subject to discrimination in recruiting or career opportunities.











The potential appraisal system will be one factor used to determine if a person is referred for competitive placement in a job. Its purpose is to make meaningful distinctions among qualified employees.

Potential will be determined by formulas developed for 23 types of positions--called job families--having similar characteristics of job requirements.

Weights—the degree of importance of each element in a job family—have been assigned to each of the 19 behavioral dimensions for each family. Weights vary by job family and supervisory or non-supervisory characteristics of the positions.

For example, behavioral dimension number 12 is "the employee prepared written materials that are effective and easily understood." When an employee applies for a writer/editor position, the rating on element number 12 would have a high weight because it is very important in that occupation. If the employee applies for an accounting technician position, the rating received for this element would have a low weight. Element number 12 would not even be considered if the employee applies for an electrician position.

Forty different formulas are used to predict an employee's potential for success. The maximum rating possible

for each job family is different. The maximum rating on the CPAS will depend on the job family, whether the job is supervisory or non-supervisory and the applicable behaviorial dimensions. As a result, no single score can be provided to an employee.

Falcons drop shootout, women grab third

Local top amateur bowlers, representing B&B Lanes of Fayet-teville, visited Pope recently to compete against the base's two varsity bowling teams.

After the final pins had dropped in one of the highest scoring matches ever witnessed at Pope Lanes, the Falcons had lost a heartbreaker, 6,938 to 6,678; while the Falconettes extended their record to 3 and 0 with a devestating 6,183 to 5,800-pin win.

Falcons

The Falcons, fresh off a big win with Seymour-Johnson AFB, jumped out to an early first-set lead behind the hot shooting of lefthander Johnny Cassell. Cassell, better known as "Mr. Falcon" in local bowling circles, ripped off games of 224, 213 and 233 for an excellent 670-pin start, followed by Falcon team captain, Mike Callahan, who added two more 200-plus games

and a 618 set to the attack.

B&B found the range in the second set, grabbed the lead in game four and never again trailed. Jay DeJaynes led the All-Star's assault with 627 pins, followed by Wallace's second straight 619 set. Gene Sparks added a 602 to the All-Star's total.

The loss marked the Falcon's first of the season and first ever to a Fayet-teville team at Pone Lanes

Cassell led all scoring in the event with 1,239 pins, followed by Wallace's 1,238.

Falconettes

The Falconettes, resembling anything but a squad that went winless in 1981, ripped past their guests in game one and roared on to a big 367-pin win. Primiere righthander, Linda Griffin, led the Falconette's first block attack with a 554-pin performance that included a 236 game, followed by Mar-

tha Killian's 540-pin effort.

Debra Stefan, rolling in her last match as a Falconette, and Griffin continued to apply the pressure in the second set, rolling 567 and 523, respectively. Sue Whiteside's 547 paced the R&B attack.

Griffin led all scorers in the event with 1,077 pins. Killian was second with a 1,033-pin total.

The win was the third in as many outings for the lady Falcons.

Mixed Doubles

Pope couples grabbed the majority of the places in the match's side-line

Falconette team captain, Marilyn Long and partner, Cassell, blasted their way to first place in the event, rolling scores of 562 and 624, respectively. Their 1,186-pin total was highlighted by Long's 238 final game.

Another Pope duo, Killian and Rich

McClain, grabbed second place in the event with 1,135 pins, while two other Pope teams were placing "in the money;" Yu-Lan Bailey and Ed Fenstermacher (1,099), fifth and Griffin and Lee Ballard (1,079) sixth.

Overall

Cassell led the men's scoring for the day with 1,863 pins and a 207 average. Wallace, B&B's team captain, and All-Star Pete Zanella, finished second and third respectively with totals of 1,776 and 1,763.

Killian carried the scoring banner for the women, knocking down 1,599 pins for a 177 average. Griffin's 1,555 and 172-pin average earned her second place in the scoring parade. The Falcons are now in Las Vegas,

The Falcons are now in Las Vegas, Nev., competing in the Worldwide Military Bowling Championships held annually at the Showboat Hotel, Casino and Bowling Center.

Air Force chooses C-5N, KC-10A combination over C-17

The Air Force has recommended that a mix of 44 KC-10A and 50 C-5N aircraft be procured as soon as possible to lesson a serious shortage in military airlift, instead of the previous proposal to purchase the C-17A.

The C-5N is a modernized version of the C-5A Galaxy cargo aircraft. The KC-10A is a dual-purpose airlifter and tanker. Cost would be about 11 billion during the next five years.

The Air Force has supported the C-17A until recently. That was based on the assumption that funds for airlift would be limited. Under that assumption, the Air Force believed the slightly earlier availability of the C-5N would be offset by advantages of the C-17A--better military utility and more potential for the ultimate replacement of the C-130 and C-141 force.
