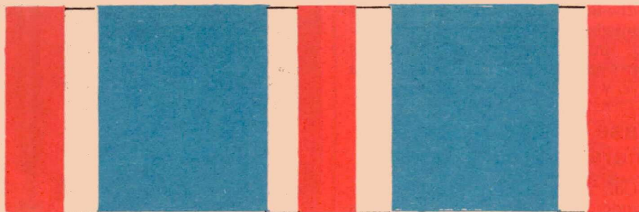


Wing wins unit award

The hard work, dedication and excellence of the men and women of the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing was recognized recently when the wing received the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award. The award is effective for June 1, 1979 through May 31, 1981. Those assigned to the 317th TAW between those dates are authorized to wear the Air Force Outstanding Unit Ribbon and personnel will automatically update records accordingly.

The citation accompanying the award reads:

"The 317th Tactical Airlift Wing, Military Airlift Command, distinguished itself by exceptionally meritorious service from June 1, 1979 to May 31, 1981. During this period,



the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing performed with distinctive excellence during the numerous combat readiness, training and humanitarian missions throughout the free world.

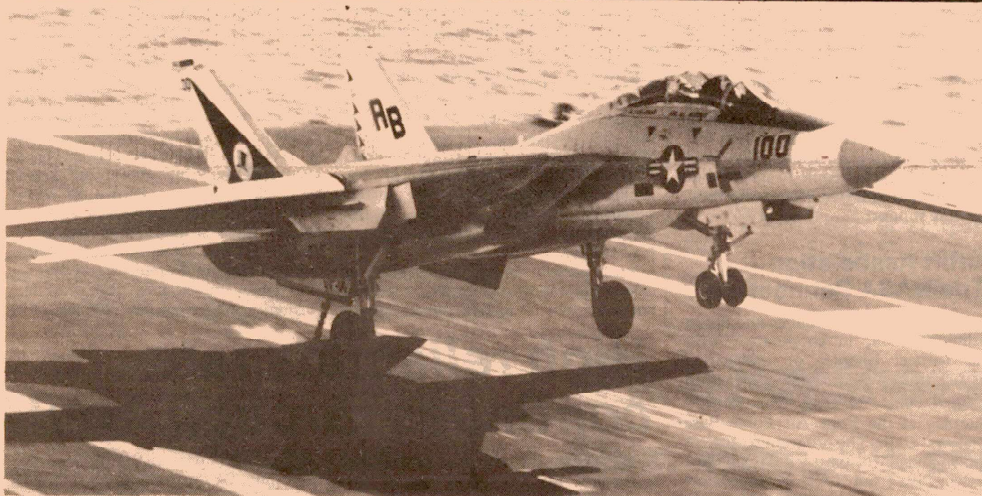

F-14 to Pope, Fort Bragg Open House

Precision aerial maneuvers and combat tactics performed by skilled Air Force and Army pilots will highlight the Pope-Fort Bragg Open House May 22 on the Pope flightline.

The flightline will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Highlighting the Open House will be an air show, scheduled to begin at noon. Military Airlift Command C-130 "Hercules" transports will demonstrate their capabilities to airlift troops on short dirt airstrips and to airdrop troops and equipment.

The Navy will demonstrate its new F-14 "Tomcat." The sweep-winged fighter is one of the latest in the military flying arsenal and is capable of

achieving speeds twice that of sound.

Two A-10 "Thunderbolt" close support fighters will fly air cover for members of the Army's elite 82nd Airborne Division as they demonstrate an air assault operation.

Officials at Pope also report that they have requested demonstrations by other fighter aircraft as well.

Other activities scheduled for the air show include an aerial refueling, formation flyovers, a parachute demonstration by members of the 82nd Airborne Division Sport Parachute Club and Pope's Combat Control Team, an air rescue by the HH-3 "Jolly Green Giant" helicopter, and a low-altitude parachute extraction of heavy equipment.

In addition to the air show, a variety of military aircraft and equipment will be displayed including the C-5 "Galaxy" (the world's largest aircraft).

Throughout the day, the Army will conduct a variety of children's attractions including a jump tower and jeep ride. The Air Force will demonstrate their security dogs several times throughout the day. The Highlander's British Brass Band and the 82nd Airborne Division Band will play in concert.

There will be refreshment booths at Pope for the hungry and thirsty.

This year's event marks the third consecutive Open House cohosted by Pope and Fort Bragg.

Briefs

Canalda sentenced

SSgt. Juan R. Canalda, assigned to Pope, was convicted and sentenced at general court martial May 6 for the abduction of an 8 year old girl from the Pope Elementary School grounds Feb. 19.

Canalda pled guilty as charged to offenses involving kidnapping, sodomy, and indecent liberties with a child under the age of 16. He was sentenced to forfeiture of all pay and allowances and reduction to the lowest grade.

Under the terms of a pretrial agreement and the sentence imposed by the court, Sergeant Canalda will be ordered to be dishonorably discharged and confined at hard labor for 20 years. The place of confinement will be the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks, Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Pope observes police week

Pope's 317th Security Police Squadron will join other area law enforcement agencies in observing Police Week this week. The week's festivities will be highlighted by National Law Enforcement Day Sunday on the campus of Fayetteville Technical Institute.

In conjunction with FTI and area explorer scouts, Pope's security policemen will conduct a military working dog demonstration and a display of one of the squadron's cruisers.

Pope crews in Caribbean

One crew and aircraft from the 41st Tactical Airlift Squadron and 39th TAS have deployed to Hurlburt Field, Fla. for Operation Ocean Venture according to wing officials. Lt. Col. Mike Clay, 41st TAS, is serving as the deputy commander for unconventional warfare for Ocean Venture.

During the deployment phase of the exercise, Military Airlift Command aircraft delivered more than 4,500 people and 2,800 tons of cargo to the exercise area. All this will be moved by 18 C-130s, 99 C-141s, eight C-5s and eight commercial aircraft.

According to Lt. Col. James L. Dunn, MAC liaison exercise officer, Ocean Venture has been an "education for the joint services group as to what MAC does and what MAC has available."

Colonel Dunn, chief of the combat support branch at the 436th Military Airlift Wing at Dover AFB, Del., says this is not one of the "big" exercises for MAC; the command will transport only 10 percent of the people involved.

MAC will deploy and redeploy people, furnish airplanes during the employment phase and transport troops and equipment to other locations during the exercise.

While MAC aircraft are used regularly during exercises of this nature, this is the first time commercial aircraft have been used.

Base commander shares concern

Applications will be accepted through May 21. After that date, the existing school board members will screen the applications prior to filling the vacancies.

Colonel Angell went on to say, "We have had several well qualified individuals apply for these positions; however, there is still time for others to express their concern and support for these demanding positions. We need the best available people to insure that Pope school children receive the best possible support."

High reliability rate continues through April

Pope had the highest controllable reliability rate of all wings in the Military Airlift Command in April according to recently compiled statistics.

During April, 1,044 aircraft of

various types took off from the Pope flightline. Of those departures, only 49 were delayed and 103 were early. Pope's overall controllable reliability rate for the month was 96.3 percent.

Communication commander visits Pope

Communications may be his field, but people are his primary concern. Last Friday his focus was on Pope and the people who provide essential services to the base.

He is Maj. Gen. Robert F. McCarthy and he commands the Air Force Communications Command at Scott AFB, Ill. His people are members of the 1943rd Communications Squadron and they provide around-the-clock communications to support the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing and tie it into a worldwide command and control system.

General McCarthy assumed command last July. Since then he has devoted much time to his most valued resource, people. "More than half of my time is spent on people issues," he says. "The best way to find out what those issues are is to get out and talk to the troops. In AFCC, that com-

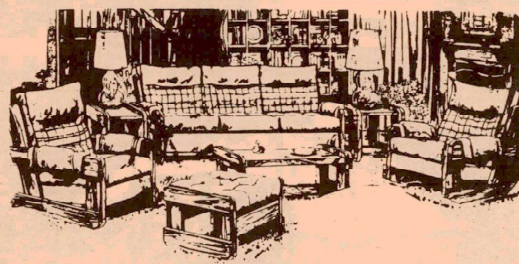
munications channel is uniquely difficult to establish because of the widely dispersed nature of our units and our mission. Our people operate from more than 400 locations worldwide, providing the communications, air traffic control and data processing capabilities needed to make the Air Force an effective deterrent force."

AFCC people, about 49,000 in all, literally span the globe. Not only do they operate from military bases around the world, but also from 59 FAA facilities in the aftermath of the civilian controller walkout. Approximately 278 controllers have been drawn from 79 bases. By occasionally lengthening the work week and carefully managing leaves, AFCC continues to provide responsive air traffic services to its customers.

General McCarthy visited Pope May 7 to take a firsthand look at the com-

munications and air traffic control operations and equipment of the 1943rd Comm Squadron. During his visit, General McCarthy met with Col.

Edsel R. Field, commander of the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing, and Capt. Marcia Tamblin, commander of the 1943rd Comm Squadron.

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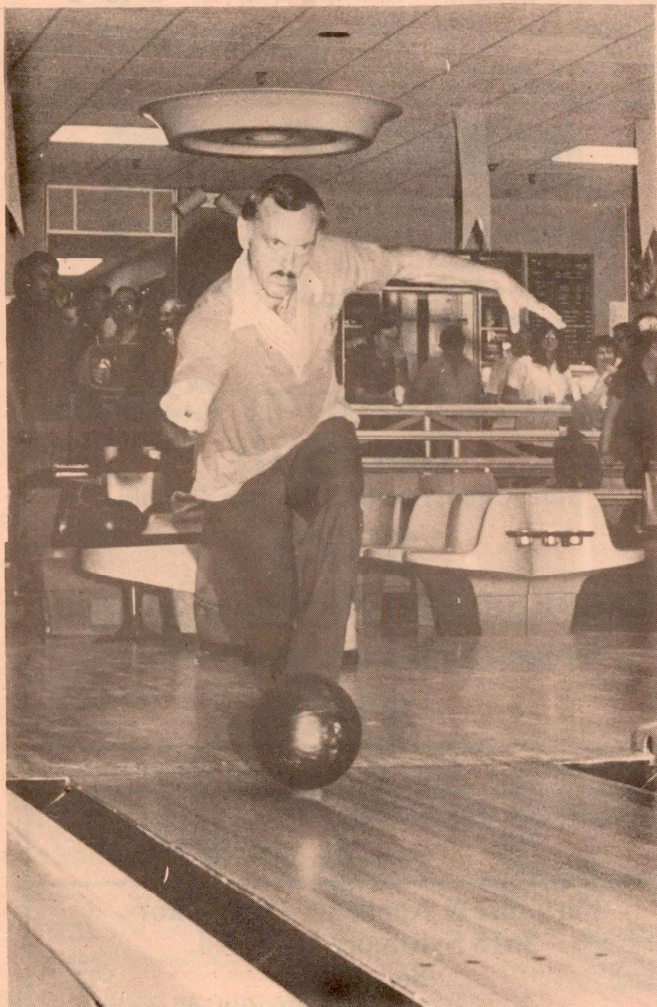

Pope hosts regional bowling championships

It was bowling at its very best last week as Pope Lanes played host to the 1982 Region VI Bowling Championships.

Nearly 90 top keggers, representing Air Force installations from Maine to South Carolina and two overseas locations, squared off for three days of competition to determine the team which will represent the region in All Air Force play this week at Tinker AFB, OK.

Team Event

The tournament opened May 4 with 14 four-man and 10 two-women squads vying for respective team event honors.

Myrtle Beach AFB, S.C., behind the brilliant 1,318-pin, 6-game effort by anchorman Ed Reppert, totalled 4,780 pins to grab honors in the men's division.

Pope's Falcons finished second on the day with a combined total pinfall of 4,683. Team captain Mike Callahan (1,257) and standout righthander Jerry Vanpelt (1,217) led the attack which produced a 195-pin per game average.

An outstanding performance by Sue Bair propelled the Dover AFB, Del., women's team to the top of their standings. Her strong 1,185-pin effort provided the edge as her Dover team managed 2,108 total pins in the winning effort.

The Langley AFB, Va., entry, behind an 1,101 scoring effort by Barbara Cremeans, combined for 2,089 pins to finish second.

Doubles

Day two saw the tourney's participants face off for the doubles events.

A Langley duo, Dave Lancot and Andy Tomaro, connected for 2,416 pins to capture the men's doubles crown. Tomaro's excellent 1,242 led the way.

Dave Johnson and Bill Palm from Fort Meade, MD., finished a single pin off the pace in second place. Johnson's 1,217 paced the team's scoring.

The Falcon duo of Callahan and "Mr. Falcon" John ny Cassell totalled 2,269 pins to finish sixth in the field of 28.

Steady efforts by Kathleen Radcliff (1,008) and Marilyn Kornusky (1,029) paced the Andrews AFB, MD. pair to a 2,037 total and the women's title.

The Fort Meade team of Marie Hooper and Mary Ptacek claimed second place with 2,025 pins. Ptacek's 1,051 led the way.

Singles

Thursday's final day action saw the 86 hopeful All Air Force bowlers move into the arena of singles competition.

A 1,232-pin outburst earned a McGuire AFB, N.J. bowler, Mike

Cuviello, the men's singles title. Cuviello's steady performance was marked by six games between 193 and 224, including four games over 200.

A Dove kegger, Chuck Hadley, third recently in the Langley Invitational, compiled 1,214 pins to finish second behind Cuviello.

Fort Meade's Ptacek dominated women's singles play, ripping the lanes for 1,156 pins and a 193 average on the day. Her second set of 616 pins provided the edge.

Dover's Bair finished strongly to total 1,083 enroute to second place in the event.

Teams Overall

Myrtle Beach held off a final day charge by the host Falcons to earn Team All Events honor. Reppert's strong performance paced the Myrtle Beach effort which produced 13,835 pins and a 192 per game average over the three-day tourney. Ron Meade (3,471-192), team captain Larry Walker (3,404-189) and Jim Ott (3,403-189) accounted for the rest of the team's scoring.

The Falcons, in third and trailing by 261 pins as day three began, charged past Fort Meade and finished second overall. Callahan, who led the team's scoring effort, had plenty of help from teammates Cassell (3,467-192), Vanpelt (3,467-192) and Ed Fenstermacher

(3,291-183). Their 13,734 left them only 101 pins behind the tourney champions.

All Stars

Four men and four women departed Pope Sunday for Tinker AFB.

Qualifying at the top of the men's division ladder was an Andrews AFB bowler, Jim Long. A long-time standout Air Force performer, Long threw sets of 1280, 1250 and 1148 to complete the tournament with 3,678 pins and a 204 average.

McGuire's Cuviello compiled a three-day total of 3,632 and a 201 average to finish second. Tom Malone, (3,594-199) from Plattsburg AFB, N.Y. and Reppert (3,557-198) finished third and fourth, respectively.

Callahan was Pope's top entrant, finishing eighth with 3,509 pins and a 195 average.

Fort Meade's Ptacek, All Air Force in 1977 and 1979, took the lead on day two and never looked back. The steady right-hander managed sets of 1102, 1051 and 1156 to finish with 3,309 pins and a 184 average.

Three-time All Air Force kegger, Barbara Cremeans, Langley AFB, totalled 3,214 pins and a 179 average to finish second. Carol Pace, Bolling AFB, D.C. (3,179-177) and Bair (3,153-175) round out the women's contingent.

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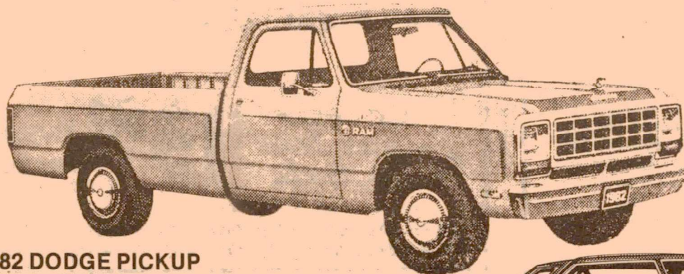


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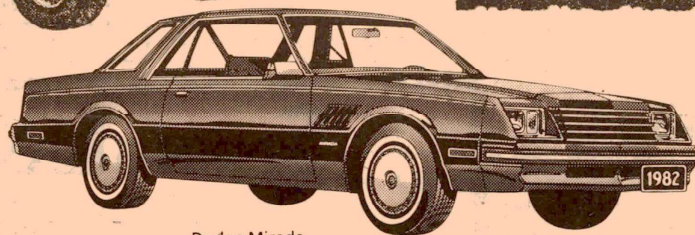

Series EE bonds are protected against loss, fire and theft. Federal income tax on the interest earned may be deferred until the bonds are redeemed, and there is no state or local income tax.

Bonds currently earn 9% if they are held to their maturity of eight years. Currently there is legislation being considered to pay a variable rate of interest on U.S. Savings Bonds held for at least five years. The variable rate would be 85 percent of the average return on outstanding treasury marketable securities that mature in five years. Savings would be protected from drastic market declines by a guaranteed minimum return.

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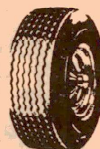
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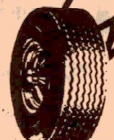

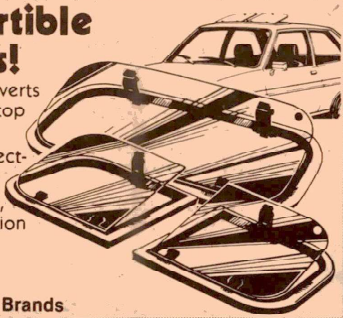
