The aircraft took turns flying out to the storm to fly into the eye of the hurricane and gather weather data. The information was relayed to the National Hurricane Center for forecasts.

Nerve agents deadly

Nerve agents are one of the deadliest weapons used in chemical warfare. The chemical can be dispensed in vapor, aerosol, or liquid form. It is a fast acting killer that must be recognized and treated immediately.

There are six early warning symptoms and three advanced symptoms.

Early Warning
1. A feeling of tightness in the chest.
2. Unexplained running nose.

3. Difficulty in breathing, either in or out.

4. Small, pinpoint size pupils.

5. A slight drawing, slightly painful sensation in the eyes or unexplained dimness of vision.

6. Nausea, vomiting, cramps and involuntary defecation and urination.

Advanced Symptoms 1. Headache, mental confusion, drowsiness, convulsion and coma.

Cessation of breathing.

3. Death.

To counter the effects of nerve agent poisoning the combo pen (auto-injector) and atropine are given a person showing the above symptoms.

What's this? A civilian Boeing 747 enlisting?

This was the case recently on the Pope flightline. It is an important part of the nation's strategic mobility resources. The 747 belongs to Military Airlift Command's Civil Reserve Air Fleet, a contracted wartime reserve component of the Air Force that can be mobilized when airlift demand exceeds military capability.

The planes are specifically marked on the tail for speedy recognition in time of war.

Whether they are really a wartime asset, though, is controversial. According to SMSgt. Art Dureitz, a load-master from McGuire AFB, N.J., a 747 takes from three to five hours to load as opposed to a one-hour load time for the C-141 or C-5. Nor can the plane carry the outsized cargo often hauled in the C-5.

Airmen in 3rd Mobile Aerial Port Squadron recently loaded three 747s here in support of operation REFORGER currently under way in Germany. But they encountered another problem with the plane was an 18-foot high wide-body elevator loader was needed. It was borrowed from Charleston AFB, S.C.

I would like to use this column, however, to select those questions which pertain to more than the individual involved.

Smell at nursery I think something should be

done about the base nursery. There is a terrible odor in the nur-sery and I think the children are not supervised enough. I would like an answer as to why these conditions

The Child Care Center is aware of odor problems, particulary in the toddler area. A survey by Environmental Health in July revealed that the ventilation system in the toddler area was adequate and in compliance with applicable Air Force standards. Since the ventilation system could not be improved the Child Care Center has taken the following measures to reduce odors: The carpet is cleaned at least once a month; carpet and room deodorizers are used; and the soiled diaper container is emptied every two hours. These actions have reduced the problem but not completely eliminated it. Other possible solutions are being investigated.

The Air Force has established--and Pope strictly adheres to--ratios to insure proper supervision is maintained. These ratios are as follows:

6 weeks-6 months 6-18 months 1 caregiver to 4 children 1 caregiver to 8 children 1 caregiver to 10 children 18 months-3 years

3-5 years 5-10 years

1 caregiver to 12 children 1 caregiver to 15 children

All caregivers receive child development, first aid, and CPR training as part of a continuous training program. We are constantly trying to upgrade the quality of child care for our patrons and feel our caregivers are meeting the high standards we have established.

Hunting on Pope

The deer season opens on Fort Bragg Sept. 13 for bow and arrow hunting. Would it be possible to bow hunt in the wooded area across from Perimeter Road away from the runway?

The area that you refer to is controlled by the Wildlife Section of Fort Bragg. The area was opened for bow hunters during the 1981 bow season and will be open again this year. The area is bordered by Hurst Drive, Aldish Street, Butner Road and the fence line that borders the Army Staging area by Gate 6. The area is identified as Area IV at the game warden headquarters. It is limited to five bow hunters and will be open only on Saturdays during the hunting season.

Commander's **Forum**

There have been a number of calls regarding air conditioning in military family housing.

As indicated in last week's paper my decision to turn off air conditioning was based on a long range forecast which called for average temperatures below 78 degrees Fahrenheit. Unfortunately, there were several days of hot weather before we experienced the cooling trend which is expected to last for the remainder of the month.

The nature of many calls indicated the energy conservation program was mismanaged or new construction was not considered or contractors were using base energy.

We aggressively account for every source of energy consumption at Pope. Each new building has been added to the total space allocation for the base so we get credit for new energy requirements. Contractor energy use is

monitored by meter and the cost is billed to the project. Even energy consumption of vending machines operated by the Exchange Service is computed and costs reimbursed.

The energy conservation program is a joint responsibility of all energy users on Pope. We have initiated management actions to monitor and initiated control energy use in those areas and facilities within our control. Base residents also have a responsibility to take actions to reduce energy consumption through limiting the use of air conditioning when weather permits, turning off unnecessary electrical devices when not in use and maintaining a 78 degrees Fahrenheit temperature on thermostats.

Energy consumption indicates we have been ineffective in educating users to exercise conservation on a daily basis. As a result, we ended the sum-

mer period--especially August--with an excessive consumption rate: collectively, we used more than our fair

The action to turn on air conditioning earlier than normal this year and to turn it off last week was my decision. This week we are continuing to turn off selected areas throughout

I realize the difficulties many of you have experienced and we will tighten our program next year to reduce consumption throughout the year to achieve energy conservation objectives without a shortfall at the end of the fiscal year.

The bottom line is that energy costs are continuing to escalate. We spend big bucks for electricity at Pope. Energy conservation is and will continue to be a high priority item and all of us are responsible to do our part.

A letter of apreciation

I would like to share with you a letter I received from a retired military person who recently spent three days on Pope. This in itself is not unusual. However, the background of the retiree is unusual because he has been associated with the military in one capacity or another since 1916. Over the years, he has had the opportunity to see countless military organizations compare outstanding organizations composed of super people who take PRIDE in their work and their base. His letter follows:

Calm, quick action can save poison victim's life

Poisoning remains among the leading causes of deaths in children in

Unfortunately, many of the fatalities could have been avoided if adult supervision had acted promptly and axisely.

Delays in contacting the hospital for advice concerning first aid measures, when not known, are suspected to be the leading reason for death by poisoning in children. If necessary, call the rescue squad or police nearest your home.

Once known, immediate activation of first aid measures is important and should be continued while enroute to a medical treatment facility.

Dilute or remove poisons as soon as possible. Keep Syrup of Ipecac in your home to induce vomiting, when appropriate. If Syrup of Ipecac is not available, try tickling the back of the throat with a finger or similar blunt object after giving water.

Caution: Vomiting is *not* recommended in all cases, especially when acids, corrosives or petroleum distillate products are involved.

If the poison is from a container, read the first aid instructions on the

label and bring the container with you to the medical treatment facility.

When possible, save evidence such as



portions of ingestion materials from vomit which may help identify the plant or object involved. The following represents a partial

The following represents a partial list of items most frequently ingested by children, and the first aid measures to be taken until medical aid is available:

medicine overdoses (aspirin, cough syrup, etc.). Give two or three glasses of milk then induce vomiting

unless the patient is unconscious or convulsing.

Vitamins and iron tablets. Induce vomiting, then give a glass of milk.

Sleeping pills. Induce vomiting.

Sleeping pills. Induce vomiting. Do not induce vomiting or force fluids if the patient is unconscious.

Tranquilizers. Induce vomiting unless patient is unconscious. Give two tablespoons epson salts in two glasses of water.

Arsenic. Give a glass of milk immediately and induce vomiting. Then give the patient activated charcoal.

DDT. Induce vomiting then give two

DDT. Induce vomiting then give two tablespoons of epson salfts in two glasses of water.

Lye. Do not induce vomit. Give the patient a solution of vinegar (two) tablespoons vinegar in two glasses of water), then give two raw egg whites or two ounces of olive oil.

two ounces of olive oil.

Paint (dry). Give milk or water then

induce vomiting.

Paint (liquid). Give two or three glasses of milk. Do not induce vomiting

Cologne/perfume. Give milk. Induce vomiting if large amounts are ingested.

Deodorant. Give milk of magnesia and induce vomiting.

Bubble bath/shampoo. Give milk and induce vomiting.

Nall polish and removers. Give

milk and induce vomiting.

Home permanent/wave solutions. Give milk or water then give weak acid solutions such as lemonade, citris juice ordistilled vinegar.

Laundry bleach/household cleaners/cleaning fluids. Give two orthree glasses of milk immediately. Do not induce vomiting.

Toilet bowl cleaners. Do not induce vomiting. Give two or three glasses of milk or water at once. Avoid gas forming carbonates or bicarbonates.

Wax remover. Give milk or water. Do not induce vomiting.

Fabric softeners. Give milk.
Neutralize with weak soap (not detergent) solution. Induce vomiting.
Household ammonia. Give citris

Household ammonia. Give citris juice or diluted (one tablespoon per glassful) vinegar. Then give two raw egg whites or two ounces of olive oil. Do not induce vomiting.

Do not induce vomiting.

Plants. Any plant is a potential poison. Induce vomiting if convulsions are not imminent. Give artificial respiration if necessary.

Do not panic if poisoning occurs, keep calm and call for help.

Understanding Space A travel can save you money

Space-available air travel is one ofthe most valuable privileges afforded to military people. Understanding the Military Airlift Command's worldwide "space-A" network can help servicemembers enjoy the vacation of a lifetime while saving hundreds of dollars in travel expenses. In order to make the most of space-A travel and avoid unnecessary inconvenience, travelers should acquaint themselves with the system before embarking on a

The most important thing to remember about traveling space-available is just that-the number of seats available depends on mission requirements. Space-required cargo and passengers take precedence, so there's no guarantee that any flight will have seats for space-A passengers.

This rule applies not only at the point of origin, but also at any en route station the aircraft transits. So although you may be signed up for a certain destination, the possibility exists that you may be "bumped" at a stop along the way. Once you've left the point of origin, you can't be bumped by another space-A passenger, but space-required passengers or cargo at an en route stop could reduce the number of space-A travelers who can proceed.

Just as space-required cargo and passengers have priority over space-A travelers, some space-A travelers take precedence over others. Space-available travelers are grouped within four broad categories:

Category 1 is for emergency roundtrip travel for dependents of U.S. service members, Department of Defense civilians and Red Cross personnel in connection with serious illness, death or impending death of a member of the immediate family, between the contenental United States and an overseas area.

Category 2 has two subcategories, 2A and 2B. Category2A is for environmental and morale leave for sponsors and their dependents. Category 2B is generally for active-duty service members on leave.

Category 3 is for dependent secondary school students, college students and active-duty members on permissive temporary duty orders and miscellaneous other categories.

Category 4 is for retired military members who have retired Armed Forces Identification Card (DD Form 2) and are eligible for retired or retainer pay, as well as ROTC cadets and Reservists with appropriate documentation

Priority within each category is determined by the date and time each person's name is entered on the space-A register. Active-duty military members must be on leave in order to sign up for space-A travel, and must be in uniform for the flight, regardless of their branch of service. Registration must be accomplished in person at the passenger terminal, and although sponsors may register for their entire family group, they must have valid ID cards, immunization records and passports for the area of travel for their family members, as well as valid leave orders or other authorization for their own travel, at the time of registration.

registration.

Under a current test program, eligible people can register for a destination three days in advance, and remain on the register for the entire three days without revalidating their intention to travel, even if flights with seats leave that station for the intended destination. Travelers must, however, revalidate their travel intentions by the end of the third day--or the seventh day at commercial gateways-to remain on the register.

Removal from the register will oc-

cur, however, if you are refused manifestation, selection or boarding for such reasons as excess baggage, improper attire, etc. Each space-available passenger is authorized 66 pounds of baggage; family groups may pool their baggage as long as the total weight does not exceed 66 pounds per person.

person.

By direction of Congress, MAC terminals manifesting more than 1,000 international or intratheater space-available passengers each year must collect a \$10 processing charge from



cach passenger traveling aboard DODowned or controlled aircraft. This is a one-time charge, regardless of en route stops, as long as the traveler is proceeding to a specified destination, even if this travel involves changing airplanes.

A passenger failing to register within six hours after arrival at an en route station, or who changes the specified destination, will be reassessed the \$10 charge for onward travel.

Passengers originating at a nonpaying terminal may transit paying terminals without paying the \$10 charge, provided they are proceeding to their specified destination.

Travelers should be prepared to incur additional expenses when traveling

space-available. Meals and lodging may be required, as waiting periods of three days or longer are not uncom-

Additionally, if time is a factor, commercial transportation may have to be used at the traveler's expense. These circumstances occur most often during peak space-A periods, which include late May through early September, as well as the Christmas and Thanksgiving holiday periods, but may occur at any location depending on the number of flights and availability of seats.

Trained specialists at any MAC terminal can help you choose the best routes and answer any questions you have.

Worldwide locator helps track Air Force members

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (AFNS)--A worldwide locator keeps Air Force members in touch with each other, Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center officials announced at Randolph.

Active-duty. retired. Guard, Reserve and their family members may use the service at no charge.

The Department of Defense does, however, ask the general public to pay a \$2.85 fee for the service. Officials said the fee is to offset search costs.

Officials said in certain cases fees will not be charged to members of the public. One such case would be separated members searching for character witnesses when applying for VA benefits, or upgrading discharges

when trying to re-enter the military. A full explanation of the circumstances should be given to determine whether or not a fee is required for the service. military-related Officials ask

requestors to state their connection so

they will not be billed.

Requesters should provide all known information about the individual for whom they are searching. Send the full name, service number and grade to: Headquarters Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center/MPC003, Randolph AFB, Texas 78150.

If the service number is not known, dates and places of birth, organizations and dates of assignments can help locate the person. Once the member is located, the military address will be mailed back to the requester.

To avoid violating the Privacy Act, a system has been devised to contact retired members. Requesters should place letters in sealed, stamped en-velopes with return address and name of the individual to be contacted. That sealed envelope and all available information on the person to be located should be placed into another envelope and mailed to the worldwide locator. The located member receiving the letter will then have the option of answering the letter without an invasion of his or


