



## Pope people airlifted to Savannah

# Wing deploys for readiness exercise

More than 600 Pope people and half a million pounds of cargo and equipment were airlifted Feb. 21-22 from here to an Air National Guard training site near Fort Stewart, Savannah, Ga.

The airlift, involving 27 C-130 Hercules transports, was the first phase of an operational readiness exercise staged by the 317th Tactical Airlift Wing. Sixteen of the aircraft will remain at Savannah until the exercise ends today.

The exercise is designed to test the combat readiness of the wing. Wing Commander Col. Edsel R. Field also flew to Savannah with the wing Feb. 21. Col. James W. Bushey, wing vice commander, assumed home station command in his absence.

"I'm really proud of the way our people responded, both here and at Savannah," said Wing Commander Col. Edsel R. Field. "We showed ourselves some problem areas, but overall I was very pleased with the performance."

The employment phase of the exercise began at 11 p.m. Feb. 22 when two Pope combat control teams parachuted onto a drop zone at Fort Stewart. In later missions heavy equipment was dropped, followed by mass personnel drops of 82nd Airborne Division paratroopers.

Early on the morning of Feb. 23 Pope C-130s airlifted 160 82nd Airborne Division soldiers in a night operation.

The airlift to Savannah began about 1:30 p.m. Feb. 21 with the departure of the first 13 aircraft carrying 257 people. Each airplane staged an assault landing at Fort Stewart prior to landing at the Air National Guard training site. Pope aircraft were arriving at the site well into the night.

Pope people were sent on 13 support chocks and 14 mainstream chocks, according to wing mobility officials. Chalk is the term used to denote a unit of cargo that will fit on a C-130. The launches of three additional aircraft were simulated.

Taking part in the exercise are Pope people from security police, intelligence, weather, and base services, as well as a 20-person airlift control element.

About 25 combat control team members also were deployed to prepare for and coordinate airdrop operations.

"We had a lot of new people on this exercise," Col. Thomas L. Stiles, Forward Operating Base commander, said. "We had others in Savannah who had deployed before, but were working in different jobs this time."

"It was a very challenging schedule for everyone, but they lived up to it."

The 317th Security Police Squadron staged a total personnel recall Feb. 21 for the ORE and deployed eight people to Savannah to provide "real world" security for the aircraft sent there.

Here at Pope two four-man security police fire teams successfully suppressed a simulated terrorist attack Feb. 21.

The teams responded when a mock terrorist group simulated attacking and killing a gate sentry. One team operated as a blocking force while the other maneuvered to overcome the terrorists, according to Capt. Eugene Hindle, security police commander.

"I'll go to war anytime with these guys," said CMSgt. Harold Lee, superintendent of the 3rd Mobile Aerial Port Squadron. He was referring to the 63-man 3 MAPS force that deployed Sunday to handle off and onload requirements at Savannah.

"They do a lot of it and they do it quick," he said. In a 22-hour period the airmen handled more than 562,000 pounds of cargo and 685 passengers on 30 aircraft.

But the highpoint of the day, the Chief said, was when a team of four down-loaded and reassembled a 25-foot TAC loader in only 17 minutes. The job usually takes 45 minutes for a seasoned crew.

"I take my hat off to TSgt. O.C. Salinas, SSgt. Steve Huducek, SSgt. David Wyman and A1C. Allen Edwards for preventing costly delays and to the rest of my crew because that's how professional they are," Chief Lee said.

## At a glance

### Main runway closed

Wing officials announced Feb. 22 Pope's main runway will be closed for 21 days of repairs. Aircraft launching or landing during the day will use taxiway 10. Night traffic will use the assault strip.

"People driving near taxiway 10 need to exercise extreme caution, since this is now an active runway," said Col. Jerry Angell, 317th Combat Support Group commander.

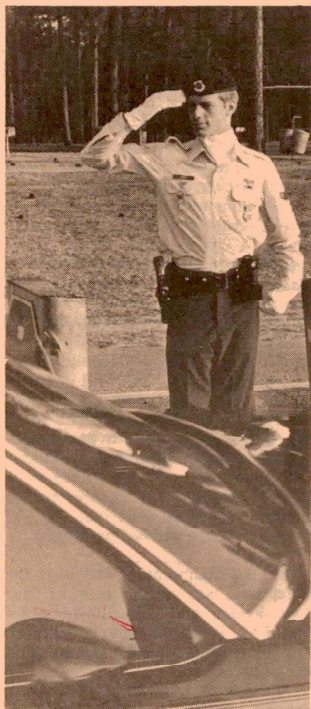
### Child safe after kidnapping

The eight-year-old daughter of an Air Force enlisted member is safe after being abducted from Pope Elementary School about 3 p.m. last Friday.

The child was allegedly forced at knifepoint to enter an automobile as she left school, according to witnesses.

Arrested in connection with the incident was an active duty staff sergeant. He faces kidnapping and abuse charges, and is subject to trial by military courts-martial. Air Force Security Police stopped the abductor's vehicle at a road block on Hurst Drive about two hours after the abduction. He was apprehended and the child recovered uninjured.

She was taken to the USAF Clinic on Pope for examination and later transferred to Womack Army Hospital, where she remained overnight for observation.

## Expanding military jurisdiction will affect Air Force people

Recent rulings by the Military Court of Appeals expanding military jurisdiction in drug-related cases tops the list of rulings that will directly impact Air Force people in the future, according to the court's chief judge.

Judge Robinson O. Everett, who was appointed head of the court in April 1980, added that the legal decision having the next greatest impact concerned the right of commanders to search barracks and use contraband found and seized during a search in military court martial proceedings. He made the observations during a tour of Pope and Fort Bragg last week.

Judge Everett said the landmark Trotter case decided 18 months ago involving the conviction of an airman for the off-base sale of LSD would impact the greatest on active-duty military members. In that decision, the court held that almost every involvement of military members in the commerce of drugs off base had a service connection. A service connection is necessary to establish military jurisdiction in a case.

The case having the next greatest impact on military people, the judge said, would be the Middleton case decided last year. In this case, involving an Army specialist, the court established the principle that drug dogs can be used during health and welfare barracks inspections and that contraband seized can be used as evidence in a court martial.

Judge Everett said these decisions had helped his court strike a better balance between the need for discipline in the military and the constitutional rights of military people.

"It is a very difficult task to hit a midpoint," the judge said. He said the Military Court of Appeals had followed the lead of the Supreme Court in this balancing act.

"Our court tries to follow the guidelines of the Supreme Court as well as we can," Judge Everett said. "We sometimes may not understand their opinions fully. But to the extent that we understand them, we attempt to apply the same rules."

"So if you have a trend in the Supreme Court and other federal courts, we will generally follow suit except that we recognize that there are some unique conditions that apply to the military community that makes military law somewhat different than civil law."

Judge Everett, who is a retired Colonel in the Air Force Reserve, said he was impressed with the high level of combat readiness and morale he had seen at Pope.

Commenting on the total force concept, he said he was impressed with how the Air Force had integrated the Reserves and National Guard into its everyday operation.

"I don't think anyone does it better than the Air Force from what I've seen," Judge Everett said.

## Amtrak offers discount fares

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- Amtrak is offering special round-trip discount fares through April 1. Another special travel package, "See-Level Fares" is available through April 24. Either can be combined with family plan or military discounts.

The round-trip discount is good on most long-distance trains in the eastern United States. Passengers paying \$45 or more for one-way travel can make the return trip for \$10, regardless of distance. The return trip must be com-

pleted by April 1.

Under the "See-Level Fare," passengers can purchase a 14-day or 30-day ticket for unlimited travel and stopovers on all of Amtrak's transcontinental and Pacific coast trains. The only restriction is that passengers may not travel over the same route more than twice. Tickets and reservations are available through April 24, with travel permitted until May 7 for the 14-day ticket and May 23 for the 30-day ticket.

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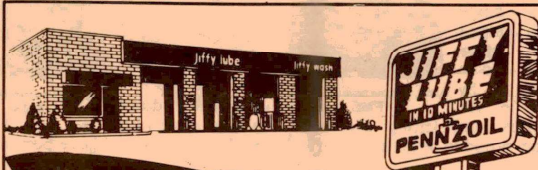

## Bicycle thefts rising

Now that warmer weather is here, more and more people will be using their bicycles. When this happens, more bicycles will be left unattended and insecure which will allow the theft

rate to increase unless a few precautions are taken.

In the last two weeks, six bicycles have been taken from Pope Air Force Base. Of the bicycles stolen, two thirds of them were left insecure and in plain sight. You can help prevent the theft of your bicycle by following a few simple steps.

First, do you lock your bicycle up? Is it locked to a fixed object such as a tree, bicycle rack or support post of your carport? Do you put your bicycle

away at night in an area where it can't be seen from the road? Well, if you answered no to any of these questions, you are making it easy for someone to steal your bicycle. This doesn't mean that following all of these steps will make your bicycle theft proof. It just makes your bicycle hard to steal and the average thief will look for something easier.

Let's say your bicycle was stolen. If it was recovered by the police, would they know who to return it to? Chances

are no, unless it's registered. To register your bicycle, bring it to the Security Police in Bldg. 378. Once there, the bicycle will be engraved with an identification number and a registration sticker attached. Now, if the bicycle is found by any police agency in the United States, it can be identified as belonging to you.

Is it worth taking an extra minute to secure and register your bicycle? We hope it is so you can keep enjoying your bicycle long past this summer.

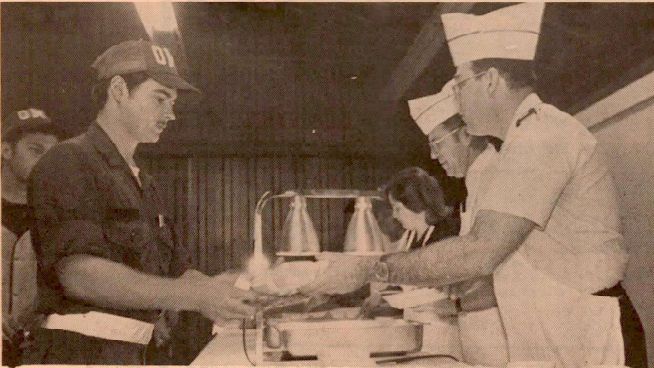
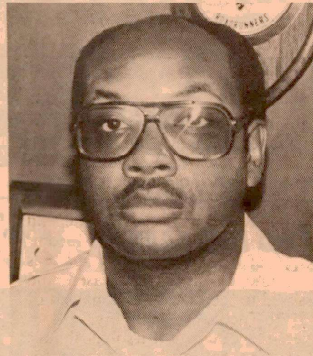

Sergeant Adams has had two other suggestions adopted and currently has two suggestions pending approval.

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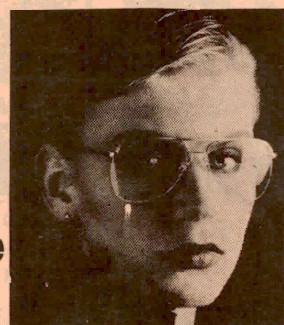
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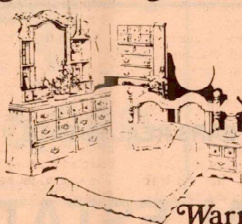
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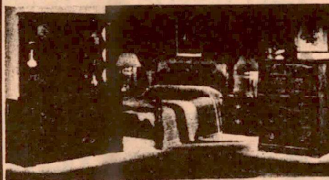
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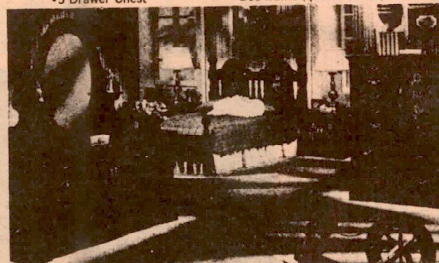

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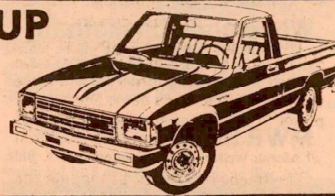
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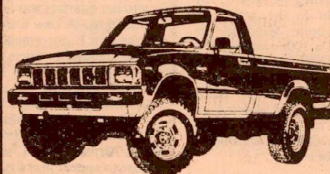
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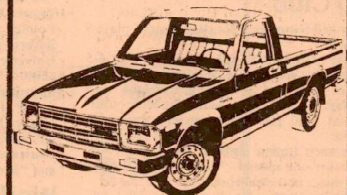
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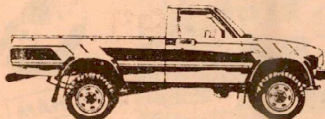
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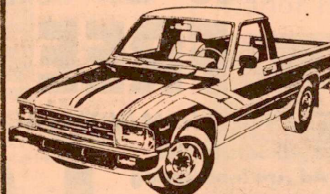
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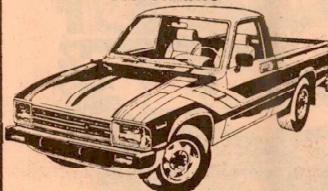
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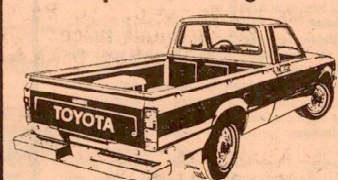
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## Chickenpox affects children

Chickenpox is a common viral infection that affects children. Although it can be seen anytime during the year, it is most common between January and March. The incubation period, that time from when a child is exposed until they actually break out, is from 10 to 20 days. It can be seen at any age, but children between the ages of 4 and 7 are most commonly affected.

The illness usually begins with a low grade fever (100 to 102 degrees), tiredness and a rash. In children, the rash and other common viral symptoms such as cold symptoms, fever and tiredness or irritability begin at the same time. In teenagers and adults, the rash is preceded by a one to two day period of headache, fever and loss of appetite.

The most striking characteristic of chickenpox is how rapidly each of the lesions or bumps appear. Looking somewhat like a dew drop on a rose petal, they generally start on the neck or upper chest and back and quickly spread to other parts of the body.

Although they are usually most numerous on the chest, stomach and back, they can be seen on any part of the body; including in the mouth, in the ears and nose and on the bottom of the feet.

Each individual bump starts as a small, flat, red spot, becomes a red-colored pimple, opens, and crusts over. The entire process takes only six to 12 hours for each bump and new ones keep appearing for about three days. As the illness progresses, one can see

numerous bumps in various stages; some red and flat, some like pimples and some already crusted over.

The child with chickenpox is considered contagious until all bumps have crusted over. This process will take between eight and ten days. During this period, the child should be kept out of school and away from other children who have not had the disease.

Treatment is directed at making the child comfortable, including the giving of aspirin or Tylenol for fever or discomfort or calamine lotion and corn starch baths to relieve itching.

If itching is severe or if the child develops unusual complications such as extremely high fever or an earache, the child should be seen at the clinic. Should a visit to the clinic become necessary, the clinic should be advised prior to the child arriving so that proper measures can be taken to keep the child isolated from the other patients.

### Scholarship available

The Pope Noncommissioned Officers' Wives' Club will again be awarding a scholarship grant in June. Applicants must be a family member of an active duty NCO stationed at Pope, or a family member of a retired Air Force NCO. The applicant's sponsor must be a member of the Pope NCO Club. Family members of deceased Air Force NCOs are also eligible for the grant.

Completed applications must be received on or before May 15. Requirement and application sheets may be obtained from the guidance office of the individual's school.

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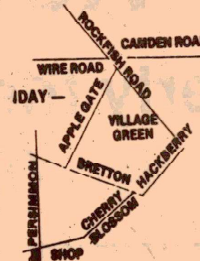
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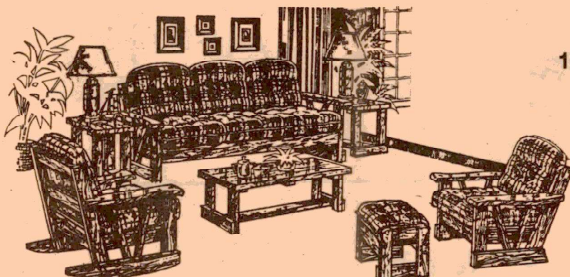
