A composite flying force of Air Force, Navy and the Marines took part in a training exercise, called Quick Thrust 1-82, at Fort Stewart, Ga., April 23. The pilots, operating fighter and tactical aircraft flew simulated combat missions in support of training activities of the Army's 24th Infantry Division.

Pope sent three of its C-130 Hercules transport aircraft and a comparable number of crews to participate in the exercise. According to base officials, there were a total of 25 Hercules drops and 11 airland missions in support of the resumply efforts.

"For the first time since I can remember, we will be dropping real Army materials into a hostile environment," said Capt. Larry Gore, Pope's tactics planner and member of the

mission control team. "In this exercise, a hostile environment employs threat simulators and opposing units."

The 317th Tactical Airlift Wing, here, provided airlift command for the Hercules aircraft deployed; however, 9th Air Force at Shaw AFB, S.C. is headquarters for the exercise.

Other exercise participants will include units of the Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard. "Quick Thrust 1-82" will give fighter aircrews experience in flying a variety of missions in support of ground units, the aircrews will also practice attacking heavily defended targets similar to those they might face during actual combat.

Many of the fighter aircraft deployed and operated from airfields near Fort Stewart, including Savannah Municipal Airport, Ga.; Hunter Army Airfield, Ga.; Charleston AFB, S.C.; Beaufort Marine Corps Air Station, S.C.; as well as other operating locations in the South East.

The aircraft made extensive use of overwater training areas east of Savannah and a special exercise area immediately south of Fort Stewart.

Extensive precautions were taken to reduce or eliminate any adverse impact on local communities. Aircraft operations have been restricted to reduce jet noise to the lowest level consistent with the training objective of the exercise.

Air Force aircraft carried out such missions as close air support, battlefield interdiction, dissimilar air combat, tactical intercepts, aerial refueling, and air radar surveillance. Tactical airlift forces flew simulated resupply missions in support of the Army. Search and Rescue forces practiced infiltrating helicopters into "hostile" territory to pick up simulated downed aircrews.

In addition, Air Force and Air National Guard fighter aircraft simulated attacks on two participating Navy aircraft carriers, the USS FORRESTAL and the USS CARL VINSON. The carriers in turn, were "defended" by Navy F-4 Phantoms and F-14 Tomcats.

The Marines flew F-4s from Marine Air Group 31, Marine Corps Air Station, Beaufort, S.C.

In addition to the flying units, several Air Force and Air National Guard support units took part in the exercise

Rote returners bolster AFAF total

With final figures in after the return Pope people from rotation in Europe, Pope's contribution to the Air Force Assistance Fund totalled \$28,249, 149 percent of the base's projected goal, according to AFAF project officer Maj. Michael Obrien.

AWACS assignments opened to women

WASHINGTON (AFNS) —
Secretary of the Air Force Verne Orr
has announced that women will be
assigned to flight and mission crew
positions aboard United State airborne warning and control system air-

In the past, women were excluded from duties aboard the E-3A AWACS. Now the crew positions will be open to women officers and enlisted members. Women aircrew members are expected to begin AWACS training by late summer at Tinker AFB, Ok.

Opening the new career field was based on an assessment by the Air Force chief of staff and senior commanders of current and anticipated AWACS requirements. The Air Force has determined that the E-3A is a combat-support aircraft rather than a combat aircraft. By public law, women may not be assigned as crewmembers aboard combat aircraft.

The KC-135 Stratotanker and C-141 Starlifter transport are examples of other combat-support aircraft to which women are presently assigned.

North Carolina primary delayed

The North Carolina primary, scheduled for May 4, has been delayed to an unspecified date. Absentee voters who applied for a ballot in the May 4 primary will not receive a ballot until the new primary date has been set. State election officials have targeted June 1 as the earliest possible date for the new primary; however, it could take place as late as August, they say

Each organization on each installation has a voting officer who is intimately familiar with each state's voting requirements and still less than 30 percent of military members vote.

TDY money can buy trouble

Want to make a little extra money on your next Temporary Duty Assignment? That kind of cash is perfect for buying you a lot of trouble.

Last year, some Air Force members came up with some pretty unique ways to make money while TDY. Since the Air Force Office of Special InOf course there are a number of reasons, no doubt, why we collectively do not vote, but in any case, we do need representation in Washington and I think we all agree on that. There are several organizations which dedicate a large part of their total budget to that end - the Air Force Association is one such organization.

I had the honor and privilege of seeing first-hand the kinds of things they do that contribute significantly to the "Blue Suiters" welfare, and of course since my interests are primarily with enlisted people in general and more specifically those at Tinker, I will talk to that aspect of being an enlisted member of the Air Force Association.

I would first like to dispel any notions that the AFA is an officer oriented organization. Thirty percent of the blue suit population who are members are enlisted, and that figure is growing larger each year. That is of course an indication that we recognize the need to be an AFA member.

Secondly, I would like to mention just a few of the Air Force programs that are supported by the AFA where enlisted people are the sole benefactor:

the 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year program, of which I was a selectee in 1977, was instituted by the AFA when there were 23 selectees. They have continually sought to upgrade the quality of the program since its inception and now have it fine tuned to the point where it is probably the most prestigious award program in the Air Force for enlisted people.

The AFA hosts the World Wide Senior Enlisted Advisor's Conference each year, providing a forum from which issues of interest to you may be discussed. The AFA Enlisted Council is staffed by the 12 Outstanding Airmen of the Year for the year for which they were selected and provide a broad based source of information to the AFA on issues concerning Air Force enlisted people. The AFA then goes on record as a supporter of a particular issue which is subsequently supported before Congressional hearings by AFA Representatives. As a direct result of one council's input in 1964, the position of Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force was established in 1967.

Likewise, AFA efforts sparked by support of the Enlisted Council, led to the establishment of the Community College of the Air Force and to degree granting authority. Other issues which AFA supports include, but are not limited to:

--Full travel benefits for junior enlisted families

--Enlisted per diem comparable to officer per diem

--Repeal of curbs that bar enlisted band members from moon lighting as musicians

--Enlistment and reenlistment bonuses for active duty and reserve component members

--A fully funded Airmen Education and Commissioning Program

-Direct commissioning of qualified enlisted members.

The list is endless.

With organizations such as the AFA to represent us in Washington, why do we need unionization? I say we don't. Not only is the AFA interested in us and our welfare, they are also dedicated Americans who believe in America and in doing only those things that will serve to strengthen it, and not divide it.

Join the AFA as soon as the opportunity presents itself.

vestigation is always looking for ways to help the Air Force reduce travel expenses, we invited a number of these "financial wizards" to explain their methods. Admittedly, some were a little reluctant at first, but their stories came out in the end and their commanders insure that they each got "good value" for the money they "earned."

A good example is a sergeant who recently purchased himself a reduction in rank and 14 days extra duty. Others bought similar packages and were even invited to provide "matching funds."

Some people ask why the Air Force bothers with these "small fry" and even if the Air Force thinks it is important, "why should I?"

Well, the Air Force thinks it is important because thousands of dollars

are lost by each command, every year, because people cheat on their TDY vouchers. Add that up throughout the Air Force and it comes to a lot of tools, tires, bombs and whatever else the Air Force needs to operate. You should care because every dollar someone steals from the Air Force costs you too. How does that work? Think about it. If the Air Force loses a dollar, taken from you in taxes, it must replace it by getting another dollar from you.

What can you do about it? We make

it easy for your. If you think someone is defrauding the government, through travel vouchers or any other way, The Inspector General, Lt. Gen. Howard Leaf, guarantees that your suspicions will be taken seriously and investigated thoroughly by specially trained people and has provided three ways for you to

tell someone about your suspicions. The Air Force Fraud, Waste and Abuse Hotline can be called any time, day or night. It is Autovon 227-1061. If you use the Hotline, you don't even need to use your name if you don't want to.

Another way to report fraud is to call the base AFOSI Detachment at 4264. Any agent will be glad to take your information and, if you wish, your name will not be revealed to anyone without your permission.

If neither of these avenues appeal to you, then write to AF/IGO, Pentagon, Rm 5D286, Washington, D.C., 20330. If you don't want your name to be revealed, you can leave the letter unsigned or just say that you don't want your name used and your wishes will be respected.

Fraud, waste and abuse - who, me?

How many times have you walked out of your office or work area with government property? It might simply be a piece of pipe left over from a plumbing job on base or a pad of paper or a pen that you didn't even think about. In these cases, the intent is not malicious or premeditated, but still represents the waste of government resources.

It's not just simple pilferage, but can range from large scale fraud by overpricing of materials by a civilian contractor working for the government, to fraud by married personnel using a meal card, to mismanagement of resources. These situations are resulting in enormous losses of government resources each year, costing hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The Military Airlift Command has recently begun an intense drive to identify and prevent fraud, waste, and abuse within the command. This action comes in conjunction with a new hard line approach taken by the Air Force. It begins with us. It's our responsibility to help identify existing and potential cases of FWA. The real secret is to prevent it in the first place.

Look around your work area and see what can be done to better utilize all resources. If you identify an area that could prevent the waste of materials, you may help to save the Air Force

valuable dollars. If you further submit your idea in the form of a suggestion on an AF Form 1000, you may bag some valuable dollars for yourself. If you discover that an existing case of FWA cannot be solved locally, the Air Force Inspector General's office has established a hotline to investigate reported cases of FWA. To report fraud, waste, or abuse, call autovon 277-1061. Supply officials with as

much information as possible. Without specific information, reported cases cannot be investigated. Your calls are confidential.

What's the ultimate goal? It is to tatally eliminate fraud, waste and abuse. It's up to us to do our part to save our resources. So the next time you see a case of FWA, regardless of how large or small, report it. It'll make work better for us all.

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MAC Senior Enlisted Advisor visits Pope

Chief Davis addressed Pope audience at NCO Club 'I am the CINCMAC's voice on enlisted matters'

(Editor's note: CMSgt. Harry Davis, Military Airlift Command, senior enlisted advisor visited Pope April 24 to speak at the awards banquet of the Pope Chapter of the Air Force Sergeant's Association. While here Chief Davis consented to be interviewed by SSgt. Cynthia Hedrick, 317th Public Affairs Division.)

Q. What exactly does your job as MAC senior enlisted advisor entail?

A. To put it in a nutshell, I am the enlisted voice for the Commander In Chief Military Airlift Command, Gen. James R. Allen. My job is to go out in the field and let him know the state of the health, morale and welfare of the troops and at the same time let the troops know what the CINCMAC is thinking.

Q. What is the biggest gripe you get from young enlisted folks?

A. For the young troops in the dormitories it's the dorms. They are just too crowded for the life style of our young people. Today young folks want

their privacy. These buildings are also old — for the most part they were built in the Korean War.

We would also like to see our troops in the dorms get separate rations, so they would have the choice of eating in the dining halls or not.

Q. Why has the Air Force historically recruited the highest quality of troops?

A. We are an all-volunteer force and right now we have 30,000 people knocking on the door to get in. We can afford to be very selective and take only the best. Last year we met all our recruiting goals and more than 95 percent of these people had high school diplomas. Of course whenever their is a downward trend in the economy first term enlistment and retention are up.

Q. What will happen when the economy picks back up?

A. The economy is only one reason why we were able to meet our recruiting goals. Recent pay raises have given us comparable pay with the civilian sector. If we can maintain this pay comparability, come up with a new G.I. Bill and come up with per diem equity we will continue to be successful. Other changes that would help immeasurably would be improved CHAMPUS benefits and to provide better travel entitlements so we don't have people paying \$1,000-7,000 out of pocket to move.

Q. What did the recently completed Gallant Eagle Exercise say about our airlift capabilities.

A. It demonstrated we can deploy troops and equipment rapidly in remote areas. This was the biggest airdrop operation since World War II. Although we at MAC feel that we need more airlift, we've consistently shown that we can do the job whenever asked.

Q. Here at Pope the military is strongly supported by the civilian community. How does this compare with other MAC bases?


A. Pope has one of the closest relationships with the civilian community that I have seen. Around the country civilians are on a high as far as the military is concerned. This is very healthy and something we've always needed.

Q. Did the Iranian situation contribute to the surge of patriotism in the country and is that feeling waning?

country and is that feeling waning?

A. The release of the hostages probably did more than anything else to cause the resurgence of patriotism in this country. In the late 60s and early 70s it wasn't fashionable to talk about patriotism but now people all over the country are not afraid to tell you they love America. The fact that the President is not afraid to wave the flag has also contributed to an increase in patriotism. I think General Allen put it best when he said the best social program is the preservation of freedom.

Team members will be available following each briefing for individual counseling sessions. If your squadron's briefing conflicts with your schedule, feel free to attend another day with one of the other squadrons.

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
