Get Ready for GovTravels!

Please join us February 27 through March 1 for the 2023 GovTravels Symposium hosted by the National Defense Transportation Association and co-sponsored by the Defense Travel Management Office, in association with the General Services Administration. We are pleased to be back in person again this year at the Hilton Alexandria Mark Center in Alexandria, Virginia.

The theme of this year's event is "On the Road Again – Industry and Government Travel Rebounds." Presenters from across Government and the private sector will engage participants with informative presentations and thought-provoking discussions focused on Government and travel industry strategies for meeting the challenges of increased travel volumes, sustaining post-pandemic safety measures, and improving the customer experience through the inspired application of current and emerging technologies.

Attendees will have access to an impressive list of guest speakers and educational Travel Academy sessions. A few notable sessions include:

- Demonstration of the Department of Defense's new travel capability, MyTravel, which will eventually replace the aging Defense Travel System.

- NDTA Government Passenger Travel Advisory Council (GPTAC) Committee Meetings, broken out by travel industry segments, will be open to all for observation.

Updated Authority and New Travel Capabilities

The implementation of MyTravel, designated to replace the Defense Travel System (DTS), is well under way within the Fourth Estate organizations supported by the Defense Agencies Initiative Enterprise Resource Planning platform. Nearly 90% of those organizations are now “live,” and the Defense Travel Management Office is working with these organizations to complete their onboarding activities for all eligible travelers on the new platform.

In October 2022, Under Secretary of Defense, Personnel & Readiness Hon. Gilbert Cisneros issued a memorandum, “Mandatory Use of MyTravel,” which states that MyTravel has been designated as the single official travel system for currently supported functions, as well as those supported in the future, for all organizations that are using MyTravel.

Then, in November 2022, DoD expanded the scope of supported travel capabilities by implementing a new Travel Allowance Module. MyTravel can now support approximately 80% of all travel types across the Department.

With the implementation of the Travel Allowance Module, MyTravel can now support these additional types of travel:

- Travel to multiple TDY locations
- Travel with limited per diem including:
 - Proportional Meal Rate (1 or 2 meals provided, typically as part of a conference/training fee, or 1 or two meals available to Service members in a government dining facility)
 - Government Meal Rate (all meals available to Service members in a government dining facility)
 - Reduced incidental expenses rate for OCONUS TDY at a military installation
 - Other types of travel when a reduced per diem rate is applicable (e.g., Reserve/Guard Travel, Field Duty, Medical Travel, Government Vessel Travel)

A new informational messaging overlay, WalkMe, has been added to provide on-screen tips to step travelers through certain screens. Updated training materials with new workflows and screenshots are now available at the MyTravel resource page, <https://www.travel.dod.mil/Programs/DoD-Travel-Systems/MyTravel/>.

As a reminder, before booking any trip, onboarded travelers should use the DoD TravelBot to determine if they must use MyTravel or the Defense Travel System (DTS). Use of the TravelBot is required to log into DTS for all onboarded organizations. DoD updates the TravelBot regularly to adapt to new MyTravel functionality, so travel that was previously out of scope may now be accommodated.



The airline lost my luggage. *What do I do?*

So, after waiting for what seems like an eternity at baggage claim, you realize your luggage went to Old York (England) rather than New York! Ugh, what do you do now? Your first stop should be to call your airline to determine what coverage they provide when your luggage is either delayed or permanently lost. General information on air carrier responsibilities can be found on the US Department of Transportation website at: <https://www.transportation.gov/lost-delayed-or-damaged-baggage>.

If your airfare was charged to your DoD Government Travel Charge Card, Citibank (through Visa) offers

coverage for lost luggage that is secondary to your airline coverage. This means that any loss not covered by your airline MAY be covered by Visa and you must file a claim with the airline first. For additional information on this coverage, and the process for submitting a claim, call the customer assistance number on the back of your travel card.

Any costs related to the loss, including replacing personal items, is NOT reimbursable and cannot be claimed on your travel voucher, nor should they be charged to your travel card.

DTMO Cloud Migration Coming in March



The Defense Travel Management Office is migrating certain website tools to the Cloud, in alignment with the DoD CIO strategy. As a result, select applications will be offline starting March 17, 2023 for a period of time. The timeframe varies based on the application and workarounds for the inaccessible applications will be posted on the DTMO website during the downtime. Thanks for your patience as we complete the alignment with DoD strategy!

DoD Preferred Commercial Lodging in 2023!

The DoD Preferred Commercial Lodging program has expanded to 80 sites with 420 commercial hotels for the 2023 calendar year.

DoD Preferred lodging facilities are select commercial hotels located off installations that have been vetted to meet strict quality, safety, and security requirements. DoD Preferred properties offer rates below per diem, as well as additional traveler protections (no fee for

cancellations before 4pm, etc.) and conveniences (free internet, free parking, etc.) at no additional cost.

The Joint Travel Regulations (JTR) require DoD travelers on temporary duty (TDY) to an Integrated Lodging Program site or surrounding metro area to book DoD Preferred commercial lodging before other commercial lodging options.

A few 2023 program highlights:

- 93% of participating hotels with 3 or 4 Diamond (AAA) or Crown (NTM) ratings; (up from 83% in 2022)
- 87% of participating hotels include breakfast in the room rate
- 96% of participating hotels offer complimentary parking
- 14% are extended stay hotels

Real ID Extended

On December 5, 2022, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Transportation Security Administration (TSA) announced that the deadline for the full enforcement date of REAL IDs would be extended from May 3, 2023 to May 7, 2025. These extra 24 months will allow for all states to ensure that their residents will be able to obtain a REAL ID before the enforcement date. This extra time also allows for the improvement of processes to allow travel to be more efficient and accessible.

The extension of the deadline for residents to obtain REAL IDs is necessary. Many state licensing agencies and other agencies are severely backlogged because of the COVID-19 pandemic and are still working to get through all of the residents that tried to obtain a new license during the shutdown. To better work through the overwhelming amount of residents trying to obtain REAL IDs, many agencies are automatically extending the expiration date of licenses and moving to only accepting those with appointments.



The REAL ID increases security standards among all states. These standards include anti-counterfeiting technology, preventing insider fraud, and ensuring that the individual is who they claim to be.


After the deadline, any traveler over the age of 18 will need a REAL ID compliant driver's license or another acceptable form of ID to travel such as a U.S. passport. These standards of the REAL ID are enforced in all 50 states, D.C., and some U.S. territories and have improved the liability and accuracy of state issued identification cards. Even if you have TSA Precheck, you will still need a REAL ID.

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You may obtain a REAL ID from your state driver's licensing agency. The state website will define what documentation is required. At a minimum, you must provide documentation showing: 1) Full Legal Name; 2) Date of Birth; 3) Social Security Number; 4) Two Proofs of Address of Principal Residence; and 5) Lawful Status.
