CHAPTER II.

GENERAL DUTIES OF THE REVENUE-CUTTER SERVICE.

10. The act approved August 4, 1790, and subsequent legislaties fixed by tion, fix the following as the duties of the Revenue-Cutter Service: law.

The protection of the customs revenue. (R. S., 2747, 2758, Customs 2760, 2762, 3059, 5318.)

The cooperation with the Navy when directed by the President. (R. S., 2757.)

3. The assistance of vessels in distress. (R. S., 1536, 2759.)

4. The enforcement of the laws pertaining to the quarantine. Quarantine. (R. S., 4792.)

5. The enforcement of the neutrality laws. (R. S., 5288.) Neutrality

6. The enforcement of the navigation and other laws governing laws. Navigation merchant vessels.

(act 6 June, 1900), and in regard to the movements and anchorages of vessels in the St. Marys River, Michigan (acts 6 Mar., 1896, and 26 Apr., 1906).

10. 21. The enforcement of regulations promulgated by the Secretary of Commerce and Labor pursuant to law to provide for the safety of life on navigable waters during regattas or marine parades. (Act April 28, 1908.)

Duty for 22. The President may direct any vessel of the Revenue-Cutter public service. Service to perform any duty or make any cruise, which, in his judgment, may be necessary for the public service.

Duty for 23. The Secretary of the Treasury may direct the officers and Treasury Devessels of the Revenue-Cutter Service to perform any duty which, partment. in his judgment, may be necessary for the protection, collection, and security of the customs revenue. (R. S., 2758, 2762.)

Duty for 24. For duty connected with the customs revenue, vessels of the Revenue-Cutter Service are subject to the direction of such colcustoms. lectors of the customs revenue, or other officers thereof, as from time to time may be designated for that purpose by the Secretary of the Treasury. (R. S., 2760.)

Exclusively 25. Vessels of the Revenue-Cutter Service shall be used exclufor public serv sively for the public service, and in no way for private purposes. Ice. (Act 7 July, 1884.)

CHAPTER III.

CLASSIFICATION AND STATIONS OF REVENUE CUTTERS.
