

TIME STOOD SYBEL A YEAR AGO THIS GOLDIER SPRANG FROM A GOAST GUARD LANDING BARGE AND DIED AT THE BARRICADES OF VESTERN EUROPE, ON THE BULLET-SWEPT SHORES OF NORMANDY. MEN WHO WERE WITH MIN WENT ON THROUGH FRANCE, DELGIUM, GERMANY, AND NOW THEY'RE PUSHING FORWARD TO VICTORY IN THE PACIFIC AREA AGAINST THE JAPS. A YEAR HAS TAUCHT THEW MUCH; THESE MEN WERE GREEN TROOPS BUT NOW ARE BATTLE-TRIED AS THEY FACE THE JAPS. BUT TIME STOOD STILL FOR THEIR FALLEN BUDDY WHEN THEY PLACED CROSSED RIFLES BESIDE HIS BODY AS THEIR FIMAL TRIBUTE SEFURE PUSHING ON. AN EXTRA WAR BOND. WILL MASTEN THE DAY WHEN SCENES LIKE THESE WILL NO LONGER BE COMMONPLACE.



SHALL NOT HAVE DIED IN VAIN-- A COAST GUARD COMBAT PHOTOGRAPHER COVERING THE INVASION OF NORMANDY CAME ACROSS THIS SIMPLE MONUMENT TO A FALLEN SOLDIER. THE MOUND OF EARTH, THE AUTOMATIC RIFLE, THE HELMET SILHOUETTED AGAINST THE SKY WAS ALL THAT WAS LEFT TO MARK HIS LAST RESTING PLACE. THEN THE MEN WENT AWAY, FOR THERE WAS WORK TO DO. THERE IS STILL THAT SAME DIRTY WORK AHEAD FOR MILLIONS OF OUR FIGHTING MEN WHO ARE BATTLING TO MAKE CERTAIN THAT THE DEAD SHALL NOT HAVE DIED IN VAIN. ON JUNE 6, 1944 IT WAS THE NAZI. TODAY, THE JAP. THE WORDS ARE SPELLED DIFFERENTLY, BUT THE IDEA IS STILL THE SAME.


