The 2024 BRICS summit in Kazan solidified an anti-liberal counter-order, challenging the rules-based international system. With its expansion to 23 members, the bloc, financially led by China, seeks to evade global restrictions, and advance its agendas, though it faces coordination challenges and diverse objectives among its members.

6. <u>China's Next Step in Modernizing the People's Liberation Army: A New Reserve Service System</u>

Xi Jinping has emphasized the modernization and restructuring of PLA reserve forces in recent years. By the end of 2021, nearly all the People's Liberation Army's reserve divisions and brigades in each service, often equipped with antiquated equipment, quietly disappeared as a new reserve-base structure started training troops and small units to plug and play into active-duty units.
